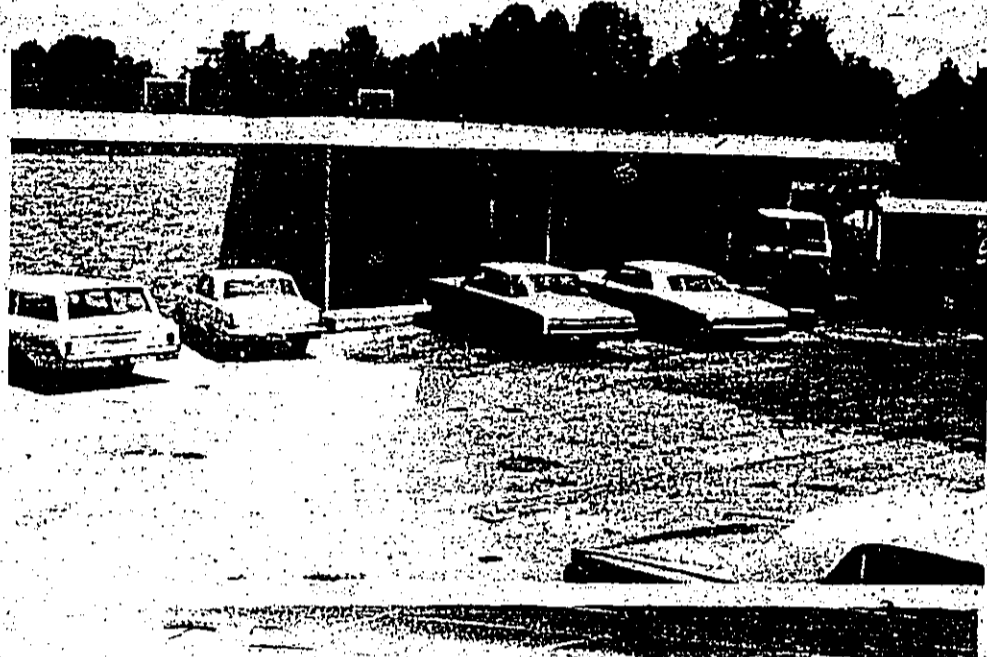

The new location features a large parking lot that will be even larger once Jarrot's Pharmacy moves to its new location in the old Big Star quarters.

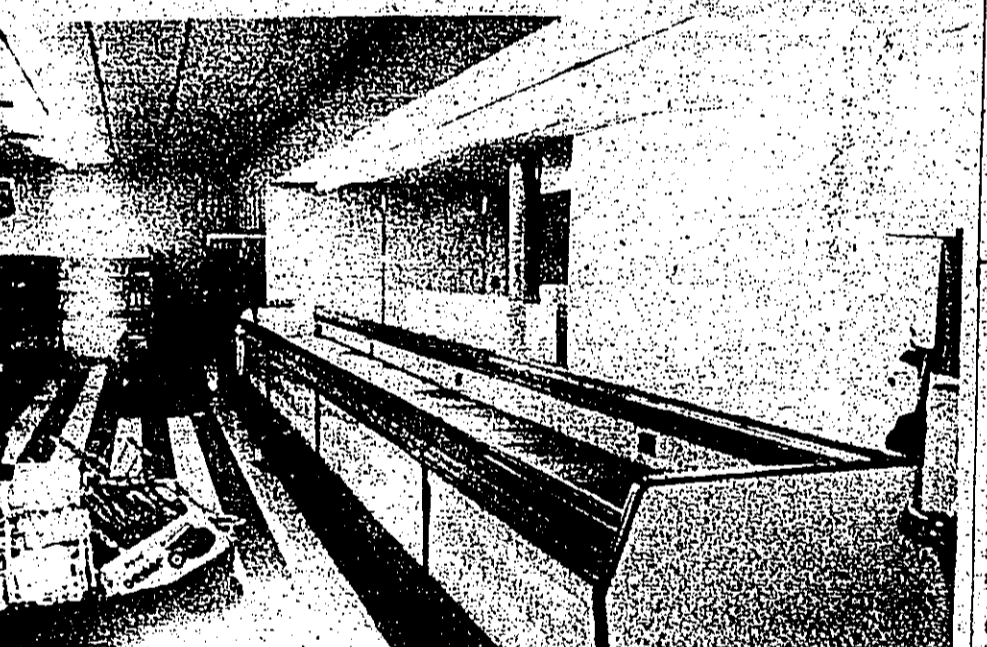
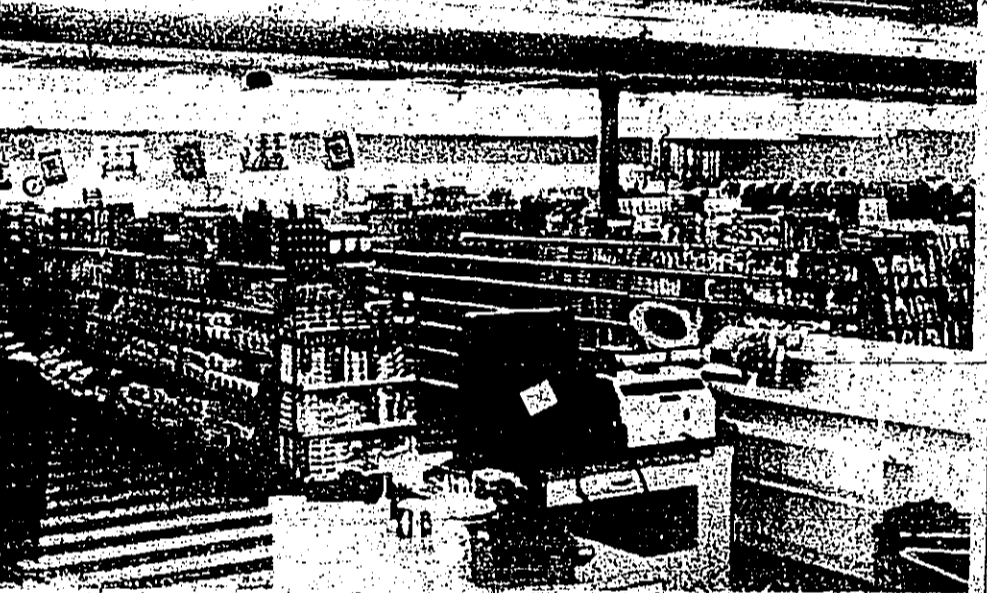
At that time, what is now Jarrot's and the former Phillips Real Estate will be razed and parking space made of that location also.

RATCLIFFS BECOME MISSIONARIES



Rev. and Mrs. Thomas E. Ratcliff, of Karnack, Texas, were appointed missionaries to the Dominican Republic today by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, meeting in Richmond, Va.

Mrs. Ratcliff is the former Josie Slaughter, of Karnack. Mr. Ratcliff is a native of Tyler County, Texas.

They recently returned to Texas after four years of pioneer Baptist work in the northwestern United States. He was pastor of Glenwood (Wash.) Baptist Church, which was organized from a mission under his leadership. He also taught school in Glenwood.

Mr. Ratcliff graduated from Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville, Texas in 1952, with the bachelor of business administration degree and worked for the next five years (he lived in Midland, Grandfalls, and Houston, Texas during that period). Then he enrolled in Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, where he received the bachelor of divinity degree in 1957. He was pastor of Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church, Woodbine, Texas during his final two years in the seminary.

Mrs. Ratcliff mentioned several missionaries who challenged her to consider serving overseas. "The Lord has used many gentle reminders and small events to encourage me to go," she said.

Mrs. Ratcliff studied in Sam Houston College and Southwestern Seminary. She and her husband have two daughters, Suzanne, 11, and Patty, Melinda, nine.

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Woodville IDS Desegregation Plan Is Published

The following plan for school desegregation of the Woodville Independent School District, as adopted by the Board of Trustees, May 12, 1965, in accordance with the directions and regulations of the United States Department of Education, Health, and Welfare in compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, is presented as follows, according to B. H. McGuire, superintendent.

REVISED PLAN

The Woodville Independent School District is located in the central part of Tyler County, Texas. The district contains 277 square miles. The population of the district is about 6,000, and of this number of persons, about 3,500 live within the city limits of Woodville, the only municipality located in the school district.

The 1965-1966 year shows a total of 1,700 pupils, of which 1,100 are white and 600 are Negro. The school district has a year-round system of education, in accordance with state law, one 12-grade system for white students and one 12-grade system for Negro students. Both 12-grade systems are fully accredited by the Texas Education Agency and by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The curriculum of each school is identical and the basic courses required for graduation are identical. No school employee shall advise, recommend, or otherwise influence the decision of a parent or pupil in the selection of a school.

The North campus contains the Kirby High School (grades 10-12) with an enrollment of 260 pupils; the Wheat Junior High School (grades 7-9) with an enrollment of 124 pupils; and the Woodville Elementary School (grades 1-6) with an enrollment of 327 pupils.

The South campus contains the Scott High School (grades 8-12) with an enrollment of 188 pupils; and the Scott Elementary School (grades 1-7) with an enrollment of 308 pupils.

To supplement the original plan for school desegregation, which was adopted by the Board of Trustees in February, 1965, the following amendments are submitted:

1. The initial selection and assignment of faculty and staff shall be made without regard to race, color, or national origin, and steps shall be taken toward the elimination of segregation of teaching and staff personnel.

2. Affiliated services, facilities, transportation, pupil activities, shall be desegregated.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY DISCUSSES PLANS FOR CONFERENCE HERE

The Tyler County Historical Society held its regular monthly meeting this past Saturday morning in the Commissioners Court.

According to Speck Risinger, Chairman, the meeting was attended by some 25 persons and that this represented the largest gathering at one of these meets this year.

First business discussed was the Society's drive to award medallions to homes in the county with historical significance. According to Risinger, there are eight of these homes eligible for the medallions at the present, and many more will become eligible later on. With so many of the homes and sites here in Tyler County having a bona fide historical background, said Risinger, this proves the value of Tyler County historically speaking.

Mrs. Ethel O. Hill was the guest speaker at the meeting and spoke at length on the history of the Big Thicket some 200 years past. She was also presented with her name engraved on the plaque she received for being named Ma Thicket at the recent Big Thicket Get-Together. Mr. Risinger presented the plaque.

Important plans were discussed to bring the next annual conference of the Historical Foundation Association of Texas to Woodville next year. According to Risinger, the conference is being held in Odessa this year, after the Odessa Committee has successfully fought last year at the Austin meet. A three-man committee has been appointed to investigate the requirements for hosting such an event. Those appointed to the committee were George Tubbs, J.H. (Jiggs) Kennesson, and Mr. Risinger. They expect to attend the Odessa conference and attempt to bring it here next year. The Tyler County Historical Society feels confident in bringing the conference here.

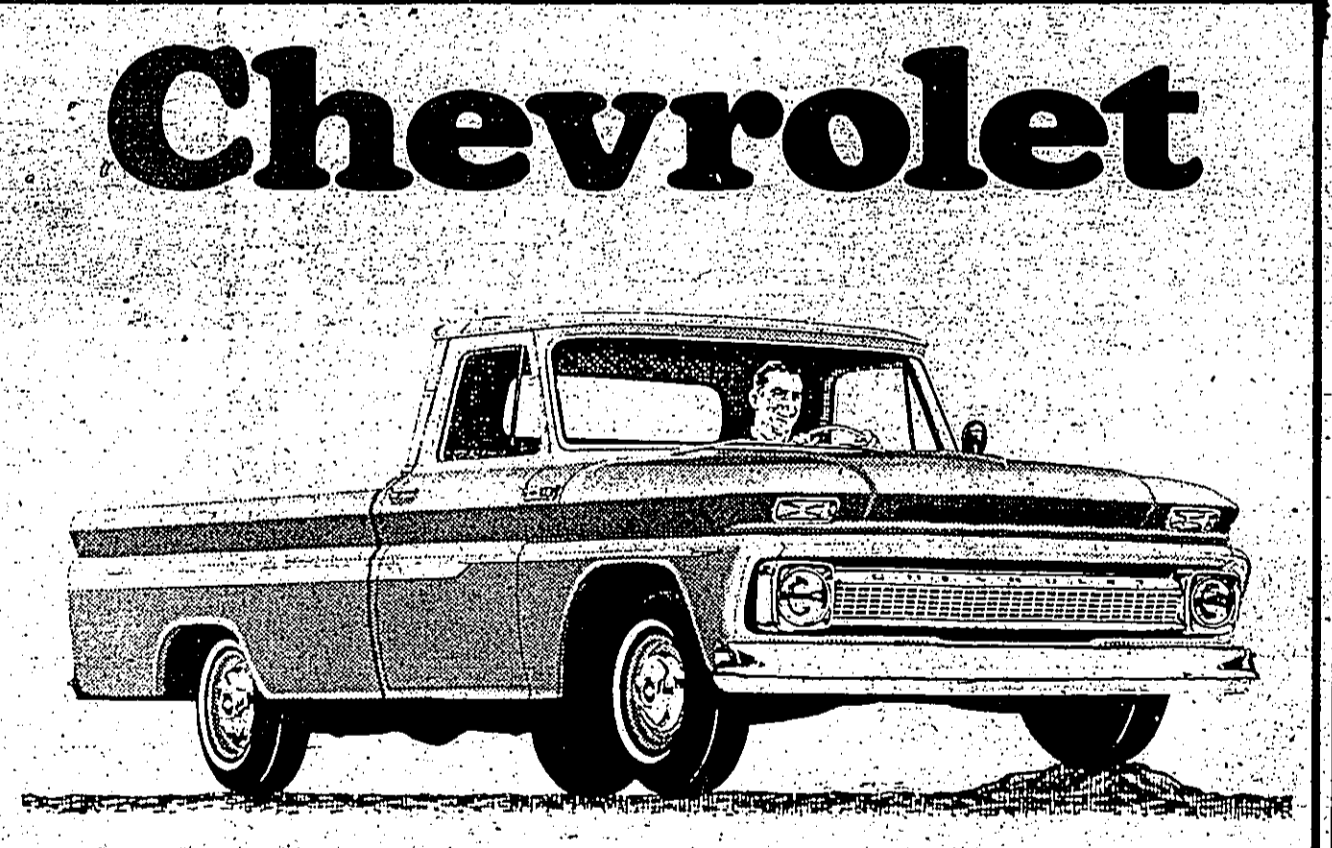

Homemaking Hints

MEATS FOR THE OUTDOOR GRILL

Outdoor meat cooking need not be limited to the expensive cuts of meat. With the barbecue season at hand, it's time to take inventory and consider all the meat choices. High quality chuck, ground beef and round are all good cooked on the grill. The chuck and round are improved by a tenderizer.

This renewal of interest in tender steaks for outdoor cooking comes when the supply of steaks begins to get short. Some beef prices are up slightly because fewer animals are being marketed.

This is also the time of year when port prices usually rise. Add to this the fact that the pig population is down and the natural result is that pork prices also are on a slight rise.

Indications are that plenty of chicken will continue to be available. Cut up fryers are delicious broiled over charcoal and basted occasionally with butter or barbecue sauce. Whole chicks also are excellent for the rotisserie.

PROPER LAUNDERING METHODS HELP KNITS HOLD THEIR SIZE AND SHAPE

There is an art to laundering knit clothing, and you can become an expert in no time. Reading the labels carefully before laundering avoids wash day hazards.

When buying cotton knits, be sure they are made by a new process which compresses the fabric and makes it highly resistant to shrinkage. Wash in warm water to reduce shrinkage.

Select a low-to-moderate setting and do not allow the cotton knits to get completely dry, as this causes shrinkage, also. Remove the garment from the dryer, then gently pat and pull into shape.

Acrylic or nylon knits may be dried completely in the dryer with relatively little shrinkage. But don't leave them in a turned off dryer as they are apt to wrinkle badly. Because agitation has a tendency to felt wool fibers, the woolen knits should be handwashed by gently squeezing rather than rubbing and wringing. Wash them in lukewarm water or in cold water, using a special cold-water detergent. Block them for drying, and dry flat.

EVERY TEXAS SPORTSMAN HAS LOST A GOOD FRIEND

American newspaper columnist and outdoor writer Robert Ruark is dead. You may not know his work, but you have either read his work or you have read the results of his work. His work will live on for years, but the works he didn't get to write are lost to us forever. Robert Ruark was 49. In experience, he was a hundred. He wrote a few books not directly related to the outdoors, but most of them were, and for these we should be thankful that such a man lived in our lifetime. The book, "The Old Man and the Boy" is a true outdoor adventure, and as the reader goes through the pages he is almost able to smell the fish browning in the skillet, and hear the soft swish of wings as ducks come barreling into the decoys. There will never be another book like it, and there will never be another Robert Ruark.

It's a sad thought. Quoting from his book THE OLD MAN AND THE BOY... "You got to remember, son, a duck in the water is like an iceberg. Eight-tenths of him is under water, and water sheds shot like a tin roof. It's a heap easier to shoot a flying bird than a sittin' one, all question of sportsmanship aside. When a duck is climbing, you just aim at the nose and you hit the other end. I can't explain it all to a boy, but you'll learn a lot about trash ducks and good ducks, and about sportsmanship, too."

Robert Ruark is dead, but his words are destined to live forever. I'VE HOUSE Don't store your collapsible fishing shack during the summer months. A dirt floor can damage it even as good sleeping quarters in your backyard.

TURTLE HATCHES Make a raft 3-4 ft. by 4 ft. In the center attach a wire basket baited with chicken or fish guts. Around the bait try to get the fish hooked. Turtles try to get the bait, get caught in hooks, then get "taught" taking them off.

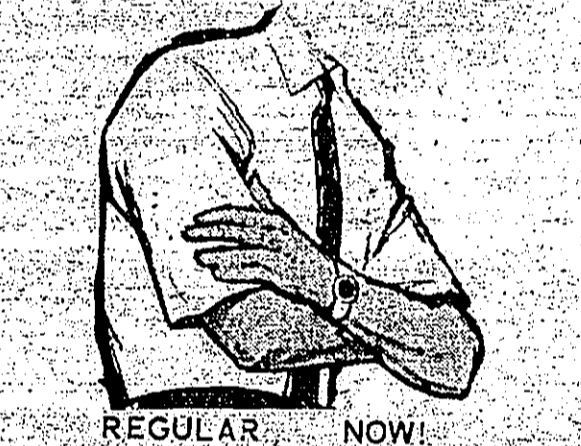

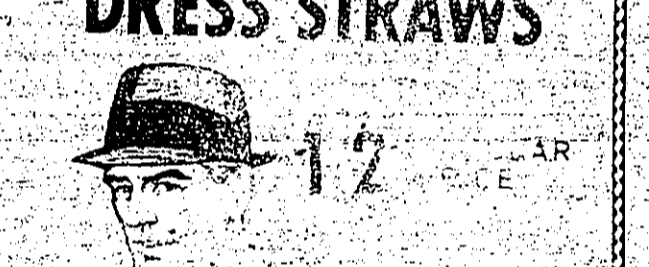
