A proposal by Tyler County to provide curb, gutter and storm sewer at Highway intersections in Spurger and Warren was approved this week by the State Highway Department.

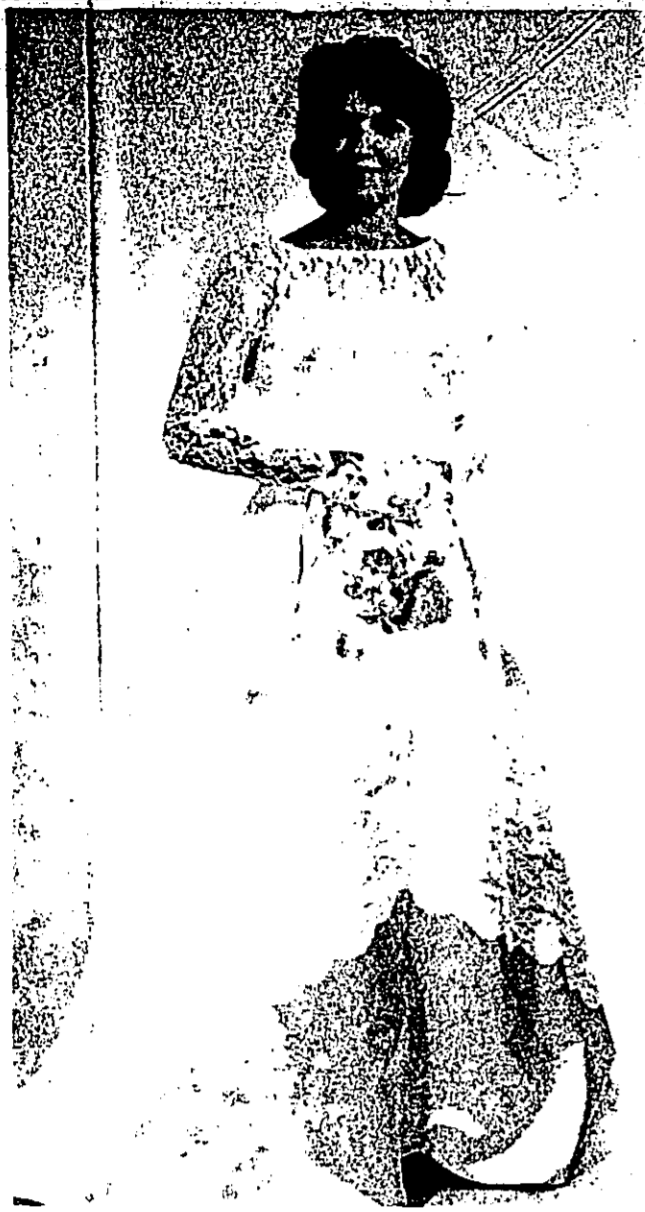

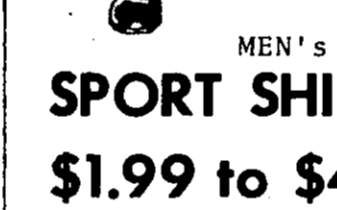

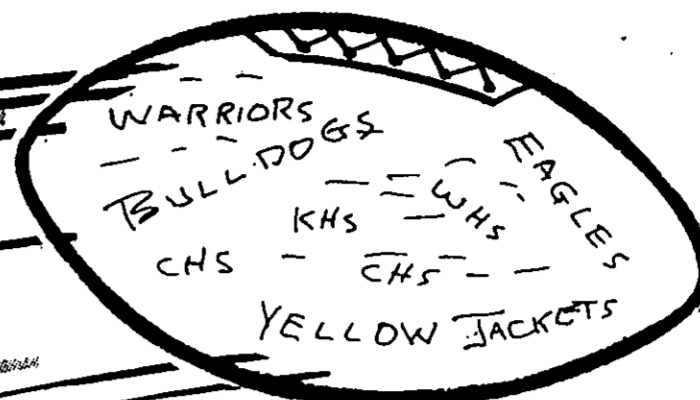
