Miss Warfield is the daughter of Mrs. Vicki Warfield and the late J. B. (Pinkey) Warfield. She is sweetheart of the Lions Club, and a member of the Kirby High School Band. She is treasurer of the senior class.

Miss Daniels is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Daniels of Warren and St. Louis. She has been drum major at Warren High School for the past four years.

Miss Jordan is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Jordan of Spurger. She has been active in 4-H Club work and was the Gold Star 4-H girl in Tyler County in 1963. She is editor of the Spurger High School annual and was chosen the best actress in the district one-act play contest.

NO AUDITOR IS COMMISSIONERS VOTE MONDAY

The Tyler County Commissioners Court in regular session Monday voted not to hire a full-time auditor "this year."

On a motion by F. C. Hicks and seconded by Herman Powell, the commissioners court voted three to two to put off hiring the full-time auditor but believed that the county cannot afford one at this time.

Leon Fowler, precinct three commissioner, explained his change in voting with a statement that he was not against a full-time auditor but believed that the county cannot afford one at this time.

Voting against the motion were County Judge Jeff Mooney and Joe I. Best. In other business, the commissioners heard A. L. Thornton, tax assessor-collector, report that county tax collections were 98.83 percent of total for the year. Of this, 92 percent was for the current year and delinquent payments made up the balance.

The commissioners voted, on a motion by Hicks, to keep the county tax rate the same as last year.

The thorny problem of enforcement of the stock law was brought up at the meeting. The county has no stock deputy since December 31, and stock that get out on roads, particularly in the area of the pre-civil war plantation mansion (Hollywood style, front only) which is nearly completed.

The commissioners decided to hold a special meeting next Monday to thresh out this problem.

The commissioners voted to observe the Friday and Saturday of the Dogwood Festival as official holidays. Judge Mooney called attention to the fact that for the first time a guided tour of historic spots in the area will be held on Friday, March 26, the day before the 25th annual Dogwood Festival.

APPROPRIATIONS BILL INCLUDES DAM B PARK FUND

The State Senate appropriations bill which came out of committee Tuesday contains an additional \$200,000 for further improvements and expansion to the Dam B State Park, according to a wire from State Senator Martin Dies Jr.

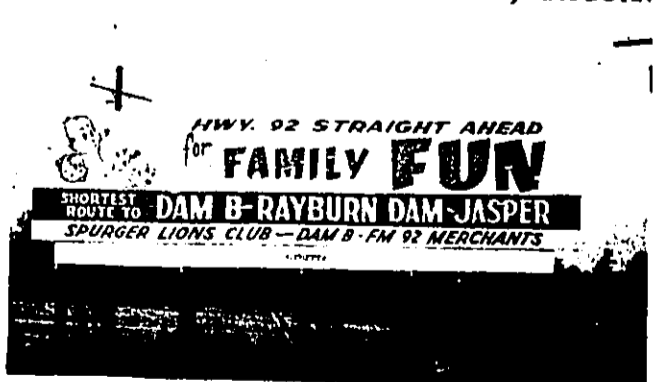
This added appropriation will assure the early completion of recreational and camping facilities which the state Parks and Wildlife Board is building at Dam B.

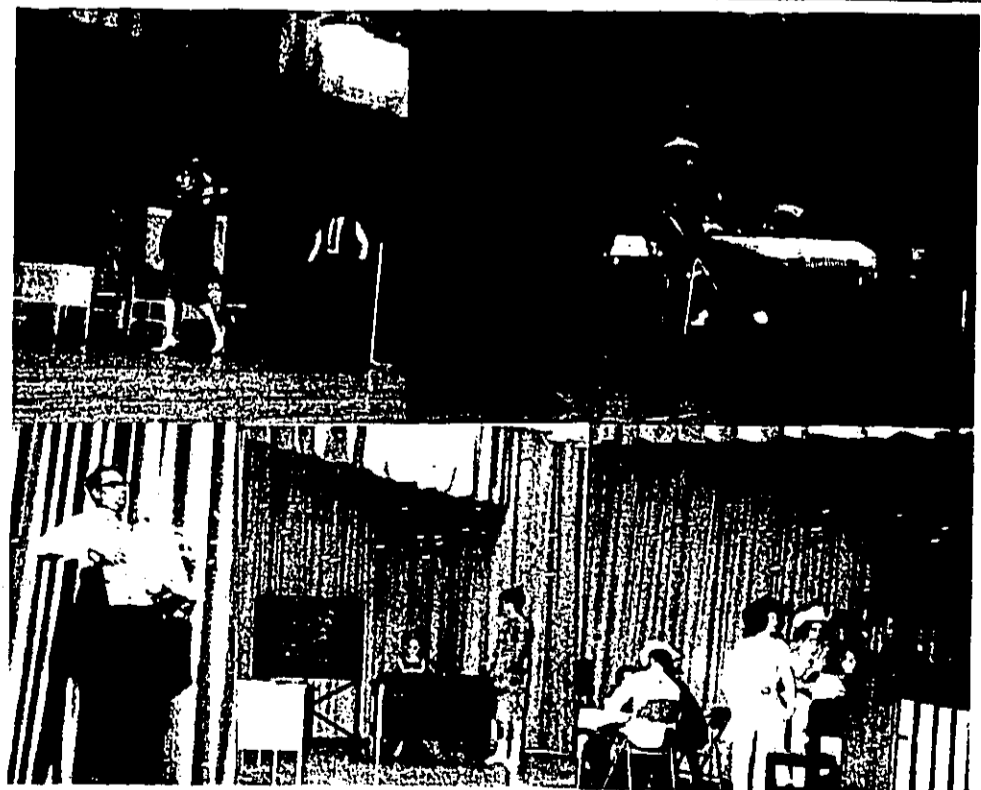

The first Dogwood Festival was held on April 6, 1940, under the auspices of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, and on March 23, 1941, the second was staged. Both played to small audiences and no one foresaw the growth of the festival to its present proportions when 10,000 persons line the streets for the parade and 3500 crowd into the amphitheatre for the coronation and pageant.

During the war years of 1942 through 1945, no festival was held. The third festival was on March 30, 1946, and it has been an annual attraction each year since.

During these first years, the exact date for the festival was not set until it could be determined when the dogwoods would be in almost full bloom. However, with the tremendous growth of the festival it became necessary to set a permanent date, and the last Saturday in March was chosen, as past festivals had shown that this was an average date when the dogwoods will be blooming.

The queen for the festival is chosen from senior girls in Tyler County high schools. The coronation has become one of the greatest attractions for the crowds, with as many as 35 duchesses from surrounding cities invited to participate in this part of the program with the five princesses from Tyler County from whom the queen is chosen.

The pageant, presented following the coronation, usually depicts some era of history in the county. This year's pageant will center around the men from the county who were in the Civil War.

The guiding hand for the festival throughout its history has been Judge James E. Wheat, who with Mrs. Wheat have contributed many long hours to keep the festival going. With the growth of the festival, hundreds of persons are active in its many phases, including making around 200,000 artificial flowers to decorate the amphitheatre by women of the county.

In the past few years, Josiah Wheat has acted as executive director to take some of the burden from his father.

Elaborate floats, including the one carrying the princesses of Tyler County, will make this year's parade one of the best, according to John Smitley, co-chairman with Bob Belt of the parade committee. Bands from area high schools and colleges will also participate in the parade.

A recent development of the festival has been the Trail Rides from Spurger and Livingston to the festival. These riders arrive in time to take part in the parade.

The King's Men, faced the task of choosing the princesses from the group of county girls, have chosen four this week (see picture). One of these will be queen, but her name will not be announced until the night of the festival. She will be chosen at judging next Tuesday night.

Last year's queen was Miss Linda Read, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Read of Woodville.

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SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q. I have a hardware store and did not have a net profit of \$400 for 1964. Is the optional method of reporting my income available to me?
A. No, the optional method of reporting self-employment income is available only to farmers.
Q. Before this year, I operated a small grocery store. Now I've sold the store and bought a farm. As a store owner I filed wage reports on my employees quarterly. Do I follow the same procedure as a farmer?
A. No. As a farm employer, you file just one wage report each year. The due date is January 31 for wages paid in the previous year. Remember, you report only those employees who are paid at least \$150 in cash wages or who work for you on 20 or more calendar days during the year.
Q. I am over 65 and have decided to quit farming. I planned on renting out my land, but have an offer to attractive to refuse. Would the sale of the land prevent me from receiving social security checks?
A. No. Income from the sale of your farm is not considered in figuring any social security benefits payable.
Q. I will be 65 in June. I still work and earn about \$2400 a year. I am married and have two small children. I could not afford to quit to get my social security payments. What good would it do for me to come see you at the social security office?
A. You might find that you and your family could get some monthly checks even though you are still working. It pays to find out the facts ahead of time.

SCREWORM PROGRAM COMPLETES YEAR OF SUCCESS

Screwworm eradication officials are looking forward to another successful year for the program, although many stockmen feel last year's results leave little room for improvement. Only 65 Texas counties were reported to be infested by the livestock pest in 1964, and only 223 cases were discovered. In contrast, during 1963, a total of 4,916 infestations were detected in 182 counties, while 49,484 cases occurred in 242 counties in 1962. New Mexico had only 14 outbreaks last year compared to nearly 1,500 the previous year. Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana had no infestations during 1964. Eradication program pilots flew nearly 2.7 million miles in dispensing approximately 4.7 billion sterile screwworm flies in Texas, New Mexico, southeastern Arizona and along the border in Mexico. Sterile flies, reared in a huge plant near Mission, mate with native flies and prevent production of offspring. Eradication activities have reduced annual losses to Southwestern livestockmen from \$100 million to less than \$1 million since the program began in February 1962. Officials think they can reduce losses even more in 1965 by strengthening the barrier zone between the United States and Mexico where screwworms can exist year-round, in this barrier, which is several hundred miles wide and runs from the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of California, sterile flies are dispensed routinely to prevent fertile screwworms from migrating into "clean" areas and causing new outbreaks. Stockmen can also help by frequently examining their animals and promptly reporting all infestations. No screwworms have been reported in the Southwest since early in December, so outbreaks can be brought under control quickly if they are detected during early stages of development.

TOURING EAST TEXAS

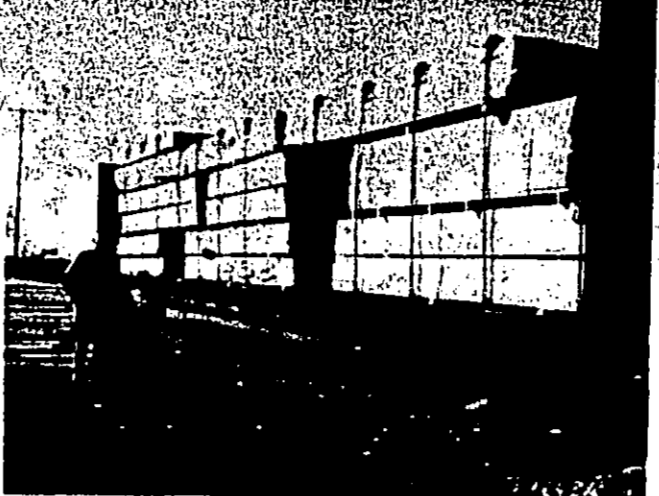
A historic tour is in the making for visitors to the Tyler County Dogwood Festival at Woodville this month.

Plans call for the tour to begin at 10 a. m. Friday, March 26, a day before the traditional parade and pageant that ushers in the Dogwood season in East Texas' forests.

Stops will include the historic Ringer home in the Harmony community, a strange pine tree that turns gold each winter, the Allan Shivers Museum and Library at Woodville, Clyde Gray's Heritage Garden, and the nearby Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, where a special program will mark the opening of a new \$40,000 museum, curio shop, and restaurant.

The Dogwood Festival, incidentally, will mark its silver anniversary this year. It has grown from a small school play-let to one of the most outstanding historical pageants in the country.

GULF STATES TAXES IN COUNTY \$28,348

A record \$2,953,088 in property, city street rental and city franchise taxes were paid in Texas in 1964 by Gulf States Utilities Company. It has been announced by Frank Robinson, local superintendent, Tyler County \$28,348 in taxes last year from the utility company.

The largest share in the 27 Texas counties served by Gulf States was \$1,521,371 paid in Jefferson County, where the firm's system-wide headquarters is located (Beaumont).

The electric company, which serves a 28,000-square-mile area in Texas and Louisiana, paid a total tax bill last year--including federal taxes--amounting to \$26,300,000, the GSU official said.

Gulf States' over-all tax figured out to over \$72,000 daily and more than \$2 million monthly during 1964.

The Gulf States spokesman also reported that the total taxes were 67.2 per cent more than dividends paid to common and preferred stockholders. Dividends amounted to \$15,731,343.

Gulf States, which has a plant investment over \$575 million in its Texas and Louisiana service area, is owned by more than 18,600 shareholders in all fifty states.

Pallbearers were L. B. Hanks, J. P. Powell, Bill Powers, J. T. Winters, Earl Winters and Doyle Cowart.

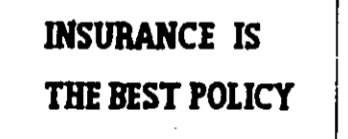

REPORT FROM THE LEGISLATURE

Monday morning the House assembled to present Governor Connally with a sculptural bust of the Governor fashioned by Representative Neff Caldwell. I thought it was a beautiful work of art and I didn't know that Neff was so talented.

H. B. 51 was considered by the House and passed to engrossment. This bill raises the compulsory school attendance requirement to 17 years. I voted for it.

My friend Don Hefton had his bill on the floor which would provide for additional pay for teachers performing extra duties like selling popcorn and tickets, chaperoning students, riding buses on ball games, etc. This, of course, would have to be financed entirely from the local level. Consideration of the Bill was postponed until Monday. There is some controversy over this bill.

The Constitutional Amendment which would provide equal rights for women was considered on third reading. Such Amendment requires a 2/3 vote or 100 votes to pass. I only got 91 votes and thus failed. I voted for it on second reading. I was sick in bed with a cold and had an excused absence Tuesday when it came up for third reading.

I voted for H. B. 92 which passed the House which provides that no suit for divorce can be heard before 180 days after filing date if there are children involved under 18 years old. An amendment was tacked to it and passed which says that the court can, if deemed necessary, provide for a hearing earlier than 180 days.

Two very controversial Bills were heard in committee this week. One involved a change in the Workmen's Compensation Laws. This was a long hearing. It was referred to sub-committee. The other "interesting" hearing was on the proposal to legalize pari-mutual betting on horse-racing. Representative Red Berry, as usual, was the author and is pushing hard for its passage. This proposal also was referred to sub-committee as are most Bills. I'm committed against this one.

The Joint Rules of the Senate and House now are that no new Bill that requires State money or appropriation can be passed until after the 120th legislative day. Of course, there are many Bills being considered now that provide for some appropriation. But according to the information that I have the Lt. Governor and the Speaker will interpret which is primarily an appropriation Bill and which is a Bill that is not. It seems to me that practically speaking this Joint Rule has become meaningless. I think its obvious that the Teacher Pay Bill is primarily an appropriation Bill.

Our Representative District is well represented here this week by two teams in the Annual State Boys Basketball Tournament. Deweyville (Newton County) and West Sabine (Sabine County) both won their first game too, and are now in the final game for the State Basketball Championship of their respective classifications. Speaks well of basketball in our area. I have seen and will see all games our "home" teams play this week-end.

A lot of the House members have been absent with colds, flu, sinus, etc. this week. Hope to be in District 7 next week-end.
