TWO INCUMBENTS FILE FOR SCHOOL BOARD

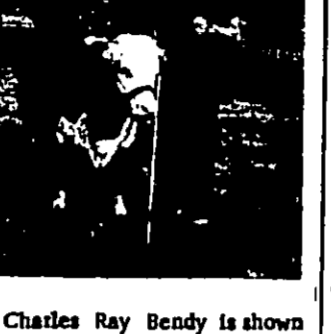

AT MEETING FRIDAY

Final Plans For Historical Tour To Be Made

Final plans for the First Annual Historical Tour sponsored by the Tyler County Historical Society will be made at a meeting at the court house Friday beginning at 2:30 p.m.

In last week's Press, the date of March 5 was inadvertently omitted, leaving the impression that the meeting was last Friday. The Press regrets this error and apologizes for any inconveniences it may have caused committee members.

In the meeting tomorrow afternoon, the committee will make final plans for the tour, which will be held on March 26, the Friday before the Dogwood Festival.

Those making the tour will meet at the Allan Shivers Memorial Library and Museum, and following a tour of this attraction will proceed by bus to Heritage Garden. The visit at the Garden is expected to be completed in time for the buses to return to Community Inn, where those who wish to do so may have lunch.

Following lunch, the buses will take the old Harmony Road where the "Golden Pine", a phenomenon of nature, will be seen. The group will then follow the old Indian trail across Cypress Creek, stopping at the old Indian ball yard, and going on to the W. H. Risinger home. This is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, homes remaining in the county. It was built before 1842 by James Barclay Indian agent. The house, of hand-hewn logs, is dated back to 1842 by the family records which show that Mr. Risinger's grandmother was born in the house that year.

The buses will go from the Risinger home to Indian Village, where the new museum of the Alabama-Coushatta tribes will be visited. Besides historical relics, the Indians have stocked a curio shop with handcrafted articles. The Indians are also planning a short program to entertain the persons on the tour.

Each bus on the tour will have a commentator to explain the historical sites and answer questions. Charge for the tour is \$1 per person, which does not, of course, include lunch. Those making the tour may have lunch at Community Inn or other eating place, or may bring a box lunch.

Mr. Davis, retired carpenter, was found dead in a field behind his house about two miles north of Doucette, about 8:30 p.m. Tuesday. Justice of the Peace Joe Loggins of Woodville ruled accidental death.

Davis had apparently tried to cross a barbed wire fence while carrying a shotgun, became entangled and accidentally discharged the gun, shooting himself in the stomach, Loggins said.

He was not missed at his house until late Tuesday and a search party located his body a short time later.

He had lived in Doucette for the past 23 years and was a member of First Baptist Church of Doucette.

Special Venire Called For Peyton Smith Murder Trial

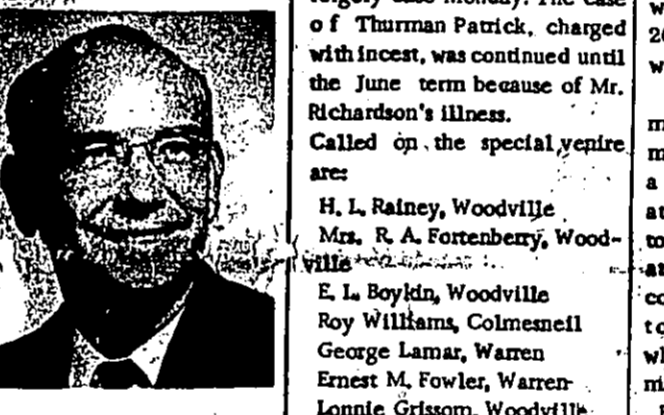
A special venire of 75 persons has been called for the Peyton Smith murder case scheduled to begin Monday in 88th District Court here, according to District Clerk Hilda Coats.

COMMUNITY INN STOCKHOLDERS IN MEETING FRIDAY

George E. Tubb, president, made a report on the operation of the Woodville Community Inn from its opening in November 1963 through January of this year at the annual meeting of stockholders of the corporation Friday.

Mr. Tubb said that the percentage of occupancy is growing steadily and that the motel's food department operation costs is below the national average, thus allowing a better profit.

Herbert Wilson, president of Community Inns of America of Nacogdoches, the operating managers of the motel said that room business in the Woodville Inn has shown an increase while other motels in Texas were experiencing the usual winter decline.

Vernon Birkhead, manager, spoke briefly on the Woodville Inn's part in the development of local facilities, and reported that the Inn was one of the county's largest employers.

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REPORT FROM THE LEGISLATURE

Maybe I didn't get on the right "team" to begin with here. Most of my votes have been with the minority and losing side. I voted against the compulsory Pooling Bill which passed. I voted for the many attempted amendments to it which failed. But in the first place I don't like the word compulsory in such legislation and in the long run my interpretation of this oil and gas pooling bill is that it is not to the best interests of the varied land owners of my district. But it will be law anyhow.

I voted to amend the Appropriation Bill to give Old Age Assistance recipients a monthly increase of about eight or nine dollars. Again I was on the losing side. The majority of the House would not accept this even though the people of the State of Texas approved of it a couple of years ago in a Constitutional Amendment raising the total to be spent for this purpose from forty to around sixty million dollars.

One representative offered an amendment to lower the appropriation for the Junior College in his own county and it was not accepted. I am attempting to illustrate that this matter of legislating so far has been a mere procedural thing of accepting exactly what the team or "powers that be" here desire.

I don't want to be on anybody's team and still intend to vote on each issue according to its merits as I see it and according to what I think is best for District 7. You might say that one could get cynical here.

I did vote with the majority on legislation which would exempt employees of governmental and sub-divisions of lunch with two school Superintendents from District 7 and two new programs of education were discussed. I think it was a useful appointment with the Texas Education Agency.

I have had some conversation with Rep. John Allen of longview about his Bill to create the "Sabine Navigation District" within the counties of Gregg, Rusk, Harrison and Panola. The ultimate goal of this project is to permit navigation by water from that area to the Toledo Bend Dam. In the feasibility planning stage also is to make the Sabine navigable from Toledo Bend to the Gulf.

No major fights have developed on the House floor as yet because few bills have come out of committee. There is promise of much sharp debate on bills later on in the session.

Bills referred to committees which I serve have really begun to toll in and it takes much time doing research on these bills. Of course, there are other bills not referred to committees governmental agencies from having to buy liability insurance on vehicles which they drive on the job for that agency.

This would include school bus drivers, highway patrolmen, etc. There has been considerable discussion over interpretation of rules in the House and Senate which will be applied for one purpose only. PLANTING DIRECTIONS
Dogwood Trees

1. Do not handle plants by top—handle by ball of earth only.
2. Dig hole 12 inches wider and 8 inches deeper than ball of earth. This will provide a 2" deep basin around tree to catch rainfall.
3. Mix soil with one-half peat moss or miracle mulch and a moderate amount of organic fertilizer such as Milorganite or barnyard fertilizer.
4. Put mixed soil 6" deep in bottom of hole.
5. Place plant in hole and fill soil mixture one half way up on ball of earth.
6. Water generously.
7. Finish filling around ball of earth with soil mixture. Ball of earth should not be covered deeper than one fourth inch on top with soil (excluding mulch).
8. Water again generously.
9. Mulch with peat moss.

miracle mulch or pine straw one and one-half (1 1/2) inches deep on top of ground around plant extending out approximately six inches past the diameter of plant top.

10. Place four moth balls one half inch below ground level and two inches from trunk of dogwood.

11. Dogwoods should be watered thoroughly once each week during hot weather (April through September) and as needed for remainder of year.

12. After planting dogwoods, wrap stem of plants with two plys of heavy paper up to the first limb, beginning at the ground. This will help prevent borers from damaging the plant. This paper should be left on the plant for one year.

13. Another way to avoid borers is to spray or paint trunk of tree early in spring with Malathion (diluted as directed by manufacturer).

14. When mulching your trees each year, concentrate on the area under the outer leaf drop, keeping mulch at least a foot away from trunk. Mulch placed too close to trunk may cause ground rot.

IMPORTANT NOTE

Due to the texture of our local soil which does not retain moisture very long, #9 mulching and #11 watering, are the most important requirements in the successful growing of dogwood trees.

READING CLUB HEARS B. H. MCGUIRE

The speaker for the evening was B. H. McGuire, Superintendent of Woodville Schools, who informed the Reading Club of some important problems facing the public schools in Texas in the immediate future, as well as the present time on the local and state levels.

Mr. McGuire stated that the trend in Texas today seems to be that of shifting more of the burden of the education of our children, from the state to the local taxpayer. This is particularly true if the new program of school finance proposed by the governor is passed by this session of the Legislature.

Today Texas ranks third in the nation in scholastic population but ranks 41st out of 50 states as being a state supported of public schools. As more of this burden is shifted back to the local level there is but one other course for the local district to turn and that is to accept federal aid which is available. "We all know what the result will be when we accept federal funds, especially since the passing of the civil rights statutes of 1964."

Today with more emphasis being put on education and the problem of dropouts, we feel that the state is shirking its duty by trying to shift this responsibility instead of accepting more of this problem as they should, McGuire declared.

Mr. McGuire said that we all need to take a state-wide look at our public education systems in Texas, all the way from the first grade through junior and senior college level. The children of today are under great pressures that will effect the emotional development of their lives. These problems can be solved only by a well informed public and the action of that public, McGuire said.

There were 21 members and three guests present, who enjoyed the program and refreshments served afterward. The club voted to give a nursing scholarship of \$200.00 to a Kirby High graduate to begin studying this September at Lamar college.

STUDENTS TO GO TO ATOM SYMPOSIUM

Many of Southeast Texas' academically talented high school science students and teachers will get a front seat to the drama of the atom next June 6-9 at the fifth annual Texas Nuclear Science Symposium.

For the fifth straight year, Gulf States Utilities Company will sponsor a delegation from its Texas service area encompassing 19 counties. The 1965 participants will be announced sometime in March or April.

The four-day symposium, scheduled for the campus of the University of Texas, is jointly sponsored by the University and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, which is composed of Gulf States and nine other investor-owned electric firms.

Woodville's Kirby High School has sent three representatives to the symposium since its inaugural in 1961.

Some 500 science students and teachers are expected to attend the 1965 conference, which will feature lectures, demonstrations and discussions by prominent scientists on recent developments in nuclear science.

Last year, Gulf States paid room, board and travel expenses of 38 students and teachers at the symposium. Since the conferences began in 1961, the firm has sponsored 122 students and teachers at the sessions.

Kirby High School sent one representative the first year, 1961, and two last year. Attending the symposium a year ago were student Charles Blanks, Jr., now a senior, and teacher James M. Hays.
