TRACKMEN GO TO DISTRICT AT BUNA

The track and field men took part in the Buna Invitational meet last Saturday. Cleveland won the meet with 105 points. Foremanberry of Kirby High placed in the broad jump at this meet.

Dr. R. E. Swearingen, in a bid for a third term on the Woodville City Council, led the ticket in Tuesday's election with 177 votes out of 254 cast.

Other winners for the three posts on the council were Dr. James M. Radford and James Spurlock. Radford received 125 votes and Spurlock 123.

The eight-man field of candidates was the largest in recent years.

Votes for the other five candidates were Barclay Dismukes 69, George E. Tubb 69, Clay Miller 66, David P. Mann Jr. 57 and Jimmy K. Brown 40.

The number of votes going to the polls was surprisingly light due to the fact that eligible voters in recently annexed areas of the city were eligible to vote in the election.

All three winners said Wednesday that they wished to express their appreciation to the voters, and that they will try to serve the people of the city to the best of their ability.

Dr. Swearingen is the only incumbent in the race. Emory Mahan, whose term is expiring, did not seek re-election. The council post held by Billy Mitchell was vacant due to Mr. Mitchell's moving from the city.

The following is a statement to the voters of the city of Woodville by Jim Spurlock: "May I express my sincere appreciation for the confidence shown in me in the City Council election on Tuesday. I pledge myself to the task with all diligence and shall attempt, at all times, to merit your support."

Hank Williams Jr. To Star at Jasper Rodeo

It's tough to follow the steps of a tremendously successful father. It's even tougher to stand in the shadow of a legend.

Hank Williams, Jr., robust with dusty blond hair and the build of a pro football hero, has not only stood in the shadow of his legendary father for more than a dozen years, he has suddenly and startlingly burst out of the shadow and into the glowing national entertainment spotlight to become a full-fledged star in his own right with a hit record, network teevee appearances and staggering offers from the show world's shrewdest managers and promoters.

But Hank Jr.'s keeping it all in the family. His mother, Audrey Williams, widow of the late Country Music phenomena is his manager, and crafty one at that. She carefully laid the groundwork for his debut which came just before the strapping youth turned 15. His first record shot into the national popularity charts in both the Country and Pop music fields. He was pagged by the star-swamped Ed Sullivan for an appearance on his most-sought-after Sunday night CBS TV showcase.

Other teevee shows threw down the welcome mat. Hank Jr. suddenly became the most "in demand" talent around.

Audrey groomed Hank Jr. for this explosion to prominence through almost seven years of grueling traveling schedules with her widely acclaimed "Musical Caravan of Stars", and other road shows. But she saw it that he remained out of the glare of national publicity.

Apparently, the giant MGM Record Corporation agrees, and apparently the world's largest talent organization, agrees. The agency's Number One and Number Two execs from Hollywood and New York personally handled the signing of the rangy Nashville lad. MGM's top made it their personal business to work out Hank Jr.'s contract, which stands today as one of the biggest single recording contracts in the business—a pact involving some \$300,000 over a three year period.

LOWER RATES IN EFFECT ON LONG DISTANCE CALLS

Lower long distance rates are in effect on station-to-station calls within Texas after 8 p. m. daily and all day Sunday, LeRoy Poole, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, announced today.

The night rate formerly was in effect after 9 p. m. Now it is effective at 8 p. m. daily, and applies all day Sunday.

The "evening" rate, which applies from 6 to 8 p. m. Monday through Friday, is effective all day Saturday.

"Since Sunday is the day families usually get together, this change in rates will make it possible for family calls to be made all day Sunday at the lowest rate of the week," Poole said.

The changes in rates will apply only to station-to-station calls. The "night" and Sunday rate will not apply to intrastate collect or third-party calls.
