The hospital board had petitioned commissioners court to call the election to construct a \$300,000 senior citizens home on property just west of the hospital.

Stores To Close Two Days For Christmas Holiday

Schools will turn out in Tyler County Friday for the Christmas holidays with the exception of Woodville, where classes will be continued through Tuesday.

Churches are planning Christmas programs and cantatas (see stories elsewhere in this issue.) Merchants report that Christmas business is beginning to pick up and that a last-minute rush will develop as is the usual case the last few days before Christmas.

Most stores still have a good selection of gifts, although some are beginning to get short on a few items.

The post office reports that Christmas mail and packages are coming in at a high volume and that incoming mail will probably reach a peak the first few days of next week.

Stores in Woodville will take next Friday and Saturday for Christmas holidays, reopening Monday. The court house will be closed Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

In a letter to the people of Tyler County, the board of managers of the Tyler County Hospital this week explained their decision to ask the commissioners court to call a bond election to construct a home for senior citizens.

The commissioners court has responded by issuing an order for the election with a date to be set sometime in January.

The board's letter follows: In connection with our request to the Commissioner's Court to order an election to authorize the issuance of \$150,000.00 in bonds to construct a nursing home, we wish to make the following explanation:

We think everyone realizes the need of a nursing home in Tyler County in order that our elder citizens may not have to go to Beaumont or other out of county places causing unnecessary expense and trouble for the relatives that may wish to visit them.

In the first place, there will be no expense to the county or the hospital district except for the construction of the building. Our experience for twelve years in conducting the local hospital has demonstrated to us that it can be done without any expense from the county. We take pride in saying that during this period of twelve years, we have not had to call on the county for any support except the maintenance of the building. From the information we have, nursing homes are self-supporting. Also, we have the available ground near the hospital on which the nursing home can be erected which will be convenient for the doctors and staff of the hospital.

We have now a tax of thirty cents on the \$100.00 to pay the bonds which have been heretofore issued to construct the addition to the hospital. We find that ninety-five (95%) per cent collections of the county valuation of nearly fourteen million dollars will yield \$38,400.50.

The amount necessary to retire the bonds, including the proposed issuance of \$150,000.00 amounts to \$32,792.65 thereby

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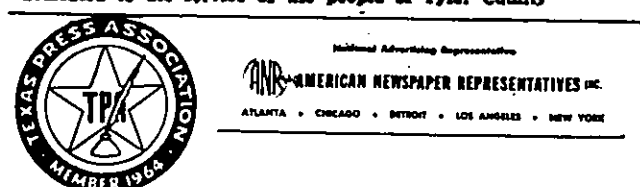

YULE LOG COOKIES

Yule log cookies, made with rolled wheat, make a delicious holiday confection for gift giving or for the family cookie jar. (This recipe makes use of several of the commodities donated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to schools and low-income families.)

You'll find the cookies similar to Russian tea cookies. The rolled wheat gives them that nutty flavor. (If you prefer, you can substitute 2 cups of finely chopped nuts for the rolled wheat.)

YULE LOG COOKIES

(100 Cookies)

- 1 1/4 cups butter or margarine
1/2 cup plus 1 tablespoon granulated sugar
3/4 teaspoon vanilla
6-8 cups flour
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3 1/4 cups plus 2 tablespoons rolled wheat (or 2 cups finely chopped nuts)
1 1/2 pounds (approximately) powdered sugar
Cream butter or margarine until light and fluffy. Add granulated sugar and cream well. Add vanilla and mix. Sift flour and salt together and add to creamed mixture. Mix. Add rolled wheat.

Shape with hands into bars about 3 inches long and 1/2-inch thick. (If it will not stick together, add a little melted butter.) Place on lightly greased baking sheet. To make the cookies look like logs, lightly run lines of fork over the surface of each cookie. Bake for 20 minutes at 350 degrees. As soon as the cookies come from the oven, roll them a few at a time in a bowl of powdered sugar. Re-roll, so cookies are well covered with sugar.

Allow 2 to 3 days to thaw a large, whole frozen turkey in the refrigerator, the U.S. Department of Agriculture says. WATER YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE For a healthy, fire-resistant Christmas tree, keep your tree well-watered, urges the U.S. Department of Agriculture. A 6-foot tree may take up as much as a quart of water a day when it's first brought indoors. This water is needed to replace the moisture given off by the needles in the warm atmosphere of your home. Also, the more moisture the needles give off, the more fragrant your tree.

A POINSETTA It happens only once a year--the purchase of a poinsettia. That's why it's so hard to remember just what makes a good plant. To jog your memory--or in case you never did know--the U.S. Department of Agriculture offers these pointers for choosing a long-lasting poinsettia. 1. Select first for height and size. Choose a low, compact plant for a table centerpiece;

are one teaspoon neutral detergent in one quart water, with one teaspoon of white vinegar added, and a dry-cleaning fluid or solvent available from household cleaning supply merchants.

Third, identify the kind of spot or stain to determine the appropriate removal procedure. Spots that are water soluble may be removed with the detergent solution. On grease and oil borne stains, use dry-cleaning compound.

When cleaning a carpet, try not to get the area too wet. Dry it off as quickly and completely as possible.

The following are some of the recipes the home service ladies prepare during the demonstrations. The recipes come from the recently published colorful "Holiday Recipes" cookbook being distributed by the Gulf States home service department. All of the recipes in the book have been specially selected and kitchen tested for electric cooking by the home service staff.

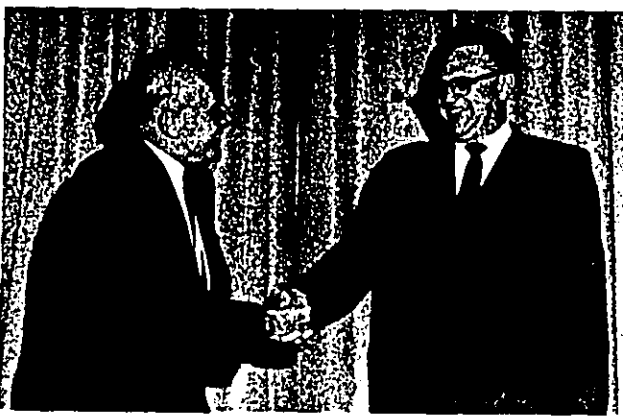
PUMPKIN ICE CREAM PIE 3 Tbsps. sugar 2/3 cup brown sugar 1/2 tsp. salt 1 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 tsp. ginger 1/2 tsp. nutmeg 2 cups canned pumpkin 1 pint vanilla ice cream One 9-inch baked pastry shell Combine sugars, spices and pumpkin. Add softened ice cream; mix until well blended. Pour into baked pastry shell or graham cracker crust. Freeze until firm. If pie is to be stored in freezer for several days, use graham cracker crust.

GRAHAM CRACKER CRUST: Crush about 18 graham crackers in the blender or with rolling pin. Combine crumbs, 3 Tbsps. sugar and 1/3 cup melted butter or margarine. Press mixture in an even layer against bottom and sides of a 9 inch pie pan. Bake electrically at 350 degrees for 10 minutes.

CRANBERRY UPSIDE DOWN CAKE 1/4 cup butter or margarine 3 Tbsps. brown sugar 1 can whole cranberry sauce 5 or 6 thin orange slices with rind Pour melted butter into 2 qt. utility dish (or pan 7 1/2 x 11 1/2 x 2). Stir in brown sugar and spread evenly. Arrange orange slices in pan, then cover with cranberry sauce that has been drained and broken up. Cover with cake batter. Bake 35-40 minutes at 350 degrees.
