NEW FHA PROGRAM FOR VETERANS

Even though the new housing law specifies that no down payment is necessary for a \$15,000 mortgage for veterans, federal regulations require a minimum payment of \$200 to cover closing costs, announced Morris Clemmons, Jr., president of the Deep East Texas Board of Realtors, today.

The new law, signed July 1964 by President Johnson, extends liberal home loan benefits to millions of post-Korean War veterans, hitherto uncovers by any program, and to older veterans who have not used up their eligibility under a Veterans Administration program.

Mr. Clemmons said information received from the National Association of Real Estate Boards, of which the local board is a member, reveals that FHA will insist upon a minimum down payment of not less than \$200 in lieu of closing costs.

The \$200 figure will enable FHA to continue to include closing costs in its estimate of a property's value, instead of making a distinction between veteran and non-veteran purchasers, he explained, noting that under the VA program, veterans are required to pay closing costs.

"In other words," said Mr. Clemmons, "FHA will require the veteran to make a minimum down payment of not less than \$200 on the first \$15,000 of appraised value, plus 1 percent on the balance of the loan."

Any veteran who served in the armed forces during the period from September 8, 1940, to the end of the war, and who has not previously received a VA loan, is eligible for the program.

Dr. Smith said that the crusade will feature the music of Cliff Barrow and the singing of soloists George and Ethel Waters.

A crusade executive committee of more than 50 ministers and business leaders, representing many denominations, has been formed from the greater Houston area.

### ASC Community Committee Election Deadline Nears

The election of ASC community committees for farm program administration in Tyler County is under way. According to R. Evertson Kennerly, County Office Manager, of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The community committees assist the ASC county committee in administering the price support, acreage diversion, agricultural conservation, and other farm-creation programs in the county. They are particularly responsible for keeping their neighbors informed about the program. The county committee supervises the ASC county office and is responsible for the administration of the various programs. Voting is by mail. Kennerly explained, and ballots have been sent to each eligible voter. In case eligible voters fail to receive a ballot through the mail, one may be picked up at the ASC Office. Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or shareholder is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees. Eligibility, by reason of race, color, creed, or national origin, is prohibited. Ballots may be mailed or returned to the ASC County Office anytime by or before September 31. Ballots mailed must be postmarked by midnight, September 30. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the county committee, September 15, 9:30 a.m. in the Community Room—ASC Office, Best Building, Woodville, Texas. The public is invited to witness the vote counting.

TYLER COUNTY OIL ROYALTY IS AROUND \$269,000

Tyler County's producers and royalty owners are marketing some \$2.6 million in crude oil and natural gas a year, according to statistics released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association this week.

Farmers, ranchers and other mineral owners share in a \$328,000 distribution of oil and gas royalty payments annually. The Association based its annual study of this county's oil and gas output on statistics compiled by the U.S. Bureau of Mines for 1963.

An important indicator of activities is the amount expended on drilling of wildcat wells seeking new fields, and those wells drilled to develop fields already located. The Association estimates that in 1964 approximately \$1.1 million was risked by Texas oil and gas operators on drilling ventures in Tyler County.

An upgrading of the county's gross economic output is contributed by the operation of a plant which can process some 4 million cubic feet of natural gas a day to remove liquids such as butane and propane.

Election To Decide On Enlarging State Senate

Texas voters will go to the polls Tuesday to vote on a constitutional amendment which, if passed, will increase the membership in the state senate 39 instead of the present 31.

The Supreme Court's "one-man, one vote" edict for reapportionment of both houses of state legislature will give inequitable representation to large urban areas and take representation away from rural areas unless the membership in the Texas Senate is enlarged.

proponents of the amendment The defeat of the amendment has been urged by labor leaders and other urban groups. Its adoption has been urged by most East Texas Senators, including Martin Dies, Jr. of Lufkin and Jack Strong, A.M. Aldin, Jr., Galloway Calhoun, Jr., and Ralph Hall.

Lawyers, peace officers and peace justices from 17 East Texas counties heard the new Texas code of criminal procedure discussed at the regional meeting of the Texas Bar Association in Woodville Friday.

U.S. Dis. Atty. Woodrow Seal of Houston served as moderator of the panel. Other members were U.S. Dis. Judge Joe J. Fisher and Jefferson County Dis. Atty. W.C. Lindsey of Beaumont, Judge Jack O'Neil of San Antonio and Attorney Tom White.

Area Schools Open Monday

East Texas schools, for the most part, opened for the 1965-66 school year Monday without incident although for the first time many accepted Negro pupils: in previously all-white schools.

Many superintendents and school boards had accepted, under federal pressure, the "freedom of choice" principle throughout all 12 grades, although some, such as Lufkin, had plans accepted for grades up through the ninth.

Attempts to work out a grade by grade plan acceptable to Washington HEW authorities failed for most schools, whose superintendents in May had been assured that plans providing for intergrading certain grades would be acceptable.

As the schools in the smaller districts began Monday, only a scattering of Negro children had registered under the freedom of choice plans. Some districts reported none had registered.

Districts in smaller communities which had no Negro high schools were left with no choice but to integrate. No plans were acceptable for transferring Negro high school students to neighboring districts as such districts had done in the past.

Tyler County schools which have no Negro high school in the past and accepted Negroes in high school classes Monday included Warren, Spurger and Colmesnell. Woodville and Chester had a freedom of choice plan accepted through all 12 grades.

Schools in East Texas accepting a scattering of Negro students included Jasper with over 12, Eldhart 18, Diboll 1, Shilohville 4, and San Augustine one.

Livingston and Lufkin schools had not opened Monday. Lufkin opens next week and Superintendent Frank Leathers expects some Negro students to enroll in the first nine grades. Livingston will begin registering Thursday and 25 to 30 Negro pupils are expected to enroll.

Most schools maintained for the first time in the East Texas area reported that enrollment was about normal, indicating that very few Negro children had exercised their "freedom of choice" option to attend the former all-white schools.

A lively session of questions followed a speech of Sam Rayburn Project Engineer H.L. Holder to the group. Holder delivered a brief talk to the group on the regulation policy which will be in effect on the lake.

Individuals in the audience took issue with the Corps' policy of not allowing the construction of permanent piers and docks or the mooring of any individual boats, boat docks, bouthouses, barges, houseboats, or other vessels on Sam Rayburn waters at locations other than those included in concession lease areas and private clubs.

Holder explained that individuals who desire to store and moor their vessels for more than three days will be asked to arrange such storage in the concessionary areas.

Holder said that the Corps, by 16 years of management and operation of reservoirs has found that the majority of owners of individual craft on reservoirs have not assumed the responsibility and proper maintenance of their craft.

This has resulted in the despoilment of the natural scenic beauty of the shoreline lands, impairment of public health, operation problems, creation of fire hazards and general hampering of the use of land and water areas by the general public.

Some of the comments from the crowd, many of which owned property on the lake, were that if a man couldn't build a boat dock and was several miles from the nearest one, he might as well not have any property on the lake.

"I thought I had a pretty valuable piece of land, one man said, 'but now I don't know.'"

Holder said that the concession areas providing vessel storage will be established as soon as the reservoir reaches a stage suitable and practicable for such an operation. Dry storage of vessels on privately owned lands will be encouraged, he said.

A September Election

Kilgore News Herald

An election in September? Yes, 1965 normally would be an "off year" for voting, but the Texas Legislature has submitted 11 Constitutional amendments to be voted on this year.

Only one of these proposed amendments will be voted on in a special election set for Tuesday, Sept. 7, the day after Labor Day. On that eventful date will be decided the fate of a plan to enlarge the Texas Senate from 31 to 39 members.

Other amendments will be voted on in the Nov. 2 general election.

The Texas Co-Op Power Magazine has made an analysis of the proposal to change the number of Senators. We agree with the conclusion that this amendment should be adopted.

As explained by the magazine, the amendment calls for three changes:

(1) To remove from the Constitution the restriction that "no single county shall be entitled to more than one Senator."

(2) To increase the size of the Senate from 31 to 39 members.

(3) To make population the basis for division of the state into senatorial districts rather than the "number of qualified electors" presently provided.

Actually, however, only the change from 31 to 39 members is in question.

Rulings of the Supreme Court of the U.S. have made it mandatory to redistrict the state on the basis of population rather than "qualified electors."

And such redistricting on the basis of population cannot be done without giving some counties—where cities such as Houston and Dallas are located—more than one senator.

So two of the changes, in effect, have already been made.

The change from 31 to 39 members, then, is the real question that voters will decide.

If the change is not approved, seven senators from the rural areas of Texas are certain to disappear from the Senate.

The 31-member plan already passed by the Legislature throws five pairs and one trio of senators into combined districts where they must run against each other or retire.

The senators who, under this 31-member plan, will have to retire or run against each other, are grouped as follows:

(1) Louis Crump of San Saba and J. P. Word of Meridian.

(2) Galloway Calhoun Jr. of Tyler and Jack Strong of Longview.

(3) William T. Moore of Bryan and Mrs. Neveille H. Colson of Navasota.

(4) W. E. "Pete" Snelson of Midland and Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo.

(5) Jack Hightower of Vernon and Andy Rogers of Childress.

(6) William N. Patman of Ganado, Walter H. Richter of Gonzales and Culp Krueger of El Campo.

Many of these senators are long-time supporters of rural area projects. And by virtue of their years in the Senate, they have gained both experience and seniority which gives them claims on some of the vitally-important committee posts in the Senate.

Supporters of the plan to increase the Senate to 39 members say that approval of the amendment could make it possible to keep all of these experienced senators who definitely will be lost under the 31-member plan.

Supporters of the 39-member plan also point out that some of the districts under the 31-member plan cover huge areas with little community of interest.

Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith, presiding officer of the Senate, has called the 31-member districts "monstrous."

One of these districts, where Senators Snelson of Midland and Hardeman of San Angelo will compete with each other for one seat, includes 20 South-west Texas counties. And the counties which these two senators call home are the northernmost ones in the district. These senators will have to campaign over hundreds of miles of territory to the south and west—a territory which is larger than any one of some 17 states.

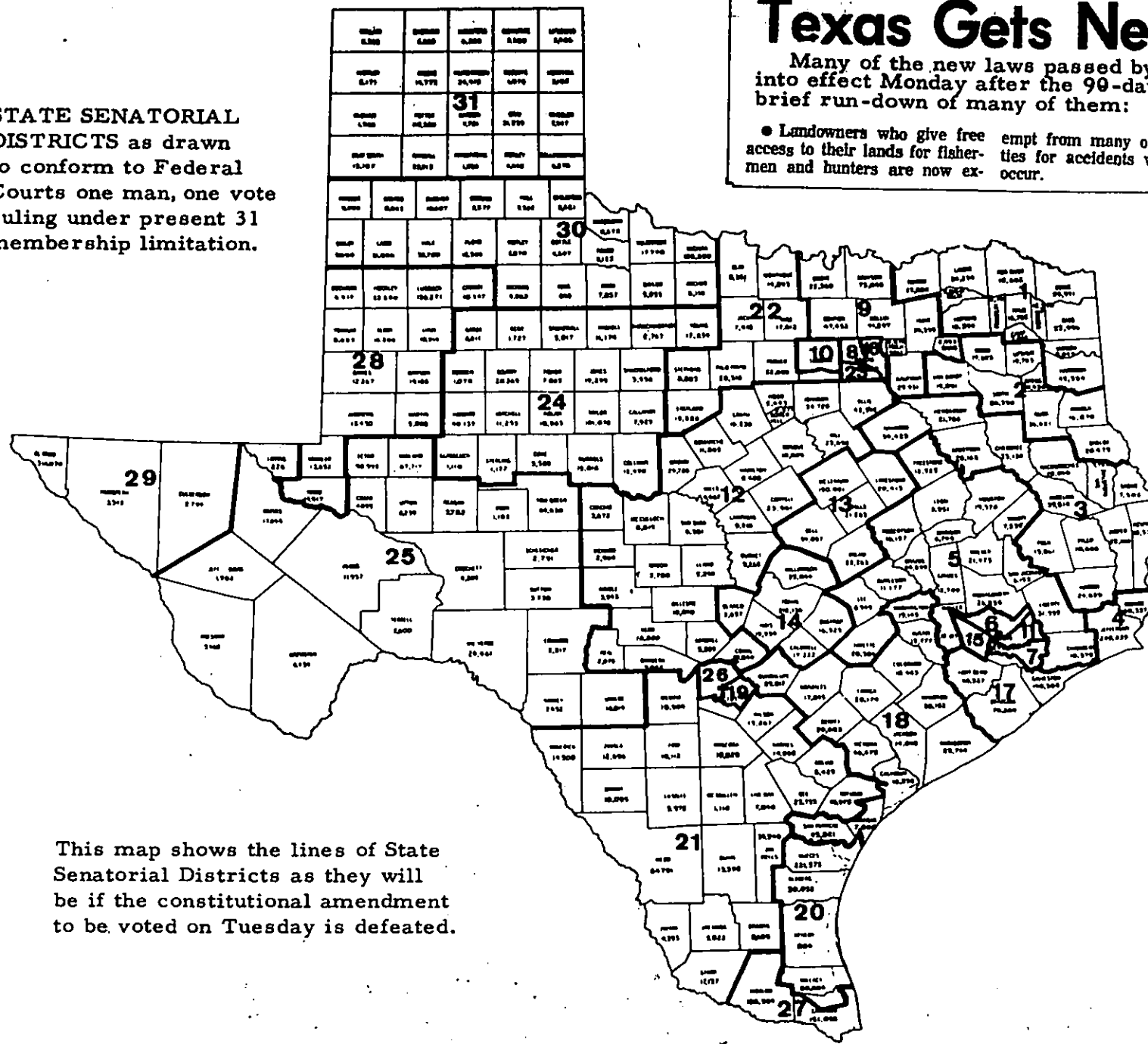
Another Senatorial district under the 31-member plan takes in the southern and western edges of San Antonio and then stretches all the way to the Rio Grande above Eagle Pass. From there it follows the river down past Laredo, stopping just short of the heavily-populated lower end of the Rio Grand Valley.

Another district along the Gulf Coast combines Kennedy County—884 residents, one of the smallest populations of any county in the state—with metropolitan Nueces County—population 221,573.

Supporters of the amendment feel that more reasonable district lines could be drawn for 39 senators than these already set for the 31-member Senate.

If the 39-member amendment passes, a special session of the Legislature will be called to set the district lines on this new basis.

Texas Gets New Laws

Many of the new laws passed by the 59th Legislature went into effect Monday after the 90-day waiting period. Here is a brief run-down of many of them:

- Landowners who give free access to their lands for fishermen and hunters are now exempt from many of the liabilities for accidents which might occur.
Bats must be registered with the state and reckless boating is unlawful under a new state safe boating act administered by the State Highway Department and local law authorities.
Retailers will have to label imported fresh meat with country of origin or face fines up to \$200.
Allens may own property in Texas.
Anybody who damages or removes a street construction warning signal faces up to \$1000 fine and two years in county jail.
Shooting guns on public roads can bring a \$100 fine.
Parents are liable for up to \$5000 on malicious damage caused by their children who are 10 years old or older.
Buses, panel trucks, pickups and other trucks with one-ton capacity may now drive at the same speeds posted for passenger cars.
Doctors must be sure that newborn children are given a standard test to detect mental retardation.
Commercial trucks up to 65 feet long can ply the highways, and logging trucks may carry freshly cut timber in lengths that make up a 90-foot-long vehicle.
Annoying, tormenting, abusing, threatening or intimidating anyone over the telephone can result in fines up to \$1000 and up to 12 months in county jail.
Churches organized and managed as nonprofit corporations with members as managers no longer need to provide for a board of directors in articles of incorporation.
Investing a sponge crabs from coastal waters means a \$50-\$200 fine.
Selling master keys to motor vehicles is punishable by \$25-\$200 fines.
Providing liquor for anyone under age 21 can mean a fine of \$10-\$100, except for the minor's parents, legal guardian or adult spouse.
Executives with firms covered by workmen's compensation insurance can get the same protection as the company's other employees.
Escape from jail, prison or custody of a law enforcement officer is a crime now, with stiff jail or prison terms, depending on the kind of offense for which the person was originally arrested.
A maternity home or shelter for unwed mothers must have a state license.
Any incorporated city can write its own civil and criminal ordinances and impose fines.
Harris and Dallas counties may build parking garages for county courthouse patrons and employees.
Commercial debt poolers who charge fees are outlawed, although lawyers, banks, the courts and retail merchants associations or non-profit debt counselors may help people out of financial jams.
Inflating the loan value of property or inflating ability to repay, a loan are double contract situations usually involving false statements which could mean jail terms and up to \$1000 in fines for the borrower and lender.
County commissioners courts may hike the pay for jurors to \$10 daily.
Deliberately setting a fire which fatally burns somebody, even if no harm was intended, can result in two years to life in prison.
A father or mother alone can sign consent to let minor children marry. A mother can sign only if dad has been away six months from the county where mother and child have lived one year, or if the mother has had legal custody for at least six months.
An incorporated city can help homeowners by going into court to uphold property deed restrictions.

Tower Defends Gov. Connally

WASHINGTON — It was the lot of Republican Sen. John G. Tower this week to rise to the defense of democratic Gov. John B. Connally of Texas in the United States Senate.

The only other Texas in the Senate, liberal Sen. Ralph Yarborough, has had nothing but harsh words for his fellow Democrat in recent weeks, and he was not expected to say anything in defense of the governor on the Senate floor.

Tower's defense of the governor came as the result of a blistering speech by Senate Democratic Whip Russell Long, La., arguing for elimination of governor's vetoes of federal anti-poverty projects.

Yarborough has been a consistent critic of Connally for his veto

of certain Texas projects. Long, in an impassioned speech in the Senate, contended that Republican governors would attempt to wreck the poverty program through use of the veto power.

He cited states with GOP governors—New York (Nelson Rockefeller), Michigan (George Romney) and Pennsylvania (William Scriven).

Long said these governor could use the veto power to set up "one of the sweetest Republican deals imaginable."

Tower immediately questioned his position, and it was during this colloquy that Long declared: "The senator (Tower) comes from Texas. I have some doubt that Gov. Connally would be governor of Texas unless he had the President's support. Gov. Connally used to work under the President.

"In my opinion—and I make the statement after some meditation—Lyndon B. Johnson thinks that Sen. Ralph Yarborough was never more right in his life than he is about this, as much as he likes and admires Tom (Sic) Connally."

Tower reminded Long that they were talking about John Connally and not the late Sen. Tom Connally of Texas. But Long went ahead and assailed the idea that governors should have veto power over anti-poverty projects in their states.

Tower, as quickly as possible, got in his defense of Gov. Connally. "The governor of Texas has been mentioned," he said. "It has been said that he owes his present position to the President of the United States.

"But, in that connection, the

polls show that in Texas the governor is more popular than the President. He is governor in his own right.

"It was suggested that politics was instrumental in the administration of the present program. The governor of my state is not of my party, he is a Democrat. He has not acted through politics; he has acted with dispatch.

"He favors the program. He has acted in a singularly efficient way. He has drawn no criticism from either party in our state for the way he has acted in administering the program. He is certainly wholeheartedly in favor of the exercise of the gubernatorial veto.

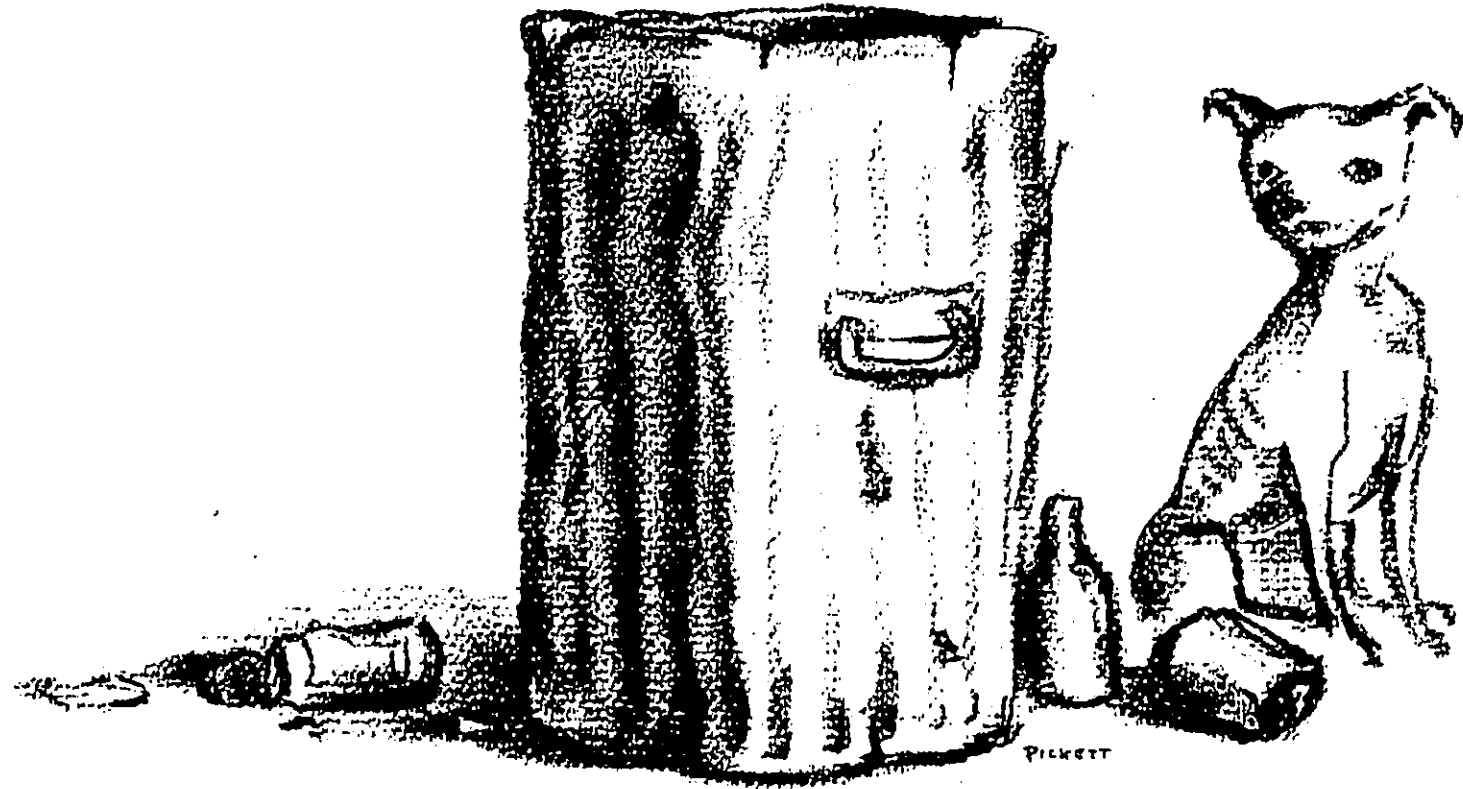
"It seems to me that all that has been implied is that this program is, indeed, politically motivated, politically oriented and politically administered. That is why it should not have been enacted in the first place.

"It will continue to be administered in that way, whether there is a gubernatorial veto or not."

The Senate, which is the most liberal body of Congress these days, went ahead and voted against allowing governors to have veto powers on major aspects of the anti-poverty program in their states.

But the governor of Texas, a Democrat and a friend of the President, found out that his best defender in the United States Senate was a Republican—John G. Tower.

### Homemakers Tips and Trends

The plain cotton house dress, once standard attire for the American homemaker, has all but vanished from the scene. From a fashion standpoint, it's a good thing.

Taking the place of the house dress is a wide range of stylish, comfortable cottons that combine fashion and practicality. Today's homemaker wears smart-looking A-line shifts, culottes, knee-length jumpsuits, or trim smocks.

Unlike the house dress, these versatile styles are designed to be worn outside the home as well.

The new fashions come in comfortable, easy-care cottons like popular chambray denim. This fabric is a favorite in the modern homemaker's wardrobe, because it washes well, needs only touch-up ironing and won't shrink.

Consider safety features when buying shoes.

Research studies show that crepe heels offer more protection from slipping on wet floors than do four other types of heels.

The Department of Home Economics at North Carolina Experiment Station conducted the recent research, using the five types of shoe heels on nine types of flooring materials.

While the crepe heels were rated first from the safety standpoint, others which were found to be fairly safe were those featuring heels made from neoprene, rubber and urethane rubber. In that order, reports Mrs. Short.

"The woman who comes in out of the rain and steps onto a linoleum floor recently polished with an ordinary liquid polish had better watch her step—especially if she's wearing shoes with heels of some type of leather," the specialist emphasizes.

All resilient floor coverings are much slicker when wet than dry, and several types offer little added resistance, the research showed.

### HOW MUCH IS A WIFE WORTH?

One issue that frequently comes up for family discussion is should a wife be insured as well as her husband.

A man will try to carry a sufficient amount of insurance on his own life because he is usually the breadwinner. His family, deprived of his income or insurance benefits to replace it, would have a difficult time getting along.

But family counselors point out that the financial importance of a woman to her family should not be underestimated. It should be weighed very carefully when life insurance needs are being considered.

If a wife were to die, someone would have to be hired to care for the children and to perform the many household tasks for the family. The cost of competent full time nursemaids and domestic help can be very steep.

This is why many families make an honest evaluation of the wife's contributions to the family and how much it would cost to replace her. They evaluate her contributions in monetary terms to consider the family's insurance program.

Currently, about six out of ten women in the nation own some kind of life insurance policy.

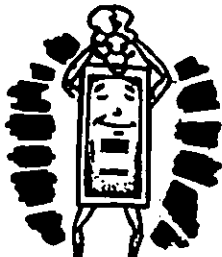
We are pleased to see our new members the William Longs so regular. We are happy to have these folks in our community.

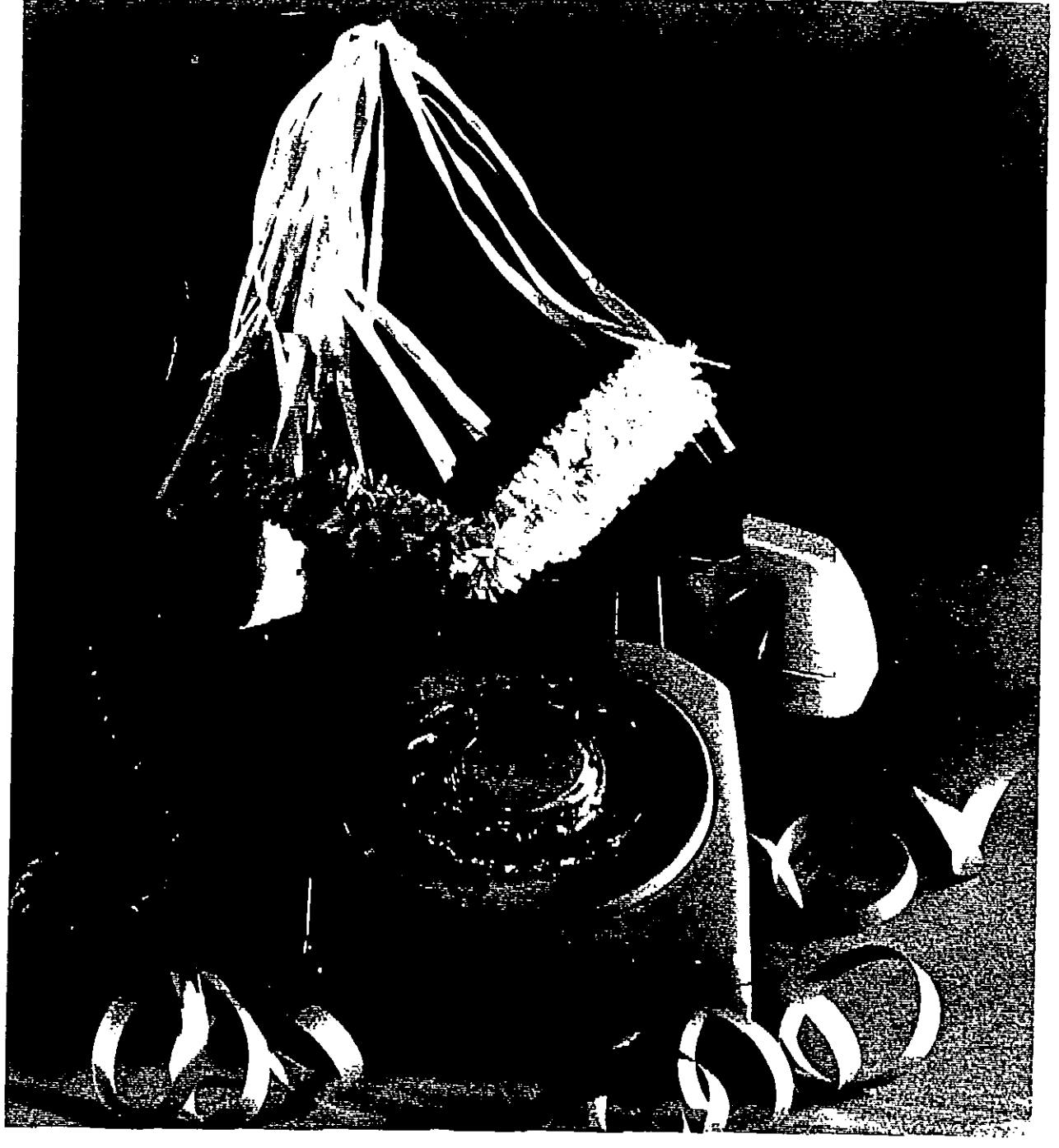

## GARDENING NOTES

By J.L. CRUSE

It's not a bit too early to start preparations for fall pansy planting. I've had so many to ask for pointers on growing pansies that I will give what information I have on growing them. Experts may not agree with me on some points but from growing pansies some twenty years, I've learned quite a few things from past experience.

The first thing to decide is what age plants one wishes to start with. If you expect to start with small seedlings be sure to get started on your bed at once. A bed three by four feet will take care of up to 200 plants for up to six weeks at which time they will be ready to transplant to a permanent location. A good fertilizer I've found for this bed is good rotted barnyard fertilizer and some cotton seed meal. Be sure not to use too much. Anyone can work in more after plants are started. Get this bed started now to have it ready by last week in October. After digging bed to a depth of at least six inches, add fertilizer and mix thoroughly. Then rake and level as if you were ready to set plants. If we don't get rains then it helps to water this bed once or twice weekly and about every ten days dig and stir soil again. This will help to rot fertilizer and also keep down weeds and grass. It will also help to add a sprinkling of 10% chlordane to soil and dig in. This will kill ants and insects. By preparing bed as above you should be ready for your pansy plants the last week in October. I forgot to mention that if possible locate your bed where it will get some afternoon shade.

It's not too early either to go ahead and place your order for plants with your nursery man and be ready to pick them

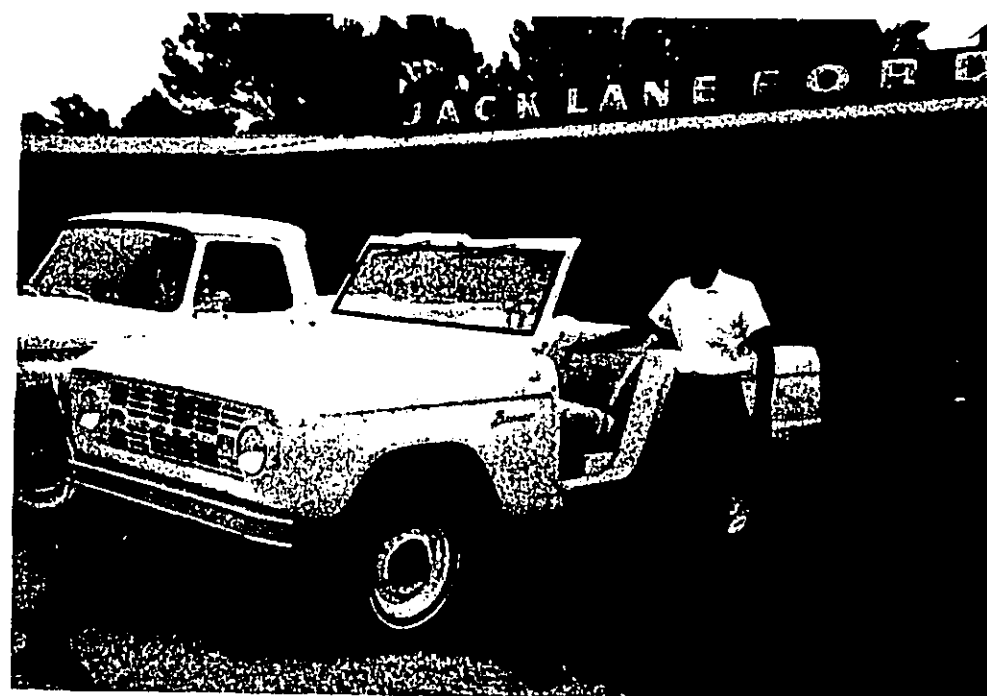
