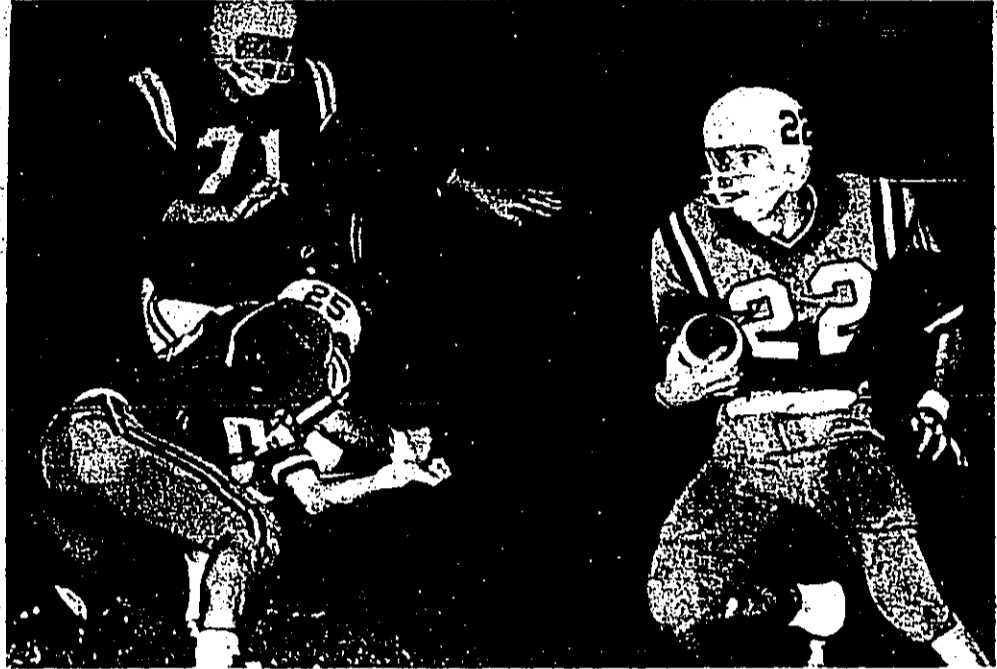

All County Teams Play Home Friday

The Kirby High Eagles lost another game this past week. Livingston roared to a 28-8 lead in the first half of the game played in Livingston this past Friday night and neither team scored after that. Off to a shaky start, the Eagle defensive team finally managed to contain Mark Mosely, starback of the Livingston Lions.

City Hall Votes To Sue For Delinquent Taxes

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Woodville City Council was held this past Monday night. All members of the council were present.

The main order of business the council acted upon was to unanimously vote that all persons owing taxes for the year 1959 or before be notified that suit will be instituted unless the delinquent taxes are paid within a specified time.

The council also declared the installation of a stop light at the end of Live Oak Street. Other action taken by the City Council was to make plans to contact the highway department to put in school crossing zones on Highway 69; decree that no tax certificates will be issued unless all taxes and assessments have been paid. The council also voted to amend the plumbing code to allow the use of PVC-Tylo 1220 sewer pipe inside of buildings and also PVC-Tylo 4 water lines, both hot and cold.

County Accepts Jack Lane Ford Bid For New Car

The Commissioners Court of Tyler County held its regularly scheduled meeting this past Monday morning in the Commissioners Meeting Room.

First order of business disposed of was to open bids received on a new car for the Sheriff's Department. Bids were as follows: Jack Lane Ford \$2,395 with trade-in; Howard Motor Company - \$2,253.98 with trade-in subject to increase and decrease in prices on the '66 models.

The Court voted to accept the Jack Lane bid because of difference in specifications of the cars and because of the loan of a car while the new ones are being delivered.

Other routine business attended to by the Court was to set a County Budget Hearing for September 30th at 10 a.m.; accept two plats in Tyler County which are part of the Woodville resort area, and to pay all current bills.

There were no dissenting votes on any of these issues.

Medicare Enrollment Being Mailed Now

The first mailing of informational leaflets explaining supplementary medical insurance for the aged is now being made. This mailing will go to people who will be 65 or over before January 1, 1966, and who receive monthly social security or railroad retirement benefits, according to L. R. James, social security district manager in Lufkin.

An enrollment card is included with the leaflet so people can tell the Social Security Administration whether or not they wish to enroll in the voluntary medical insurance plan. Instructions for completing the card are in the leaflet. An addressed envelope requiring no postage is enclosed for the convenience of beneficiaries in promptly replying.

Not all beneficiaries will receive their enrollment cards and leaflets at the same time.

James advised people not to be concerned if they do not receive their leaflets and enrollment cards immediately. He will take several weeks to mail the leaflets and cards to more than 15 million social security beneficiaries 65 and over. Everyone will receive information in time for them to make their decision about enrollment in the medical insurance plan before the end of the initial enrollment period, March 31, 1966, James assured.

The leaflet contains complete information about the benefits offered by the supplementary medical insurance plan. Anyone having a question about medical insurance after reading the leaflet should get in touch with the Lufkin social security district office, located at 307 South First Street, James said.

WOMANS STUDY CLUB HOLDS MEET

With the theme, "Quest for Growth," selected for the year's work, members must look forward to serving families, schools, town, state and nation, Mrs. Forrest M. Archer, president of the Woman's Study Club emphasized at the opening meeting Tuesday in the home of Mrs. Robert Allen Mann. Mrs. Archer shared hostess duties.

"We shall learn of unity in diversity and the government and spiritual workings of the ecumenical council," she stated. "Our timberlands are a source of beauty and wealth and the conservation of them is of great importance as we shall see. Taxes and family finance in relation to relief and rising costs is an important subject to be studied.

"Our American legacy will be headlined as well as the search for spiritual growth," the president continued. "We shall tour the Indian village to see the work accomplished there and will study juvenile delinquency so that our knowledge and understanding of this problem may be increased."

Mrs. Archer, in outlining the year's work, also stressed that attention would be given to opera, Texas' Independence, the making of flowers for the Dogwood Festival and the great steps taken in communications and manufacturing.

Also speaking on the program was Mrs. Harold Allison, federation councilor, who listed the goals of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and the various projects in which the Study Club will participate. A film on the growth and development of the General Federation of Women's Clubs was shown by Mrs. Mann. Among the many facts brought out by the film was the one that the first women's club was organized in March, 1868, and that a charter for the general federation was granted April 3, 1901. The idea that no cause is too small because the clubs are diversified and no cause too large because they are united was set before the turn of the century, the film revealed.

Memorial Marker Honoring Civil War Man To Be Erected

A Confederate Memorial Information Marker for Phillip A. Work in Tyler County will be erected by the State Building Commission. This announcement was made by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the State Building Commission, which are jointly responsible for its erection.

The marker is made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect for durability and appearance. There are four sides of these markers erected by the State Building Commission with research and inscriptions prepared by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

The Official Texas Historical Medallion appears at the top with the inscription below. Members of the State Building Commission are Governor John Connally, Attorney General Waggoner Carr, and Charles S. Coates, Chairman of the State Board of Control.

The Official Texas Historical Marker for Phillip A. Work is 18 x 28 inches in size and will be erected in front of the Courthouse on Bluff Street.

The following information appears in the inscription: LT. COL. PHILIP A. WORK (1832-1911)

Came to Texas, 1838, represented Tyler County, Texas succession, convention, 1861. Raised and was Captain, Co. F, 1st Regt., Hood's Texas Brigade, as Lieutenant Colonel, commanded Hood's Texas June 1862 - Jan. 1864, in battles such as Shiloh, where brigade had over 82% casualties. Gr-

County HD Council Elects Delegates To State Meet

At the September 3rd meeting of Tyler County Home Demonstration Council held at 3:30 p.m. in the Extension Office names of three delegates of Tyler County Home Demonstration Clubs to the State Meet on September 21st were revealed. Mrs. Schouville and Mrs. Sirmons were visitors, also. Twelve council members answered roll call by telling what they have in their First Aid Kit.

Reports were heard from the August meeting in each Club and from the council chairman. Minutes were read and approved, and a devotional on the value of a smile was brought by Mrs. P. L. Plake. The Annual Meeting of all Tyler County Clubs will be held November 5th at the Community Inn and each club will be responsible for exhibits and each president and council chairman will submit a written report. Upon a motion made by Mrs. M. F. Rumery, it was voted to ask Mr. Young, Social Security Representative, to bring us a program on Medicare at that time. Prime Hunting Seen For Fall; Deer, Squirrel, Turkey Abound

Sportsmen seeking either trophies or meat apparently will be satisfactorily served this fall on the basis of a preliminary survey by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

E. A. Walker, assistant director for wildlife, said the study indicates "better than average growth of antlers which are dependent upon favorable food supplies from late winter until August." He added: "The acorn crop is excellent in some areas and not so good in others. If the acorns do mature, it can be expected that fat deer will be abundant in those areas where acorns are plentiful."

Walker noted favorable prospects for wild turkey hunting, stating: "The wild turkey hatch was good again this year in most parts of the state. Excellent production has been observed throughout the big turkey country through the Edwards Plateau in the counties west of Austin. Some increase in turkey numbers has been noted in south Texas but hatches were not as good as in other parts of the state."

The assistant director noted some negative angles such as: "There are a few isolated areas within the whitetail (deer) range, primarily in the Edwards Plateau, where excellent fawn crops, coupled with abundant brood stocks, have resulted in too many deer on the range. Some scattered die-offs are occurring at this time in these areas, primarily because of the fact that the weather has turned dry and the supply of green succulent deer feed has drastically diminished. Malnutrition in these specific areas is considered to be primarily responsible for the moderate die-offs occurring. Parasitism is also involved."

But in the main the big game outlook is good, reported Walker, adding: "Elsewhere in the state, in north central, east

central, southeast and south Texas hunting prospects for deer are considered to be excellent. It is estimated that there are in the neighborhood of 2,250,000 whitetails in the state to support the 1965 hunting season.

"Mule deer populations in Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions appear to be in excellent condition and deer are more plentiful in these areas than in the fall of 1964. The total mule deer population in the state is estimated to be in the neighborhood of 100,000 head."

The age group of the club is from ages 9 - 18, and it is divided into a Junior and Senior club. Among the various projects which will be covered this year will be: Housing and Home Furnishings, Citizenship, Civil Defense, Health, Safety, Public Speaking, Recreation, Fire Prevention, Home Management, Food, Clothing (wardrobe planning), child care, photography, and dog care and training.

Anyone interested in any of these projects will be welcome to come to the meeting.

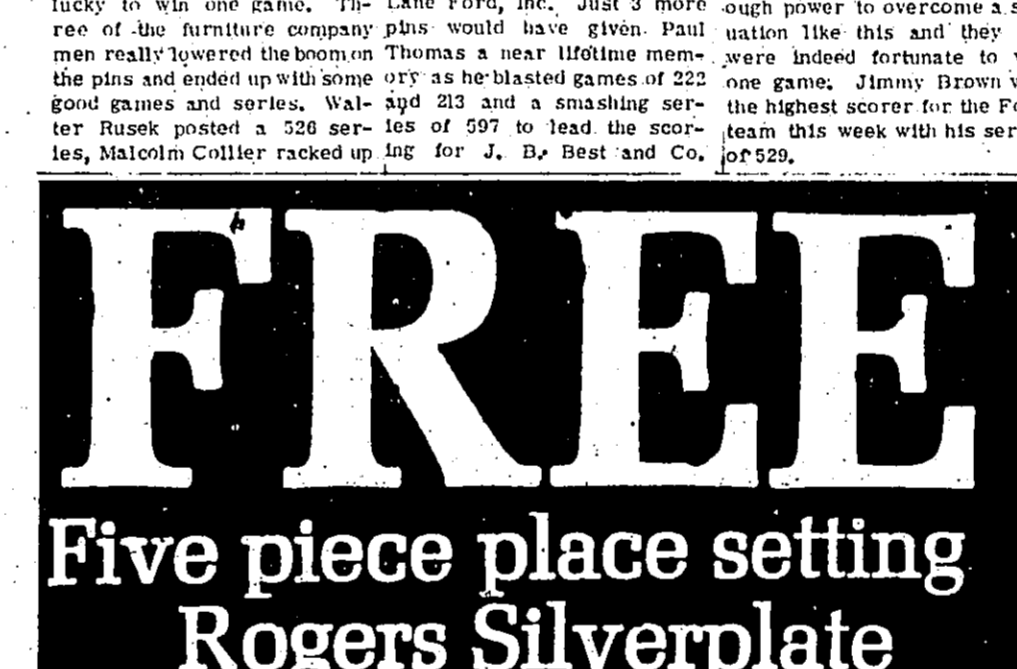

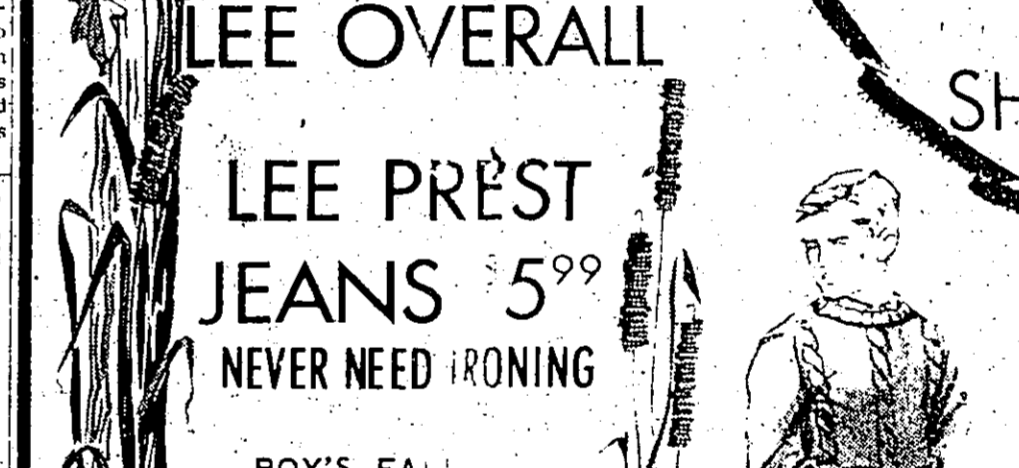

Accent on Health

Headache may well be humanity's number one malady. It makes people under many names - sick headache, coffee headache, hunger headache, all-ergy headache, fever headache and Sunday headache - to name a few.

But what really happens when your head hurts? A common misconception is that the brain hurts when you have a headache. But the brain itself - while marvelously sensitive in some ways - is an unfeeling mass of gray tissue. You can probe, cut, burn, or smash it with impunity without its hurting.

Other structures of the head, however, are extremely sensitive to pain, including the scalp, blood vessels and some of the brain coverings.

Some of the processes causing headache include swelling of arteries within the head, pulling, inflammation of irritation of the head's pain-sensitive structures, unbalanced contraction of neck muscles, pain spreading from another source such as an inflamed eye, or an emotional disturbance.

Headaches can be important since they may be the warning sign of a serious condition which possibly could be controlled if detected early. They can indicate glaucoma, fever, high blood pressure, an enlarged central nervous system, injury or infection, epilepsy and tumors of the brain and head.

They can also warn of intoxication by such poisons as carbon monoxide gas. Or, a headache can indicate sensitivity to certain solvents, the elements in some liquids, or anti-histamines or to noise.

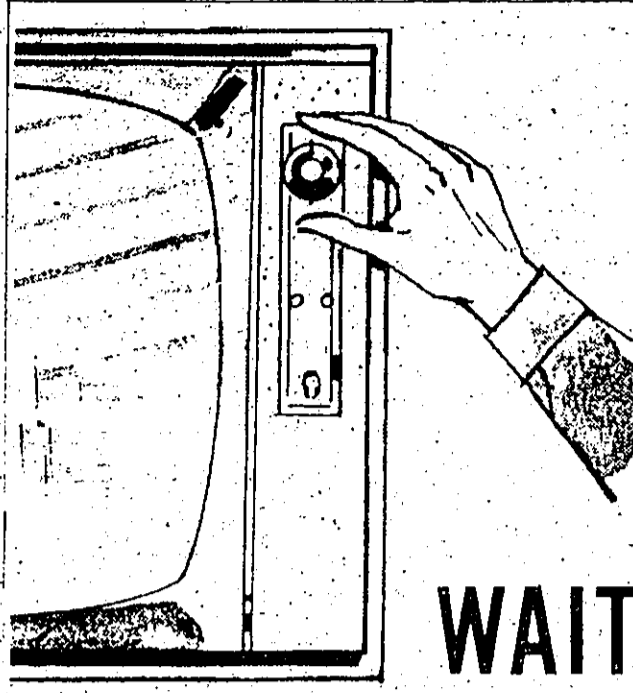

Thomas Nursery Notes

BY RUTH THOMAS

There are several shrubs still blooming - hibiscus, althea, crape myrtles, ixora and others, but at this time of year most thoughts turn toward chrysanthemums for fall color. Chrysanthemums come in many colors and sizes. Small plants should have been planted in June, but they are one plant you can move from a can to the ground even in full bloom without disturbing it. They multiply so next year you will have a multitude of plants. Chrysanthemums are hardy exotics so fertilize before planting and often. Rotted barnyard fertilizer is very good, but a little commercial should be added. If you use commercial dry fertilizer, add with caution and water well after application. The safest thing to do is use water soluble fertilizer on small beds or canned plants. You run less chance of burning the plants. There are a number of good ones - Carl Pool, Rapid-gro, hypones and others. The formula in the fertilizer depends on what kind of plant you have or what you expect out of it. Do you want it to grow as fast as you expect it to bloom? Your salesman should be able to help you with this.

Calciums should be dug out. Wash them clean and dry well. Store in a bag with good circulation and keep in a place cool enough to keep from rotting but high enough to keep from freezing. Most bulbs can be refrigerated but not so with calciums as they are warm weather plants.
