Eagles Look Sharp In Win Over Newton

The Woodville Eagles scored in the first three quarters to upset the Newton Eagles 20 to 8 before a near capacity crowd here Friday night.

Woodville received the opening kickoff and started toward paydirt on the first series of downs. Woodville quarterback Steve Oates got the Eagles into scoring position as he flipped a 38-yard bomb to end Hugh Howard, penetrating Newton territory.

A few plays later Oates took it in from the one on a sneak for the six points. Kay Thornton kicked the point after.

The Woodville Eagles kept rolling along in the second period of play as Keith Kilgore broke loose for a 25-yard scamper to set Woodville up in scoring position. Eagle quarterback Oates then took the controls and tossed an aerial to left end Roger Wardlaw in the Newton end zone. Thornton kicked to make the score 14 to 0 in favor of Woodville at the half.

The third period of play found Newton unable to cross the Woodville goal line as Woodville continued to add points to its agenda. The Eagles continued to grind out the yardage on the ground and in the air and wound up on the Newton 31.

Then halfback Keith Kilgore brought the fans to their feet as he broke loose and hit the end zone again for six more points. The point after was blocked.

The fourth period of play seemed to pick up the Newton spirit as an alert Newton defensive back picked off a pass from the Woodville quarterback on the Woodville 30. From then on the Newton Eagles marched down the field with halfback Tommy Briggs hitting paydirt from the five. Fullback Joe Noddin bowled over for the two points.

Time ran out for the heavily-favored Eagles and knocked them out of contention for District 22-A honors.

For the Woodville Eagles Richard Winstead, Steve Oates, Keith Kilgore, Roger Connors, David DeLamus were outstanding on offense. John Bestard, Kenneth Weaver, Jay Crews, Hugh Howard and Jerry Tolbert were outstanding on defense. Mike Roberts kept the Newton team at bay with his punting.

The B Team and the Junior High play the last game of the season at Kirbyville Thursday, November 11. The Eagles conclude the 1965 season at Kirbyville Friday night.

The deer hunting season in Tyler County will open Saturday at sunrise and continue through December 31, according to Gene Samford, conservation officer for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The season usually begins on November 15 in counties under state regulatory authority, but the commission decided to open the season a day earlier this year in order to give hunters the advantage of a season opening on Saturday, thus giving them a long opening weekend.

The deer population is plentiful this year and most are in good condition in spite of the

KHS Eagles Go To Kirbyville Friday Night

The Kirby High School Eagles will close the 1965 football season against the Kirbyville Wildcats in Kirbyville Friday night.

Kirbyville has a season record of four wins and five losses. In district play they have won three and lost two. Last Friday night they were swamped by Port Acres 48 to 7.

The KHS Eagles have won two and lost seven games this season. In the district they have two wins against three losses, having defeated Buna 6 to 0 and Newton 20 to 8.

Taking the Port Acres games of the two teams as a barometer, it would seem that the Eagles should be able to break even in district play this season by racking up their third victory.

The game starts at 7:30 in Kirbyville Stadium, and local fans are being urged to follow the team in order to encourage them in this final game of the season.

Chester and Colmesnell will wind up their District 26-B play this week away from home also. Chester will go to Cold Springs, second strongest team in the district with a 3-1 district record.

Colmesnell will go to Evadale, where they should rout the Rebels. Both have identical 1-3 records in district play.

However, Colmesnell has held district opponents to 35 points while scoring 18, and the Rebels have given up 77 points while scoring 22. The stronger Colmesnell defense should be the determining factor in the game.

dry summer. Hunters are expected to take a large percentage of the animals in the county.

Mr. Samford said that the limit is still two buck deer, and that a hunting license with deer tags is necessary. When a buck is killed, a tag should be fastened immediately to the antlers, he said.

Some doe will also be harvested in the northwest part of the county in the Cneater area. Doe permits are being issued to landowners according to the amount of acreage they own, Samford said. The deer population in this area needs thinning out, he said.

Deer herds across the entire state have been estimated by Texas Parks and Wildlife Biologists as the largest ever. The eradication of the screw-worm menace has caused a "population explosion" of young deer in the past two seasons in some areas, although the screw-worm was not as big a problem in this county as in other areas.

The woods will be crowded with hunters this weekend, with out of county hunters in large numbers expected to be here to take advantage of the long opening weekend.

Hunters are warned that permission of landowners should be secured before hunting on private property.

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Garden Clubs Hold

Fall Meet

Garden clubs in District Three were challenged to greater beautification efforts in their towns and communities during the recent fall meeting of the Board for Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. at Fort Worth.

Mrs. A.M. Alkin, Jr., president and former governor of District Three, presided over the session where emphasis was given "Creating and Preserving a More Beautiful Texas." Nearly 200 officers, committee chairmen and club presidents attended the 38th annual meeting.

The Kilgore Council of Garden Clubs was recognized during the symposium on civic development for work with the East Texas Treatment Center, having received a grant from the Sears Roebuck and Company Foundation for garden therapy.

Mrs. Howard Kittel of Fort Worth, Sears Awards Chairman and national civic development chairman, urged garden club members to work for beautification, beginning in a small way and aiming for full community cooperation.

Garden clubs may apply for a Sears Grant to aid beautification projects, by November 15, to the district governor.

Mrs. Kittel was endorsed by Mrs. Robert Dooley, Dallas, announced a slogan contest for the "Beautiful Texas" Committee, offering fifty dollars for the best entry not to exceed seven words, mailed to her by March 1, 1966.

Plans were made for two symposiums of advanced flower show schools, to be held in Dallas or Fort Worth, the second week of September, 1966, and in San Antonio in 1967.

State conventions were announced for Dallas, April 11-13, 1966; and May 1-4, 1967 at Houston together with the South-Central Regional meeting.

A new series of Landscape Design Schools will begin with the October 3-5, 1966 school

at the University of Missouri, St. Louis, Missouri.

Q. - Can you please tell me where I may obtain a record or discharge of a man who was in the Navy during the years 1915 to 1918?

A. - You might write to the Officer in Charge, Discharged-Enlisted Personnel Records Branch, U.S. Naval Records Management Center, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, Missouri.

Q. - Could you tell me if my husband is eligible for a GI loan? He was inducted into the service in March, 1943 and was discharged in February, 1946.

A. - He would appear to be eligible. By adding, according to the formula, ten years to his date of discharge, (February, 1946 to February, 1956) and then one year for each 90 days he was on active duty (there are 11 such 90-day periods in his two years and 11 months of service) we reach February, 1967 as the expiration period for his entitlement. However, he should check with his VA regional office to make this more explicit by using the actual date of induction and discharge.

The 1966 Fall Board meeting will be in Odessa, October 25-27.

VA QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q. - I applied for and have been accepted for the newly re-opened NSLI Insurance. I now find that the payments for \$10,000 are too expensive for me. Can I reduce this amount?

A. - Yes. You can reduce it to any amount in excess of \$1,000 in multiples of \$500.

BOBWHITE QUAIL SEASON OPENS FRIDAY IN MOST COUNTIES IN STATE

Before the ink is good and dry in this newspaper, bobwhite quail season will be open in many East Texas counties. Regulatory counties will call November 13 the opener, while general law season opens on December 1. John M. Carlisle of the Parks and Wildlife Department is interested in passing along some special provisions in a few of the Region III counties.

In Camp, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Rains, Upshur, Van

Zandt and Wood Counties, quail may not be hunted on Sunday. In Rains County, quail may be hunted on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday only, unless one of these days is a legal holiday, then quail may be hunted the following day, unless that day falls on Sunday.

The daily bag limit in counties in East Texas Region III is 12 birds, and the possession limit in most of them is birds, but a few have no possession limit, such as Smith, Kaufman and Wood.

INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE

Q. - A friend of mine is still liable for his Federal taxes even though he went bankrupt. Why does he still owe for taxes and not for anything else?
A. - The law provides that although commercial debts of a legally declared bankrupt are dissolved, federal taxes remain a legally collectible debt.

Q. - I regularly purchase U.S. Savings Bonds for my daughter to pay for her college education. If these bonds are registered in her name, does she have to file tax returns reporting the accrued interest each year even though it is her only income and is less than \$600?
A. - No. Generally, interest income from bonds purchased by a parent with his own funds for minor children is taxable to the parent. This would apply in the case you cite where the child is made co-owner of the bonds. Savings bonds interest should be reported for the year in which the bonds are cashed, unless you choose to report the interest as it accrues each year.

Q. - Can I still claim my kids as exemptions for withholding purposes even though I am divorced and my wife got custody?
A. - You may claim them as exemptions for withholding tax purposes only if they will qualify as your dependents. Generally, this means that you must provide more than one-half the total support for the year. This subject is explained in detail in Document No. 5013, "Personal Exemptions and Dependents," available free at your Internal Revenue office.

Q. - When I sold my house last year, I thought I was going to buy another within a year. But we decided to live in an apartment instead. Should I report the profit that I made on the sale on this year's return, or do I file an amended return for last year?
A. - You should file an amended return for last year.

In a situation like yours, when there is a question of whether you will be buying another home, it is better to report the gain and pay the tax in the year the sale is made. If you buy another home within a year after the sale, you may file a claim for refund of the tax you paid on this gain. When you file an amended return to report the gain and to pay additional tax, you will be charged interest if you had

reported the gain in the year of sale, you would receive interest with your refund.

Q. - My fiancée and I are planning a December wedding. Will that entitle us to file jointly as a married couple for the entire year?
A. - Yes it will. Marital status is determined as of the last day of the tax year.

Q. - How long do you have to keep stock to qualify for a long-term capital gain?
A. - More than six months.

Q. - I just got a job through an employment agency. Will the fee be deductible when I file my Federal income tax return?
A. - Yes, it is a deductible expense if you itemize deductions.

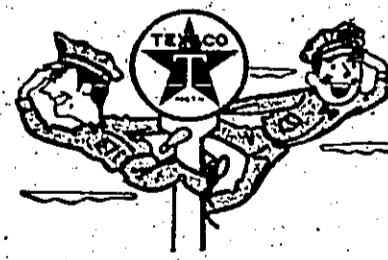
