In the October 28 issue of the Georgetown Sun is an interesting story on "The Doctors Three", who were having an open house on a new wing of their privately-owned hospital, the Georgetown Medical and Surgical Clinic.

The article related that three young doctors had taken a calculated risk to invest \$150,000 to add a new wing to a hospital that was already losing money. Then they planned to remodel the old part of the hospital. The whole idea is to enlarge and modernize the hospital to make it more economical to operate and perhaps get it in the black.

The article says that besides being unique in the fact of its private ownership, the Clinic's new west wing has so many firsts for a Georgetown hospital that somebody may have to start a "Who's Who for Hospitals" just so this

one can be properly credited. "For instance, the TV sets and personal phones in the new private room might beat the heck out of staying home evenings. Besides that the private baths and piped-in oxygen to every room sounds good for a man with five children, or even fewer," the article continues.

"Other commodious categories are the new operating suite, new emergency room facility, new laboratory, expanded x-ray facilities, new kitchen and new nurses call system."

What makes this interesting here is that one of the "Doctors Three" mentioned in the article is a Woodville product, Dr. James Shepherd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Shepherd. The other two, just for the record, are Hal Gaddy, Jr. and Douglas M. Benold.

Colmesneil School Bond Vote Slated

The Colmesneil School Board, in a call meeting November 16, ordered an election to be held on Saturday, December 11, for the purpose of voting on the propositions as described in petitions which had been presented to the board.

H.A. Crews was appointed Election Judge, E.C. Harden, Mrs. Faye Seamans and Mrs. Mattie Fortenberry were appointed clerks to help hold the election. The Community Center in Colmesneil was designated as the voting place for the election.

The petitions are as follows: PETITION FOR ELECTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTIES OF TYLER AND JASPER COLMESNEIL INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF COLMESNEIL INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

We, the undersigned resident qualified property tax-paying voters of Colmesneil Independent School District, who own taxable property in said District and who have

fully rendered the same for taxation, respectfully pray your Honorable Body to order an election in said District at the earliest date practicable, but within thirty (30) days from the date of the election order, for the purpose of submitting the following propositions to the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of said School District for their action thereon: PROPOSITION NO. 1

SHALL the Board of Trustees of Colmesneil Independent School District be authorized to assess, levy and collect an annual ad valorem tax of not to exceed \$1.50 on each \$100 valuation of taxable property in said District for the further maintenance of public free schools, as authorized by Chapter 528, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session (Senate Bill No. 116), as amended, provided that such tax shall not exceed in any year the limits prescribed by said Chapter 528? PROPOSITION NO. 2

SHALL the Colmesneil Independent School District, as the same now exists, assume and pay off certain outstanding bonds which were issued prior to the formation of the present District, said outstanding bonds being described as follows: ISSUED BY UNLIMITED TAX DATE 7-1-1961 INT. RATE - 4% & 4-1/2% AMOUNT OF ORIGINAL ISSUE - \$20,000 AMOUNT NOW OUTSTANDING \$16,000

and shall the Board of Trustees of Colmesneil Independent School District be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding, a tax upon all taxable property within said District, sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay the principal at maturity? No mistake in the description of the aforesaid bonded indebtedness, or other wise, shall in any way affect the amount of debt to be assumed, it being the intent hereof for the present Colmesneil Independent School District to assume all bonded indebtedness now outstanding against the territory thereof. PROPOSITION NO. 8

SHALL the Board of Trustees of Colmesneil Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of said School District to the amount of \$250,000, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum, and maturing serially or otherwise in such installments as are fixed by said Board of Trustees, with a maximum maturity not to exceed thirty (30) years from their date, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, repair and equipment of public free school buildings within the limits of such District, and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall the Board of Trustees be authorized to assess, levy and collect taxes annually in an amount and at a rate sufficient on each \$100 valuation principal of such bonds, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of Texas, and particularly Chapter 528, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session (Senate Bill No. 116), as amended?

He has served the people as a public servant for about 28 years, serving in both the US Naval Airforce and the Texas Department of Public Safety. He has retired from both services.

He states that "I earnestly seek each and every vote in the district, and when elected I pledge to serve as a full time representative of the people."

Vocational Nursing School To Open At Hospital Jan. 24

The Tyler County Hospital will open its School of Vocational Nursing on January 24, 1966. Those interested in this school should contact the hospital before January 1, 1966 since no application can be taken after that date.

Applicants for admission must be between the ages of 17 and 55 and must have an educational background which includes at least two years of high school.

All applicants must pass a physical examination before their applications are considered. An admissions committee has been appointed which will interview each candidate and evaluate their aptitude for nursing.

The tuition fee for the entire course will be \$30.00 and there will be an additional charge of approximately \$30.00 for books and supplies.

The course will last for one full year and at the end of that time, the students will be eligible to take the state examination for their LVN license.

The various projects available under the Economic Development Act through a Community Action Committee was explained to a group of local people Monday night by Robert Watts of the State Economic Opportunity office.

Next Monday night another meeting will be held at which it is hoped that a Community Action Committee representing all of the county can be organized. This committee will be the administering agency in the county for any projects to employ needy persons under the Economic Development Act.

The meeting will be held in the district court room beginning at 7 p.m., and all interested persons are strongly urged to be present, State Rep. J.E. Miller said.

Mr. Miller urged that a good representation attend from all areas of Tyler County, Jasper and Newton counties, with which Tyler County will be grouped for assistance under the program, have organized committees and Tyler County needs to do so as soon as possible in order to get the program going, Miller said.

You will find the ingredients listed on the label of frankfurters; or any processed meats inspected for wholesomeness by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

For example, when you see the term "all beef" on federally inspected frankfurters, you can be sure that only beef is used.

In fact, federal meat inspectors do not even permit scraps of cut-off beef fat or other beef by-products to be used in frankfurters labeled as "all beef" when they are produced under federal inspection.

The Consumer and Marketing Service does not permit the use of aromatic or fragrant scents in the packaging or wrapping of federally inspected meat and meat products, nor can scented literature or other enclosures be included in the package. This prohibition helps protect you, the consumer, because added aroma or fragrance could cover up the odor of spoiled or tainted meat.

CHICKEN CASSEROLE DISHES

Stretch your food dollars with plentiful broilers. You can get 10 or 12 servings from a three pound broiler using these recipes suggested:

HE-MAN CHICKEN CASSEROLE: Dip disjointed frying chicken in flour. Brown in hot fat until crispy. Drain on absorbent paper. Prepare smooth egg batter (using flour, salt, baking powder, butter and eggs). Pour batter into a greased baking dish. Place browned chicken in batter. Bake in moderate oven until batter is golden brown. Serve with giblet gravy.

CHICKEN CREOLE: Sauté disjointed chicken until brown in separate frying pan, sauté diced bacon and ham. Add chopped onion to bacon and sauté. Add tomatoes, chopped parsley, thyme and okra. Simmer. Add browned chicken and simmer until chicken is fork tender. Serve on bed of rice.

ONE MEAL CHICKEN CASSEROLE: Rub fresh lemon into skin of disjointed frying chicken. Fry chicken in butter to golden brown. Remove chicken, place in casserole and add small white potatoes, whole carrots, turnips cut in inch and 1/2 cubes, celery slices. Brown vegetables. Place vegetables in casserole on top of chicken. Prepare gravy from drippings. Add diced mushroom to gravy and pour over vegetables and chicken. Tightly cover casserole. Bake in moderate oven for one hour. If desired, on bay leaf may be placed on top of gravy during cooking. Be sure to remove bay leaf before serving!

CHICKEN BAKED WITH ALMONDS: Place in casserole. Sauté disjointed, flour dredged frying chicken. Fry chicken in butter to golden brown. Remove chicken, place in casserole and add small white potatoes, whole carrots, turnips cut in inch and 1/2 cubes, celery slices. Brown vegetables. Place vegetables in casserole on top of chicken. HOLIDAY FOODS AND CALORIES

For example, if a weight-watcher eats a high-calorie food, he must watch his consumption of other high-calorie food. Second helpings should be avoided. Many traditional holiday foods are not only delicious, but are also low in calories. Refer to the following list of holiday foods for a calorie guide. The calorie count will vary somewhat due to the difference in recipes.

APPETIZERS: Cranberry juice, 4 oz. glass-75; eggnog, 8 oz. glass-250; grapefruit juice, 4 oz. glass-45; cream of mushroom soup, 3/4 cup-105; tomato juice, 4 oz. glass, 25; cream of tomato soup, 3/4 cup-150.

SALADS AND DRESSINGS: Waldorf Salad, 1/2 cup-185; blue cheese dressing, 1 tablespoon-75; ripe olives, 3-30; Cranberry Sauce, 2 tablespoons-70; french dressing, 1 tablespoon-60; mayonaise, 1 T-90.

MAIN DISHES: Harvard Beets, 1/2 cup-120; buttered broccoli, 1/2 cup-40; giblet gravy, 1/2 cup-150; creamed onions, 1/2 cup-135; bread
