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Commissioners Vote No On Auditor

Tyler County's commissioners court Friday voted again not to hire a full-time auditor at this time.

The thorny question was brought up at the regular Monday session. The court recessed until Friday morning for a final vote on the question.

The vote Friday was two for hiring an auditor and three against. County Judge Jeff Mooney and Precinct One Commissioner Joe L. Best cast the two votes for, while Commissioners Leon Fowler, Herman Powell and French Hicks voted against the motion.

In explaining his vote, Mr. Fowler said that he was for an auditor if the court could find a way to pay the salary and office expense. He said that he felt that by next year the county's valuations will be above the 15 million dollar mark, and that by state law the county will be required to have an auditor. This year's valuations are 14.7 million dollars, he pointed out, and very little increase will be necessary and with the growth of the county valuations should easily go up another \$300,000.

Mr. Powell also explained that he was for hiring an auditor at such time as he felt the county can pay him.

County Judge Jeff Mooney, in speaking for the hiring of an auditor, said that he felt the commissioners court needed help in straightening out the county's deficit financial condition. He said that the county has about borrowed its limit at the bank, and will have to start paying this back next year. He said that an auditor could help the county's spending and help the commissioners court straighten out the county's financial plight.

In other business at the Friday session, the commissioners court voted to ask for bids on a five-year dump truck for precinct three and a two and one-half ton truck for precinct one.

Port Acres To Play Crockett

The Port Acres Eagles will clash with the Crockett Bulldogs Friday night in Sam Houston Stadium at Huntsville in a B-District game of interest here.

Port Acres won District 22-AA this season without too much trouble. Woodville played in this district.

Crockett was winner of District 21-AA, the district in which Woodville will play next year.

Game time will be at 7:45 p.m. Huntsville is 70 miles from Woodville, but many local fans have indicated that they will see this game if possible.

Both Crockett and Port Acres have 9-1 season records. Port Acres lost one non-district game to Kirwin of Galveston, winner of Catholic District I. Crockett lost its game to the Cleveland Indians of District 21-AA and finished the season in a three-way tie with Cleveland and Rusk. A flip of a coin to determine which team would represent the district was won by Crockett.

Tyler County Gets Designation For Economic Program

Tyler County is one of 69 Texas counties, most of them in the eastern part of the state, which have been designated as qualifying for grants, loans, and technical assistance under the new economic development administration.

The announcement from the office of Presidential Press Secretary Bill Moyers said that 1280 nationwide counties are designated for the program designed to create permanent new jobs in areas of high unemployment or low family income.

The areas are qualified under the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965 which set aside \$3.25 billion over a five year period to aid sections "which are not keeping pace with the rest of the nation."

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Speaks Here Today



Congressman John Dowdy

Congressman John Dowdy of Athens will be the principal speaker at the regional meeting of the Texas Municipal League which will be held at Woodville Community Inn tonight.

Representatives of cities and towns throughout Region 16 will attend the meeting with the City of Woodville being host city.

Rep. Dowdy, a native Texas, was first elected to Congress in 1952 and has been re-elected each two years since that time. He has been a member of the House Administration Committee, the Post Office and Civil Service Committee, serving as chairman of the Postal Operations Subcommittee in 1955 and 1956. He is presently a member of the Judiciary and District Committees.

In the re-districting of Texas Congressional districts by the last legislature, Tyler County and other counties of the old Second District except Jefferson were placed in the new Second District which includes the home of Rep. Dowdy. He will be the incumbent congressman in this district if the courts uphold the redistricting act.

Rep. Dowdy's paternal grandfather brought his family to Texas prior to the Civil War, settling in Cherokee County. As a child, Rep. Dowdy lived in Rusk and went to grade school there. He graduated from high school in Henderson in the spring of 1928. That summer he attended Waco Business College. After working a year he went to Marshall, got a part-time job and obtained two years of college education at the then Marshall College, now the East Texas Baptist College.

In the spring of 1932 he went to work in a law office in Center as a secretary and in August of the same year became official court reporter of the newly established 123rd judicial district and served in that capacity until about January 1, 1937. As of that date he accepted employment as official court reporter of the third judicial district and moved to Athens. He served as third district court reporter until January 1, 1945.

Rep. Dowdy took the State Bar Examination in June 1940, making the highest average grade of those taking it at the time. He received his license to practice in September 1940.

In 1944 he made the race for district attorney of the third judicial district and was elected, taking office January 1, 1945. He was serving his fourth term as district attorney when he was elected to congress in 1952.

Taxpaying voters will vote Tuesday in an election to give the City of Woodville authority to issue revenue bonds for constructing extensions and improvements in the city's waterworks and natural gas systems.

Voters will be asked to decide on three propositions. Proposition 1 will be for issuing \$69,000 in revenue bonds for the purpose of paying off, refunding and cancelling an equal amount of outstanding indebtedness in waterworks and sewer system revenue bonds dated October 1, 1950.

Proposition 2 will seek authorization to issue \$166,000 of revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing extensions and improvements to the city's waterworks system.

Proposition 3 is for the issuance of \$25,000 in revenue bonds for extensions and improvements of the city's natural gas system.

The voters will be asked to be retired from the city's waterworks and natural gas systems and will increase the city's indebtedness. city officials point out.

Since \$69,000 will be used to retire old revenue bonds, the new revenues will increase the city's indebtedness by \$15,000 to be retired over a period of years.

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LETTER FROM CITY OFFICIALS . . .

Ask Vote For Bonds

Mayor E. W. Gassiot and the City Council this week released a letter in support of the city revenue bond election Tuesday in which they explain the reason for the need for the improvements to the city's waterworks and natural gas systems.

Text of the letter follows:

During the past year your City Council has made a thorough and complete study of the water system of the City of Woodville and has found it wholly inadequate in every respect.

Our engineers have recently completed a master water plan and have supplied us with cost estimates for construction and improvements they thought was necessary to give us a much needed up-to-date system. After studying these estimates and plans our next problem was how to finance these improvements and upon examination of the city's financial condition we find that the costs can be paid out of our revenues, WITHOUT THE NECESSITY OF RAISING TAXES OR VALUATIONS. We have made an application to the Federal government for a grant to match our funds and we were recently advised by Congressman Jack Brooks that funds for this purpose will more than likely be appropriated in the very near future, therefore, for the best interest for the citizens of Woodville, we have called a REVENUE bond issue to be voted on Tuesday, November 23rd, 1965. We are submitting to you three propositions, namely:

1. Issuance of \$69,000.00 in revenue bonds for the purpose of paying off an equal amount of existing outstanding bonds.
2. Issuance of \$166,000.00 revenue bonds for the purpose of new construction and improvements to the city water system.
3. Issuance of \$25,000.00 revenue bonds for the purpose of new construction and improvements to the city gas system.

The reason for proposition No. 1 to pay off existing outstanding bonds in the amount of \$69,000.00 is that by consolidating our old and new indebtedness it will only require an additional \$3,000.00 per year to pay both principal and interest on the propositions. We are asking you to vote FOR. In other words, we are consolidating our debts and extending the time of payment.

From our study of our present system we find that we only have 50,000 gallons of overhead, or pressure, storage and in the event of a power failure, as recently experienced in New York City, we have approximately 4 hours supply of water. We have ground storage facilities of 120,000 gallons but this must be pumped overhead to obtain water pressure. It is planned to construct a 250,000 gallon elevated tank which will give good pressure to all parts of the city and we plan to construct a new well and a ground storage tank of 500,000 gallons in the south part of town. This ground storage tank will be equipped with auxiliary power, run by natural gas, which can pump water to the elevated tank in the event of extended power failure.

We found that many parts of town is without ample pressure and fire protection due to the lack of water mains too small to carry fire plugs. We also found that many of our large lines are dead ended. It is planned to so enlarge our distribution system so as to enable us to install enough new fire plugs to give fire protection to each building within a 500 foot radius. It is planned to install new water mains so as to loop all existing dead end lines which will do away with "dead water" and supply the city with fresh palatable water. We are informed by the Texas Fire Commission that the citizens of Woodville are heavily penalized in computing the key rate for insurance premiums due to the lack of adequate water supply and fire plugs.

On examination we find that our present wells have an excessive amount of carbon dioxide gas and it is not only distasteful but is highly corrosive to water lines, valves and fittings and is the cause of our "red water". It is planned to construct new aeration improvements which should take care of this problem.

Due to the growth of our city and the recently new annexed neighborhoods there is an increasing demand on our gas systems, we feel that in order to maintain adequate pressure and service it is necessary to construct some new high pressure lines and another supply line from the pipe line (south of Doucette) into the city.

We have very carefully studied the program as outlined above and it is our firm belief that these improvements are sorely needed for our water and gas system. Remember, this bond issue will be paid for from our water and gas revenues AND THERE WILL NOT BE ANY ADDITIONAL COST TO THE TAXPAYER.

We respectfully submit these issues to you for your consideration.

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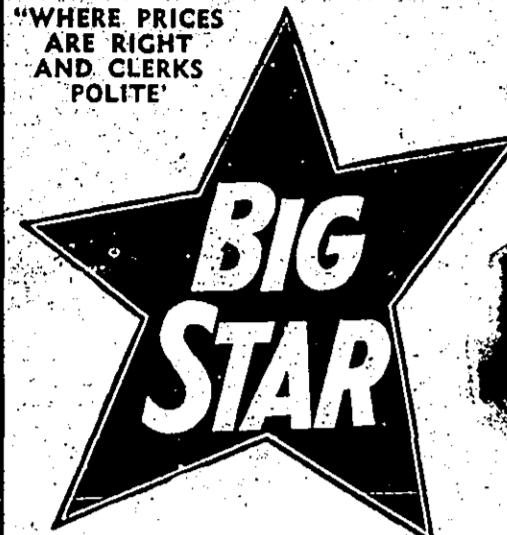

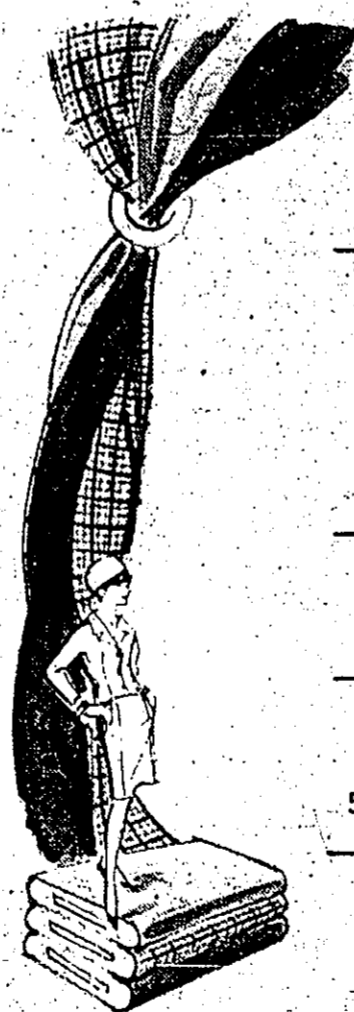
