# Coast Guard To Watch For **Boat Regulation Violators**

The Coast Guard has put out notice that it is going to keep a closer watch on boating regulations in the nation's waters this summer season. Roving safety patrols will be on the lookout for violators of boating safety regulations.

A statement from the Coast Guard said the patrols will visit high - density boating areas to detect excessive speed, overloading, improper loading, operations in swimming areas or posted dangerous waters, erratic operation, or failure to carry safety equipment.

A Coast Guard safety unit visited Dam B Reservoir last year, but in the statement, which applies nationwide, no specific waters were mentioned.

The statement said that flagrant or repeating offenders will be hit with heavy penalties and have little opportunity for easing them.

Up to now most of the boating safety education has been conducted by the Coast Guard Auxiliary, an organization of volunteer boatmen without enforcement powers. The auxiliary inspects motorboats, patrols regattas, saves lives and shows marine safety films.

However, the Coast Guard said it has analyzed recent accident reports and found skylarking and reckless operation are increasing as the cause of boating mishaps. And it has found that the typical offenders are not youngsters but adults between 26 and






