POLL TAXES SELL SLOW IN COUNTY

With only a month to purchase poll taxes to be eligible to vote in the 1965 elections after January 31, only 97 poll taxes had been sold at the office of A. L. (Pete) Thornton, tax assessor-collector, Monday afternoon.

Poll taxes now on sale are for the year 1964 and are effective to vote in 1965 elections. However, in the nursing home bond election on January 9, the present poll taxes for the year 1963 are the only poll tax receipts valid.

Thornton has several sub-stations over the county for the sale of poll taxes. They are the International Paper Company office in Doucette, the J. P. Dean store in Colmesneil, the Pat Dean Store in Rockland, the J. L. Veal store in Chester, Spurger Mercantile Company and Frazee's Service Station in Spurger, and the Warren School tax office in Warren.

NINE HOURS OF FOOTBALL FRIDAY

Nine hours of solid football viewing, with no time out for dinner, provides a gluttonous fare Friday for the millions of armchair quarterbacks.

The New Year's Day program will draw more than 300,000 fans but these will be only a drop in the bucket to the untold millions who will watch the show on television.

The only time any juggling of the stations will be necessary will be at the start of the afternoon where there is a conflict between the Cotton Bowl at Dallas and the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans. Both games start at 1:00 p. m.

After that, it's clear sailing through the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, matching Michigan and Oregon State at 4:00 p. m., and the Orange Bowl at Miami, with national champion Alabama and Texas as the principals. The Miami kickoff is at 7:00 p. m.

Tyler County's taxpayers will go to the polls a week from Saturday to decide on issuing \$150,000 in bonds to build a \$300,000 nursing home on the four-acre site owned by the hospital district just west of Tyler County Hospital.

The bonds, if approved, will be matched by a like amount in Hill-Burton funds if the application for such funds is approved. Otherwise, the \$150,000 in bonds will not be issued and the nursing home will not be built.

The board of managers of the Tyler County Hospital District this week issued a letter in support of their proposal to build the nursing home. (See letter in adjoining column).

Hospital District Board Urges Bond Support

On January 9, 1965, you have been notified through the news media serving the county, that all Resident Property Tax Payers who hold a 1963 Poll Tax Receipt or Exemption are requested to authorize the issuance by your TYLER COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT of bonds in the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$150,000.00) Dollars to be used in connection with other funds which will then be available for the construction and equipping of a Nursing Home. The other funds mentioned will be a like amount which will be available (without necessity of repayment) through the Hill-Burton Fund.

Your Hospital Board consists of members of various walks in life, citizens of the county and are representative of every section of the County, who are happily serving without desire for remuneration other than the abiding satisfaction of the better health, greater happiness and welfare of those who are being and will be served through the facilities which you have already provided and through the additional facilities which you are now being asked to provide.

From the date of opening of Tyler County Memorial Hospital, its patient load has been so great and over demanding that it has almost continuously been required of the staff and attending doctors that patients be moved to other facilities or discharged earlier than desired, because of the vital need of space to receive others whose needs and requirements were greater and more vital. Thus it has become forcefully apparent to your board that the need of the Nursing Home is vital for the welfare of patients, for the great need and convenience of the doctors in attendance as well as for the more efficient service of your hospital itself.

It is proposed that the home will be constructed on the spacious property west of and adjacent to the hospital, requiring no expenditure for the acquiring of additional property, and that the full sum of the proposed cost will be spent under the supervision of your Hospital District Board in the building and equipping of the Home.

The building will be of modern design, as completely fire proof as is possible, and of materials calculated to give it the greatest permanency possible and to require the minimum of expense in its maintenance. It will have air conditioning proper for every season and condition of the year. The home is to be so constructed as to provide continuous space for the private care of approximately forty-eight (48)

patients, with additional space for facilities for providing for the welfare and comfort of the patients, space for an assembly room and library, and for inside area of recreation. Provision will also be made for seasonal outside recreation on the spacious grounds upon which the home will be located.

The home will be operated with trained personnel at all times, whose duties and pleasure will be to patients' greatest comfort and welfare. It is the purpose of the Hospital Board that the home will be operated by the Hospital District as a non-profit organization, and such shall be its undertaking. However, if this does not prove possible, then the home will be leased to a NON-PROFIT organization so that from the revenues derived only the actual and bona fide operation expense will be taken, leaving any profit to be used by the Home for upkeep or expansion.

We again assure you that we do not believe that any raise in your property tax will be necessary for the paying of the bonds; we are confident from the tax structure which you have already allowed your Hospital District, we will be fully able to meet the payment of the bonds.

We trust and respectfully request that you investigate and become informed of the impossible patient load of your hospital, of the needs possibly of many of your friends or neighbors of today, or the possible needs of yourself or your loved ones for the tomorrows.

We have given much and serious consideration to this matter, and we as the Hospital Board and the Commissioner's Court of Tyler County are unanimous in our approval, as may be determined by the minutes of our meeting and of the commissioner's court. election provided he is a property owner with such property rendered for taxation in the county.

The board of managers of Tyler County Hospital District through which the bonds to build the nursing home will be issued, have stated that the present hospital district tax of 30 cents per \$100 valuation will be sufficient to retire the nursing home bonds as well as the hospital bonds now outstanding.

There is now one small nursing home in the county operated by Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Howell on Cobb Mill Road in Woodville. It is the Tyler County Nursing Home, a privately owned institution which receives no support from the county.

A proposal to build another privately-owned nursing home Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Ratcliff at a cost of \$125,000 has been stymied because of financing. The Ratcliffs were refused financing by the Federal Housing Authority early this year.

The Press learned on good authority this week that the basis for the refusal of the loan by the FHA was the apparent lack of sufficient patients to support such a home in this area. This survey of the patient need in the area was reportedly made through the State Welfare Department, although this could not be confirmed at press time.

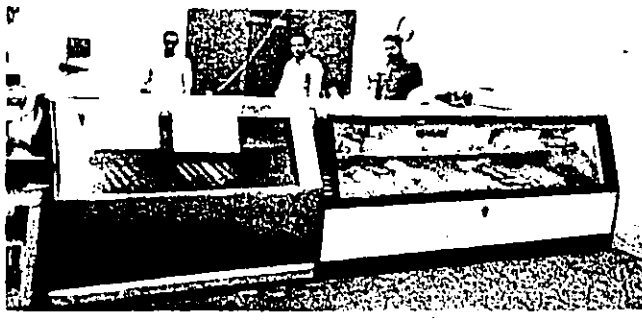
However, both the Ratcliffs and the board of managers of Tyler County Hospital District feel that a type 3 nursing home (type 3 is the highest standard for homes of this type) would attract enough patients to pay its way.

If the county builds the nursing home, it will not be able to operate it since the State Welfare Department will not make assistance payments for patients in a county-operated home. Since the hospital district is also a political subdivision, it is apparent that the home in all likelihood will have to be leased to some organization. The hospital board of managers have stated that they will lease it to some non-profit organization, provided they cannot operate it.

Questions facing the voters in the January 9 bond election are (1) whether the nursing home is needed, (2) if it will pay its operating expenses after being built, and (3) whether a non-profit organization will be willing to lease the home on the basis that it will be self-supporting from patients in the home.

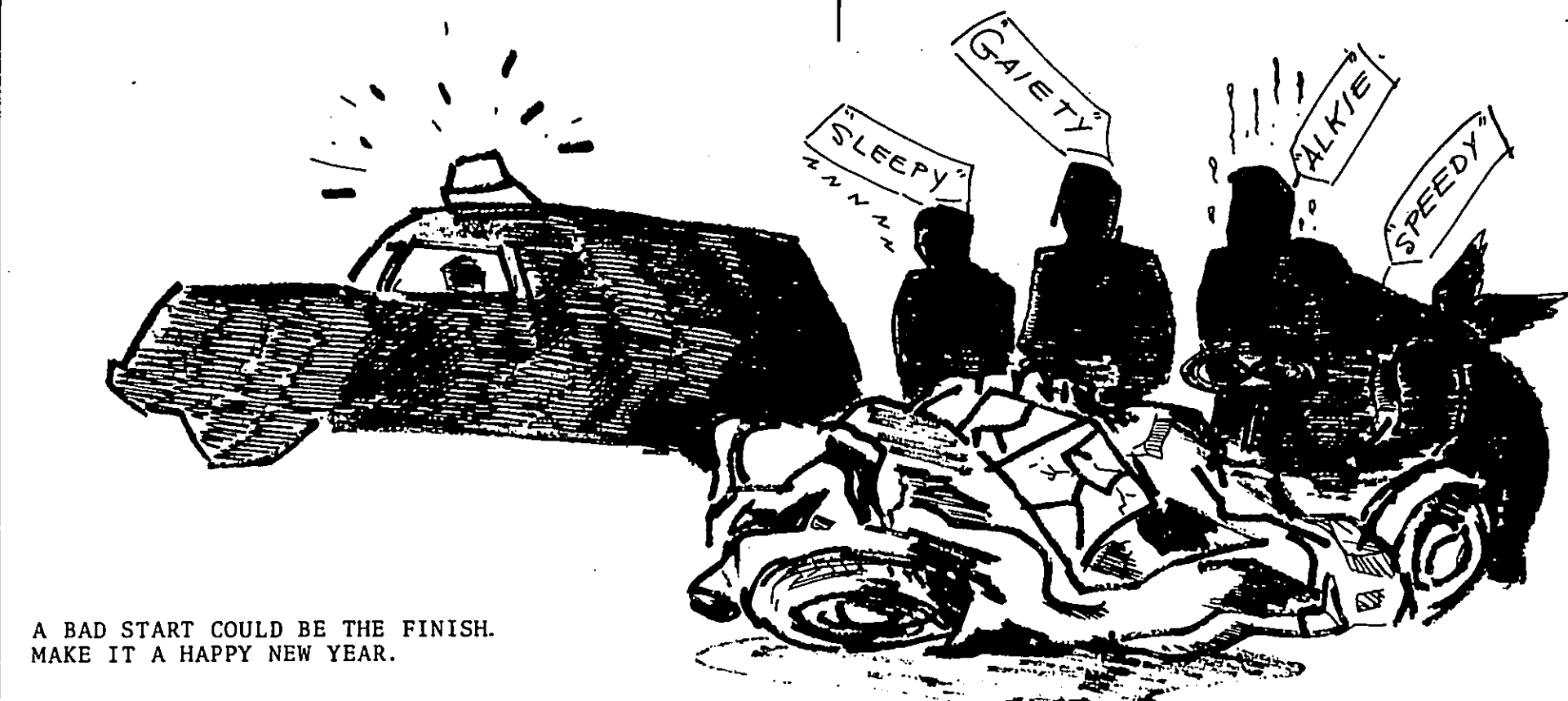

Vice-President of SCOT Bruce Wiggins opened up 3,000 acres of the 10,000-acre East Texas hunting area. Sixteen hunters bagged 10 deer, two hunters missed their shots, one a woman who never scored after shooting at a buck nine times. Located near Pineland the SCOT preserve is being stocked with deer from the King Ranch. Hunters pay \$10 a day to use a blind and if they get bucks the cost of transplanting the animals is added. 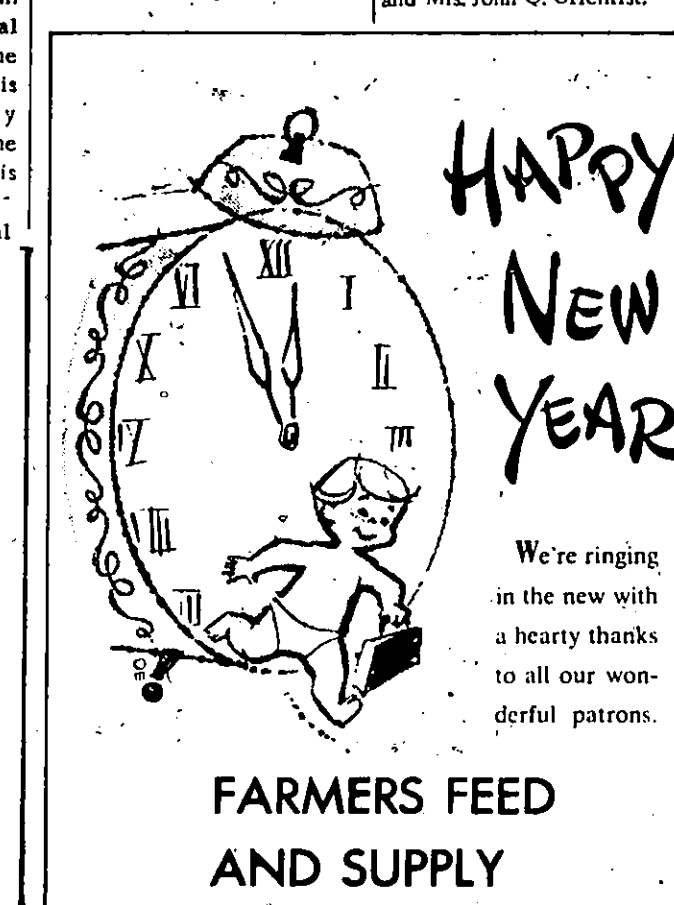
