## Just A Few Words

The day after the night from Taylor me and a couple of other boys, I German soda water and bought for a little old bash in the Brazos river.

We had an old car with the back seat bare out to make it look bad. We hung his three, loose Wizard on the tall gate and got some string and some junk iron out of the blacksmith shop and some hooks and took it.

We stopped at Fritz Krueger's store in Burleigh and picked up some weiners and cheese and crackers and some coffee.

James, he always insisted on using the dirtiest old syrup bucket he could find to make 'river coffee', he called it. Now I am partial to coffee like you make in a regular old-fashioned drip pot.

But anyway, we made it in the bucket, dipping the grounds in the boiling water, and drank it at breakfast, grounds, wood ash and all.

We slept on that bluff and on sand bars for nine nights. After dark we'd lay there and watch the stars and talk and listen to the night. Two or three times a night (if we felt like it) we'd get up and slip down the steep bank to where the boat was tied and run the lines. Some nights were lazy and wouldn't run them till just before dawn.

It was August and warm and just plain good. You know, it was right. Maybe we didn't contribute much to society, but on the other hand, we mostly stayed down there by ourselves and didn't give society any problems, either.

James, he was working for his daddy in the blacksmith shop, and every morning I had to run him back into town. But I didn't stay there too long. Just to replenish the soda water and things, then I'd hunt up some kid and we'd selne balf.

The days were good because by noon I was mostly by myself down there on the river. I'd check the hooks then pull up on sandbar and strip and swim. Mostly, I'd lay naked on the sand or right in the edge of the shallow warm water, and let the Brazos wash the army away. It took a few days. The Brazos is wide there, deep channels with some sure enough deep holes against the bluff banks where we set the hooks. It is big—and kind of lonesome.

There wasn't nothing to bother on the river. It doesn't rain in August and not many clouds. The sky is mostly sky-blue but the woods not too green, because it's pretty dry.

The bluffs tower up high above you and the sand bars are big and wide—like beaches. The river is 'down' that time of year. You can hear squalls rattle the dry leaves up on the bluffs in the pines, and lots of birds, and on the logs in the river big hardbacked turtles float for sunning space and buzzards make an occasional floating black dot in the clear blue.

It always came around too soon to get dressed and go to town for James and I was jealous of the hour it took out of the day to go after him.

Some nights, when we had finished running the lines, we'd just pull the skiff up on a sandbar and sleep there on the sand. It was soft and warm. We could hear the big river sighing its way to the gulf and frogs, and now and then a gar or something would run sild or minnows up in the shallows and take a hook of a whack at them. One night I caught a little baby cottontail. We kept it all night and then turned it loose the next morning. We night fished for good with cut bait and caught some, and next day I took 'em home. 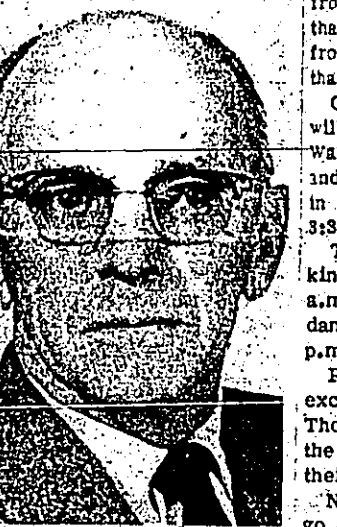

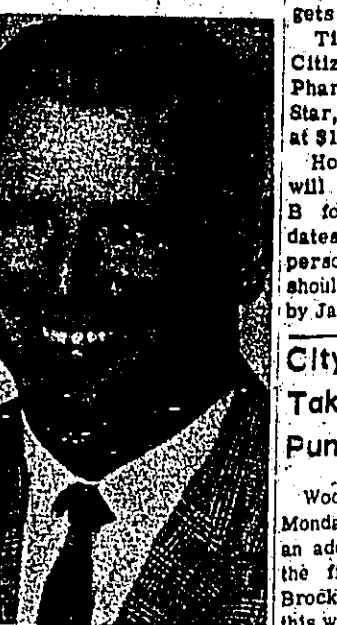
He took that part all right, but I never did understand why he got so put out when he found out I took that girl's mother—the catfish we'd caught that last night.

Thursday, Jan. 21, Bob Jenkins Grocery in Fred from 8 a.m. until noon and Jack Jordan's in Spurger from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

## Commissioners Huddle In Secret On Salaries

After two days of confusion, recess, indecision, and no session, Tyler county commissioners abandoned their first session of 1965 Tuesday afternoon shortly after 2 p.m., calling yet another recess until 10 a.m. of Friday.

Previously, the court and the behind locked doors of the commissioners' court room in split the cost 50-50. Morris Clemmons Jr., former secretary of the C. of C. held the court that the chamber had undertaken a new program in that it had hired a part-time manager and was trying to cut operational costs.

The subject of putting justices of the peace and county constables on a salary basis rather than the present fee basis came up and Judge Mooney called for the closed-door recess.

Following the secret huddle, court reconvened and the judge announced that further discussion on salaries would be resumed Tuesday morning.

But the court still had time for talking over more matter before quitting for the day at approximately 4 p.m.

They did canvass the results of the nursing home bond election held last Saturday and the official tally showed 968 voted against the issue with 238 supporting it.

Tax assessor-collector A. L. "Pat" Thornion asked the court to purchase some equipment for his tax raising trucks. After brief discussion, the subject was tabled.

Just prior to recess, for the day the subject of the attorney telephone was taken off the somewhat crowded agenda and it was noted that the county would underwrite the cost.

The meeting resumed Tuesday morning with County attorney Clyde Earl Smith introducing the court that under Texas law, constables in counties of Tyler county's population bracket MUST pay their per-constables on a salary basis. In other words, the old fee basis was illegal all along.

The matter of justices of the peace was optional with the court, Mr. Smith advised, but he added, justices could receive up to \$5000 per annum, if approved by the court.

Mr. Smith recommended to the court that they put the JPs and constables both on a salary basis.

All this discussion was held prior to the commissioners' court being called into session. Judge Mooney complained to the court that he had been criticized for the court's action.

"It is my duty to bring questions up. It doesn't mean that I'm for or against anything—I simply must bring it up. I have been unjustly criticized about this," he said.

Court was then declared in session.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the salaries of elected officials (excluding JPs and constables) remain the same as heretofore, and elected officials, including the county judge, sheriff, district clerk, treasurer, clerk, tax collector, and county attorney are all paid \$6750 per year.

All four commissioners voted for the motion by Commissioner Hicks but Judge Mooney voted at vote no on that. I don't think all the officials are entitled to the same rate of pay, since they don't all have the same responsibility.

Mr. Hicks moved that the justices of the peace be kept on a fee basis.

## City Council Will Take Bids On New Pumper Truck

Woodville city council voted Monday night to seek bids on an additional pumper truck for the fire department, Rols Brockman, city secretary, said this week.

Acquisition of the fire fighting unit would reduce the city key rate on fire insurance by two cents, or to 41 cents, Mr. Brockman said.

This would result in a savings of roughly \$5000 per year to persons within the city limits having fire insurance, he said.

The council also discussed working out an adjustment with Rhodes Construction Co. regarding 450 feet of sewer line installed by the company on a recent contract, which has proved unsatisfactory, the city secretary said.

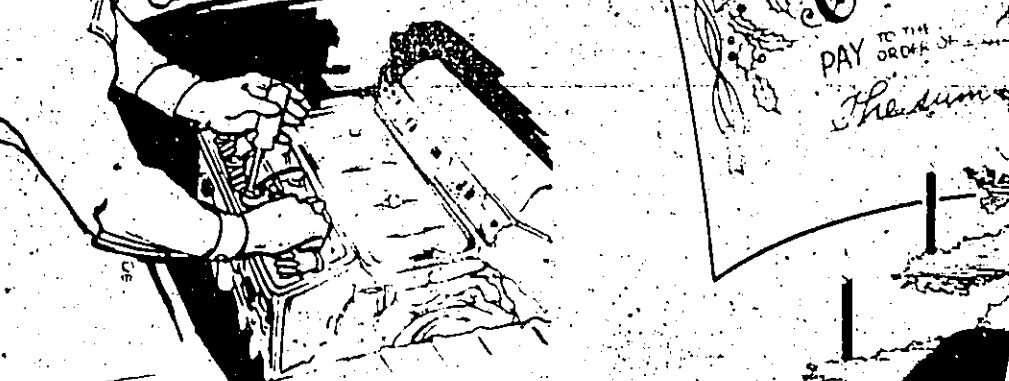

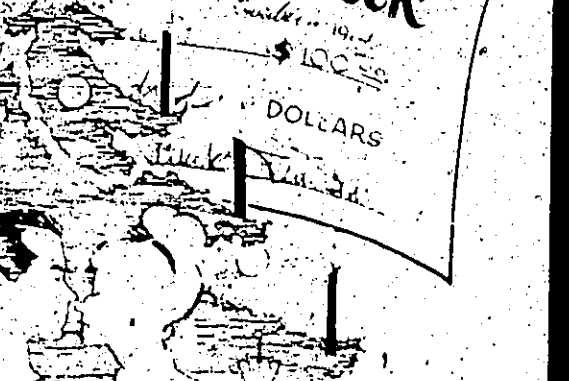

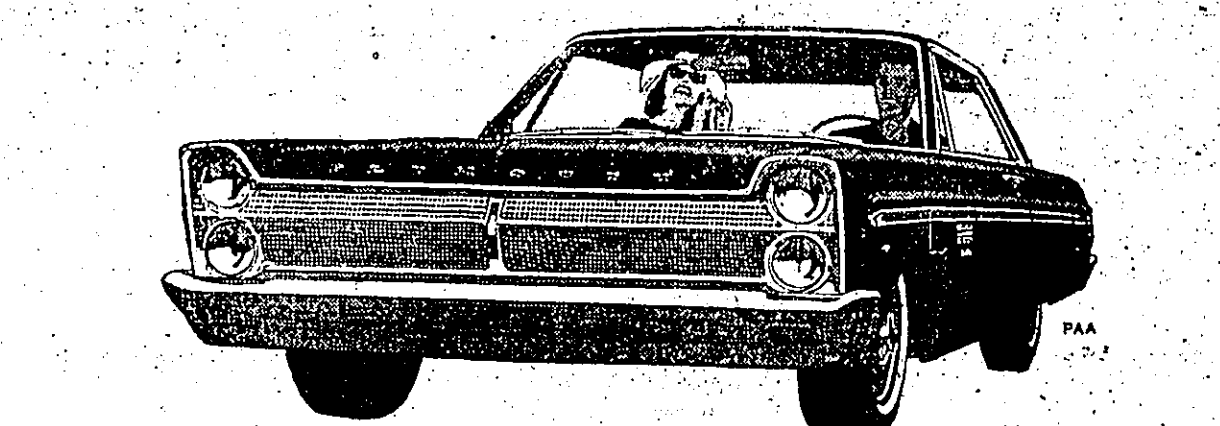

**County Business Population Shows Loss Of Two Firms**

Business statistics were mailed to 110 businesses in Tyler county in 1964 compared to 152 in 1963, R. C. Cushman, district manager for the Houston office of Dun and Bradstreet, announced this week. Mr. Cushman noted that each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun and Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns. The corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions. The Dun and Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit, but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. 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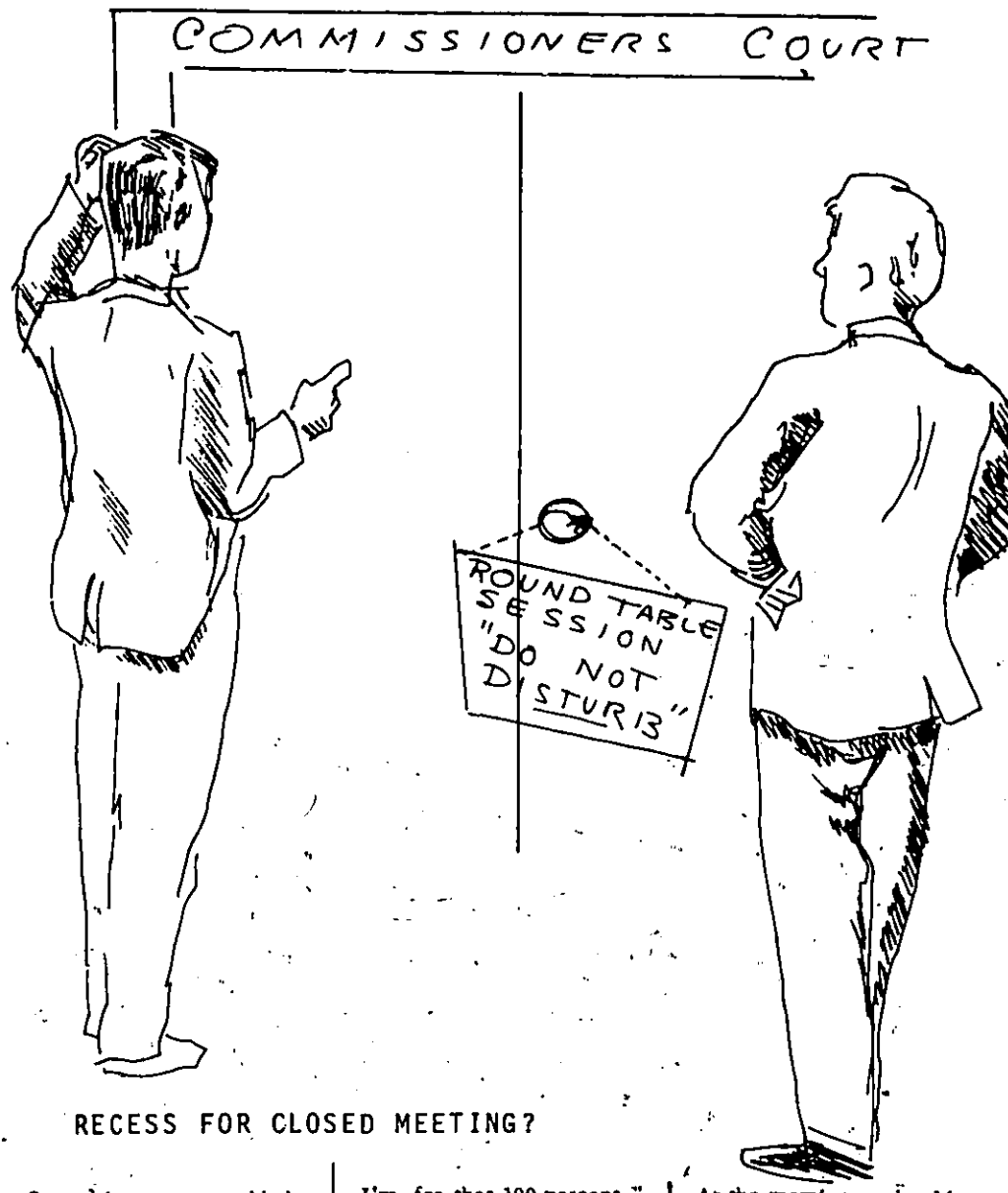

RECESS FOR CLOSED MEETING?

Something new was added to proceedings of the Tyler County Commissioners Court Monday when County Judge Jeff Mooney, prior to the opening of the regular meeting, proposed that "I think we should have a round table discussion behind closed doors in privacy before we can publicly give an answer" (to agenda under discussion).

"I'm for that 100 percent," Herman Powell, precinct two commissioner, agreed. "There will be lots of things I don't understand and I know there will be some things the new ones (commissioners) won't understand."

The occasion was the first session of the court since the two new commissioners, Joe Best and Leon Fowler, took office.

At the morning session Monday, several items were passed over until the new commissioners could be briefed privately at the "round table" discussion, the first of which was held Monday afternoon. The court recessed for the discussion, thus avoiding an executive session label. However, everyone present except the commissioners and county judge were expected to leave, and did.

## COUNTY HIRES AUDITOR

### COUNTY EMPLOYEES' SALARIES Tabled

### COMMISSIONERS FIRST MEETING OF THE YEAR IS LONG SESSION

Tyler County commissioners court met Monday for the regular first session of the year with two new members, Leon Fowler of Colmesneil and Joe I. Best of Woodville.

The first meeting, as required by law, had before it the salary schedule of county officials and employees plus a large number of routine items. They met

Monday and Tuesday, and recessed for another session Friday.

In action taken Monday, the commissioners court reappointed Dr. John Gilchrist as county health officer for another two year term, voted to continue support for the Multi-County Bookmobile, and decided to observe the same hol-

days as set out by the chamber of commerce for 1965.

H. G. Waldrep, justice of the peace in precinct four, submitted his resignation because of health reasons. Later in the session, they appointed E. E. Sheffield to fill out Mr. Waldrep's unexpired term until the next general election.

The court voted to authorize the county judge to write the Texas Highway Department about setting a speed zone from Highway 69 through Hillister. They also approved the bond of Otho Miles, deputy sheriff; accepted the quarterly report of County Treasurer J. F. Boyd; authorized the county judge to be in charge of maintenance at the court house and authorized the payment for the telephone at the Tyler County Airport for the year of 1965.

The court also canvassed the results of Saturday's election on issuing bonds for a nursing home, and found that it was defeated by a vote of 238 for and 968 against.

Tuesday's session was devoted to salaries mainly, an item tabled at Monday's meeting. On a motion by Hicks and seconded by Best, the court voted to leave the salaries of all elected officials at the present rate, which is \$6750 annually, except constables and justices of the peace. All voted for this motion except Judge Mooney, who voted against.

On another motion by Hicks and seconded by Best, the court voted to leave the justices of the peace on a fee basis with Mooney again voting against the motion.

On a motion to pay constables a beginning salary of \$1200 per year subject to change later, all voted for the motion except Fowler, who cast a no vote.

On other items decided Tuesday, the commissioners were unanimous in deciding to leave the sheriff's deputies on their present salary except the stock law deputy; to lay the stock law deputy off until January 15; continue the janitor, county service officer, county nurse, and county attorney's secretary at the same rate of pay as last year.

The court voted to pay the county judge's secretary \$225 a month instead of weekly as at present.

Salaries of employees in the tax assessor's office and the office of county clerk were passed over for decision at Friday's session.

When he took office in 1963, Judge Mooney had proposed the hiring of an auditor but the court at that time voted against the motion.

Fowler and Best took office January 4 following the election last year in which they defeated incumbents H. A. Cruse and Howard Riley. In voting Tuesday, they joined with Judge Mooney in supporting the hiring of an auditor.

A county auditor is appointed by the district judge, and cannot be fired by the commissioners as far as his tenure of office is concerned. The court can set his salary and appropriate money for his expenses.

Following the court's action Tuesday, Judge H. A. Coe of Kountze is authorized to hire an auditor for the county. The court did not take any action on the auditor's salary at the session Tuesday.

The commissioners will reconvene Friday to try to complete the many items on the agenda for the first session of the new court.

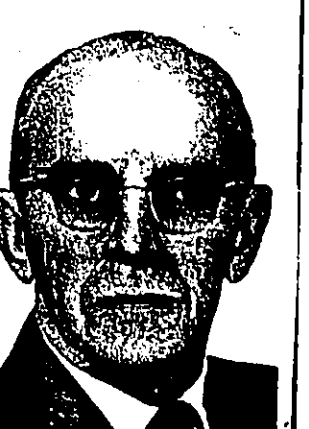

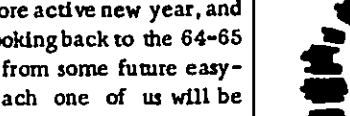

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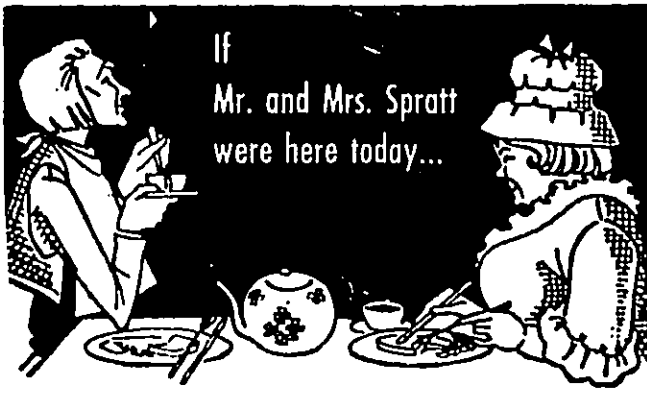

This was meant to be done by the regulation of these salaries. But as it turned out, this meeting, instead of cutting expenses and being able to pay an indebtedness to the Citizens State Bank of Woodville, Texas of \$50,000.00 of borrowed money and putting the County back on a cash basis, they added \$11,000.00 or thereabout more expenses annually. The largest portion of the borrowed \$50,000.00 above mentioned was to meet the payroll last year. The \$11,000.00 extra added expenses were as follows: the salary for a full time auditor and salaries for the four Constables of Tyler (one in each precinct). The Constables of Tyler County all put together do not turn in more than \$600.00 per year, yet they will be paid \$1200.00 each per year.

### With the bookkeeping system now in effect at the court house, an annual audit could be done by contract for as little as \$1000.

### If Tyler County had to borrow \$50,000.00 last year (the biggest portion being for salaries), how do they expect to meet the payroll as it now stands with the above \$11,000.00 or more added to it???
