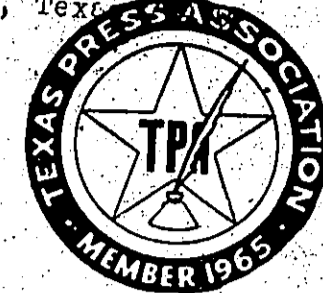

Kountze Defeats Woodville On Field Goal

The Kirby High School Eagles lost the first 22-AA encounter of the season to the Kountze Lions on a fourth quarter field goal. The final score was Kountze 3, Woodville 0.

The game was one of defense with neither team able to move the ball successfully. The game was marked by a succession of fumbles and penalties. The Eagles fumbled six times and lost the ball four times and the Lions lost the ball three times on four fumbles. Woodville was able to move

the ball for only 63 yards against Kountze for 143 yards. Mike Roberts continued his good punting record of punting 4 times for an average of 43 yards per punt. Weaver and Bednarik were outstanding on defense for the Eagles.

In the first quarter Woodville drove to the Kountze 10 yard line but lost the ball on a fumble. In the second quarter Kountze drove to the Woodville 20 yard line but there the Eagles defense held and the ball went over on downs.

In the third quarter Kountze drove to the Woodville 10 yard line and on fourth down John Wheeler kicked the field goal that was the game's only score.

Next week the Eagles play at Buna at 7:30. The Woodville B team and 8th Grade Team will play at Livingston Thursday night beginning at 6:00. Uzzell, coordinator for wildlife in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the archers will have plenty of targets but the riflemen will be restricted to a fair number of antelope west of the Pecos and in the Pecos Mountain area and the Panhandle. Ralph Yarborough To Visit Indian Reservation

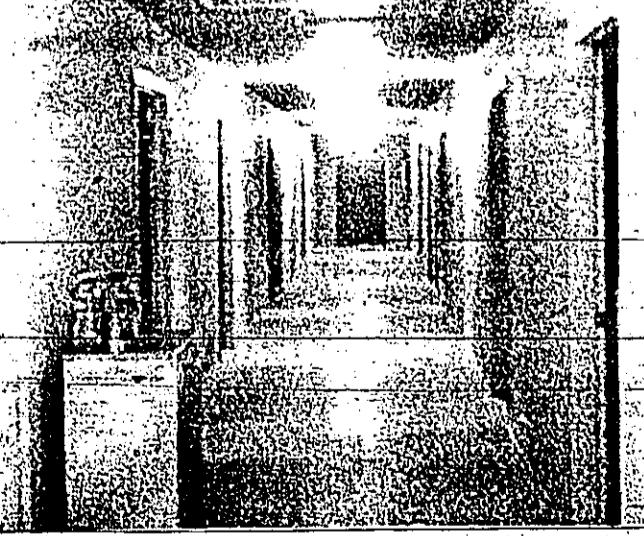
U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough will visit the Atlatama-Cochattat Indian Reservation on Highway 190, 17 miles East of Livingston, Texas, at 5:00 p.m., Saturday, October 9, 1965. Senator Yarborough will land in a helicopter in front of the Tribal Museum and be a guest of the Tribal Council.

The Senator is an Honorary Member of the Tribes and is returning to the Reservation to see the progress made by his people and see the results of projects sponsored by Federal Aid. The visit will include a tour of the Museum and Arts and Crafts Building, Tribal Dances, the Senators response to the Indian Reservation Programs and a Barbecue.

The public is invited to come early to enjoy the beautiful fall colors on the "Indian Reservation Big Thicket Tour Ride" leaving on the hour from the Museum Building and hike along the "TRIBAL NATURE TRAIL" where a pine tree is growing that is older than the Declaration of Independence. The Indian Museum and Arts and Crafts Center will be open all day and Indian Dances will be performed hourly.

Everyone is invited to the special performance by the "Na Ski La" (Dogwood) Tribal Dancers at 5:00 p.m., Saturday and Barbecue (\$1.00 per plate) following the program.

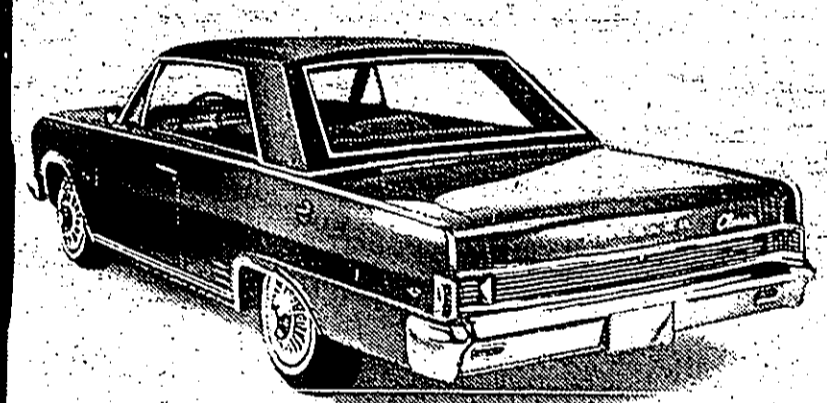
FOR YOU RETIRING IN 1965: A STUDY OF THE YEAR 1900

You who come up for retirement this year at age 65, have a distinction that comes only once in 100 years. You were born in a year that launched a century. This is not exactly a thing to raise the flag for, but since you are retiring and since 1900 was an unusual year, you may find some profit in what a man named Eugene Royster, also 65 this year, is doing about it. "About 18 months ago," he says, "I read in your column about a man who was 65 in 1964 and was researching his birth year of 1899. I made a note of the idea. In January of this year I began work on 1900. "I am discovering that it was quite a year to be in. There were no major world disasters in 1900, unless some was your birth year. It was the year when Benjamin Holt invented the water-pump tractor, when the first German zeppelin was launched when the Carnegie Institute of Technology was founded in Pittsburgh. There is no particular reason for this kind of research according to Mr. Royster, except that it is interesting and perhaps a person should not go out of this world without finding out something of what it was like when he or she came into it. He thinks it is far more worthwhile than what most retired people are doing with their time, which he says is virtually nothing. Mr. Royster's study thus far has led him through the second victory of William McKinley over Jennings Bryant for the Presidency (1900) and to such information as the number of autos built that year — 1,000; the number of college graduates — 27,410; and the U.S. population of 76,000,000. "But there was glamor to the era," he says. "We were getting through the hangover of the Gay Nineties and were trying to digest and manage such exotic places as the Philippines, Guam and Puerto Rico which we had just taken from Spain. Mr. Royster's project may seem a bit trivial to you. But when, after you retire, all those \$10,000 retirement jobs fail to materialize and the living room walls start talking back, you might give it a thought. 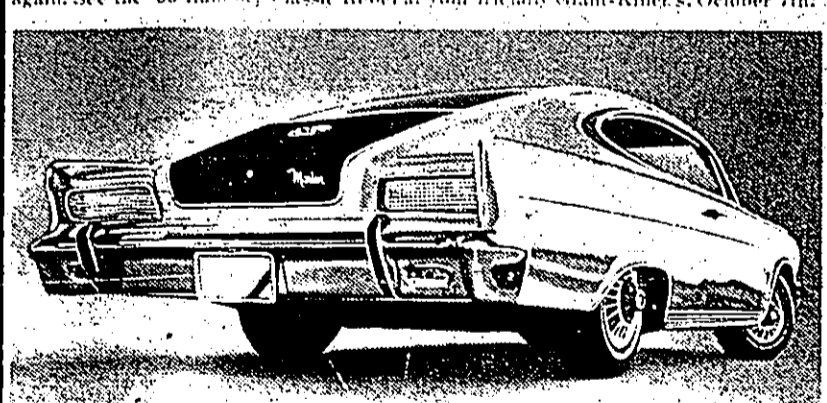

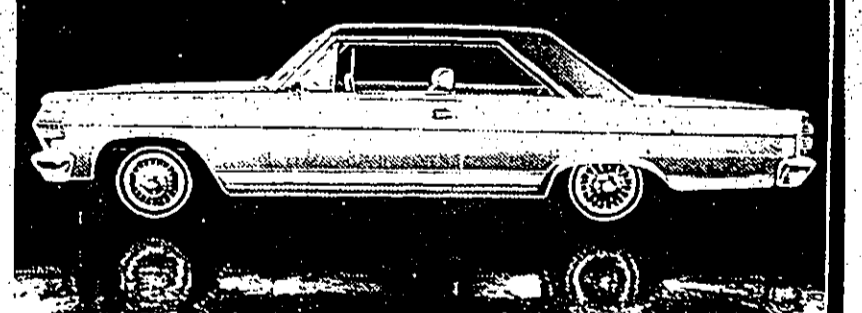

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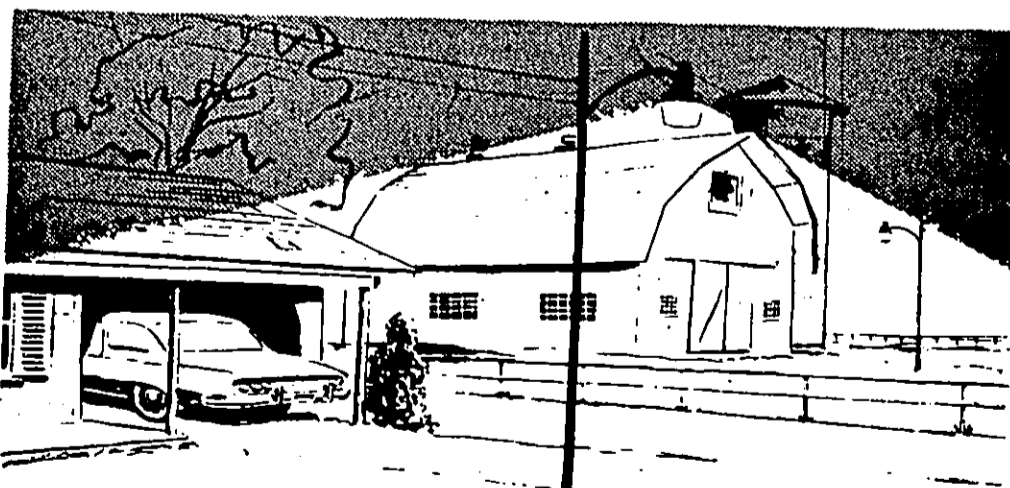

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GARDENING NOTES

Now that we have had good rains and fall seems to have arrived, it should be a busy time for home gardeners. We've had so much hot and dry weather in September so many summer annuals have died out. Now is the time to clean these all up and dig up and fertilize with bone meal, and some superphosphates. There are many new varieties of bulbs on the market in many colors and types and are very beautiful. However, most of these have to be bought and planted each year but we still do have some nice types and colors that will naturally come back and bloom in the same location without being moved. If you already have bulbs of this type out be sure to work some bone meal and superphosphates into the soil about the time the bulbs start coming through the ground. Now is the time to get busy and get beds ready and get your plants out — not later than November if you expect to get early blooms.

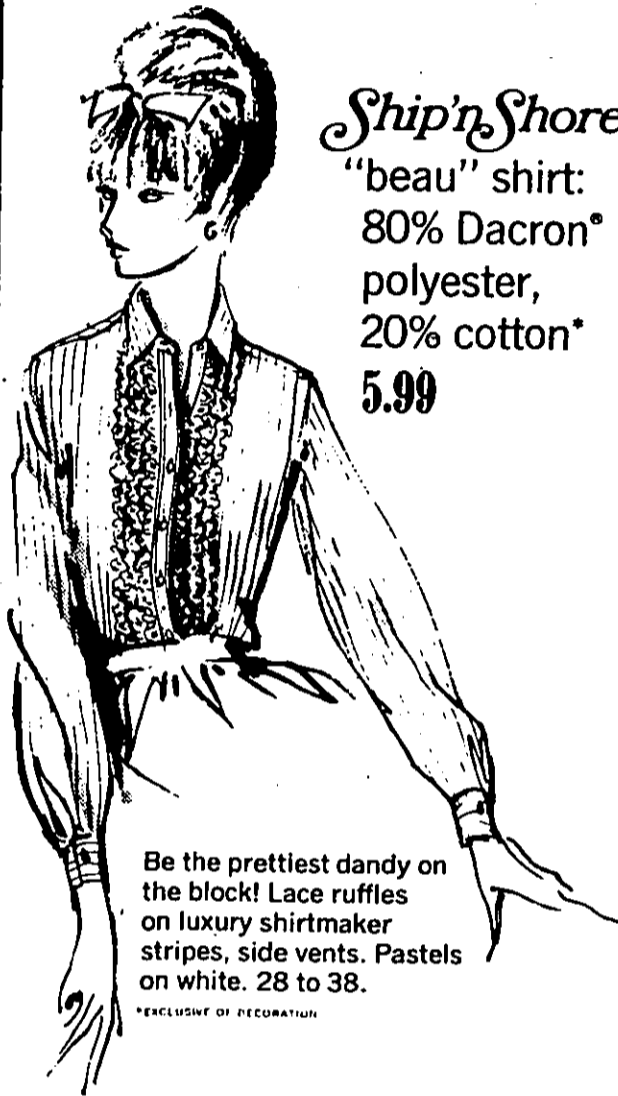
