

C of C Will Conduct Recreational Census

The Woodville Chamber of Commerce is initiating a recreational survey or census of Tyler County this coming week, according to Morris Clemmons, Chairman of the Committee.

This is a survey designed to find out exactly what the people of Tyler County would like to have in the way of recreational facilities and how willing they are to support such a move.

Members of the Chamber's Steering Committee will be contacting many people during the next weeks and these people will be requested to fill out a form provided by the Farmers Home Administration. It lists a number of activities that are possible in this area and leaves space for suggestions.

Lack of recreational facilities has been a deterrent in the county to bringing industry and growth here. One of the first questions prospective industries ask when they are considering a move or expansion, said Clemmons, is what recreation does the area offer for the employees.

If the answer is not adequate, these companies look elsewhere for plant locations.



U.S. Government bonds were authorized, August 3, 1790.



Area football teams have a full schedule set for this Friday night, following the start last week in which Woodville and Warren lost their opening games.

Woodville ran into a tough Crockett team that is rated tops in its district and came home on the short end of a 26 to 8 score. Warren lost to Corrigan 8 to 0.

This week Woodville plays closer to home and hopes that the shorter traveling distance will bring them better luck. They play Livingston here. Last Friday Livingston was shut out by a strong Anahuac team, 20 to 0.

Warren will be host to Colmesneil of District 26-B this Friday. Colmesneil ranks high in the B district, although the difference in the game may come through superior reserve strength on the Warren bench.

Woodville's Eagles looked better in defeat than could be expected, but lack experience --and the only way to gain experience is by playing. The Eagles hope to get their offensive rolling this week in Livingston, although the Lions are always a tough opponent for the Eagles.

A large crowd of local fans are expected to follow the Eagles to Livingston, one of the hottest rivalries in the area creating lots of enthusiasm although the teams are no longer in the same district.

TANE Executive To Speak at Methodist Church

The Reverend Albert F. Tucker, executive secretary of Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education, Inc., will speak at the Woodville Methodist Church on Sunday, September 12, at the morning service.

After serving Methodist pastorates in New Mexico and west Texas for 21 years, Reverend Tucker became the first president, and later executive secretary, of the New Mexico Temperance League. In 1952 he was elected the executive head of TANE.

The speaker holds certificates of special training from the University of Denver, Yale University, and the Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism at Loma Linda, California. In 1961, Reverend Tucker studied the alcohol problem in Europe and was a delegate to the World Christian Temperance League, which met in Oslo, Norway. Among other places of responsibility, Reverend Tucker is a member of the executive committee and board of directors of the National Temperance League, which has headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Some phases of TANE's program include: A modern printing division; a Legislative Information Service; Local Option counsel, guidance and materials; annual Seminars and Workshops; as well as scientific, positive visual aids and programs for churches, schools and colleges.

Under Reverend Tucker's leadership TANE has come to be known as one of the best organized temperance State organizations in the nation. Parts of its program and many of its materials are used by several groups in other states and some foreign countries.

Most of the inmates know that rodeo ticket sales mean spiritual, educational, recreational and medical services not allocated by the Texas Legislature.

They know, also, that because of the rodeo, the Texas Department of Corrections is able to carry on a full scale rehabilitation program designed to help inmates prepare for the day when they will be either paroled or discharged from the prison.

On October 3rd, Tennessee Ernie Ford will be guest star, followed by Dizzy Dean on October 10th; Roger Miller on October 17th; Brenda Lee on October 24th, and Jimmy Dean on October 31st.

Voters In County Against Amendment

Tyler County voters turned down the constitutional amendment to increase the State Senate from 31 to 39 members in the special election Tuesday. In a light vote, there were only 124 votes cast for the amendment and 271 against, a margin of over two to one.

Only one of the county's 15 voting boxes went for the amendment. That was Fred, where 7 votes were cast for and 7 against. Another box, warrented at 18 for and 18 against. Most county boxes were overwhelmingly against the amendment.

Votes by boxes were: Woodville 56 for, 64 against; Doucette four and 11; Hillister two and 16; Campground one and 9; Chester four and 21; Bethany four and 8; Emilee one and 5; Colmesneil 10 and 34; Rockland 3 and 22; Smith Ferry 2 and 14; Town Bluff 2 and 8; Spurger 6 and 30; New Hope 4 and 5.



200 Students To Get SS Payments

Approximately 200 young people in central East Texas have taken advantage of a change in the social security law intended to give financial help to students in completing their education.

According to L.R. James, social security district manager at Lufkin, 194 claims for payment have been received in the first three weeks since the Lufkin office began accepting applications under the new rules.

Formerly, social security benefits for children stopped at age 18, except in cases of severe disability. Under the recent changes in the law, monthly benefits can now be paid until the child reaches 22, if he is in regular school attendance.

The new rules are retroactive, so that payments can go back as far as January, 1965. "This is the most important part of the 1965 Amendment," James said, "since in many cases it can mean the difference between being able to continue in school or having to drop out. Back payments in some cases can be as much as \$400 to \$500, with monthly benefits ranging up to \$88 per month."

As explained by James, the new rules will in general apply in three ways - If you are under 18 and are getting social security checks, you can continue without interruption when you reach 18. The change-over will be almost automatic, with the social security office merely checking to see whether you are a full-time student.

If you did receive social security payments which were stopped when you became 18, they can be started up again, but you must re-apply and show that you are a full-time student and have not married since your payments were stopped.

If you have never been eligible for social security benefits because you were already 18 when one of your parents retired, became disabled, or died, you may now be able to receive benefits. You - or your parent - must apply for the benefit.

In any case, the new payments will continue until you leave school, become 22, or get married, whichever occurs first. Because the facts are different in each case, James urges any-
