Vocational Nursing School To Open At Hospital Jan. 24

The Tyler County Hospital will open its School of Vocational Nursing on January 24, 1966. Those interested in this school should contact the hospital before January 1, 1966 since no application can be taken after that date.

Applicants for admission must be between the ages of 17, and 55 and must have an educational background which includes at least two years of high school.

All applicants must pass a physical examination before their applications are considered. An admissions committee has been appointed which will interview each candidate and evaluate their aptitude for nursing.

The tuition fee for the entire course will be \$90.00 and there will be an additional charge of approximately \$30 for books and supplies.

The course will last for one full year and at the end of that time, the students will be eligible to take the state examination for their LVN 11cense.

duced under federal inspection. The Consumer and Marketing Service does not permit the use of aromatic or tragrant scents in the packaging or wrapping of federally inspected meat and meat products, . nor can scented literature or other enclosures be included in the package. This prohibition helps protect you, the consumer, because added aroma or fragance could cover up the odor of spoiled or tainted meat.

CHICKEN CASSEROLE DISHES

Stretch your food dollars with plentiful broilers.

You can get 10 or 12 servings from a three pound brioler using these recipes suggested:

he-MAN CHICKEN CASSEROLE: Dip disjoined frying chicken in flour. Brown in hot fat until crispy. Drain on absorbent paper. Prepare smooth egg batter (using flour, salt, baking powder, butter and eggs). Pour batter into a greased baking Place browned chicken in batter. Bake in moderate oven until batter is golden brown. Serve with giblet gravy. CHICKEN CREOLE: Saute disjoined chicken until brown In seperate frying pan, saute diced bacon and ham. Add chopped onion to bacon and saute. Add tomatoes, chopped parsley, thyme and okra. Simmer. Add browned chicken and simmer

until chicken is fork tender. Serve on bed of rice. ONE MEAL CHICKEN CASSEROLE: Rub fresh lemon into skin of disjoined frying chicken. Fry chicken in butter to golden brown. Romove chicken, place in casserole and add small white potatoes, whole carrotts, turnips cut in inch and 1/2 cubes, celery slices. Brown vegetables. Place vegetables in casserole on top of chicken. Prepare gravy from drippings. Add diced mushroom to gravy and pour over vegetables and chicken. Tightly cover casserole. Bake in moderate oven for one hour. If desired, on bay leaf may be placed on top of gravy during cooking. Be sure to remove bay leaf bafore serving!!

CHICKEN BAKED WITH ALMONDS. Saute disjoined, flour dredged frying chicken. Place in casserole. Baster generously with butter. Add about 1/4 cup water. Place tightlyfitting cover on casserole and bake until fork tender. While chicken is baking, prepare sauce by sauteing onion in chicken drippings. Add chicken stock and medium white sauce in equal portions. Mix thoroughly. Add whole cloves and bit of bay leaf. Cook about 5 minutes, stirring constantly until smooth. Aid raisins and almonds Mix beaten egg yolks with heavy cream and add to mixture. Serve over chow mein noodles.
