## Artifacts Needed For Tourist Facility At Indian Village

The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, on U.S. 190 between Livingston and Woodville, is planning to open the first phase of a tourist facility complex in March of 1968. This first phase shall provide one day's activities, including the Indian Museum, Arts & Crafts shop, Dining Room, Nature Trail, Indian Dance Exhibitions and Jeep tours through Virginia Timber, Hardwood bottomlands of Bear, Mill and Big Sandy Creeks, Tupelo Swamp and pine plantations.

Loans and gifts of Alabama and Coushatta Indian artifacts or other items of museum interest would be appreciated. This Museum will have a wide life scene of life-size mounted animals that were important to the Indian livelihood and culture. Many animals have been collected, but there still is a need for the following mounted animals or full skins to be mounted: Black Bear, large buck Deer, Mink, Cooper's Hawk, Great Horned Owl, Pileated Woodpecker, male wild Turkey, Alligator-6 to 8 ft. long, Beaver, Panther (mountain lion), and Snapping Turtle.

There is also a need in the Arts and Crafts program for raw or dried Deer and other animal skins such as wolf, raccoon, rabbit, etc., that can be tanned. Deer heads can also be used in the program. The skins can be preserved with salt or alcohol. Please call for or write to Walt Broemer, curator, Indian Museum or Arts and Crafts shop. The tribes will appreciate your help. ## DEER HUNTING IN COUNTY IS SETTING RECORD

Approximately 300 deer have been killed in the Chester area of Tyler county since the season opened November 14, local game wardens and observers estimate.

Of these, about ten percent have been does killed on the special doe permits issued for that area to landowners.

Deer in the Chester area have been on the increase several years, and in order to reduce the population the Parks and Wildlife Commission issued doe permits for that area this year. Each landowner was eligible to receive one permit to each 100 acres, and most of them applied for their quota. However, the kill of does in the area has been below the number anticipated because of the reluctance of many persons to shoot a doe, even with a permit.

## COLDSPRINGS MEETS CENTERVILLE FOR BI-DISTRICT

The Coldspring Eagles will meet the Centerville Tigers in Huntsville at 8 p. m. Friday for the bi-district clash which will determine which team will play in the regional contest, highest for Class B teams.

Coldspring won the District 26-B title with a season's record of 10-0. Centerville has an 8-2 record and is 4-0 in District 25-B.

The Eagles, coached by Bill Hunter, are in the playoff for the first time since they moved up to Class B football in 1956. While playing six-man football, the Eagles dominated their district, winning 32 consecutive games.

Centerville has tied for their district title for the last two years, and won this year's title outright.

The Woodville Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Christmas decoration and beautification contest among local merchants this year. Any business in the Woodville community may participate.

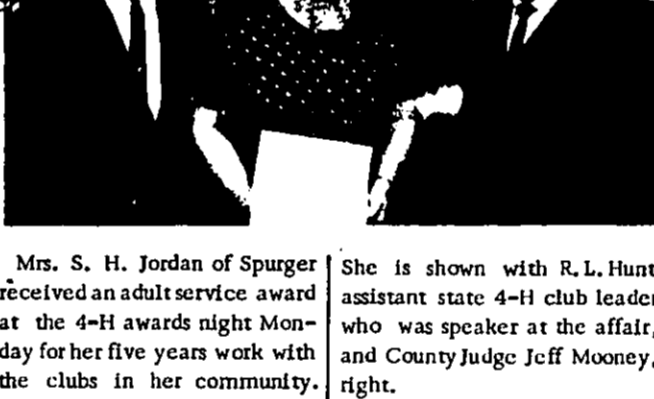

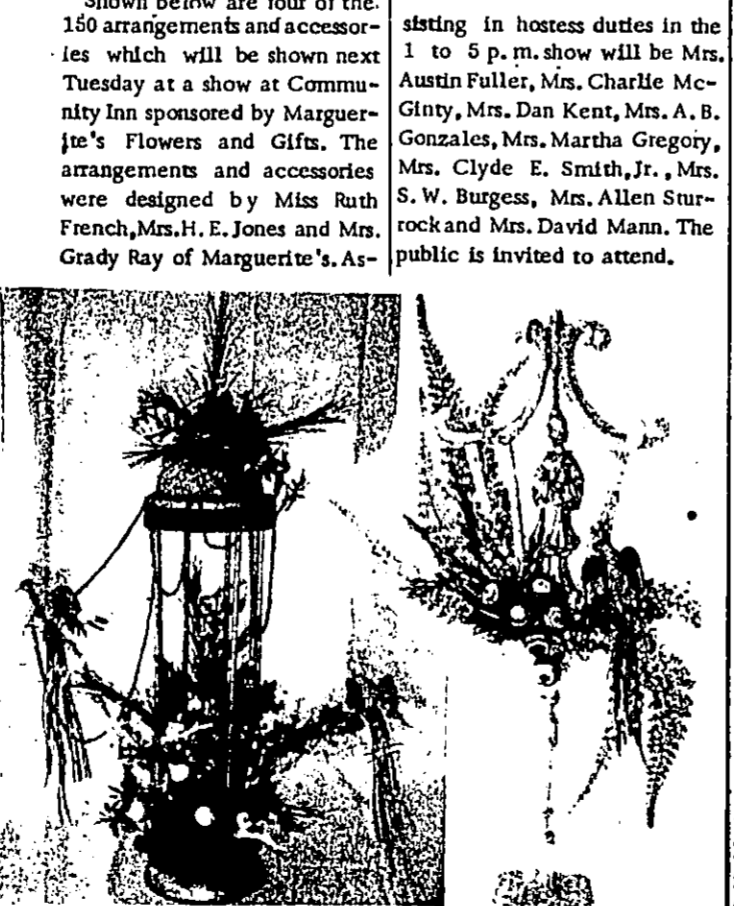

## FLORIST'S PLANTS

A potted plant makes a lively gift for a person in the hospital, a gracious hostess or a birthday girl. They also take special care, say horticulturists at the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Florist plants are grown in greenhouses. They are used to conditions there, so for best results they should continue to receive regulated light, heat and water.

A few of the more popular gift plants are listed below with their desired growing conditions.

**Azaleas**—Keep azaleas in diffused sunlight. They do best at temperatures of 55 to 60 deg. Water frequently.

**Chrysanthemums**—Potted chrysanthemums like full sunlight, temperatures between 60 and 70 deg., and lots of water. Most potted mums are not satisfactory for later planting outdoors. Some new varieties, however, are. Ask your florist.

**Cinerarias**—Place them in a sunny window. They like temperatures from 50 to 60 deg. and frequent watering. Discard plant when the flowers are gone.

**Cyclamen**—Flowers last about 2 weeks if the temperature is kept at 70 deg., longer at 50 to 55 deg. Never let water stand in the crown of the plant; flower shoots and bases of the leaves rot easily.

**Hydrangeas**—Provide abundant water and moderate light. After the plant has bloomed, cut it back to several internodes and repeat.

Don't stuff your turkey until time to roast it. Food specialists at the U. S. Department of Agriculture say you should not stuff a turkey and refrigerate or freeze it at home for later use.

## A COOKIE AND A BOOK

by Ruth White

It's the time of the year to bake goodies to place in the home freezer to have ready for company around the fire on cool evenings. "The Home Freezer Book for Better Living" by Zella Boutell contains so many delicious ideas. This recipe is found on page 325.

**Favorite Christmas Cookies**  
1-1/4 cups strained honey  
3/4 cup butter  
2 cups granulated sugar  
1 6-ounce can frozen orange juice

grated rind of 2 lemons  
grated rind of 2 oranges  
10 cups sifted cake flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon mace  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon cloves  
1/2 teaspoon allspice  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
2 cups chopped nuts

Melt the honey and butter in the top of a double boiler and add the sugar, fruit juice, and lemon and orange rind. Heat until the sugar is dissolved. Sift the flour, salt, spices, and baking powder into a large bowl and add the nuts and honey mixture. This is a very stiff dough and may have to be mixed by kneading with the hands. It may be frozen and kept for several months, or used as soon as chilled. Roll about 1/8 inch thick and cut into fancy shapes. Bake at 300 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned.

It's a leibchen type of cookie made with honey which improves in flavor with freezing and storing. They may be baked now and frozen then frosted later.

While cookies are baking and the timer is set there is a moment to look into a novel. "The Half-Crown House" by Helen Ashton is a story about an old house and the people who live in it. The old house sometimes a burden eventually lends a new enchantment to living for the family.

**MINISTERS HAVE NEW CHANCE FOR SOCIAL SECURITY COVERAGE**  
Some clergymen have an opportunity for a "second choice" on social security for themselves and their families. This comes about by a recent change in the law extending the time limit within which ministers may choose to take part in the program.

L. R. James, social security District Manager at Lufkin, explained that, while social security is mandatory for nearly everyone, the law excludes clergymen unless they individually request coverage. Generally speaking a newly-ordained minister has about two years in which he can make his choice. For clergymen who have been in the ministry for some years, the law sets a specific date or deadline by which the choice must be made. Until the recent change in this law this deadline was past, so that it was too late for ministers to elect social security if they had not already done so.

The amendment sets up a new period in which clergymen may obtain social security protection, but the period is rather brief. In most cases the new deadline is April 15, 1965. After the deadline, ministers who have not elected will be permanently barred from social security coverage.

James reports that about 140,000 clergymen have chosen to take part in the program and are building up protection for themselves and their families. He added that his office has a leaflet explaining the new provision and that he will be glad to send a copy to anyone interested.

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## County Agent's Column

### GARDEN READINESS VITAL FOR WINTER PLANTINGS

Since considerable planting will be done in Texas gardens during December and January, soil conditioning and watering well in advance of planting dates are important. This will not only avoid a last minute rush that usually results in poor preparation, but it often makes planting possible when the soil is too wet to work later in the winter.

Prepare the soil now in all areas where shrubs, hedges, shade and fruit trees or bare-root dormant rose bushes are to be planted.

It is a good practice to secure a supply of pine bark, peat moss or other organic matter as well as some soil that may be required for later planting operations. Pile these materials so they can be covered with a sheet of polyethylene or other cover to keep them dry for future use.

Winter garden is often neglected. In Gulf Coast areas, long dry periods may cause severe drying back on the growth tips of broadleaf evergreens, especially azaleas and camellias. This is serious on such plants since many are winter flowering types, and rapidly developing flower buds require a steady supply of moisture.

Shallow rooted plants such as ferns and begonias and many plants in containers also dry out frequently during the winter. Such plants, especially those in an area exposed to the south or west, need moisture to prevent winter injury.

Many gardens do not drain properly; these should be inspected before general watering. When soggy soil becomes cold, the root damage on plants in such locations may be more severe than any caused by frost to the above ground parts.

Where well-drained soil conditions are prevalent, light waterings can be applied. However, adequate drainage must be provided and water reservoirs such as watering basins and other retainers around established plants must be cleared away.

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Intact with the head, says Klusmann, and salt or freeze until delivered to the taxidermist.

Back at camp, hang the carcass in a tree by the hind legs for four or five hours. This will allow all the tiny blood vessels to drain. Wrap the carcass in a sheet, cheese cloth or sack made for this purpose, and always remember to keep the carcass in the shade.

After it has cooled, cut the carcass in half or quarters and wrap to take home. It is wise to keep the hide, head, antlers, legs and tag until the meat is placed in a freezer or commercial locker, advises Klusmann.

**PROPER FIELD DRESSING BRINGS HOME QUALITY VENISON**  
Quality venison depends primarily on how the deer is handled from the time of the kill until it is placed in the freezer. That's why field dressing a deer properly is so important, says Wallace Klusmann, Extension wildlife conservation specialist, Texas A&M University.

After making the kill, begin field dressing at once, using a strong, sharp knife with a guard and at least a four-inch blade. The first step, says Klusmann, is to prop the deer on its back and remove its external sex organs.

Beginning between the hind legs, cut down to the pelvic bone; then cut up the middle, through the breastbone and all the way to the jaw (unless the head is to be mounted). After cutting the windpipe and esophagus as far forward as possible, grasp both and pull downward to free the insides to the midsection.

To free the entrails from the ribs, roll the carcass on its side and cut the thin layer of muscle (diaphragm) down to the backbone. Then turn the deer over and do the same on the other side, the specialist points out. Cut around the vent so the entire visceral mass can be removed without severing any part; then, using both hands, pull the entire entrails out.

The next step is to prop up the deer's rump to spread the back legs, cut through the seam in the middle of the pelvis and finish cleaning the visceral cavity.

To allow remaining blood to drain from the body cavity, hang the deer by the head or antlers from a nearby tree for about 20 minutes. If no tree is near, turn the deer upside down on a clean place to let it drain, advises Klusmann.

Skinning can be begun while the deer is draining. However, if the head is to be mounted, hang the carcass by the hind legs to skin. The skin comes off most easily while the deer is still warm, explains the specialist, so it is best to skin the animal within two hours after the kill.

To remove the skin, cut down the inside of each leg to the deer's middle. Then cut the skin all the way around the neck, grasp with both hands at the back of the head and pull down. Usually the skin will come off down to the front legs. Use a knife to work the skin off the legs and other areas where it sticks tightly to the meat.

If the specimen is to be mounted, do not make any cuts in the skin around the neck or head but rather cut around the shoulders when removing the skin. Allow the skin to remain
