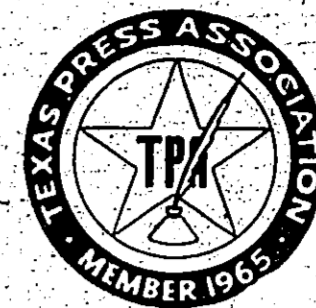

Area farmers and ranchers will be familiar with the Grub and will be glad to hear that a new and easy to administer chemical has been produced to control this profit-eating pest. The Beef, Cattle and Pasture Sub-Committee, sponsored nine Cattle Grub Demonstrations in the County this past Thursday and Friday. Those ranches and farms visited were those of: Elton Spurlock, J. C. (Sap) Barlow, Willis Read, Lawrence Lee, Odel Seamans, John Sturrock, Robert Gillespie, and L. A. Wardlaw. The demonstration pictured above took place at the Lawrence Lee farm and ranch at Chester. Currie is pouring on the chemical Co-Ral, which is administered on the back of the animal and then absorbed into the bloodstream. This chemical and another produced by Dow Chemical called Rue-lene 99R has been proven extremely effective against the grub in nearly 10 years of extensive tests.

COUNTY WILL GET \$26,500; PAVED ROADS IN NEAR FUTURE

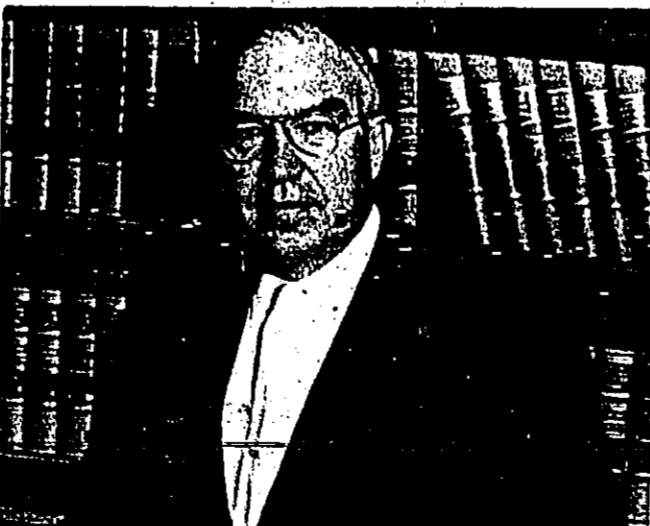
Local Scouts Participate in Swim Meet

SOCIAL SECURITY ACT RESULTS IN INCREASED PAYMENTS FOR COUNTY

The 1965 Amendments to the Social Security Act, signed into law last Friday by President Johnson, will have prompt and very great effect on Tyler County, according to L. R. James, social security District Manager at Lufkin. James said that the most immediate result would be an increase in payments for everyone receiving monthly benefits. Social security checks will be raised 7% for most people, with a minimum increase of \$4 for most retired workers. The increase applies not only to future checks but also goes back to cover payments for all of 1965, beginning with January. All of the increases will be automatic, without any requirement for an application or request of any sort. "We will raise the payments for everyone on the rolls," James said, "without any action on your part. If you are getting social security benefits, you do not have to do anything at all to qualify for the increase. We will raise the regular checks and send a special check for the back payments just as soon as possible. You do not have to write or inquire about the increase in benefits."

Another important change in the law will permit payments for children up to the age of 22, in many cases. Under the old rules, a child's benefits stopped when he became 18 years old. The new law allows payments to continue four years longer, until the child is 22 years old, provided he is in school. This change applies to children whose payments were stopped when they came 18 years old, as well as those who will reach that age in the future. "There are a number of other important changes in the law," James concluded, "and we will be explaining the details just as rapidly as we can."

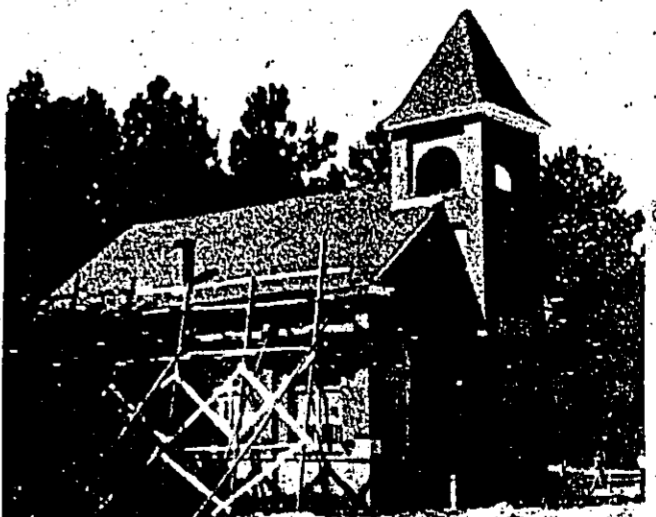
Kiwanis Club Will Install Arena Lights

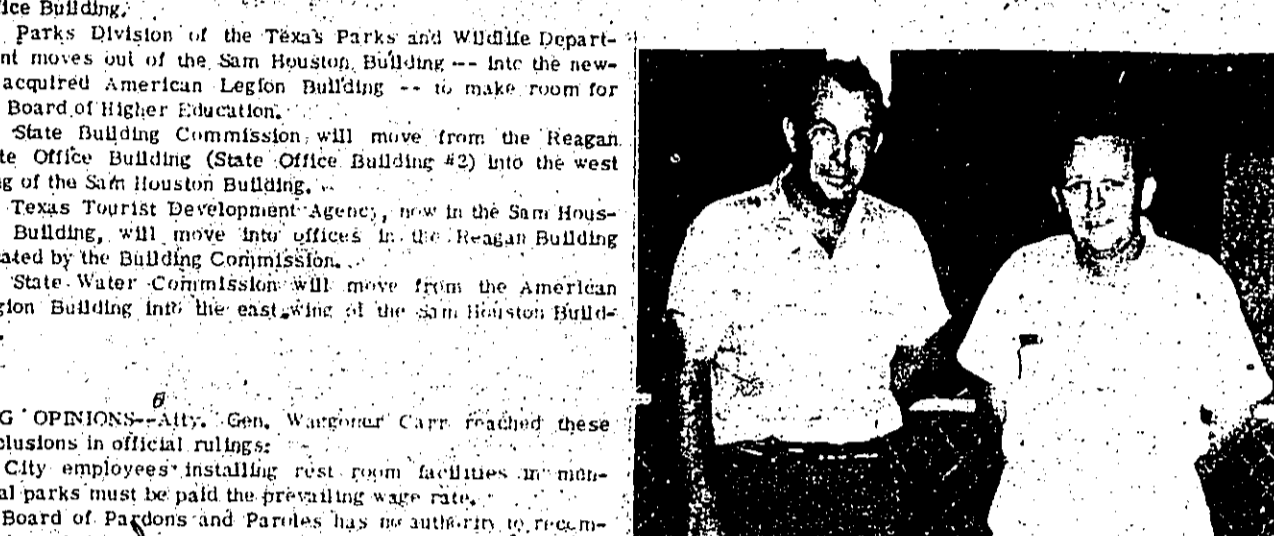

They also voted to furnish Citizens State Bank with a legal opinion on borrowing by the county to meet expense. They authorized the Tyler County Historical Association to locate a memorial to Phillip A. Work on the court house property. The court also voted approval of a preference for the state's highway projects near Dam B. First preference was extension of FM 2628 east toward Jasper County. Second was construction of an extension of FM 92 from E. 1919 north along the Dam B reservoir to connect with 2628 and third was extension eastward of FM 1014 from Rockland to connect with these two roads. The court also voted authorization to the tax assessor to hire an extra helper for 90 days or until the tax roll is completed. Salary is not to exceed \$225 per month. The court also voted a raise of \$25 per month on the county's part of the salary of the secretary to the county attorney. This is effective September 1. Also a motion to buy a Monroe adding machine for the tax office for \$250 was passed by the court. Payment of current bills was approved.

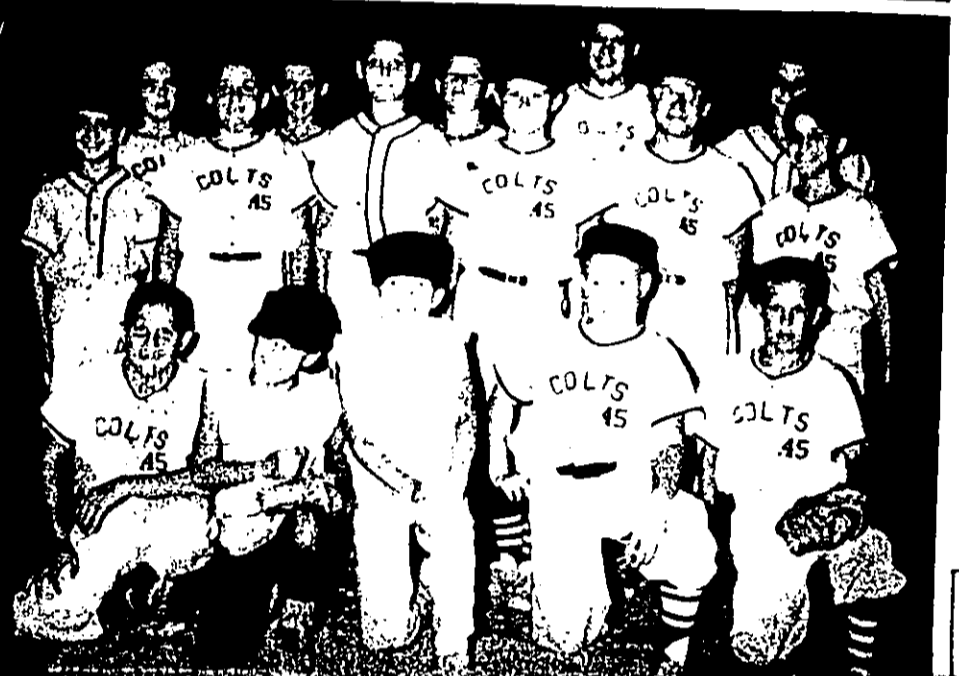
COLMESNEIL SINGING SCHOOL TO END WITH GOSPEL SINGING

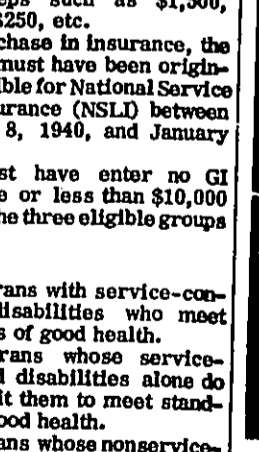

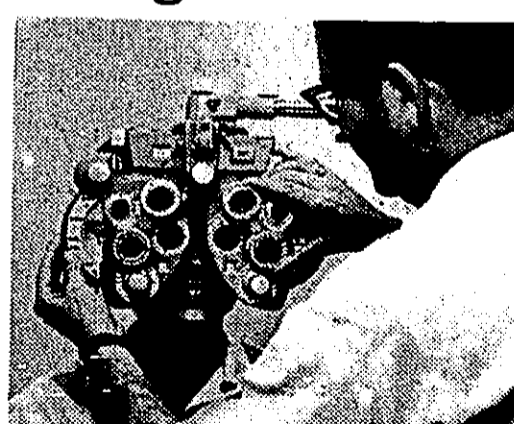

Hunting Seasons

Austin—The precise pattern for Texas' famed wildlife harvest has been set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Dates, bag and possession limits, shooting hours and other details for the more popular species do not vary greatly from last year. But the exact rules for the different places governed directly by the commission necessarily provide variations to meet the existing need.

Whatever the regulations, the commission motif envisions a generous share of most species for the Texas gunners.

Final trimmings will be delayed in 33 new counties added to the regulatory responsibility bloc by the last Legislature since the law changing their status does not become effective until September 1. The required public hearings will be held in each of the counties after that date to consider proposed harvest regulations. Then the commission will meet in Austin, consider results of local county hearings and issue proclamations before the major hunting season begins.

Counties not under the regulatory responsibility of the commission are not affected by these proclamations.

The taking of game and fish in counties not under the regulatory responsibility of the Parks and Wildlife Commission is set by statute and is governed by the general law applying to such counties.

Here is a detailed rundown on the hunting seasons as a result of action taken by the Parks and Wildlife Commission at its July meeting:

SOUTHWEST TEXAS DISTRICT (Hardy, Houston, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Montgomery, Newton, Orange, Polk, Tarrant, Taylor and Walker Counties):

Open season, second Saturday of November through December 31. Bag limit, one turkey per season. Possession limit, one turkey per season. 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Pine Tree Root Rot Puzzles

College Station—A silent killer of Southern pine trees, Fomes annosus root rot, is creating serious concern among foresters and timber landowners in Texas, according to Don Young, head of the Forest Management Dept., Texas Forest Service.

The killer is a fungus which may attack and kill healthy living pine trees about two years after a stand of trees has been thinned.

Outward signs of the infection are stunted needles and a thinning of needles in the crown. Occasionally, healthy-looking trees are windthrown, the result of decaying roots.

An infected tree's roots are usually soft and stringy and contain small elongated white pockets.

The fungus appears to be more prevalent in stands and plantations of pines which have been thinned. A study is currently under way by the Texas Forest Service to determine the extent of the infection in East Texas.

In some East Texas stands, up to 30 percent of the trees left after a thinning were either dead or dying.

Infection and spread of annosus root rot is by spores produced in a "mushroomlike" conk which grows at the base of an infected tree or along its surface roots.

The commission authorized opening the deer season in most counties under regulatory responsibility on the second Saturday of November (Nov. 13) three days before the legal opening in counties under statutory regulations.

At the present time the Parks and Wildlife Department is preparing a map which will enable hunters throughout the State to understand and interpret the regulations for taking the various species of game during the coming hunting season.

As soon as this map is available, it will be sent to the Department's regional offices and to the license deputies where hunters and fishermen can pick them up at no charge.

Other publications for distribution to the public are now being prepared by the I & E Section of the Parks and Wildlife Department showing in detail the special archery seasons permitted during the month of October.

If you need more details about the bag limits, seasons and regulations in your area, the best man to see is your local game warden.

A Customer, Too (Dallas Morning News) JAPAN last year bought \$52,670,000 worth of manufactured products from Texas. Dallas office of the Japan External Trade Organization reports that the total is \$9,547,000 more than in 1963 — or almost \$1 more in Japanese money for every Texan.

This figure does not include almost \$100 million worth of raw materials that Texas sends yearly to Japan.

In 1963, for example, total sales from Texas to Japan were \$138,300,000, of which manufacturers accounted for about \$38,000,000. Among the states only California exceeds Texas as a supplier for the Oriental islands.

Iron and steel products led in Japanese purchases of industrial manufactures, accounting for about \$31,000,000 in Texas sales, or more than half of the total.

Plywood and veneer, toys, games and sporting goods, vehicles, clay products, electrical machinery, floor coverings and organic chemicals were among other leading manufactures sold there.

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Dove Dates and Limits

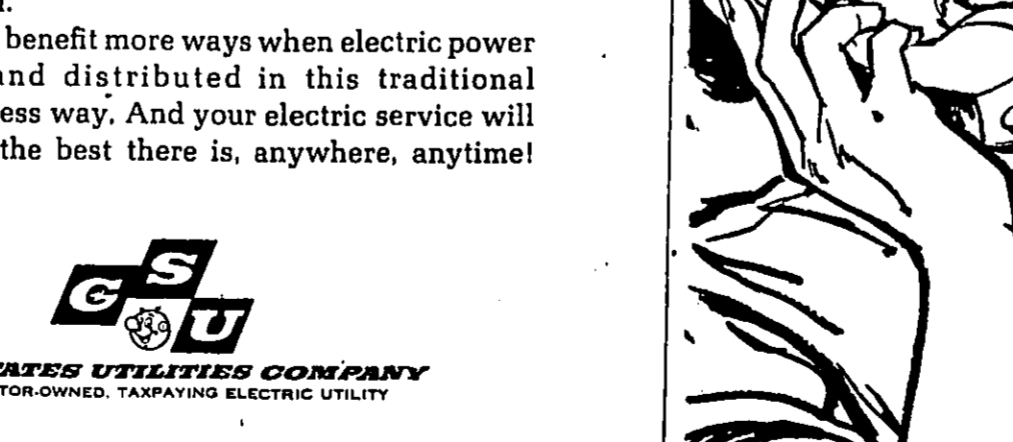
North zone dove season is Sept. 1-Oct. 30. South zone is Sept. 25-Nov. 23, except in counties having special white-wing season where the shooting stops Nov. 19. White-wing seasons are Sept. 4-5 and Sept. 11-12. Mourning dove limit is 12 per day, 24 in possession (after first day). Limits during white-wing season 10 white-wings per day and 12 mourning doves per day. Possession limit is double daily limit after first day on both species. Shooting hours are noon to sunset on white-wing and mourning doves.

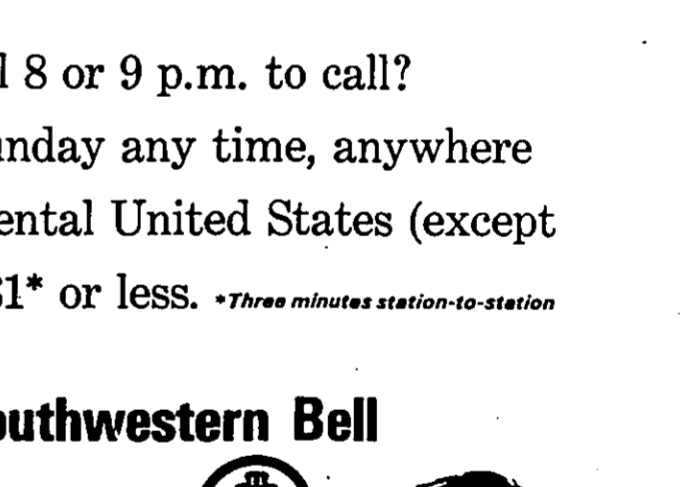

GARDENING NOTES

By J.L. CRUSE

One of the best border plants we have and an evergreen, one is the Liriope. We have these in either the green or the green and white variegated. The variegated is the prettiest I think although both are very pretty. This stays green throughout the year and blooms through the summer. The blooms grow up on six to eight inch stems, are lavender in color and are very pretty. There isn't anything that shows up any more than a bed of white caladiums bordered with the variegated Liriope in bloom with its lavender blooms. The Liriope will grow in either shade or sun;

however, it seems to do best with some afternoon shade. It will do well in any good rich garden soil. After these plants get established they require little water and can grow for several years in one place without being separated and reset, therefore, it requires little care after it gets started. It will blend in with most any other plant. There are several different kinds of the green Liriope and in addition to the green with lavender blooms there is one which has white blooms. Most all Liriope stay rather low, growing only to eight to ten inches, therefore works as a good border plant.

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
