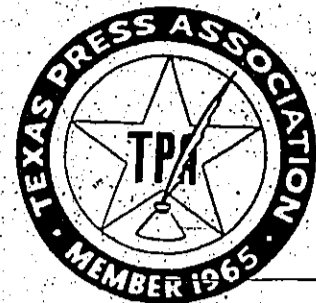

ADLAI STEVENSON

The rent of UN Ambassador Adlai Stevenson's apartment at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City hasn't gone up. --It's still \$33,000 a year.

Testimony before a House appropriations subcommittee which recently considered State Department money matters, disclosed that the hotel had considered upping the rent last year to \$45,000 a year.

Rep. John J. Rooney, chairman of the appropriations subcommittee, suggested the State Department, "take the requested increase up as a public relations matter with the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel and remind them of all the business generated for it by the State Department and the United Nations."

Naturally, the hotel agreed. I sure am proud of Rooney for his watchdog tactics on our federal money, and of Stevenson for the beautiful orations he so eloquently delivers in the deaf ears of the Soviets. South Texas Youth Choir To Sing

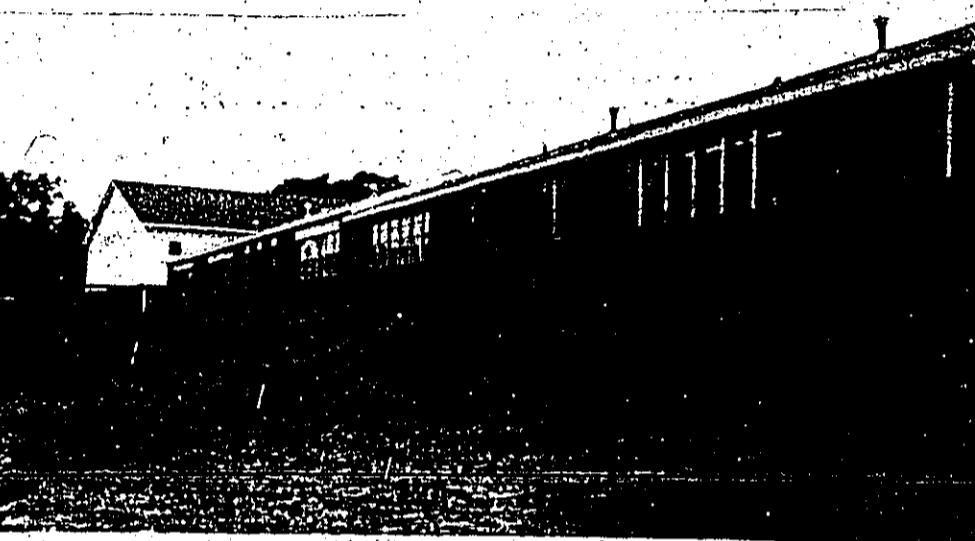

The group is made up of twenty-five young people ranging in age fourteen to eighteen years. They have made appearances in many churches throughout the state, and have been highly accepted.

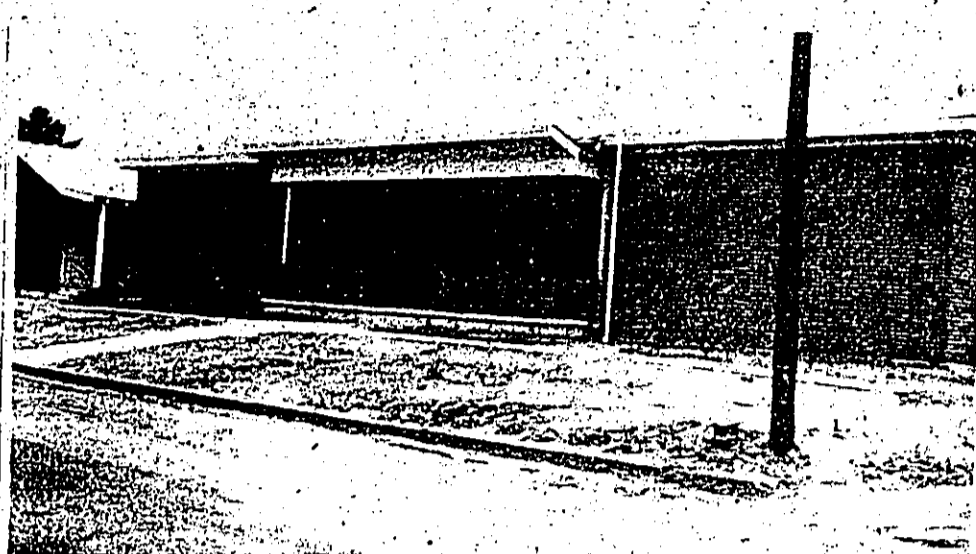

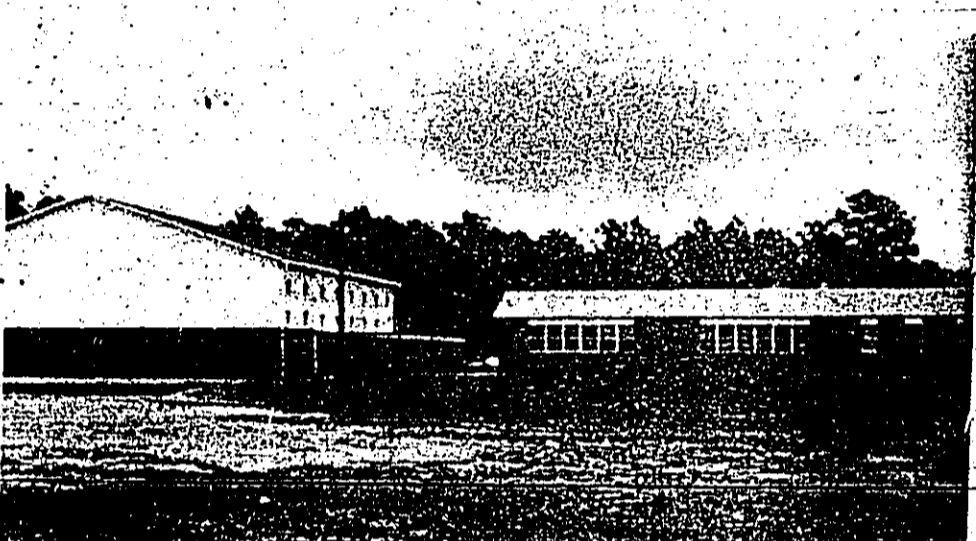

SCOTT SCHOOL REMODELING COMPLETE

In the May 13th edition of the Booster, the completion of the Scott School remodeling made headlines. This week, we are telling the story again in pictures.

This remodeling and reconditioning of the Scott Elementary School buildings, the Scott lunchroom, and Canada Gymnasium has been completed and the structures are in use by the students. The work was begun in May of 1964.

Canada Gymnasium received an exterior finish of brick and asbestos siding and enlarged to include modern dressing room facilities, basket and storage space for physical education classes, shower facilities, field house facilities for athletes, and automatically controlled heating. The cost was \$13,995.71.

Scott lunchroom was completely remodeled and the kitchen and storage facilities enlarged. The building was reroofed and

a brick exterior provided. New furniture, kitchen equipment, automatic heating, ceiling tile, insulation and fluorescent lighting were provided. This cost was \$9,886.69.

The two wood annex buildings that were formerly used for elementary classroom purposes were moved and joined together. This annex structure was then reroofed and bricked.

Concrete porches, aluminum windows, automatic heating, fluorescent lights, and venetian blinds were installed.

Since completion, the Scott Elementary school is now one structure and contains 14 classrooms, a science room, a library, and other functional parts such as an auditorium, restrooms, storage and book rooms, and administrative and staff offices.

The total area of the elementary complex of building is 18,800 square feet. The cost

of the complete remodeling was \$61,930.86. The cost came to \$3.24 per square foot, and this figure includes the cost of metal walkways and curbing.

Furniture and equipment in the amount of \$5,455.29 was purchased for the elementary complex and the lunchroom, with the exception of the Scott Lunchroom, and the Canada-Gymnasium were \$91,266.05.

PAUL THOMAS TAKES NURSERY COURSE

Paul Thomas, of Thomas Nursery, has returned from the Annual Grower's Conference for Nurserymen and Florists, held at the College Station, where he spent May 11th, 12th, and 13th in conference with the nursery and florist men.

The Conference sponsored by the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences of Texas A&M offered programs on insect control, poisonous plants, plant propagation, residential landscapes, soils and fertilizers, and nursery management.

The entire program, three days long, was produced under the cooperation with the Research and Education Committees of Texas Association of Nurserymen, and the Texas State Florist Association.

Thomas was also in conference on nursery management, and on Tuesday, May 18th, a special session on the production of peonies.

"Grandpa's Boy" is an amusing strip about a small boy and his unusual and sometimes perplexing relationship with his "grampa". By Brad Anderson, which is also a pen name. He also does a popular comic strip for dailies.

"Grubby", who is both panhandler and miner, and a belly laugh every time you read him, is drawn by Warren Sattler. Sattler is a former art school instructor and currently a full-time assistant on one of the nation's leading comic strips. This cartoon will be especially enjoyed by young and old alike.

Local GOP Says No To Community Action

Jack Risinger, Republican county chairman, has brought to the Booster offices the following statement to be published. It is a statement of the views of the Republican Party of Tyler county, and according to Risinger will have been read at the Community Action Meeting that took place in the Commissioners Court, this past Wednesday night.

The Republican Party of Tyler county is against the Community Action Program, as outlined in recent county meetings. We do not feel this program has merit for our county for the following reasons:

1. Our own survey of the county indicates there are not enough people in the county who would be eligible under the program as high school drop-outs or poverty cases to warrant spending this much money. (10% of all cost plus all materials must come from local funds.)

2. A shortage of able bodied men and women exists in the county to work in local business and industry. We feel this program will only serve to increase this problem.

3. We feel that, if there is so much money to be spent in our area, why not give it to already established agencies of local government which were elected by the people. (Commissioners Court, City Councils, and Local School Boards). These agencies of local government are equipped to handle the problems of the county without having to establish new committees and organizations and new administration expense.

4. With the county already under the strain of trying to comply with federal government regulations in the coming months, this program will only tend to increase these problems.

5. We do not feel that the benefits received from this program will warrant what will be given up by the county in freedom of choice.

REPUBLICANS TO OPPOSE PROPOSAL FOR YOUTH CORPS

Republicans in Tyler County came out against the proposed Community Action Program, which is in the process of organizing to attempt to get Neighborhood Youth Corps assistance for the county.

In a statement prepared to be read at the meeting scheduled at the court house Wednesday night to make further plans for the program, the executive committee of the Tyler County Republican party declared that it did not feel that the program had merit for Tyler County for the following reasons:

1. Our own survey of the county indicates there are not enough people in the county who would be eligible under the program as High School Drop-Outs or Poverty case to warrant spending this much money. (10% of all cost plus all materials must come from local funds.)

2. A shortage of able bodied men and women exist in the county to work of local business and industry. We feel this program will only serve to increase this problem.

3. We feel that, if there is so much money to be spent in our area, why not give it to already established agencies of local government which were elected by the people. (Commissioners Court; City Councils and Local School Boards) These agencies of local government are equipped to handle the problems of the county without having to establish new committees and organizations and NEW administration expense.

4. With the county already under the strain of trying to comply with Federal Government regulations in the coming months, this program will only tend to increase these problems.

5. We do not feel that the benefit received from this program will warrant what will be given up by the county in FREEDOM OF CHOICE.

OLD CLIPPING TELLS OF OCCUPANTS OF OLD STORE BUILDING

A clipping from the Beaumont Enterprise of May 9, 1917, was recently found in some old papers by Mrs. Kathrin Wilson of Rockland and is an interesting bit of history of Woodville. It reads: The old Kirby store building, recently occupied by C. L. Dismuke, and now owned by J. H. Mr. Hoffman, a native Texan, is a graduate of Texas A & M University. He has been with Mustang five years in the capacity of Parts-Service Sales Representative in Houston-Harris county and surrounding counties.

who know of this incident consider Phil the only possible winner in this game of treasure-hunting which has always belonged to the Fort Teran area. Besides the gold, there are other minerals in the nearby woods from which both Mexicans and pioneers made small gains. About two and one-half miles from the old fort site, on Long Branch, a tributary of Bluum, was an old lead mine where Mexicans obtained their ammunition. After the Mexicans had been run away, the surrounding farmers helped themselves to the lead. About one-half mile from this mine is an old copper mine where, only a few years ago, a rambling boy found a Mexican huckle between two large rocks. A mile or two west of the fort site at the edge of the salines Uncle John Crews and other pioneers had salt wells. Old synp kettles were used to evaporate the water and obtain the salt.

There were also in the early days famous sulphur springs in this vicinity, leading from the river up McGraws Creek and ending at the well-known Sulphur Springs to the north where there was a settlement and where people went from far and near for their health. Another outstanding early settlement in Tyler County which has been forgotten is the Wilson settlement on or near the road which connected Fort Teran and

Peachtree Village. Records show that a post office was here prior to 1862. Mrs. Sallie Crews, Cheshire recalls the names of families who were said to have lived there: the Wilsons, Commanders, Morgans, Halseys, Tarrers, Ballards, Marseys and Fanna. Near this settlement later was Seamans Bluff, a shipping point on the river. Though this description might not be accurate, it is hoped that it will serve as an inspiration for furthering the development of tourism. Who knows what inventive minds and hard work can do to this area? It is said that electricity is not far from the site. A park and even the f a m o u s cave with its three rooms and their gold might be lighted. A fort with Peter Ellis Bean and his Mexican troops, and a ferry boat with the famous ferryman, Sam Belt, might be arranged. Add to these attractions of pioneering and shipping and the history given in narration and print. Then we would have here at this historic spot a place of interest and pleasure which would not only attract tourists but would also provide recreation for local citizens.

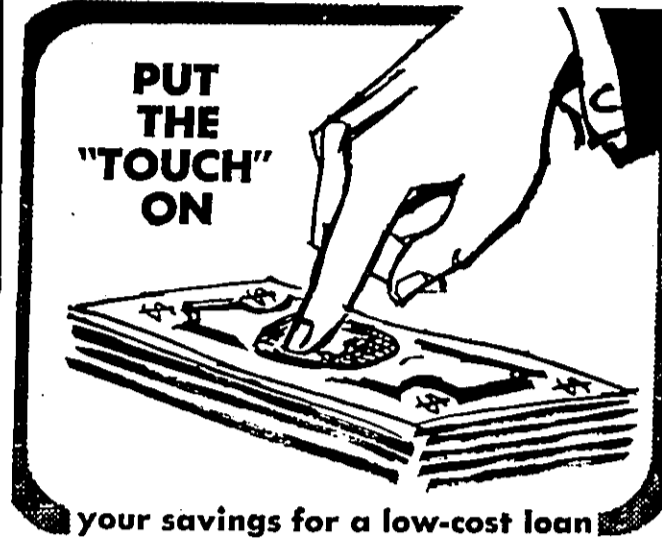
