CRASH VICTIMS WIFE RETURNS TO WOODVILLE



MAYOR PROCLAIMS YOUTH WEEK AS CRASH VICTIM RETURNS

MAKES THEM HONORARY CITIZENS

In honor of the two Duncanville citizens who were involved in a plane crash near Woodville in January of 1965, and in connection with an area-wide Youth Week in their honor, E. W. Cassiott, Mayor of Woodville, has issued the following proclamation:

Whereas: The cities of Woodville and Duncanville, Texas, have been linked together by the tragic plane crash of two distinguished Duncanville citizens near Woodville in January of 1965.

Whereas: Dr. T. V. Farris, the surviving Evangelist, together with Mrs. Farris and Mrs. Len M. Rogers, wife of the Duncanville businessman-churchman-pilot who lost his life in the crash, will return to this City for public appearances and speaking engagements Thursday and Friday of July 22-23.

Whereas: A Youth Rally in First Baptist Church and sponsored by the sister churches of this area brings Dr. Farris and Mrs. Rogers back to our city on this occasion.

Whereas: Dr. Farris will be guest speaker at the Woodville Rotary Club at the Community Inn Thursday night, July 22, at the Youth Rally 11 a.m. Friday morning, July 23, and at an open air inspirational service at 4 p.m. near Retz's Lumber Mill, same day of 23rd.

Whereas: Dr. Farris, at his own request, remained in our local Tyler County Hospital for five weeks recuperating from grave injuries sustained by the crash and the subsequent thirty nine hours spent lying in the Woods before a rescue party arrived.

Whereas: Dr. Farris made many friends while a patient in our local hospital.

As Mayor of the City of Woodville, I do hereby proclaim the week of July 19-25 as YOUTH WEEK in WOODVILLE in honor of our distinguished guests and ask that our city consider making this an annual YOUTH WEEK in their honor.

Furthermore, I do hereby proclaim the Dr. T. V. Farris family and the Len M. Rogers family as honorary citizens of Woodville for life, with all the honors and privileges thereto attached.

Your Mayor does this day call upon all citizens, groups, clubs, (both civic and social) and churches of all faiths to assist in making the return trip to Woodville as pleasant as possible and make it an expression of our regret.

To the families of Len M. Rogers, to his wife and children, Linda Kay Rogers, we do hereby as a city and as private citizens, offer our condolences and as your mayor I do hereby call on all citizens to use this week in a wholesome and constructive manner as a reminder to be active participants in teaching the preservation of life - mental, physical, and spiritual - and to maintain a watchful ear and eye for those who may be in sudden distress and need among us, and to the task of an active Christian witnesses, to which these two men gave their supreme devotion.

Historical Society To Hold Meeting

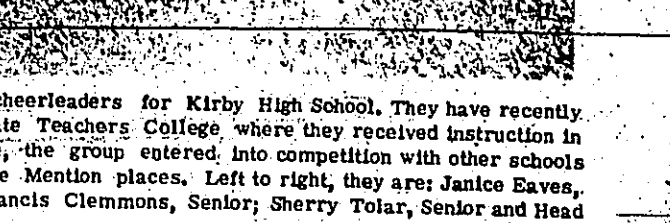
The Tyler County Historical Society will hold its regular meeting on Saturday, July 17, in the commissioners court room period of 10 a.m. to 11 a.m.

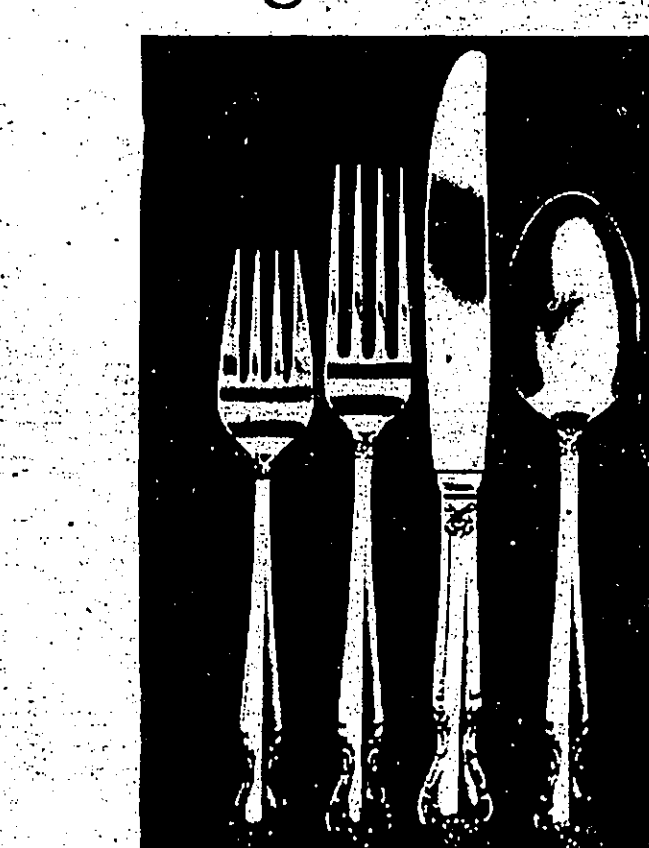

Internal Revenue Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers.

Q-My return was audited last year and I had to pay additional tax on my income. What are the chances that my return will be audited this year?

A-Most returns are selected for audit either because they have certain income or expense characteristics or on a random basis.

Q-When is the next installment of my estimated tax due?

A-Individuals who report on a calendar year basis must pay their third installment by September 15.

Q-I'm thinking of joining an investment club. If I do, how do I report the dividend or capital gains I might receive?

A-The way you report this income depends on how the investment club is organized.

Q-I just realized I paid taxes on the Social Security benefits I received last year. Is it too late to do anything about it?

A-No. You may claim a refund on Form 843 or you may file an amended return to obtain a refund for the amount you overpaid.

Q-I came to this country several weeks ago for a temporary job. What are my federal tax obligations?

A-Internal Revenue has published the booklet, "U.S. Tax Guide for Aliens," Document No. 5589.

Q-Last week at a party I heard a fellow bragging about how he cheated on his income tax. Should I report him?

A-Evidence more substantial than that should usually be the basis of a report to Internal Revenue on suspected tax violations.

Q-Is there any guide to the Federal taxes I would be responsible for if I went into business for myself?

A-Internal Revenue Publication No. 534, "Tax Guide for Small Business," should answer most of your questions.

NEW CHANCELLOR NAMED AT TEXAS CHRISTIAN

Dr. James M. Moody, 48-year-old scholar, minister and key member of the administrative staff since 1957, has been named Chancellor of Texas Christian University, effective July 1st.

He becomes the seventh chief executive officer of this 92-year-old institution—the oldest in West Texas. He is the first alumnus, and native-born Texan to hold the post.

Dr. Moody, who has been serving as executive vice-chancellor since last September, succeeded Dr. M. E. Sadler, who retired to the new position of executive chairman of the Board of Trustees this week after heading TCU since 1941.

The university's governing body acted on a unanimous recommendation of a special committee which has been seeking a new Chancellor since Dr. Sadler requested retirement in April.

He indicated that the special group, composed of Dr. Granville T. Walker, Sam Woodson, H. B. Figue, Marion Hicks and Boswell of Fort Worth, Theodore Beasley and Ralph Shant of Dallas, had considered and interviewed a number of leading educators from over the country.

Dr. Sadler, who attended Tuesday's meeting, worked with the committee and an advisory faculty staff group was consulted, Neesley said.

His training, scholarship, professional experience and outstanding record at TCU made Dr. Moody a leading candidate from the start, Boswell pointed out.

He is held in high esteem not only by his colleagues and faculty members but by the leaders of all other institutions of higher learning in the Southwest.

The new Chancellor is a leading minister-educator of the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) and has been active in other TCU chief executives since 1973.

He holds the B.A. degree from TCU; the B.D. from Brite Divinity School (the university's graduate seminary); the Ph. D. from Duke University where he won the Phi Beta Kappa Key; and the honorary LL.D. from Atlantic Christian College.

Now a tall six-foot, four-inch, Dr. Moody was born in Harrington, Texas, July 18, 1916. He was a boy in Greenville, Texas before the family moved to Washington, D.C. where he graduated from McKinley Technical High.

After completing his high school work, Dr. Moody worked six years in the Treasury Department in Washington before deciding on a ministerial career. He entered TCU in the fall of 1939, starting undergraduate work at the age of 23.

Graduating with distinction in June, 1943, the young minister went immediately into the U.S. Army as a chaplain. From October 1944 until February, 1946, he served with combat units in England, France, Hol-

Your feet must last a lifetime, and if you've been aching, aching, or just walking a lot lately, you're probably quite conscious of this fact.

Just because your feet are the lowest extremity of your body, doesn't mean that they deserve to be neglected.

According to a recent study, three times as many boys as girls have mild to severe skin problems with their feet.

The shoes, researchers found, normally contributing the most to good foot hygiene are those that cause the least perspiration. And as for youngsters, the researchers found that oxgords are preferable to boots, sneakers or tennis shoes for all-day wear.

Perspiring feet are moist feet and moist feet provide an excellent environment for the growth and multiplication of the organisms which contribute to diseases of the feet.

As for footwear, use lightweight, light colored socks to minimize excessive perspiration. And change socks whenever they become damp.

Remember, your feet must last a lifetime, so give them the best of care.

There will be a dinner on the ground on Sunday, July 25 at the closing of the revival. Everyone is cordially invited to attend these services.

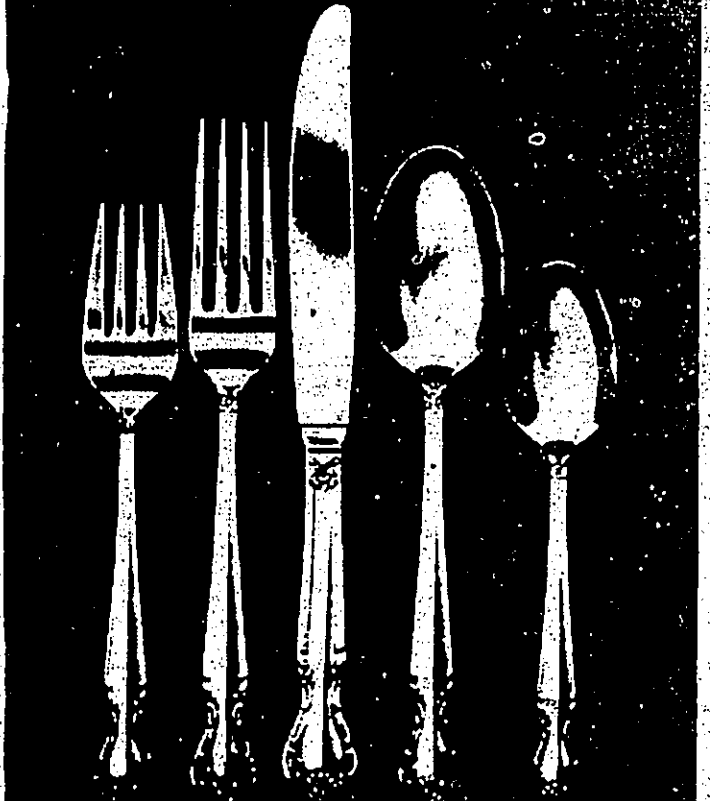

the dual system of schools for white and Negro pupils... The plan was deemed insufficient to achieve this result.

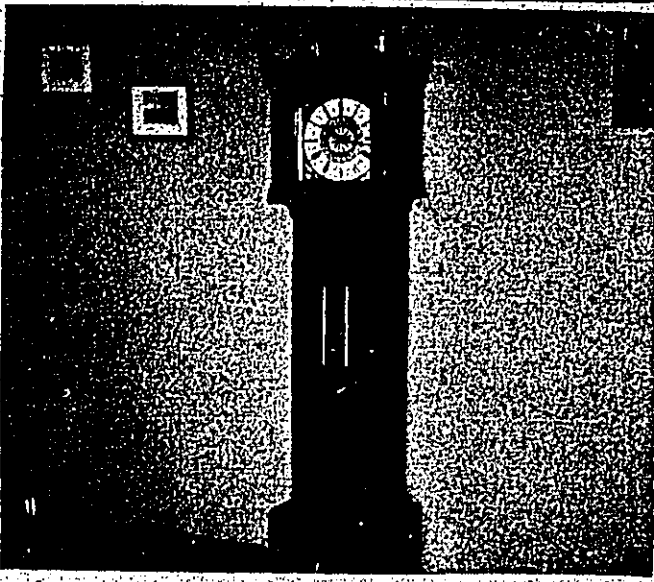
At the time of this notice of rejection, a second set of regulations was sent to the district. These regulations defined minimum outlines for Southern school desegregation.

The following directive for compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 has been received from the Texas Education Agency.

Reviews of the local educational agency pertaining to compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, will be conducted periodically by staff representatives of the Texas Education Agency.

Effective immediately following are the following regulations:

- (1) Enrollment and assignment of students without discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin. (2) Assignment of teachers and other staff without discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin.
