She is active in church work, and is assistant pianist in the church. She organized a Junior Girls Auxiliary group in the church.

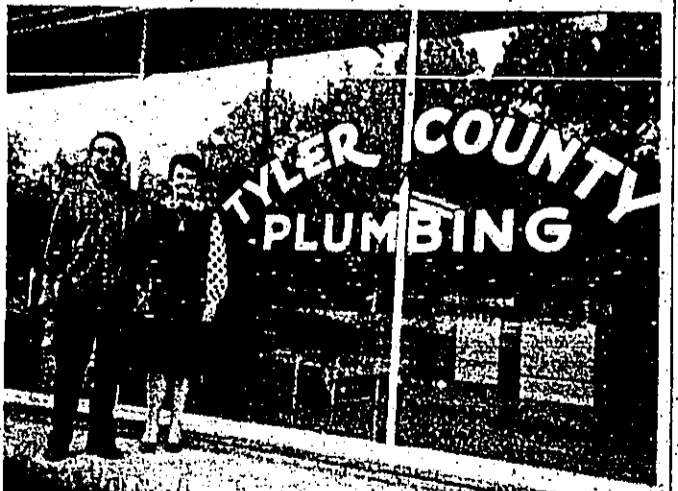

Amendments Election Tuesday

Texas voters will go to the polls November 2 to decide on 10 amendments to the state constitution ranging from an increase in the ad valorem tax rate to four-year terms for state officials and members of the legislature.

A brief summary of each amendment has been prepared by the Texas Legislative Council in Austin. They are as follows:

Amendment No. 1 - Increasing state ad valorem tax by five cents on the \$100 valuation, to be used for building construction for state institutions of higher learning. Amends Section 17, Article VII.

Amendment No. 2 - Authorizing an increase of \$200 million in bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board, and extending program for eight years. Amends Section 49-b, Article III.

Amendment No. 3 - Providing that the Legislature shall enact appropriate legislation to enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Federal Government in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of certain aged, needy and handicapped persons; expanding age categories of those eligible for blind assistance and of needy children; and extending eligibility of the program for the aged to citizens of the United States and non-citizens who have resided in the United States for 25 years. Amends Section 51-a and Subsections 51-a-1 and 51-a-2 of Article III, and incorporates them into one Section 51a, Article III.

Amendment No. 4 - Authorizing four-year terms of office for the Governor, the Secretary of State, and other state officials elected in statewide elections. Amends Sections 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV.

Amendment No. 5 - Clarifying investments authority for the Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System. Amends Article III by adding a new Section 48b, and repeals conflicting authority which exists in Section 48a, Article III.

Amendment No. 6 - Authorizing the Legislature to provide for issuance of bonds to be used in creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund as a loan fund for Texas students attending public and private institutions of higher education within the state. Amends Article III by adding a new Section 50b.

Amendment No. 7 - Exempting certain hospitals expending at least \$1.5 million for free care for indigent from the payment of ad valorem taxes levied by any taxing entity except the state itself. Amends Article VIII by adding a new Section 24-a.

Amendment No. 8 - Providing for automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age and creating a State Judicial Qualifications

commission. Providing for removal of District and Appellate Judges for misconduct, and for retirement of Judges in cases of disability. Amends Section 1-a, Article V.

Amendment No. 9 - Authorizing the Legislature to set the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and the speaker of the House, and increasing per diem pay of members of the Legislature from \$25 per 120 days to \$25 per 140 days during a regular session and \$30 per 140 days during a special session. Amends Section 21, Article III, and Section 17, Article III.

Amendment No. 10 - Providing four-year terms for members of the Texas House of Representatives. Amends Section 4, Article III.

That was agreeable to everyone but the Rice team, which rose up and flogged the Longhorns 20 to 17.

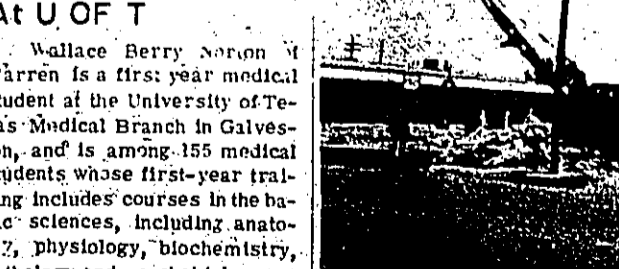

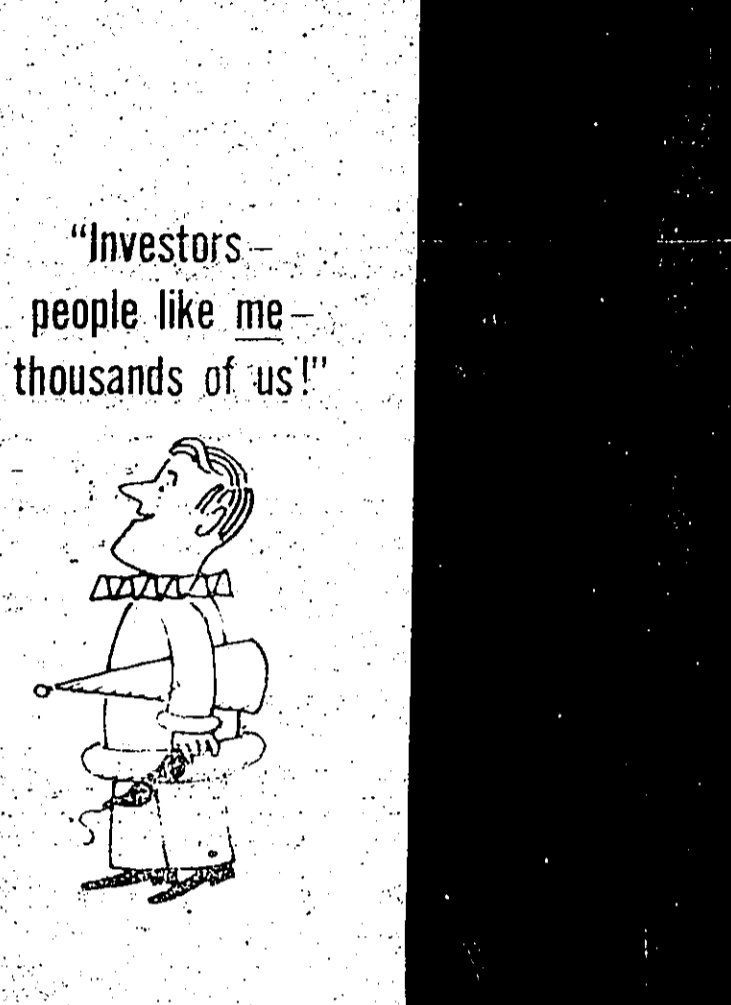

Medical Association

Skate boarding is downright risky.

Broken bones are becoming more common as skate boarding becomes more popular. No one could even begin to count the cases of bruised and skinned knees and elbows. There even have been a few deaths in skate board accidents.

So what's to be done about skate boarding? Should the American Medical Association caution parents to forbid the boards for their offspring? Obviously, it isn't practical to issue a ban against every youthful activity that might result in a skinned knee, or even occasionally in more serious injury. Bicycling also is dangerous. So are roller skates.

Except in those communities that have passed laws making skate boarding illegal, the popular sport is very likely to continue and, unless it proves to be a passing fad, gain even more devotees.

The skate board, incident-

ally, is a small board about two feet long to which are attached roller-skate-type wheels. It is ridden like a surfboard, can be steered somewhat by body movements.

Recognizing that skate boarding, albeit hazardous, is popular, the National Safety Council has drafted a set of safety precautions to help hold down the accident toll.

Public streets should not be used for skate boarding. Neither should driveways that incline into streets.

Confine skate boarding to playgrounds, noncongested sidewalks and restricted portions of parking lots and shopping center parking areas.

Beginners are urged to be mindful of the speed potential and hazard of falling, and confine maneuvers to skill level. Control, not speed, should be stressed. "See" and "Be Seen" are the watchwords.

Check the board frequently to make certain that it is in good working order.

Store boards safely when not in use. Don't leave a board on the walk, driveway or near the stairs.

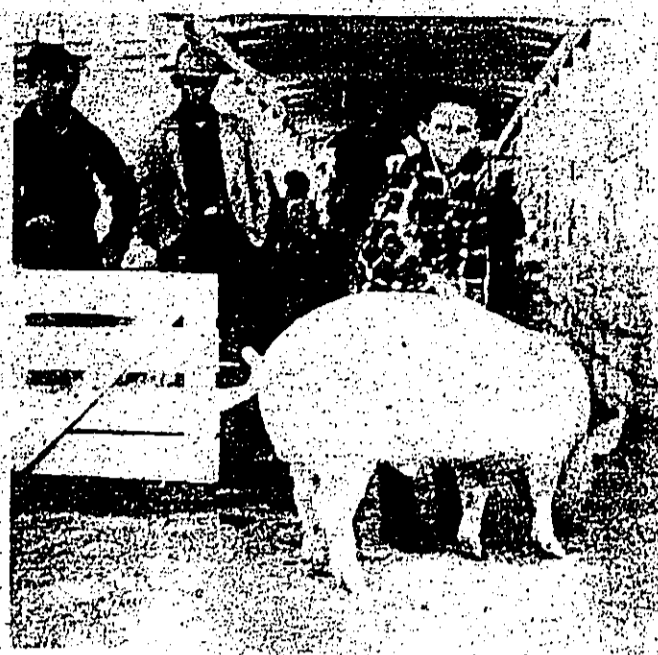
