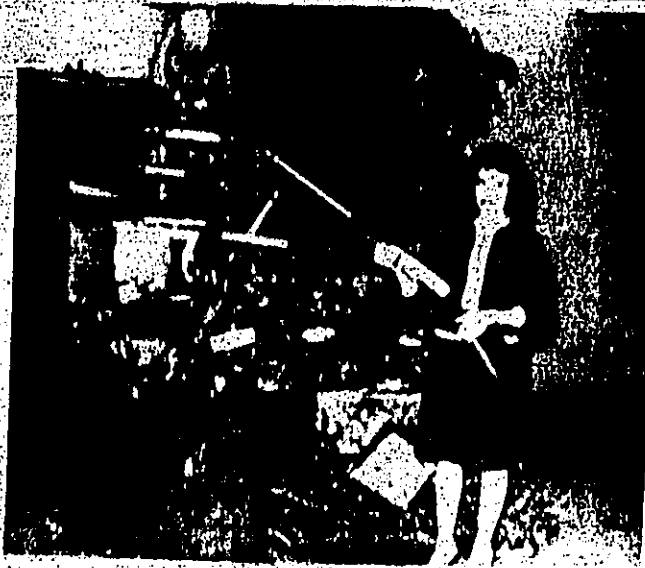

ALABAMA-COUSHATTA INDIANS START ON CRAFTS PRODUCTION

The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation on U. S. 190 between Livingston and Woodville, Texas is planning to open the first phase of a Tourist Facility Complex in March of 1965. This first phase shall provide one day's activities including the Indian Museum, Arts & Crafts Shop, Dining Room, Nature Trail, Indian Dance Exhibitions and Jeep Tours through Virgin Timber, Hardwood Bottomlands of Bear, Mill and Big Sandy Creeks, Tupelo Swamp and Pine Plantations.

Loans and gifts of Alabama and Coushatta Indian artifacts or other items of museum interest would be appreciated. The museum will have a Wild Life Scene of life size mounted animals that were important to the Indian Livelihood and Culture. Many animals have been collected, but there still is a need for the following mounted animals or full skins to be mounted: Black Bear, large Buck Deer, Mink, Cooper's Hawk, Great Horned Owl, pileated Woodpecker, male Wild Turkey, Alligator-6 to 8 ft. long, Beaver, Panther (mountain lion) and Snapping Turtle.

There is also a need in the Arts & Crafts Program for raw or dried Deer and other animal skins such as wolf, raccoon, rabbit, etc. that can be tanned. Deer hoofs can also be used in the program. The skins can be preserved with salt or ashes.

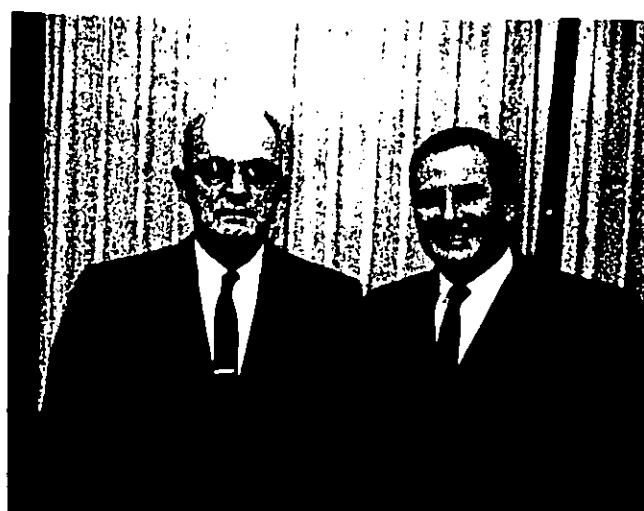

TILE PLANT TO BE RE-OPENED

NEW OFFICERS IN REALTORS GROUP



The Coastal Tile Plant just south of the city limits on the Old Town Bluff Road has been purchased by the Yarte Company and will be modernized and reopened by February 1, it was learned this week. The Yarte Company is an international company with plants in South America and Mexico as well as Brownsville, Texas. It has outlets for tile throughout the continent. One of their plants is located in Venezuela and another in Monterrey. The Coastal Tile Plant here was a subsidiary of Clayburn Tile Company in Palestine at the time it was shut down. Clayburn officials said that it did not fit into their operations. The new owners have indicated that they will import machinery from Europe and that the local plant will be automated and will be one of the most modern small plants in the area when remodeling is completed. When it opens, the plant will employ about 25 persons. Personnel of the Yarte Company have been here the past week to begin work on reopening of the plant.

EIGHT FINED FOR ILLEGAL HUNTING

Eight men appeared in county court this past weekend charged with hunting deer illegally. All eight were charged with hunting at night with the aid of artificial light and seven were charged with hunting from an automobile. One was charged with killing a deer at night.

On pleas of guilty, those fined included Everest Thomas Arnold of Livingston, Charles Clowers, Heary Clowers, Elvis Goff, Richard A. Johnston, Jerry Spurlock, Charles H. Seaman, and Richard Ross.

County Judge Jeff Mooney also suspended hunting privileges for 12 months in most cases.

Mr. Robinson also said that a committee from the chamber will go to Austin after the state legislature convenes to push for the completion of the farm road from near Colmesnell through to the Sam Rayburn Dam, thus giving a direct route through Tyler County to the big reservoir. He also said that so far the Corps of Engineers have given no indication as to whether the level of Dam B can be kept at 83 feet or will be lowered as planned to 81 feet when Sam Rayburn Reservoir is filled. The Dam B Reservoir now has about six inches of water, Mr. Robinson remarked, but the chamber wants to push for 83 feet when rains do come if the Engineers find it feasible.

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WOOD PRODUCTS PLANTS IN AREA BOON TO INDUSTRY

Area wood using industries cut enough lumber to build 100 houses daily, according to the annual census of wood grain sponsored by the Texas Forest Service and the Texas Forestry Association.

Over 4,000 people in Hardin, Polk and Tyler Counties are employed in converting standing trees to finished lumber. They work at 42 locally owned wood using industries. Products manufactured range from fence posts to southern pine plywood. Lumber is still the most common product produced by local wood using industries, but other products, such as pallets and shipping containers, are also important.

Based on current production figures an estimated 717 thousand board feet of pine lumber is sawn daily. Hardwoods account for another 215 thousand board feet daily and about 2900 railway ties are also cut.

Twenty seven sawmills are located in this area. Fifteen additional industries use locally grown wood to manufacture items ranging from telephone poles to ends for paper rolls.

Forest products are big business in East Texas. Each dollar spent on standing timber will be multiplied an average of 25 times before the finished product is purchased. Each step in handling manufacturing and distributing the wood product provides jobs for local people: income for area business.

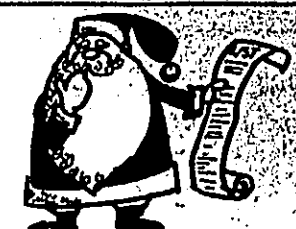

GSU RECIPES FOR CHRISTMAS GIVEN

Homemakers in Gulf States Utilized Company's service area are being treated at the beginning of this holiday season with a number of demonstrations on holiday cooking, lighting and decorating tips by the company's home service staff.

The following are some of the recipes the home service ladies prepare during the demonstrations. The recipes come from the recently published colorful "Holiday Recipes" cookbook being distributed by the Gulf States home service department.

COMPANY BEAN DISH
2 cans whole green beans
1 can (4 oz.) water chestnuts
1 can cream of chicken soup
Drain beans (reserving 3 Tbsp. juice) put beans into buttered 2 quart casserole. Stir in water chestnuts that have been sliced thin. Stir reserved bean juice into soup and pour over beans. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes. (May cook in saucepan on third heat position 15 to 20 minutes.) Serve hot to 6 or 8 people.

BEEF SALAD
1 pkg. lemon or vegetable flavored gelatin

2 Tbsp. vinegar
1/2 tsp. grated onion (option)
2 Tbsp. horseradish
1 No. 1 303 can diced beets
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 tsp. salt
Dissolve gelatin in water or beet juice. Add vinegar, onion and horseradish. Chill until slightly thickened; add beets and celery. Pour into mold and chill until firm. Serve with homemade mayonnaise. Serves 6-8.

Melt chocolate morsels; remove from heat; add remaining condensed milk, coffee and salt and stir until smooth. Spread evenly over marshmallow nut-layer, pressing lightly. Chill until firm. Cut candy into one inch squares; store in covered container. Makes about 3 pounds.

HOLLY CHEESE BALLS
4 (3 oz) pkgs. cream cheese
2 (5 oz) jars Old English cheese spread
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. red pepper
1/4 tsp. Tabasco
6 oz. blue cheese
2 Tbsp. grated onion
2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup ground nuts
1/4 cup chopped parsley
Have cheese at room temperature. Blend the cheeses, onion, and other seasonings in the electric mixer or blender until smooth and creamy. Stir in the nuts and parsley--chill. Shape into small balls about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Place in a baking sheet and freeze. When frozen, put balls in a freezer bag or carton and store in freezer. Remove from freezer about 30 to 40 minutes before serving time. Very festive addition to a hors d'oeuvre tray or salad plate.

CRANBERRY PARFAIT
Red and Green Holiday Dessert
3/4 cup clear cranberry sauce (1/2 of 1 lb. can)
3 Tbsp. powdered sugar
1 egg white, stiffly beaten
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1/4 tsp. almond extract
Red and green food coloring
3 Tbsp. blanched almonds, coarsely chopped
Add 2 Tbsp. of the sugar to cranberry sauce and beat in mixer until smooth. Fold in beaten egg white, half of the whipped cream, almond extract, and a few drops of red food coloring. Pour into ice tray and freeze to mush. (about 45 minutes). Add 1 Tbsp. confectioners sugar to remaining whipped cream; tint a delicate shade of green and fold in nuts. Place alternate layers of whipped cream and cranberry mixture in parfait glasses, using 3 layers of whipped cream and 2 layers of cranberry parfait. Makes 6 servings.

2 cups powdered sugar
3-4 Tbsp. orange juice
1/4 tsp. allspice
Prepare cake mix according to directions on package to the point of adding flour. Sift spices and flour and reserve two Tbsp. of flour to dredge fruit. (Reserve 1/4 cup of fruit for frosting) After flour is folded into egg white mixture, fold in 3/4 cup of floured fruit. Bake electrically about 5 minutes shorter time than indicated on package since batter rises above top of pan. Use temperature indicated on package. Cool and drizzle cake with icing made by combining powdered sugar, orange juice and 1/4 cup of finely-chopped candied fruit.

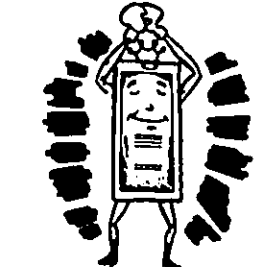

Merryman is an administrative supervisor at the base. He is a graduate of Franklin (Texas) High School. He is married to the former Natalie E. Britten.

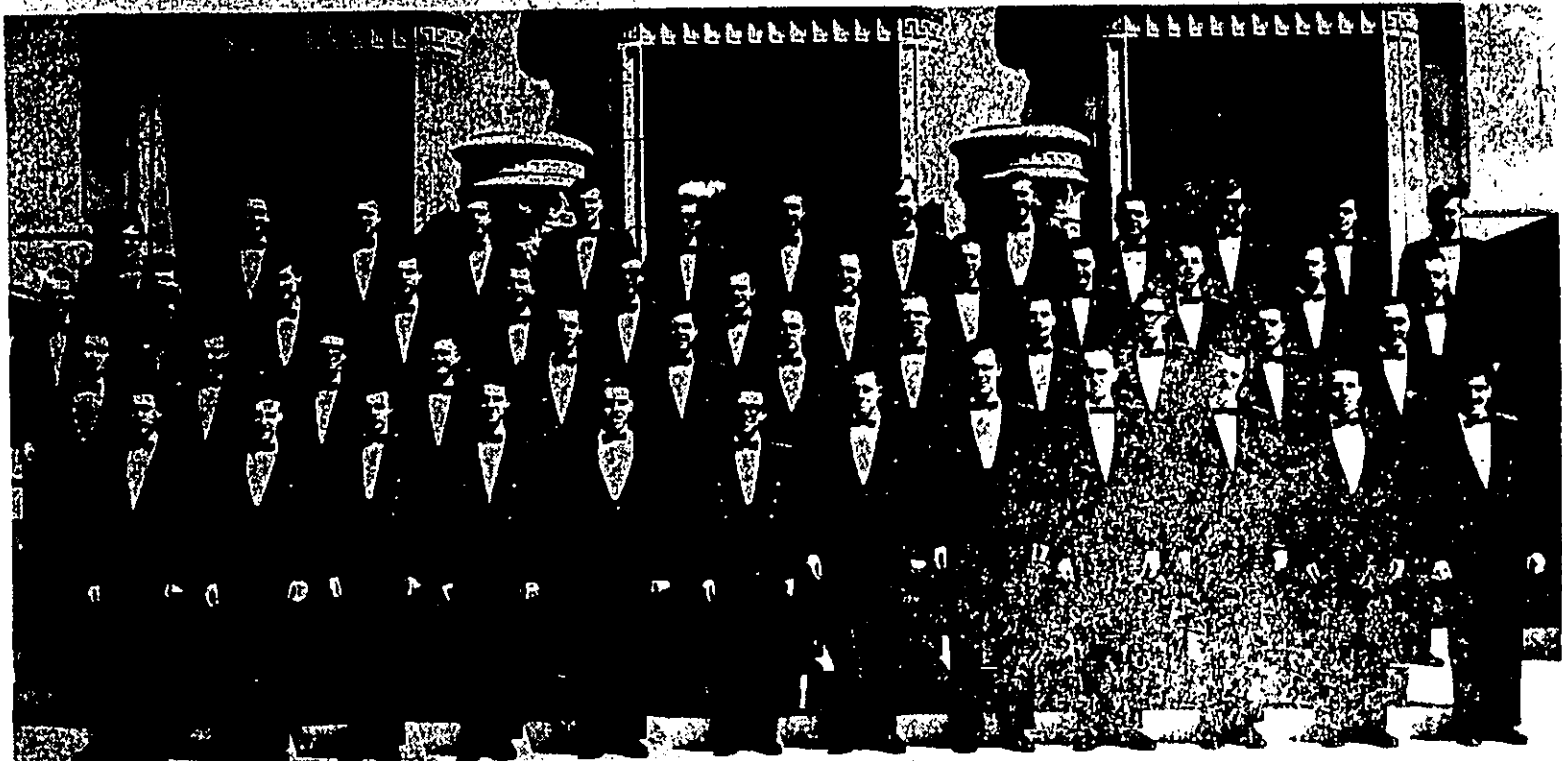
