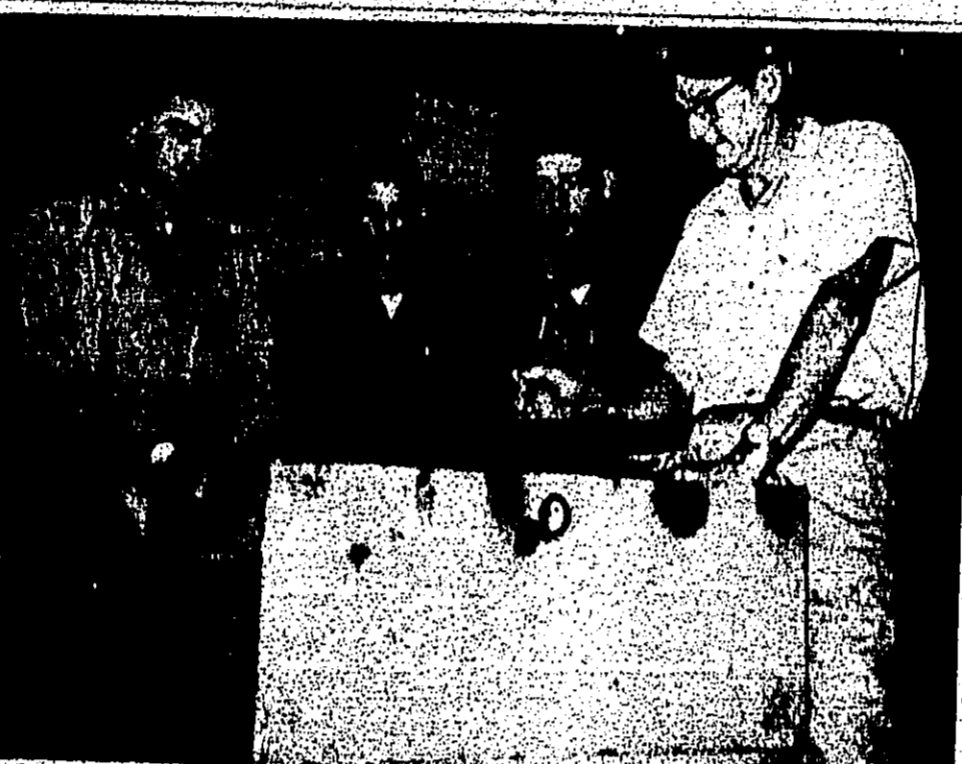
Basketball season for Woodville got underway Tuesday night with a girls game. Next Monday, the Eagle five men, against some of the best in the area, will play their first game.

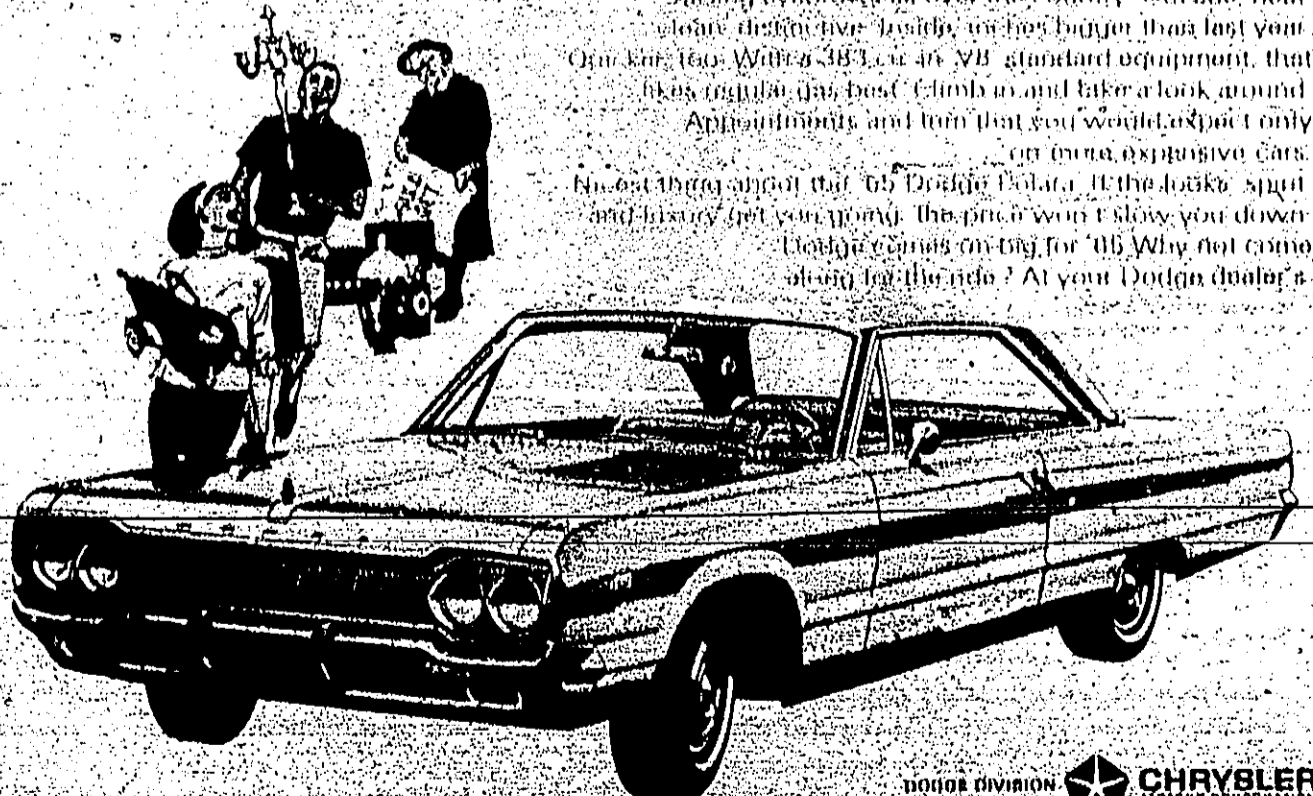

POST OFFICE URGES CHRISTMAS CARDS, PACKAGES IN EARLY

The Christmas "rush" brings a very old quote to mind: "Neither snow, nor rain, nor heat, nor gloom of night stay these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds." This was said by Greek historian, Herodotus, in the fifth century, B. C. but it is still true of the postal service.

However, Postmaster Durham recently added a thought. "While it is true that bad weather doesn't stop the mails, it certainly can slow them down." He mentioned that planes can't get off the ground, switches on railroad tracks can freeze up. Trucks must move more slowly and cautiously over highways. And, in many places, mailmen might wish for the warmth of an igloo. Even the Impish Mr. ZIP can't assure next-day delivery under these conditions.

"Why," you may ask, "Does the postmaster bring this up?" Simply to let people know that there is a factor that we just can't control, the weather. Postmaster Durham said, "It is important that people mailing Christmas cards and gifts make every effort to shop early and mail early to assure on-time delivery. This is especially true during the Christmas rush when an ever-increasing avalanche of mail moves through the postal system."

The Post Office Department has several new tools to use in this year's mail service. The most important is the new ZIP code and transportation on distribution system that came into being with the Zoning Improvement Plan, ZIP. Everyone should use the 5 digit numbers. On parcel post it is a necessity. This saves time, labor and money.

Moving Christmas mail is a hard, tiring job and the 10 local workers who work so diligently during this period deserve all the cooperation they can get. The postmaster said that shopping early, mailing early and using ZIP Codes will really put ZIP into your Christmas mailing and give your mail man a hand to deliver your letters, cards and packages on time.

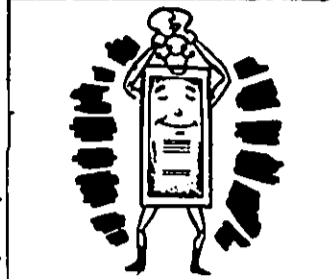

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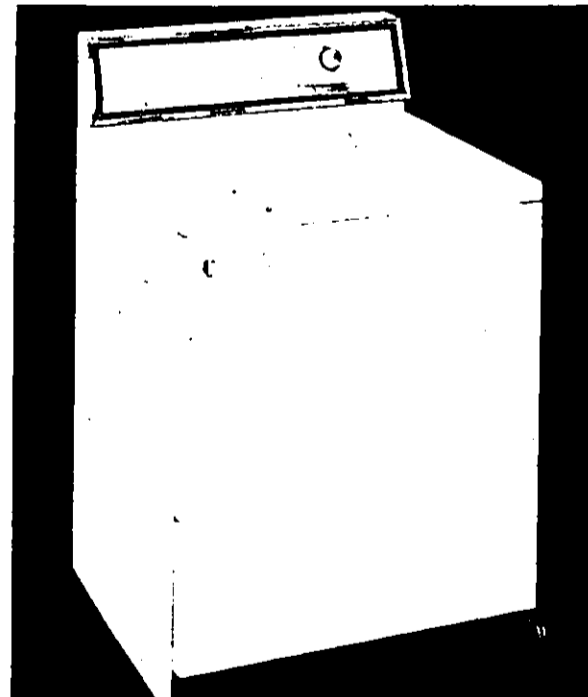
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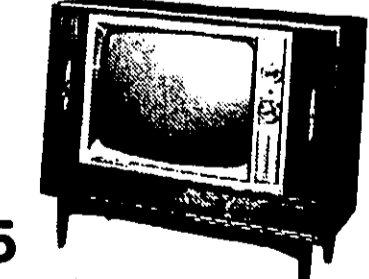

COUNTY AGENT'S NEWS by Clinton Currie

WATCH FOR LICE ON LIVESTOCK

Farmers and ranchers in Tyler County should be on the lookout for the annual invasion of lice on their livestock. These pests will again reduce the profits of many producers unless effective control measures are taken, says C. R. Currie, county agricultural agent.

Currie suggests that all livestock producers obtain a copy of the Extension bulletin, MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

This publication is "chuck-full" of information on insecticide formulations and how to use them in controlling flies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas and cattle grubs. It contains a dilution chart for mixing sprays and dips and outlines control programs for beef animals and nonlactating dairy cattle, dairy animals, sheep and goats, swine, horses and poultry. The bulletin also offers suggestions for controlling house and stable flies.

To get a head start on lice this fall and winter, Currie suggests initiating a sound control program now. The above bulletin is a good guide for such a program and can be obtained at my office at no cost, he concludes.

STEAMBOATS ON THE NECHES

We thrill at the stories of the steamboats on the Mississippi in the days of Mark Twain; yet, we seldom recall that our own Neches, marking the eastern boundary of our county, can also boast of the romance of steamboat days along her winding course. Only the very old remember the days of the steamboats on the Neches. They tell of hearing the whistles and the bells and of seeing the boats pull to shore and anchor to large trees. For near fifty years prior to the coming of the railroads a fleet of flat-bottomed paddle-wheeled steamers sailed the Angelina and the Neches carrying out the farmers' produce and bringing in the finer things of life. Wagons and slow teams plodding over muddy roads provided the only means of land transportation, so it was that the steamboats did a thriving and prosperous business in carrying both freight and passengers.

A look at a large boat was very exciting. On the lower deck were such as the farms and small industries produced and hauled to the landings by wagon: cotton, hides, staves, barrels for storing whiskey or syrup, kegs for storing vinegar, lard, tallow, horns, wool, posts, jugs of honey, casks of butter, sacks of dried beans and twists of tobacco. At one time a boat was said to have carried a hundred casks of spring water from Sour Lake to be distributed for medical purposes. Cotton, which was the chief money crop of East Texas, comprised the greater part of the cargo. Farmers of Angelina and Nacogdoches Counties shipped their cotton down the Angelina and into the Neches, while those of the upper half of Polk County

brought their overland to the landings. The Neches Belle is said to have carried near 1600 bales and the Uncle Ben 1000 bales on each trip. Among other boats were the Pearl River, The Flora, The Star, The Katy and The Laura.

Going upstream with cargoes from New Orleans or other gulf ports the boats carried large sacks of salt, sugar, green coffee and rice, barrels of flour, calico, yellow domestic, thread, needles, buttons, pins, combs, bar iron, cooking utensils, medicine, tools for farming or blacksmith work, shoes and hats, bed ticking, clocks, jugs, and lumber from the saw mill at Beaumont. Among these articles were the Negro workmen and ship's crew singing or giving the river man's yell.

For the passengers on the upper deck a steamboat trip was a thrilling experience. Here one might have seen a show man with his bag of magic tricks or a monkey, a prospector looking for good farm land, a corpulent man with a shrill voice selling patent medicine, a young doctor or lawyer coming to a new state to begin his career, or honeymooners enjoying their first steamboat ride. Busting among these was the brown-skinned chamber maid with mop and broom. Here the passengers watched the wild life on the banks of the stream. Turkeys, bobcats, bears, song birds and bull frogs vied with the laughter and singing on board the boat.

On the Tyler County side of the river were such familiar landings as Boones Ferry at old Fort Teran, Seaman's Bluff a few miles above this, Town Bluff with a sugar landing a mile below, Work's Landing nearby, and Wright's Landing farther down the stream. The shrill notes of the steamboat whistle, the mellow tones of the big brass bell, and the familiar yell of the workmen announced the coming of a boat to these landings. Then such a rush as there was! Long-bearded men and fair bustled ladies hurried along with the crowd to the water's edge to learn what had happened outside their own community. Then followed a trip to the nearby store to await the display of the items from the ship, a new-fangled household article, a gay cravat, a jeweled tucking comb, etc.

As evening drew on, modest young ladies in ruffles accompanied by handsome young men in mustaches came on horseback from far and near to the ball on the deck of the boat. Darkies rolled barrels and bales to one side while the fiddlers resined their bows. Then music began and the square dancing continued until almost day. Shortly the crew unhooked the anchors from the trees and a long farewell whistle on the early morning air announced the departure of the boat for the next landing on the river.
