**LOGGINS REPORTS ON COLLECTIONS IN JUSTICE COURT**  
J. P. Loggins, precinct one justice of the peace, this week issued a report showing fines and fees collected by his court during the 21 months he has held office.

Mr. Loggins said that due to recent events he felt that he should make a public report in regard to the business handled through his office.

He said that through the efforts of the sheriff's department, the Department of Public Safety and the Parks and Wildlife department and the cooperation of the county attorney, a total of 2,864 misdemeanor cases and 114 felony cases have been filed in his court during the past 21 months.

Fines assessed and collected and turned in to the county treasurer to be used in part to pay county officials' salaries and expenses, and in excess of the justice of the peace fees, totaled \$41,869.75, the report showed.

## Action Of Commissioners To Hinder Enforcement

Sheriff Grady Ray, in a statement issued this week, declared that the recent action of the Tyler County commissioners court in cutting one deputy from his department will greatly hinder law enforcement in the county.

The commissioners lopped one deputy from the sheriff's force, one clerk in the tax assessor's office, and one janitor from the county payroll beginning July 1. They also reduced salaries in the move to cut expenses after running into a deficit in the county's payroll funds.

The sheriff's statement follows: The decision of the Commissioners' Court on June 11, 1965, to discharge one deputy sheriff in the Sheriff's Department, effective July 1, will weaken and slow down law enforcement in Tyler County.

This man's duties were primarily office work and radio dispatching. As most of you already know, when any law violations are committed, and when almost any emergency arises, the first place that is notified is the Sheriff's Office. From there, the messages are dispatched to some officer who is in, or near that area, and the matter can be taken care of without much delay. So, without the service of a dispatcher, there will be many calls that officers will not be able to take care of because of there being no way to notify them of the trouble.

Certainly calls will be taken care of as soon as the officers learn of them. In many cases, that may be hours, because the officers will not have communication with anyone knowing of the trouble. It will be impossible, with a shortage of help, to keep someone in the office and to perform the duties of the Sheriff's Office, too.

Since the Law Enforcement Officers of this County will be operating with a very important link in the chain missing, we intend to do our very best in giving the citizens of Tyler County what they deserve, and that is, Good Law Enforcement. We sincerely ask each one of you for your continued cooperation and help, in fighting an increasing crime wave.

## PRISON RODEO PUT ON AIR TOUR ROUTE

Although the 34th Annual Texas Prison Rodeo is three months away, many fans are already ordering advance reserved seat tickets for the five Sunday performances in October.

Included in the advance ticket sales report is one from about 150 members of the 17th Annual Texas Air Tour, who plan to attend the opening performance of the 1965 Prison Rodeo series on Sunday, October 3.

According to E. M. Anderson, Jr. of Medina, president of Air Tour, Inc., the pilots and their guests will land 60 planes at Huntsville Municipal Airport, where the visitors will be greeted by a special committee headed by Huntsville City Councilman, Neil D. ## SPORTSMEN URGED TO BE PREPARED

Laymen were urged to learn practical first aid as to the means of helping stem the current high water fatality rate, in a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department statement.

J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator, whose field force has studied modern resuscitation methods, said the commonly favored treatment for a rescued person is the mouth-to-mouth or mouth-to-nose technique.

He pointed out that where proper equipment is not immediately available some form of artificial respiration should be started at the earliest possible moment. The urgent necessity, he said, is to maintain an open passageway from the lungs to the mouth and provide for an alternate increase and decrease in the size of the chest, internally or externally to move air in and out of a non-breathing person.

Phillips quoted first aid literature concerning the more commonly accepted methods and the reasons therefor:

"When a person is unconscious and not breathing, the base of the tongue tends to press against and block the upper air passage-way. These procedures should provide for an open air passage-way when a lone rescuer must perform mouth-to-mouth or mouth-to-nose artificial respiration.

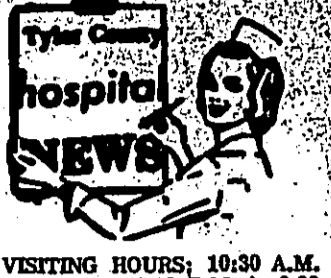
"If there is foreign matter visible in the mouth, wipe it out quickly with your fingers or a cloth wrapped around your fingers. Tilt the head back so the chin is pointing upward. Pull or push the jaw into a jutting-out position.

"These maneuvers should relieve obstruction of the airway by moving the base of the tongue away from the back of the throat.

"Open your mouth wide and place it tightly over the victim's mouth. At the same time pinch the victim's nostrils shut or close the nostrils with your cheek. Or close the victim's mouth and place your mouth over the nose.

"Blow into the victim's mouth or nose. Air may be blown through the victim's teeth, even though they may be clenched. The first blowing efforts should determine whether or not obstruction exists.

"Remove your mouth, turn your head to the side, and listen for

the return rush of air that indicates air exchange. Repeat the blowing effort.

"For an adult, blow vigorously at the rate of about 12 breaths per minute. For a child, take relatively shallow breaths appropriate for the child's size, at the rate of about 20 per minute.

"If you are not getting air exchange, recheck the head and jaw position. If you still do not get air exchange, quickly turn the victim on his side and administer several sharp blows between the shoulder blades in the hope of dislodging foreign matter.

"Again sweep your fingers through the victim's mouth to remove the foreign matter.

"Those who do not wish to come in contact with the person may hold a cloth over the victim's mouth or nose and breathe through it. The cloth does not greatly effect the exchange of air.

"Rescuers who cannot, or will not, use mouth-to-mouth or mouth-to-nose techniques should use a manual method. The rescuer should not be limited to the use of a single manual method for all cases, since the nature of the injury in any given case may prevent the use of one method, while favoring another.

At the close of the meeting Mrs. Mooney and Mrs. Johnson served delicious refreshments.

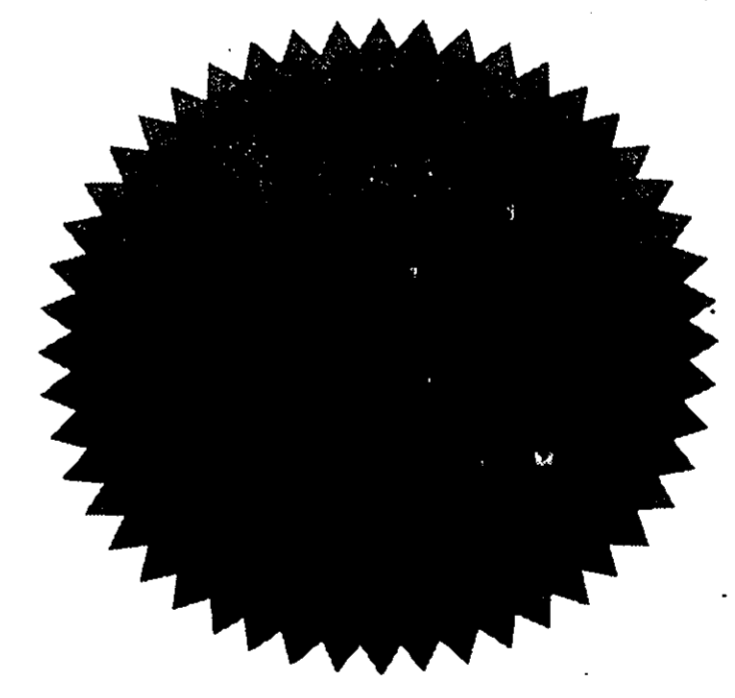
