Just A Few Words

They broadcast all the speeches back and forth. It was before television and radio was a great force.

We heard them all—Roosevelt's "Day of Infamy" speech, Sir Winston's "Blood, sweat, toil, and tears"—they were great orators, both of them.

But Sir Winston's most magnificent hour—perhaps mankind's most magnificent hour—was when he spoke to the English nation, and said in a voice that vibrated with its energy and with the determination of the man who said the words, slowly, haltingly, so that none would miss a syllable.

It was just after Dunkirk, England had suffered her most crushing defeat, France belonged to Hitler. The German army stood at the other beach—22 miles away, terrible and strong and confident.

Then Churchill spoke:

"We shall defend our island, whatever the cost may be, he said gravely.

"We shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields, and in the streets, we shall fight in the hills, we shall never surrender."

His voice shook with emotion. It rose and fell with cadence and pitch was such that not just the English nation rose up with him, but all the free world who heard it.

There was never any doubt in my mind that what he said—have a vivid picture of him, splashing knee-deep into the salty waters of the English channel, the famous clay clenched firmly in his teeth, fire in his eyes and waving a club in his hand to fend off the invading Germans.

We talked the same language then, and he would have had not only the English nation splashing along beside him but lots of Americans as well.

And, indeed sir, given your splendid examples to remember, we shall never surrender.

Though it is the dead of winter, folks are already thinking about the coming Dogwood Festival.

During the discussion following this suggestion these points were brought out:

A few members of the council objected. They pointed out that foresters were intellectuals, not used to heavy manual labor. Dzerzhinsky replied that it was high time to liquidate the age-old inequality between the peasants and the foresters.

HOUSTON'S FABULOUS DOME Stadium shines resplendently on Houston's South Main street, virtually completed now and soon to be used for the first time for indoor baseball.

Press agents for the Houston Astros professional baseball team aver that "Baseball history will be made Friday, April 9 and Monday April 12 in the fabulous \$31.5 million domed stadium in Houston."

A game between the Houston Astros and the New York Yankees April 9 will be the first major league game ever played under roof and the Astros-D Yankees game April 12 will be the first regular season major league baseball game ever played indoors.

But whether you are a baseball fan or not—Houston's domed stadium is "something else" in the line of public stadium. Seating capacities are 45,000 for baseball, 52,000 for football, 60,000 for conventions and a maximum of 66,000 for boxing or like event. The stadium itself covers 9.5 acres of ground

and the entire complex covers 260 acres. Outside diameter of the structure is 710 feet with the playing surface 25 feet below street level. The dome top is 185 feet to 205 feet above the field. There is seating on six levels. The air conditioning system, costing \$4.5 million, will move 6600 tons of air (15,200,000 pounds) of air. Smoke and hot air will be blown out the top of the retractable roof. The stadium will have a \$2 million score board which will be an attraction in itself and there will be five dining areas in addition to the main dining area. There is paved parking for 30,000 cars and a traffic artery for afford access. The stadium was financed by Harris county and is leased to the Houston Sports Association, owners of the Astros, for 40 years at an annual lease fee of \$750,000. HSA has already sub-leased for Houston Oilers and Univ. of Houston football games, the Houston Fat Stock Show and Rodeo, and Dr. Billy Graham's religious revival.

District Judge To Take Auditor Applications

Grand Jury Bills Man On Four Check Counts

Seven indictments were returned by the Tyler County Grand Jury Monday, three for felony drunk driving and four for defrauding by obtaining things of value with a worthless check.

The bad check indictments were all charged to one man, Harvey Wright, who was returned to this county last week from Pueblo, Colorado, by local sheriff's officers.

Sheriff Grady Ray said that Wright had been the subject of a year-long search. Wright allegedly left town after writing a series of worthless payroll checks last winter.

He had previously been indicted on two similar counts, records in the District Clerk's office show. He is being held in the county jail under a total of \$14,000 in bonds.

Names of those persons indicted on the drunk driving counts were with held pending their arrest.

Eastex Paper Leases 17,698 More Acres To Wildlife Group

This past January 1, a free lease on 17,698.45 acres of land became effective between East Texas Pulp and Paper Company, the owner, and the East Texas Wildlife Conservation Association.

The lease lies north of the state game preserve between the Weils Bluff Road and the Neches River north to the Kirbyville-Spurger highway.

This brought the total land leased free to Eastex Wildlife by the paper company to nearly 60,000 acres. The association now has a total of 87,822 acres under lease for conservation and game management.

R.C. Buckley, president of Eastex and a friend of conservation, and game management to the experiment in game management with an initial fee of \$45,000 acres of compensation to the Neches River.

The people in Hardin, Jasper, and Tyler counties are learning that instead of taking game from them, conservation will provide game in a plentiful supply for everyone.

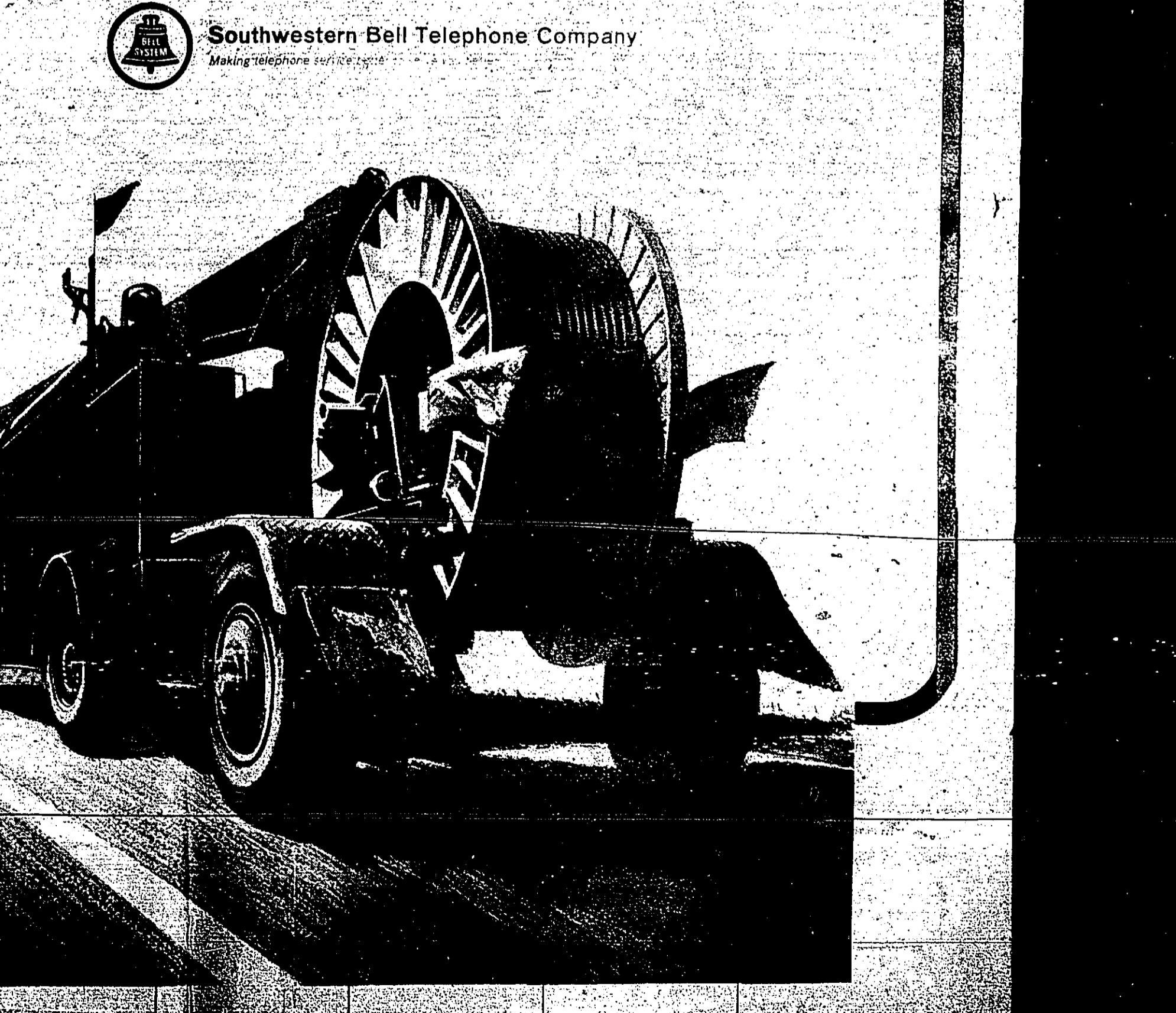

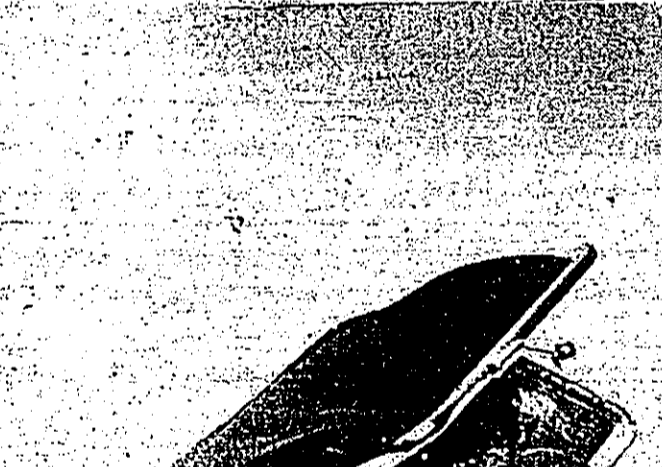

Grinnel Good Sport on Rod And Reel PWD Says

The mudfish or bowfin has many names applied locally, some of which won't bear repeating, especially when an angler has a new lure riddled by one of the always-hungry East Texas fish.
 The grinnel (grinnel) is muddy green in color, and his coarse scales give the body an iridescent color. At the base of the orange tail is a large black spot. The dorsal fin on the back is elongated down the entire back. If his description were applied to man, you'd think he'd be on the FBI list because his forehead is sloping and his eyes are beady and mean looking. He is one fish with a mouthful of dangerous teeth.
 Females are usually larger than males of the same age, averaging from two to five pounds, but one 10-pounder is not exactly rare. They are found in rivers and lakes, but also in the muddy sloughs and marshes and often are caught on trotline and while fishing for bass. Bowfin feed on almost anything in the animal world that lives in the water, with a marked preference for crustaceans, fishes, frogs, and even insects. Blood bait is especially good if the angler wants a large catch. Liver that still drips blood will also catch them.
 On the table the bowfin is no better or no worse than eating cotton, and usually the meal is thrown out after a bite or so. If the fish is dressed, liberally salted and fried in hot grease, the meat is only fair while it is still warm. Once cold it's better to go ahead and throw it away. The Louisiana name is poisson de marais, which means "fish of the marshes," and a good hint concerning the flavor.

ACCENT ON HEALTH

Ten killers are at large in Texas. These killers aren't bandits or criminals—they are the ten leading causes of Texans' deaths.
 The ten leading killers account for a giant share of 82,692 Texans who died in 1963.
 The latest statistics released by the State Health Department categorize, profile and dissect the leading killers.
 This is how they stack up on paper.
 Heart disease took the lion's share—one out of every three deaths in the State. National statistics also show the same leading cause of death.
 Cancer ranks second, taking 15 percent of the State's total number of deaths.
 Apoplexy or stroke is classified as the third most deadly, with 11 percent of the death total.
 Accidents, as the fourth leading killer, claimed 5,999 lives, or seven percent of the total. Death due to accidental cause takes the largest percentage of lives for the age of one through 45.
 Disease of early infancy, fifth in sequence, takes its toll of course—below the one year marker.
 Pneumonia ranks sixth in the line-up of killers claiming five percent of the deaths.
 General arteriosclerosis, diabetes mellitus and congenital malformations are the seventh, eighth and ninth cause of death, respectively.
 Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death. It first ranked tenth in 1958. Deaths from suicide increase each year.
 The ten leading causes of death and other vital statistics are released yearly by the Health Department's Records and Statistics Section.

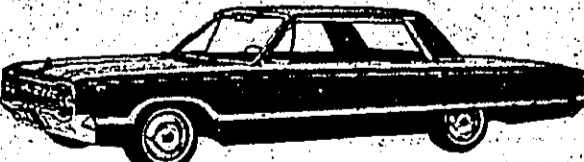

An old dream is being revived in the Big Thicket—that storied, sprawling semi-jungle in southeast Texas.
 The new Big Thicket Assn., a non-profit organization chartered by the state, has set its sights on a campaign to preserve a part of the Thicket for future generations.
 Residents of the Thicket have been talking about preservation for years, but this is probably the first time the idea has gone so far.
 The association's first fund-raising project, a barbecue and entertainment program at Saratoga, met with unexpected success. More than 1800 persons defied chilling rains to attend. Liberty mayor Dempsey Henley, who heads the association, would like to see a part of the Thicket set aside as a park or federal wilderness area.
 There are also plans afoot to establish a museum at Saratoga that would display Big Thicket products.
 One piece of memorabilia would be the original manuscripts from "Land of the Big Thicket," a folk song written by Walter McCright of Batson.

Modern times have finally caught up with Gen. Thomas J. Rusk, Texas' revolutionary hero.

A statue of the general, which stood on the town square at Henderson for almost 35 years, has been moved to make way for a street remodeling program.

The statue, built in 1930 at a cost of \$14,000, was transferred to the lawn of the Rusk County courthouse. The county was named for Gen. Rusk, a signer of the Texas declaration of independence.

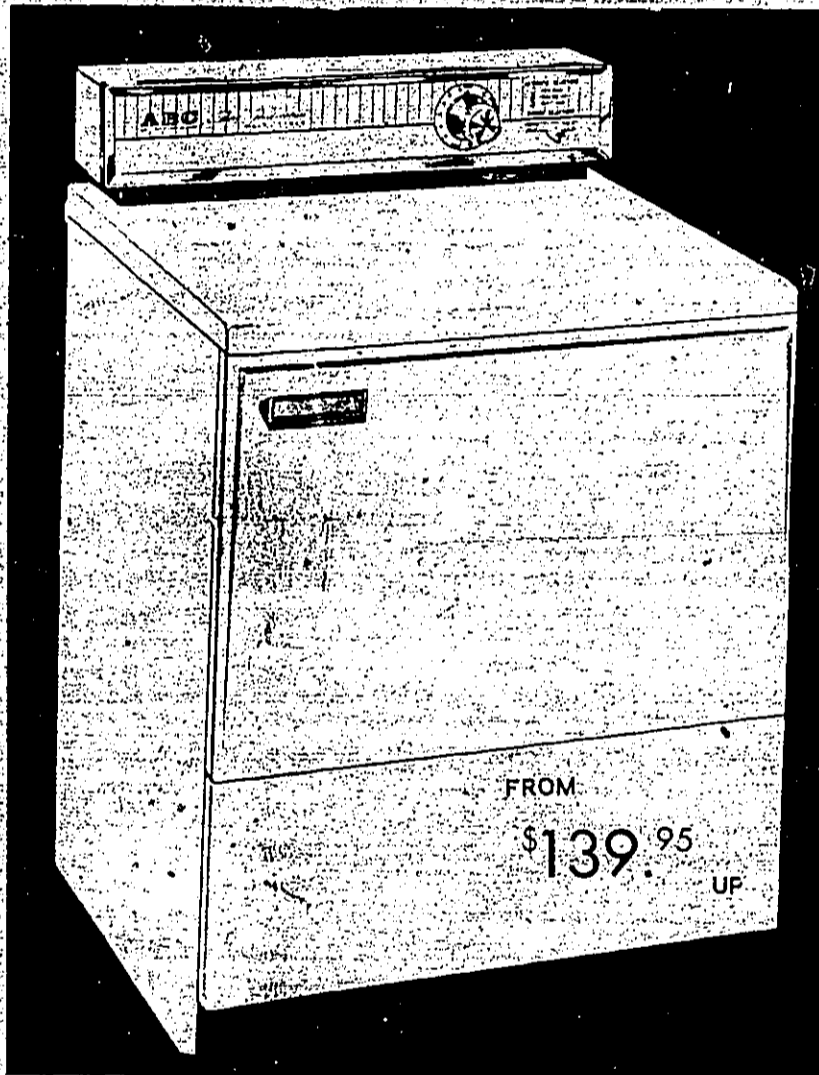
