Wheat And Scott Schools Win OK On Accreditation

Wheat Junior High School and Scott High School have been officially accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, H. H. McGuire, superintendent of schools, said Tuesday.

Mr. McGuire received notification by letter.

This accreditation makes all schools in the system now in the Southern Association fold.

Mr. McGuire said, "Wheat Elementary school and Scott Elementary were accredited in December of last year following an on-campus visitation last November."

At the regular meeting of the school board Monday night, members studied a report from H. H. McGuire relative to the accreditation of Wheat and Scott elementary schools.

A motion picture for the board was shown. Board members took no action but merely discussed the matter.

The board also talked about teacher students from other school districts in the county who are taught here.

Each year the board makes a decision on whether or not to continue to accept transfers. H. H. McGuire, superintendent, usually renders the decision.

J. Wood Fain, board member, was appointed to represent the school board on the board of the Allan Shivers Memorial Library. He will fill the vacancy created when Stanley Lindsey, former member, moved away.

Board members also spent considerable time studying the local fund apportionment regarding a proposed teacher pay raise of \$40 monthly due to be before the next session of the legislature.

Don David, co-captain of eight yards in the first period to break a 0-0 deadlock. Chester leads 10-0 and then ran over for two more points to put his team ahead for good.

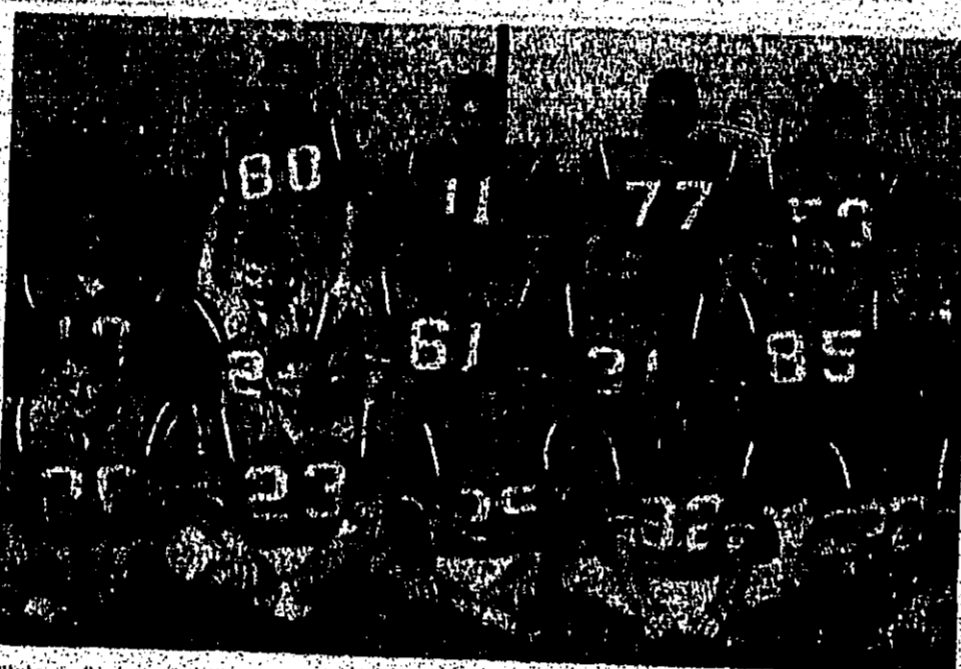

Prospect of bumper deer harvest beckons in Tyler County. The deer season opens in Tyler County Saturday, two full days ahead of the legislature's season in many counties.

For those interested, the season will close around 4:30 a.m. Saturday. The season is falling about halfway through the first quarter and due to be full about May 10. The season closes about noon or a little after and between 1950 and 1959, the weather has been fair, crisp, northerly and warming during the day with the possibility of early morning fog. However, we aren't making any firm statements about the weather. About the only thing you can say is that it is subject to change.

Hunters are again urged to exercise due caution with rifle and shotgun. Remember, a fatal accident can happen in a twinkling if you can draw sight on a living deer and no trophy is worth an injured or dead hunter.

Trifly hunters are urged to report the date and time of their hunt to the game warden if you hunt from a tree stand, don't try to climb the tree with a loaded shotgun or rifle. Never pull a firearm toward you muscle first, say when taking it out of the car after climbing a fence.

Pressure Unit Presented Tyler County Hospital

The local chapter of the National Foundation (March of Dimes) has formally presented the Tyler County Hospital an intermittent positive pressure breathing machine.

This equipment was selected by the doctors of the hospital as the most needed equipment which would have a general and wide range of uses.

The IPPM machine can be used for almost any situation where difficulty in breathing is experienced, as in asthma, emphysema, or in a newborn, assisting in recovery from a general anesthetic; breathing a patient when an airway is stopped; assisting in breathing a seriously ill patient; the machine is also equipped to give medications that can be inhaled.

The machine was purchased with proceeds raised from the 1968 March of Dimes Drive in Tyler County.

The machine is for use by anyone who may need it as recommended by his family doctor.

W. K. Krauser, hospital administrator, reports that it has been used about three or four times daily since its installation.

Protest Rumored Over Housing Location Here

Possibility of a protest over a proposed location for a new housing project has been mentioned by board of commissioners Wednesday night.

The location is at the corner of Beach and Dogwood streets, southwest of Tyler County Hospital.

The site has been under consideration for some time by the county commissioners. One of the commissioners said Wednesday:

"I have had some calls from people living near the area, who say they are protesting a location there," Mr. Clemons said.

He said that other objection to the location is that it is in the area of a proposed family apply for and with residential status in the neighborhood.

J. F. Felt, executive secretary of the local housing authority, emphasized however that the commission had made no definite decision on any location.

The commission has looked at a number of possible locations for housing projects in the past but at this time, he said:

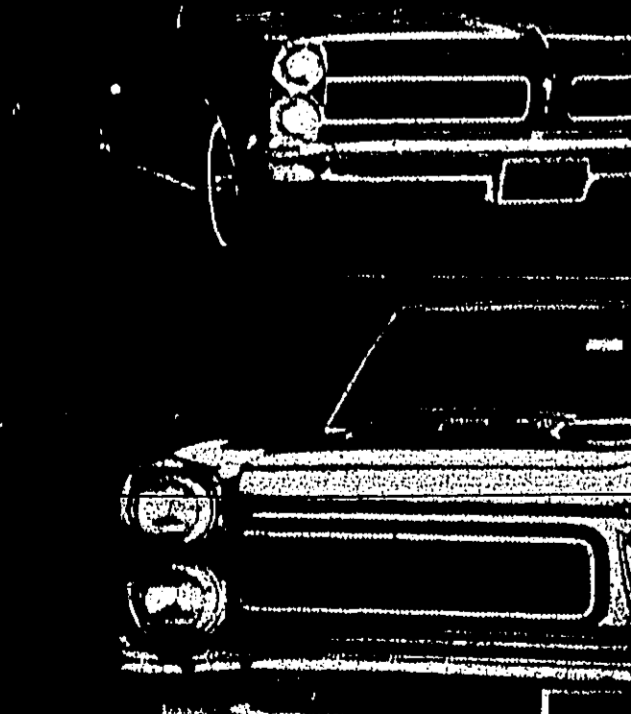

County Oil-Gas Production Is \$2.4 Million Annual Income

A \$2.4 million a year increment in the prosperity of Tyler County is the production of oil and gas, the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association says in its current survey of economic factors stemming from petroleum operations here.

Using last year's U. S. Bureau of Mines figures as a basis, the association has projected what oil and gas activities mean in this county. In 1962 Tyler County was producing more than 640,000 barrels of crude oil and 3.0 billion cubic feet of natural gas. The oil was valued at \$1.2 million; the natural gas at \$484,000.

The county ranks 14th in the state as a total value of oil and gas production.

"Demand for Texas' oil and gas is enough that you can give us an increase of about 10 percent over last year in a relatively short time, this might be proved if you go to the bank."

Oil and gas operators invested an estimated \$400,000 in Tyler County last year in the search for new fields and in the development of zones where production has been found. The Oil and Gas Journal reports that 5 wells were drilled in the county in 1963, resulting in gas wells and 4 dry holes.

Drilling operations included 4 wildcat wells in which operators hunted oil in new territory or at new depths. About \$207,000 of the drilling expenditures was lost to dry holes, the association estimated. Approximately \$200,000 was spent to conduct seismic explorations, mapping underground formations which might contain oil.

Petroleum industry payrolls contribute about \$91,000 a year to the county, according to Texas Employment Commission records. They show about 30 persons directly employed in oil and gas operations.

Occupational Outlooks Are Projected Ahead

Occupational outlooks for the years ahead have been projected by specialists with the U. S. Department of Labor.

Their findings should be of special interest to young people who must soon choose careers, and to their parents, says Mrs. Wanda H. Meyer, Extension specialist in home management.

For the next decade, a least-greatest increase in demand will be for people in professional and technical fields—in jobs that generally require at least a bachelor's degree from college.

Also needed will be more skilled craftsmen, clerical and sales workers, service workers—people for management jobs.

There will be only moderate increases in semi-skilled jobs, few increases in unskilled jobs, a decline in farm jobs.

Outlooks in some specific fields, as indicated by Labor Department studies, are:

Engineers will continue to be in strong demand, with great gains in chemical, electrical and mechanical engineering. The strongest demand will be for those with advanced degrees for research and teaching jobs.

Physicians, dentists and nurses will be needed in growing numbers, along with more medical technologists, dietitians and therapists.

Move Is Taken To Safeguard Public On Goods Labelling

There's more protection on the way for consumers.

It will be unlawful, starting next January 1, to label belts by using such words as "leather, hide or skin" or to use pictures suggesting the hide or skin of animals to describe belts not truly made from animal skin, says Lynn Parks, Extension consumer education specialist.

"Hill leather must then be so marked and not represented as genuine cowhide," says Parks, "or any other term indicating that it is top grain leather, the Texas A. M. specialist says."

If a belt is labeled alligator, it must in fact be made from alligator skin and not be cowhide just made to resemble alligator. Labels must indicate as the case may be, "ground, pulverized, shredded leather, or plastic."

When belt leather has been treated to look like something else, a label must so state. For example, a label might indicate that a product is "synthetic cowhide with simulated alligator grain." If another kind of leather, or non leather material is used for backing, the label must carry this information.

Cork makes light and buoyant duck decoys, but it has a bad habit of crumbling after much use. Prevent this mishap by ambling the decoys, then stretching tightly pulled elastic over each, let dry, then paint in natural colors. This not only will preserve the cork, but it also will make them glare-proof.

The deer hunting season in Tyler County will open Saturday at Sunrise and continue through December 31, according to Gene Samford, conservation officer for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. The season usually begins on November 15 in counties under state regulatory authority, but the commission decided to open the season a day earlier this year in order to give hunters the advantage of a season opening on Saturday, thus giving them a long opening weekend. The deer population is plentiful this year and most are in good condition in spite of the dry summer. Hunters are expected to take a large harvest of the animals in the county. Mr. Samford said that the limit is still two buck deer, and that a hunting license with deer tags is necessary. When a buck is killed, a tag should be fastened immediately to the antlers, he said. Some doe will also be harvested in the northwest part of the county in the Chester area. Doe permits are being issued to landowners according to the amount of acreage they own, Samford said. The deer population in this area needs thinning out, he said. Deer herds across the entire state have been estimated by Texas Parks and Wildlife Biologists as the largest ever. The eradication of the screwworm menace has caused a "population explosion" of young deer in the past two seasons in some areas, although the screwworm was not as big a problem in this county as in other areas. The woods will be crowded with hunters this weekend, with out of county hunters in large numbers expected to be here to take advantage of the long opening weekend. Hunters are warned that permission of landowners should be secured before hunting on private property.

TYLER COUNTY TEAMS TO END SEASON FRIDAY

Tyler County football teams will wind up the 1964 season Friday night with none of the four finishing higher than second in their respective districts. The Warren Warriors complete their schedule last week. Final games this week has Kirbyville at Woodville, Coldsprings at Chester, and Evadale at Colmesneil. The Woodville Eagles have only to get by winless Kirbyville Friday to hold on to second place in the district. The Port Acres Eagles defeated the local eleven at Port Acres in a wild game for the district title, although both teams had to get by Little Cypress at later dates. Colmesneil has lost two in District 26-B, one to Magnolia and last week to Coldsprings, 26 to 20. Coldsprings, coached by Bill Bert Hunter, a Kirby High School graduate, is all-victorious in the district. Hull-Dalsetta, classed as the Number One Class A team in Texas in current standings, was the winner in District 26-A, in which Warren plays. In last Friday's game, Woodville went to Newton for a 20 to 7 win with Quarterback Ken Walker scoring twice and Tom Carroll once. Walker scored the last Woodville touchdown on a 71 yard run with 12 seconds left in the game as the play started. He crossed the line as the clock ran out. Colmesneil was edged, 26 to 20, by Coldsprings, in a hard-fought game. Chester edged Montgomery, 16 to 14, in the other game involving county teams. Bill Bert Hunter is the son of Mrs. Jewel Beck of Spurger and John Hunter of Silsbee, and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Pate.

FOREST FIRE DANGER CITED

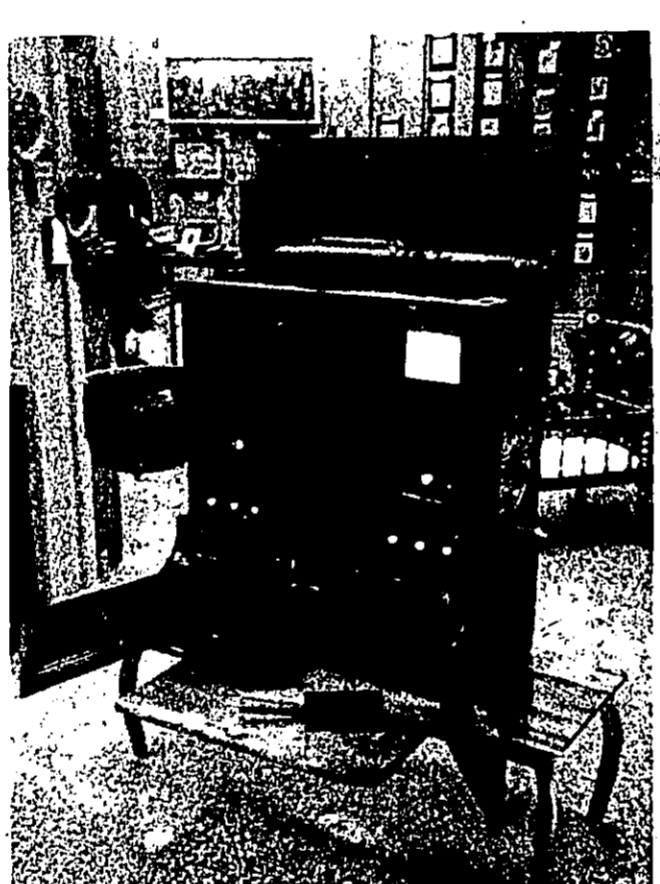
With the deer hunting season opening Saturday, an urgent plea to sportsmen to "Keep Texas Green" has been issued by the Texas Forest Service. Few hunters will start a forest fire purposely, but there is a correlation of rising fire incidents with the opening of the hunting season, the TFS says. Smoking is the number one cause of forest fires in the TFS tabulation, with 349 such fires last year in the service's area. There were 93 fires caused by hunting game from trees by squirrel hunters, and in third place as the cause of forest fires were campfires. Fires set to make it easier to hunt game accounted for 48 blazes. Retaliation counted for 31 fires and greening an area for game caused 20 fires. These fires represented about 15 percent of the total number of fires occurring in Texas forests during 1963.

JOHN K. CANADA RITES ARE PENDING

John K. Canada, principal of the Scott schools here for the past 17 years, died in Tyler County Hospital Wednesday at 9 a. m. following a heart attack Tuesday. Canada held a master's degree from Prairie View College and was recognized as one of the most able school administrators in Texas. Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Mayme Canada, homemaking teacher at Scott High school; one daughter of Houston; and one son and daughter who attend Scott Elementary School. The Scott High and Elementary Schools closed Wednesday afternoon and will be closed until Monday. All outside activities, including the Homecoming planned for Saturday, have been cancelled. This includes the football game Saturday night against Jasper Rowe High School.

PORTABLE WAGON PANTRY ADDED TO HERITAGE COLLECTION

Clyde Gray's Heritage Garden has been presented an antique portable wagon pantry by Mrs. Ida Griffin of Port Arthur. Mrs. Griffin, who is 94 years old, says that the pantry dates back to about 1830.



Made of metal, the pantry has seven compartments opening from the top, with the largest in the center being for flour. This compartment has a built-in sifter at the bottom, and a compartment for coffee on the right in the photo has a built-in grinder with handle and a measuring guide so that only the correct amount of coffee will be ground. At the lower part of the pantry, where the white round handles may be seen, are three compartments on each side for spices and condiments which are removable and which have tops punched for salt and pepper, etc. Also on each side at the top and extending all the way down are two small compartments about 1-1/2 inches in diameter. Just what these compartments could have been used for is conjecture today.

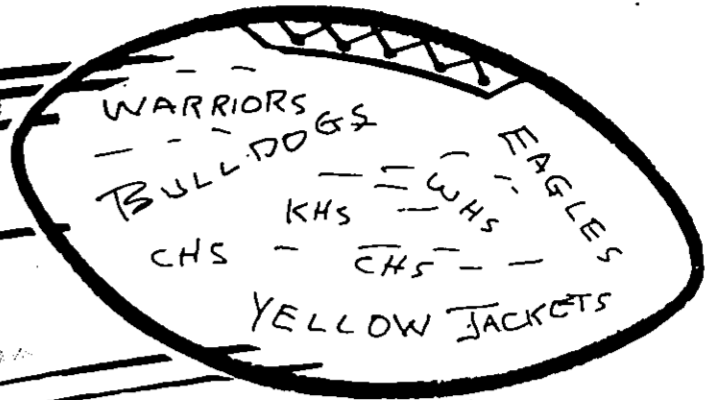
