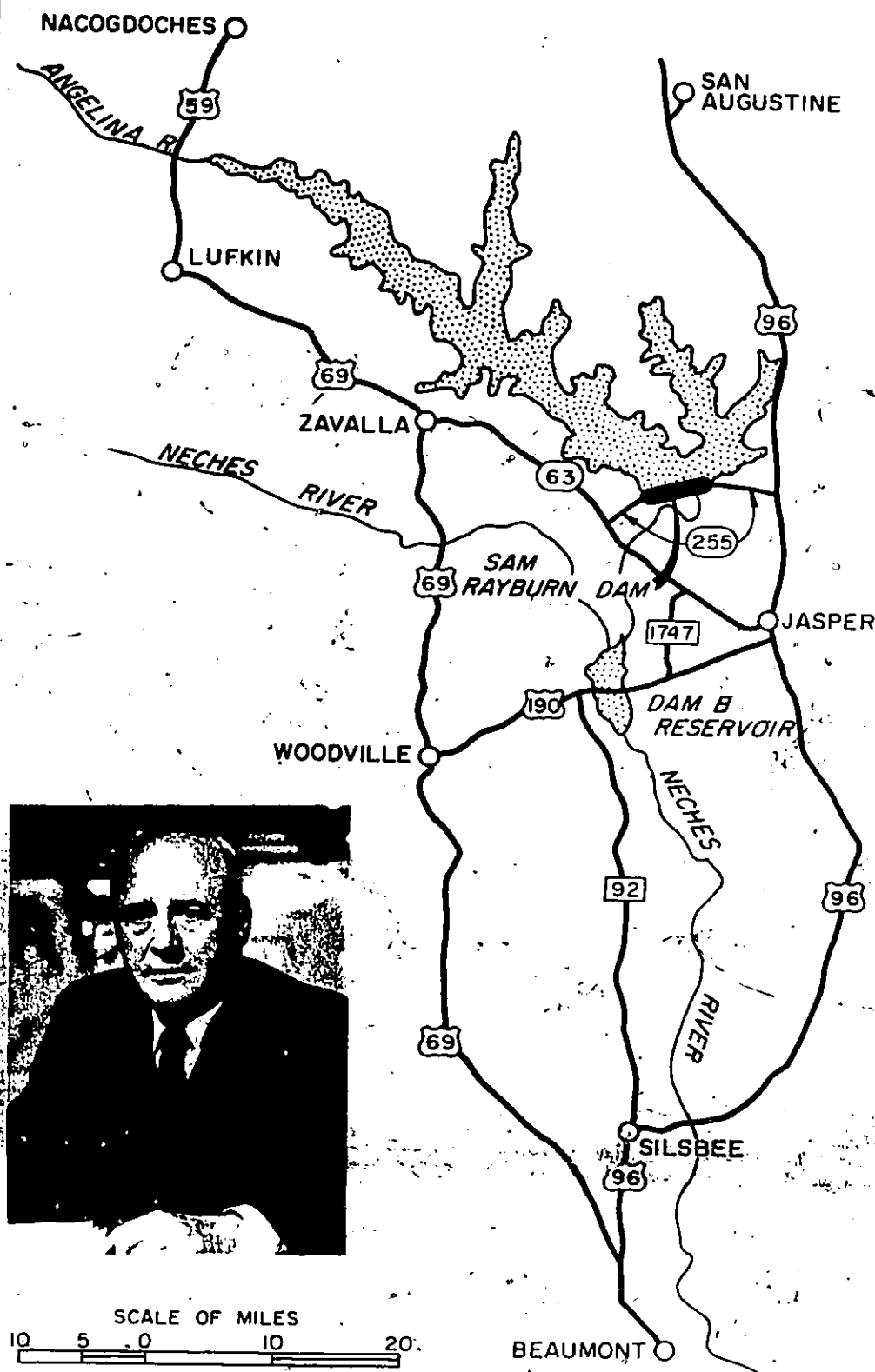
The recently organized Kiwanis Club of Woodville will hold its Charter Night program Tuesday night at Community Inn at 7 o'clock.

President Invited To Ceremonies

Formal dedication ceremonies for the new Sam Rayburn Dam and Reservoir, near Jasper, Texas, are slated for 10:30 a. m., Saturday, May 8, 1965, W. F. Weed, President of the Lower Neches Valley Authority and General Chairman of the Dedication Committee, has announced. President Lyndon B. Johnson has been invited to dedicate the dam.

Thousands are expected to attend the ceremony which will take place at the east end of the dam, located 16 miles northwest of Jasper.

A program of entertainment by leading entertainers will precede the formal dedication. Others expected to be on the program include Governor John B. Connally and Congressman Jack Brooks.

The new \$61 million dam, which will back up a lake of more than 114,000 acres at conservation level, is nearing completion. The design and construction of the dam is under the supervision of the Fort Worth District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Colonel F. P. Kolsch is District Engineer.

The Sam Rayburn Reservoir will be the largest man-made lake in surface area in the State of Texas, with 560 miles of shoreline. Its predicted by the Corps of Engineers to be attracting a total of 3,000,000 visitors annually within three years. The Corps is developing 15 recreational areas with boat launch ramps, picnic tables, shelters and toilet facilities to take care of the millions of visitors expected.

The new dam is a multiple-purpose dam providing not only water for municipal and industrial use, but also hydroelectric power.

First construction on the project was initiated in April 1956 with work on a natural gas pipe line crossing the project area. Construction of the east access road to the damsite proper, the first portion of the embankment, and dikes "A" and "C" were completed in March 1959. Construction of the uncontrolled spillway was completed in January 1959. In December 1958 work began on the second portion of the embankment which was substantially completed three years later. In 1959 work began on the relocation of roads and utilities from the reservoir areas. In 1960 and 1961 the west portion of the embankment was built. In June 1960 a contract was awarded for the manufacture of the two electric transformers. Clearing of brush and trees from the reservoir area began in August 1961.

In June 1962 a contract was awarded for the construction of outlet works, power plant and completion of the embankment, which includes the closure section.

Work had progressed far enough to begin deliberate impoundment of water March 29, 1965. The project will be in full operation by June 1966.

In addition to the storage provided for hydroelectric power generation, powerhead and sediment reserve, the reservoir will contain over 1,100,000 acre-feet of storage to control the floodwaters from the 3,448-square miles of the Angelina River Basin above the dam and provide flood protection.

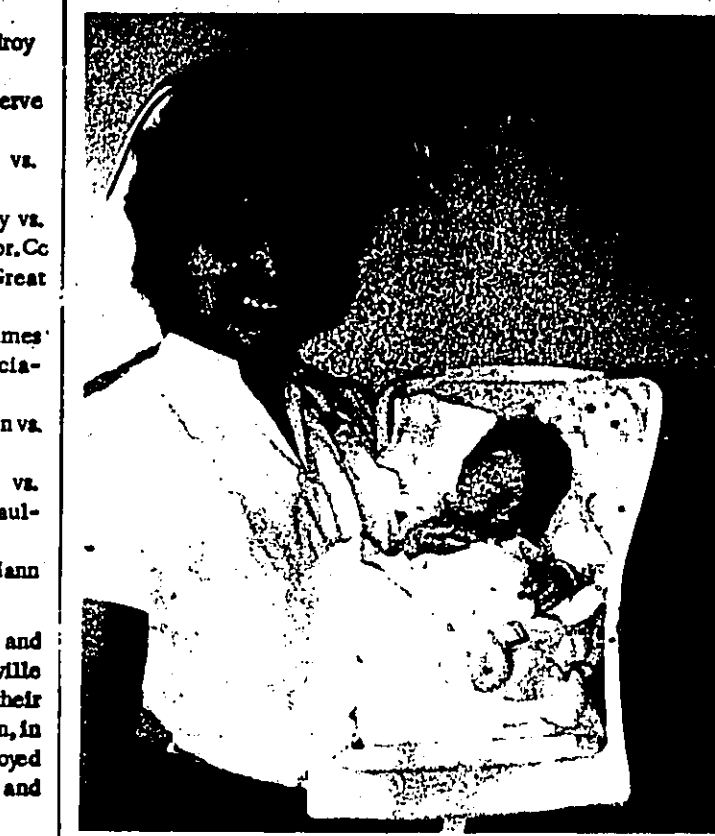

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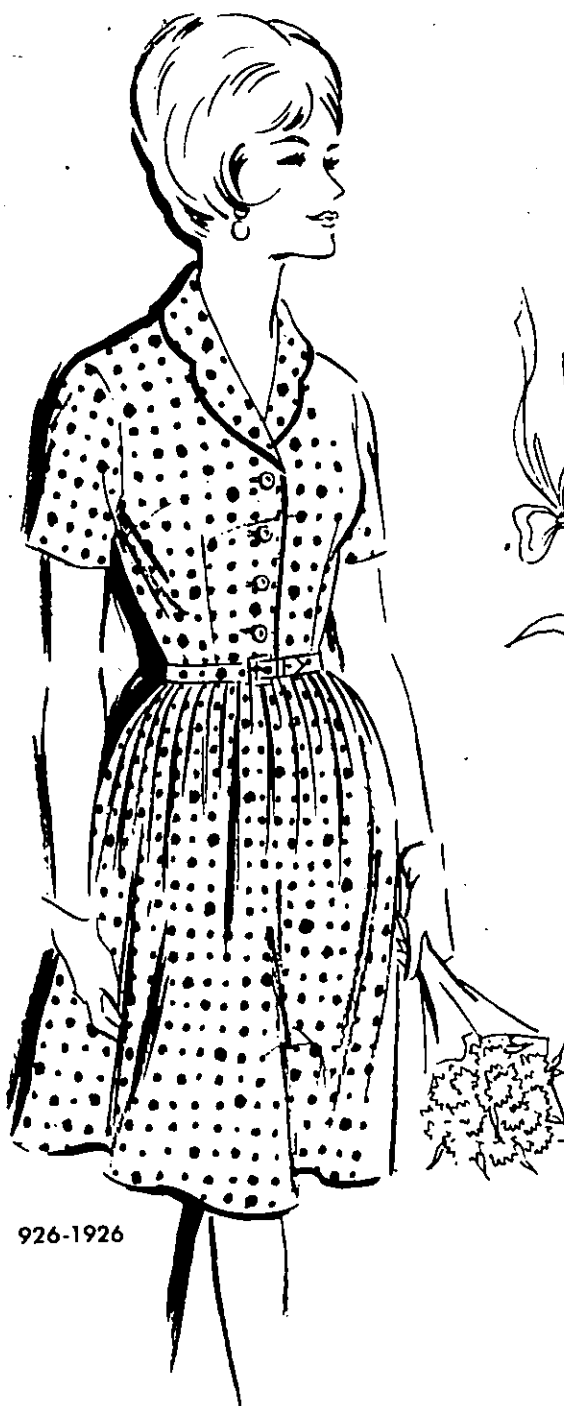

NOTARIES PUBLIC MUST QUALIFY BY MAY 15

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967, must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1 and May 15, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.



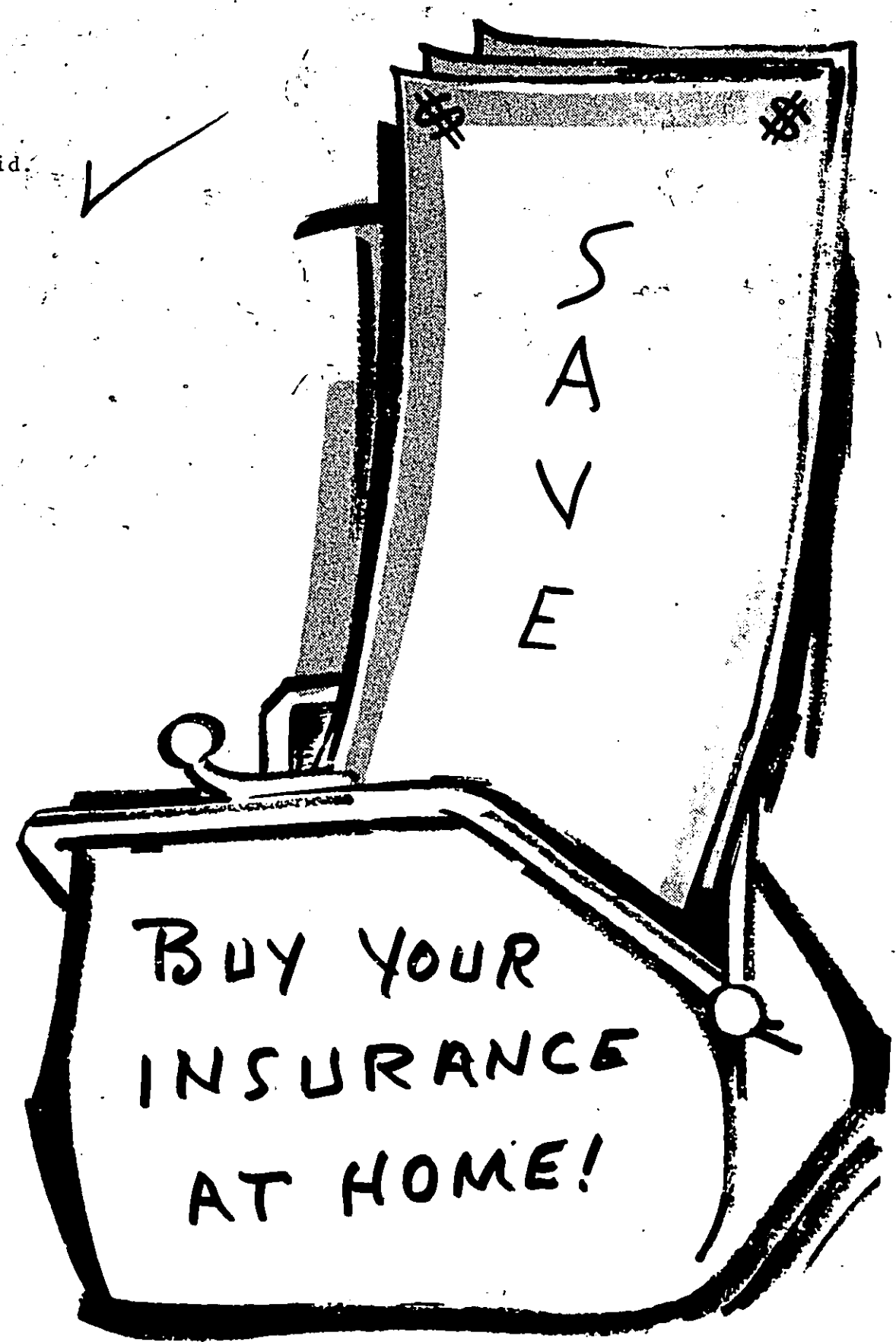

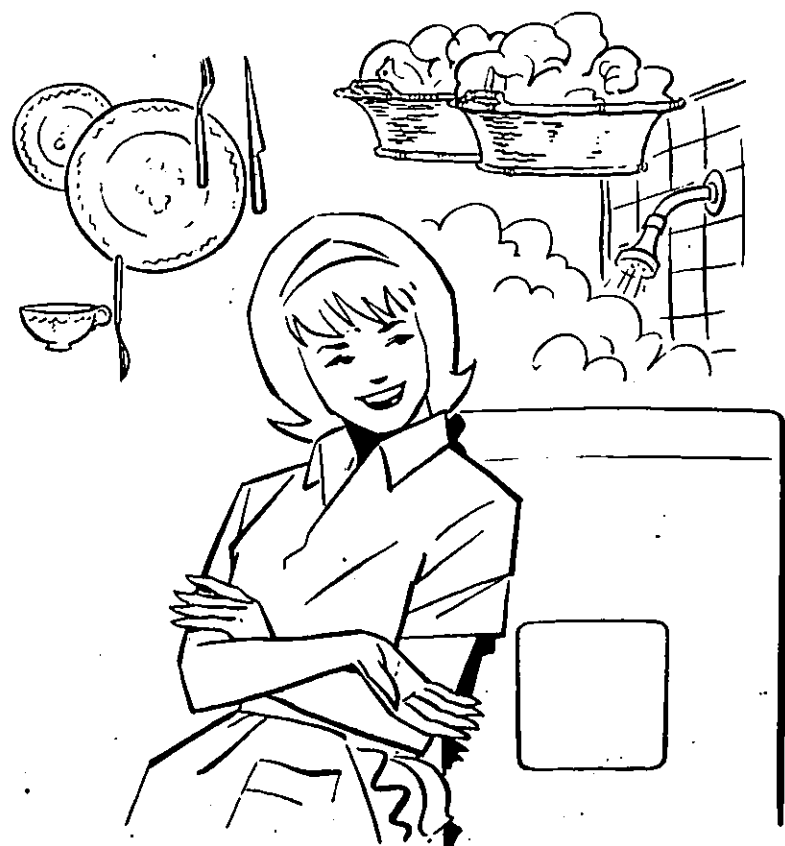
