4 and 5. Only two absentee ballots were case, and both were for the

amendment. The amendment was soundly defeated statewide. Most East Texas countles voted against it

along with Tyler County.

security payments which were stopped when you became 18, they can be started up again, but you must reapply and show that you are a full-time student and have not married since your pay-
