

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
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

opening - Saturday, an urgent plea to sportsmen to "Keep Texas Green" has been issued by the Texas Forest Service.

Few hunters will start a forest fire purposely; but there is a correlation of rising fire incidents with the opening of the hunting season, the TFS says. Smoking is the number one

.cause of forest fires in the TFS tabulation, with 349 such fires last year in the service's area. There were 93 fires caused by burning game from trees by squirrel hunters, and in third place as the cause of forest fires were campfires. Fires set to make it easier to hunt game accounted for 48 blazes. Retaliation counted for 31 fires and greening an area for game caused 20 fires.

These fires represented about 15 percent of the total number of fires occurring in Texas forests during 1963.

### Dies, Jr., state senator from the PORTABLE WAGON PANTRY ADDED TO HERITAGE COLLECTION

Clyde Gray's Heritage Garden has been presented an antique portable wagon panerý by Mrs. Ida Griffin of Port Arthur, Mrs. Griffin, who is 94 years old, says that the pantry dates back to about 1830. Made of metal, the pantry has

even compartments opening from the top, with the largest in the center being for flour. This compartment has a builtin sifter at the bottom, and a compartment for coffee on the right in the photo has a built-in grinder with handle and a measuring guide so that only the correct amount of coffee will

At the lower part of the pantry, where the white round handles may be seen, are three compartments on each side for spices and condiments which are removable and which have tops punched for salt and penper, etc.

Also on each side at the top and extending all the way down are two small compartments about 1-1/2 inches in diameter. Just what these compartments could have been used for is conjecture today.

At the extreme bottom of the pantry is storage space for pots and pans, with metal scoops still intact for use in removing flour and beans or whatever from the upper compartments. Also right at the bottom is a place for a doughboard, with the solid cherry board measur-

ing 17 x 25 inches still in place. On the far side, where the pot is hanging in the photo, is a telescoping hanger for a water from Prairie View College and bucket or pot as shown. When notin use, it can be moved inward out of the way.

The pantry is a compact 36 inches tall, 31 inches in width, and 17 inches deep at the bot-

The pantry could be used by a family making a trip when they would be on the road all day and perhaps camp out several nights. Handles on each side were for loading and unloading into a wagon.





VA PENSIONS TO INCREASE

Mr. Jack D. Powell, Manager of the Houston VA Regional Office, said today that a new law liberalizing veterans' pensions and providing increases to most pensioners, including widows and children, was signed into law by President Johnson October 13 and becomes effective January 1, 1965. Mr. Powell stressed that the law is designed to give higher increases to those with greatest need and even greater increases, as well as medical benefits, to the most severely disabled veterans.

Those who were on the pension roll prior to July 1, 1960 and who receive pension payments under the "old system" are not cligible for benefits under this new law. Only those who have, since July 1, 1960, elected to receive their pension benefits under the "new system," known gible. However, those under the "old system" who desire to elect to change in order to receive the benefits that will be available under this new law are

encouraged to do so. While the new law does not change the monetary income limitations which were set up in 1960, it does allow recipients to exclude certain income while reporting annual income as reren and 30 great-grandchildren, quired. These new exclusions


