Poised, elegant, and quite lovely in evening attire, the four finalists for Dogwood Queen for 1965 met for their final session with the King's Men Tuesday evening.

The 1965 Dogwood Queen has been named.

Her identity will not be revealed until Saturday night at the start of the pageant.

The four finalists were Mafy Ann Benton of Colmesneil, Terri Daniels of Warren, Jane Warfield of Woodville and Laurann Jordan of Spurger.

Persistent muggy and cool weather has kept the white blossoms from bursting forth in all their glory but several individuals have reported that some dogwood has begun to speckle the East Texas woods with white.

The weatherman said earlier in the week that coolness would persist through today-Thursday, with a warming trend in store for afternoon.

Meanwhile, all preparations for the Silver Anniversary Dogwood festival proceeded apace.

Floa making for the annual parade was one of the big items this week and ladies who have been busy making and tying flowers at the old feed store on East Bluff have practically filled that big building with blooms.

Trail rides from Spurger and below Livingston were scheduled to get underway Friday with overnight stops provided for for rest and festivities.

The horseback riders will assemble in Woodville Saturday in due time for the parade. The parade will be led by Ben Barnes, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Mr. Barnes will also have the privilege of crowning the 1965 Dogwood Queen at the pageant that night.

The parade will be interspersed with upwards of 26 bands from various high schools in the area in addition to dozens of floats, decorated cars and the hundreds of horses from the various trail riders.

Duchesses from 30 area cities are expected to take part in the parade and pageant.

The four queen-finalists will ride on the Chamber of Commerce float.

Marshall is far removed from Missouri, but it shares a unique distinction with the state. It was Missouri's capital of government. The story goes back to the early days of the Civil War. With the battle of Fort Sumner and accession of the Southern states, federal troops moved into Missouri, forcing the state's pro-secessionist governor, Claiborne F. Jackson, and other officials to flee into neighboring Arkansas, carrying with them the state's official seal. Gov. Jackson became ill and died at Little Rock in December, 1862, and Lt. Gov. Thomas C. Reynolds was sworn into office. The new governor sought more secure headquarters and led his exiles into Shreveport, La. But he was unable to find suitable quarters there. Reynolds then dispatched a small staff to Texas on Nov. 5, 1863, to arrange for the use of two houses near the Harrison County courthouse in Marshall. Reynolds himself arrived 30 days later. He maintained the Missouri capital in Marshall until the collapse of the Confederacy forced him to flee into Mexico. In the northeast corner of Cherokee County, where oil geologists have recently treated an ancient cave is being explored. Amateur archeologists are digging into the depths of the Carey Lake Cave, a one-time Indian dwelling laced with dozens of rooms and tunnels. One explorer says he has found arrowheads, paint rock and other Indian artifacts in and around the excavation. The region around the lake boomed in the 1830s and 1840s when oil was discovered. Hotels, stores and homes stood nearby, but only a few concrete foundations remain today.

Eastern wild turkey, thriving after their release in the Lower Neches Turkey Restoration Area in Tyler County, are getting careful attention from Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists. The sporty birds are being banded, but not actually trapped, while biologists attempt to acclimate the birds to feeding food in areas where drop nets will be used. Those trapped will be removed to pre-designated turkey release sites. A combination of excess rainfall and dense vegetation stands makes the Lower Neches unsuitable for Rio Grande turkey, common to drier parts of Texas, so birds from eastern states have been stocked in recent years. Wildlife biologists decided birds are approaching a point where some birds can be spared for other locations in East Texas in suitable habitat. The development of appliances for blasting and the use of steam to drive pumps mark the beginning of modern mining.

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Festival Theme Is Civil War Era In Tyler County

All roads will lead to Woodville Saturday for the Silver Anniversary Tyler County Dogwood Festival.

Princesses and duchesses of the royal court and their escorts will get the festivities started Friday night when they are reguests of the King's Men at a ball at Community Inn. Former queens of the festival have also been invited to this affair.

Saturday's activities will begin with the parade which will start at 2:30 p. m. A record number of entries are expected in this Silver Anniversary parade, and the number of bands participating will also be the largest if all arrive as planned.

The coronation ceremonies, in which one of the four princesses of Tyler County will be crowned queen for 1965, will begin at 7 p. m. In the outdoor amphitheatre with all 3400 seats expected to be ticketed before the end of Saturday.

Following the coronation, the pageant will unfold on the huge stage. Written by Mrs. E. W. Gassiot, it will depict Tyler County during the Civil War.

And to wind up the day, the Dogwood Dance for the general public starts at 10 p. m. in Community Inn. The Bob Smith Orchestra will again furnish the music for this affair.

Ben Barnes, Texas' youngest speaker of the house of representatives, will be parade marshal and will also crown the queen at the coronation cere-

monies. The King's Men, who choose the queen from senior girls from Tyler County schools, had narrowed the selection down to four finalists two weeks ago Tuesday. This Tuesday night they again judged the girls, this time in evening dress, and the queen has been chosen.

But her identity will not be known until the coronation ceremonies Saturday night. The four princesses are Jane Warfield of Woodville, Mary Anne Benton of Colmesnell, Teri Daniels of Warren and Laurann Jordan of Spurger.

On the pageant program will be former Governor Allan Shivers, who will recite Lincoln's Gettysburg Address at the finale. Last year's festival honored the Shivers family, and Governor Shivers has crowned several of the festival's former queens. He attended Woodville schools as a boy and maintains a home at Magnolia Hill west of Woodville. He also has ranch holdings around Chester.

Also taking part in the pageant will be the Dixie Drill Team from Fair Park High School in Shreveport. Sgt. Nelden Hewitt is coach of the team, Everett Doubleday is commander and Thomas Bruce is deputy commander.

Appearing during the pageant will be Beaumont's Melody Maids directed by Mrs. Eloise Milam and pupils of the Sproule School of Dance in Beaumont.

The Kirby High School Stage Band, directed by Laurel Brownlee, will take part in the pageant as well as play during the prelude.

Mrs. Charles Pickett of Woodville will be a soloist for the pageant, as will Chris Robinson Jr., former Broadway stage star.

The pageant, to be narrated by E. Harrison Preston, is in six episodes, "End of An Era" is the title and it depicts Tyler County during and at the end

The four semi-finalists in the judging for queen will be train-bearers to the queen. They are



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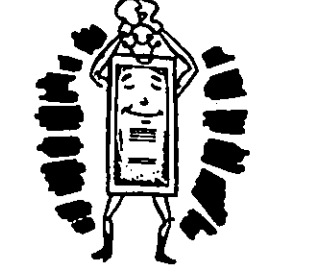
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Kirby Kapers

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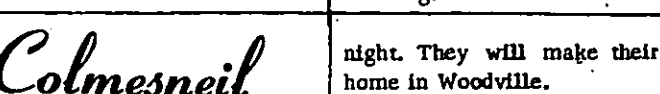
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JUDY STURROCK

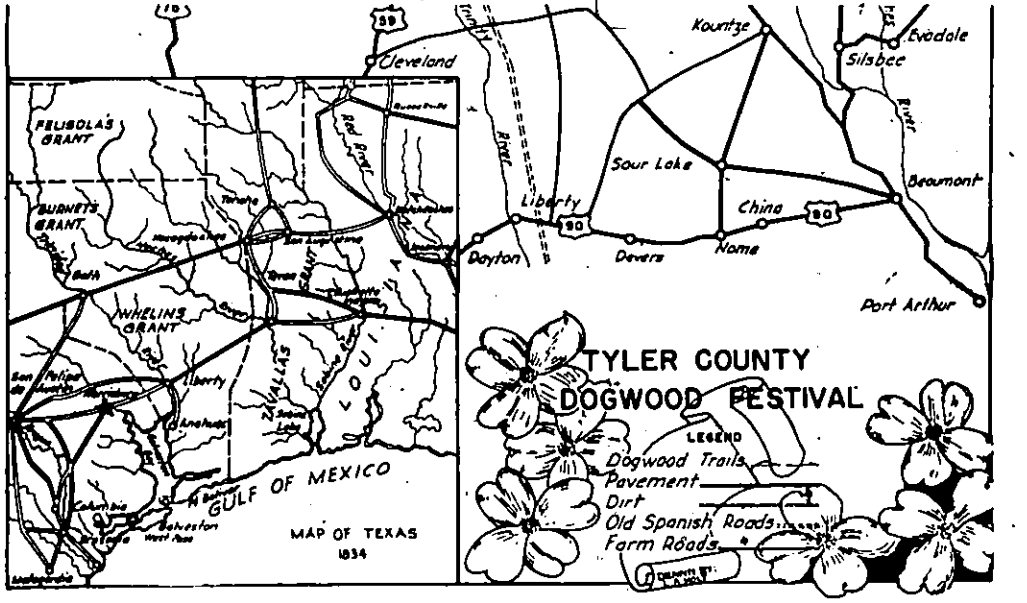
Historical Tour Tickets On Sale

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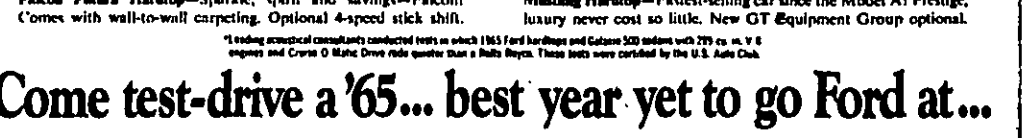

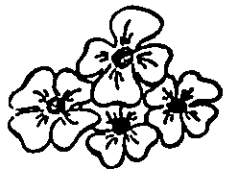

BEEF CATTLE SHORT COURSE TO BE HELD MARCH 29 - APRIL 1

Livestock producers and others interested in beef cattle production are invited to a beef cattle short course at the District Courtroom in the Courthouse in Woodville at 7:30 p. m. each night March 29 through April 1, according to Clinton Currie, county agent.

This educational program is sponsored by the agricultural committee of the Tyler County Program Building Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Elton Spurlock is chairman of the Agricultural Committee and O. L. Marsh, Roy Clamon, Herbert Caraway, Joe Glasscock, Bill Mahan, Willis Read and Lou Cruse are members.

A survey was conducted in Tyler County in 1963 showing approximately 12,000 head of mother cows in the county. There are approximately 31,000 acres of open pasture land and 300,000 acres of woodland that are used for pasturing cattle.

The present carrying capacity of open pastures are approximately one animal unit to five acres. The carrying capacity of woodland pastures are about one animal unit to 40-45 acres. The calf-crop percentage is about 75 per cent, and the average weaning weight is 350-375 pounds. The hay production is inadequate. Not enough beef cattle owners have adequate records to analyze their business or make accurate judgment about their enterprise.

The purpose of the Agricultural Committee sponsoring the Beef Cattle Short Course is to provide beef producers an opportunity to learn the latest recommended practices and management factors so their profits can be increased.

The schedule for the Beef Cattle Short Course is as follows: Monday night—Management Aspects of Beef Cattle and Pasture Production, by Wayne Taylor, area farm management specialist; Improved Pasture Production, by Dr. J. Neal Pratt, extension agronomist; Tuesday night—Beef Cattle Nutrition, by U. D. Thompson, extension animal husbandman; Wednesday night—Beef Cattle—Cows and Calves, by L. A. Maddox, extension animal husbandman;

Thursday night—Animal Health Program, by Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian.

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REPORT FROM THE LEGISLATURE

What a week! It has been long and challenging to say the least. And they tell me the best is yet to come.

One of the first of the controversial bills to come to the House floor this week was the proposal to allow cities to impose a local retail sales tax. It was hotly contested but was defeated by a vote of 84 to 57. I think the statewide sales tax and the possibility of some change in it this session was a determining factor in the defeat of this bill.

Rep. Bob Eckhardt has introduced a Constitutional Amendment proposal which if passed would allow a county to keep a certain percentage of the State ad valorem tax paid by that county to the state and providing that these retained taxes could be used in the county for hospital and health services. I think that this is a fine proposal. It passed second reading in the House by 124 to 10.

Rep. Don Hefton postponed indefinitely his proposal to provide additional compensation for classroom teachers after 5:00 p. m. In my opinion, this was a bad bill and would jeopardize the chances of a teacher pay bill which is looming strong in the latter part of this session. Don dropped his bill even though he had passed it on second reading and it was up for final passage.

Senate Bill 158 which would include Business Managers to the list of special service teachers that a local school could employ came up for final passage. This would be an optional or permissive provision and I couldn't see why it would hurt anyone or any school. The bill was bitterly fought by Rep. Grover of Houston and he did get consideration of it postponed until March 25. Such a move hurts the chances of final passage.

A bill was passed which exempts certain children from paying tuition at State Colleges if their father had been disabled or killed in line of duty as a peace officer of any description. Another bill that was postponed for final passage was H. B. 107 by Will Smith of Beaumont which tightens up on the driving laws and enforces punishment for driving without a valid license.

Several of my committee meetings have been long into the night this week. The committee hearing on my Constitutional Amendment proposal was heard and referred to subcommittee.

Some of you remember Bob Young who was a teacher, coach, basketball official, etc. at Jasper before moving to Rusk. Bob attended some kind of coaching clinic this week here. He came by to see me and one night after a committee meeting and we went out to see and hear the world renowned Dick Contino. I had never heard Dick Contino play in person. Most of you know that Mr. Contino is famous for playing the accordion. His music completely fascinated me.

We had a bomb scare here at the Capitol this week! I and a few others were brave and continued to work in our offices after the rumor had spread. But a wide-eyed and breathless young page burst into our office complex and announced that everyone had been directed to leave the building. Some thought of "the bomb" must have been playing on our minds anyhow, and I definitely detected a frantic note of wigency in the 10 year old's voice too. We all scrambled for the elevator and got out. I left my hat in the office. I then walked on over to the Texas Water Commission where I had some business to attend to. Later the all clear was given and I returned to the Capitol Building. So the Legislature can be exciting at times.

I continue to welcome all correspondence and communication concerning legislative problems.

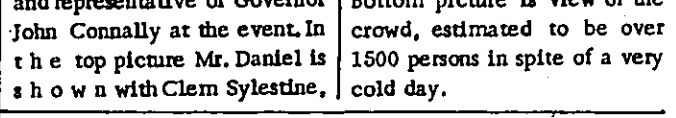
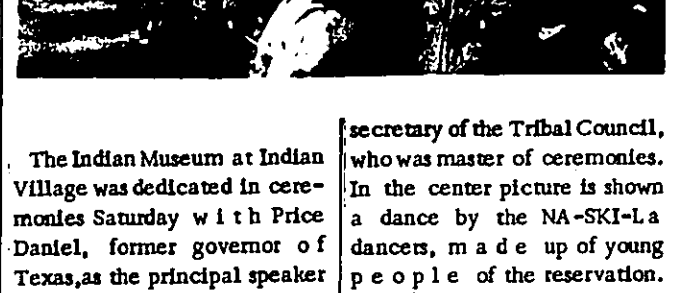
SPURGER 4-H CLUB MEETS AT JORDANS

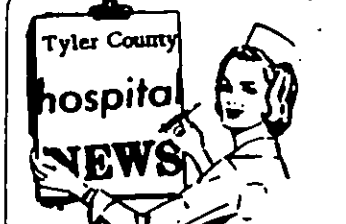
