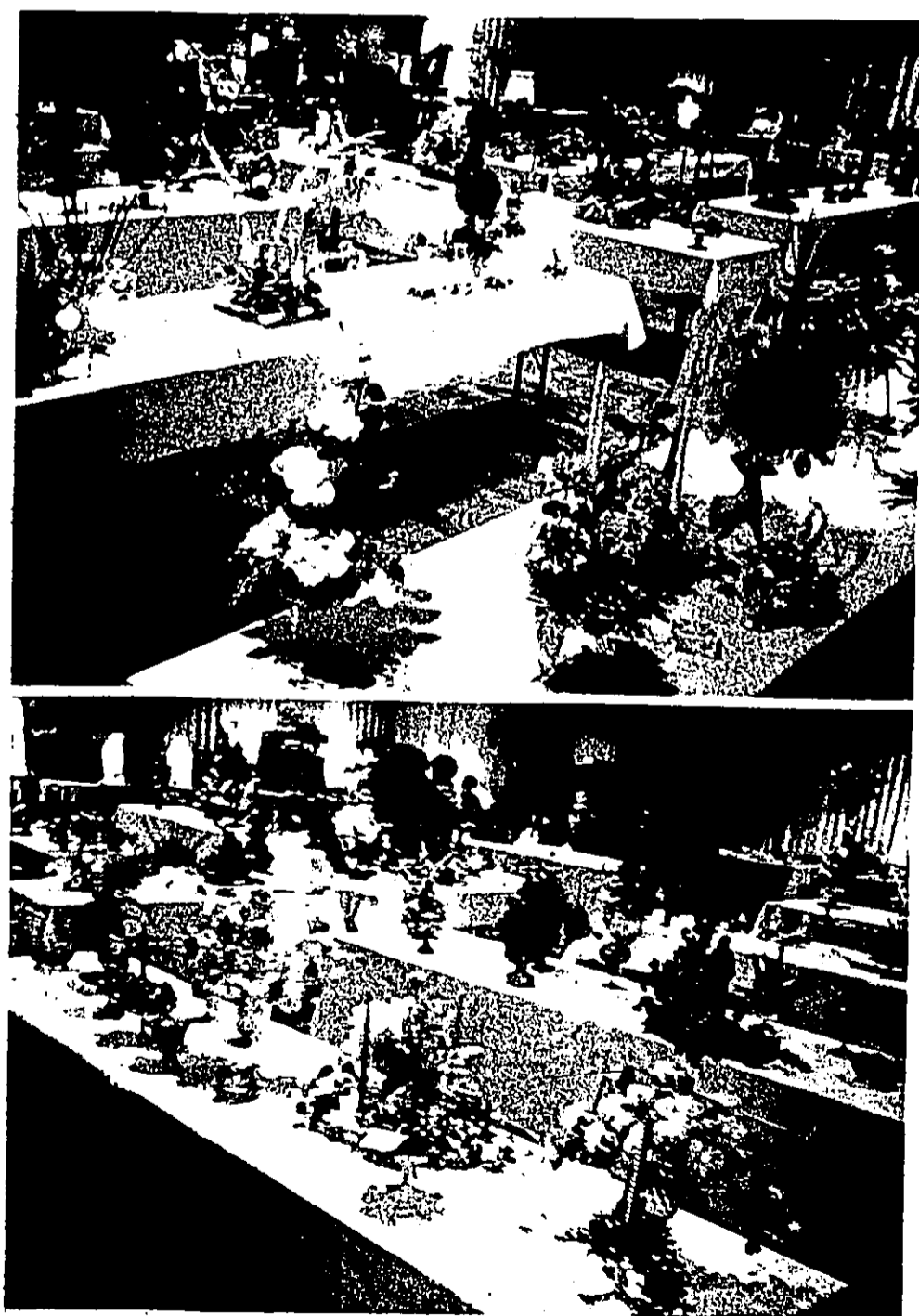


SPECTACULAR FIRE (AND SMOKE) BUT LITTLE DAMAGE

A butane-heated roofing truck caught fire Monday while the contractors, J. T. Linzy and Son of Lufkin, were applying roofing compound to the building occupied by Gassiot's 5 and 10 Store. The truck was parked at the rear of the Gassiot building on the south side behind the post office, and the fire and resulting minor explosions caused the evacuation of the post office and Gassiot's Store. The wind was blowing briskly from the north and kept the smoke and flames away from the building. The Baptist Church building across the street received the brunt of the smoke. The roofing truck and equipment was a complete loss, but no damage was done to either the Gassiot Store or post office building. The black smoke billowed high into the sky and caused a number of rumors that downtown Woodville was burning. The story might have been different if the wind had been from the south instead of the north. The photos above show scenes as Woodville Volunteer Firemen fought to bring the fire under control.
