Dowdy To Speak Here At Kiwanis Installation

U. S. Rep. John Dowdy of Athens will be the speaker at the installation banquet of the Kiwanis Club of Woodville Tuesday night at Woodville Community Inn.

Clay Miller will be installed as new president of the club. Other officers to be installed will be M. C. Prince, vice president; George A. Reynolds, secretary; and Dallas A. Pelly, treasurer.

Elected to serve on the board of directors are Hugh Patrick, Robert Jackson, Eugene Shepherd, David Hall, Jack Haynes, and David Mann. Grover C. Mixon will be the installing officer.

This will be the second appearance of Congressman Dowdy in Woodville. He recently spoke before the reg-

ional meeting of the Texas Municipal Association here. Congressman Dowdy will be incumbent from the second Congressional district under the redistricting bill passed by the last legislature. There are 18 counties in the new district.

Rep. Dowdy will arrive early Tuesday and will be in the county court room from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m., and said that he invites everyone to come by and visit with him. Tyler County is one of eight new counties which was added to his congressional district, and he wants to meet as many of his new constituents as possible. Any legislative proposals or problems which anyone wants to discuss can be discussed at that time, he said.

Mobil X-ray Unit To Be In Woodville

A mobil x-ray unit from the Beaumont Tuberculosis Association will be in Woodville Tuesday to make chest x-rays for school children and the public.

The bus will be located in front of the administration office at Woodville Schools Tuesday morning from 9:30 to 11:30. In the afternoon it will be parked on the courthouse square from 12:15 to 4:00 p.m.

Charge for a chest x-ray will be \$1.50, which is less than the cost of the film and processing. Usual charge for such a chest x-ray when done in a private clinic is \$15.

The low cost of \$1.50 is made possible by the sale of Christmas seals.

Annual chest x-rays are recommended for all adults and especially for those who work among the public. All county residents are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to have chest x-rays made at this low fee.

A. L. (Pete) Thornton, county tax assessor-collector, this week reminded Tyler County residents that to vote in state and county elections they will have to have a poll tax receipt.

Poll taxes are on sale at the tax office in Woodville and at several sub-stations over the county. Places where they may be purchased besides the tax office are the Warren School, Tarkenton, Fred Groceries in Fred, Jack Jordan Mercantile in Spuriger, Dam B Beauty Salon, Pete Dean Grocery in Colmesneil, Carl May Store in Rockland and Ray Tremble's in Chester.

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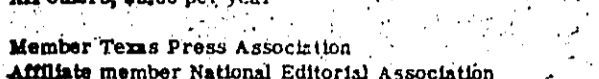
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Warren FHA Sets Show Monday

Want a free booklet on Texas fishing? One with tips, baits, hints, recipes, all designed to make fishing more fun? Drop a card or letter to the Parks & Wildlife Department, John Reagan Building, Austin, and ask for a copy of Let's Go Fishing.

The booklet has the world's freshwater fish size records with names of fish, weight of the record catch, where the fish was caught, who caught it and when.

It has a De-Lite's table to give the angler the approximate weight of his catch without using scales. Lengths are detailed and applied to weights. It's a cruel way to make a tippet out of your fishing buddy, but it also keeps him honest.

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CURRIE'S AG NOTES

Feedlot cattle decrease in feed efficiency after 112 days. Research done at Texas A&M University's Coastal Bend Experiment Station near Bayville, indicates the cost of cattle feeding goes up considerably after the cattle have been on feed for 112 days.

Why does the cost go up? Ed Neal and Bill Conrad, in charge of beef cattle research at Bayville, say their tests show a sharp decrease in the conversion of feed to gain in the cattle after 112 days. This means an increase in the amount of feed required to make a unit of gain with the end result a higher feed bill for the cattlemen.

In the experiment at the A&M field station, after 112 days in the feedlot, cattle in one group required 684 pounds of feed to make 100 pounds gain. At this conversion ratio, the research figured a selling price of \$19.68 per cwt. was needed to break even on cost of the ration and purchase price of the cattle.

But, as the feeding time for the same group was increased to 140 days, feed required to make 100 pounds of gain jumped to 785 pounds—and a break-even price of \$20.52 per cwt. was needed (an increase of \$4 per cwt.). The researchers point out that the price of cattle may not increase this much in 28 days, in fact, it may decrease or stay the same.

This was just one case, other producing similar results. And in every instance, an increase in selling price was needed to break even, as the feed cost increased.

The A&M researchers hasten to point out that 112 days on feed isn't a magic number, by anyone's standards—but their tests, a significant jump.

Gift Wraps Give Scope for Imagination

What's new in gift wrapping for Christmas? Gift wraps and greeting cards that coordinate, lavish gold foil seals in a variety of holiday inspired shapes, ribbons in multi-hues and velvet-textured are among the latest fashions in package wrappings.

Paper velours and other luxurious fabric-like papers are widely available.

Tissue paper, once the only gift wrapping material, makes a comeback this Christmas. Bright red, white and green tissues now get competition from such shades as coral, lavender, gold and red.

In short, gift wrappings are more luxurious than ever. But there's still scope for the imagination.

With the abundant assortment of distinctive wrappings available, the creative approach to gift packaging gets a boost. Whatever effect the package-wraper would like to achieve, there's a wrapping material to provide it.

One idea might be to make the gift package a gift in itself. Start with a box, round, square or oblong. A matched set of two or three boxes can be especially useful for closets, accessories, or for use on a desk or vanity table.

When trimming boxes, it is easiest to start by lining the inside with a high gloss paper foil. Extend the liner over the rim and secure to outside with cellophane tape. For the outside, select either an embossed foil or a textured velour. This can be secured with white paste. Braids, ribbons or other trims may be attached, too.

Boxes designed to be living gifts can also hold many little gifts. A vanity-table box, for instance, might be filled with cosmetics or perfumes.

NEW FOR gift wrapping are colorful tissue papers, matching papers and cards, and stretch-fit housework decorations such as the Santa here.





HOMEMADE COOKIES SAY 'MERRY CHRISTMAS' OVERSEAS

Dear Cece: My boyfriend is in the service and won't be home for Christmas. I'd like to send him a box of homemade cookies. How can I pack them so they won't crumble?

Linda.

Dear Linda: For shipping, forget the fragile butter cookies and select a hard-type cookie, such as brownies or chewy fruit bars. You might ship two different types such as a Chocolate Chip Bar Cookie and Buttercookie or Dale Salt Squares. These cookies pack and ship well. For maximum protection, start with a sturdy box and line it with paper towels. A bright yellow or turquoise paper towel will add color to the box. Cut the cookies into bars and wrap individually in Cello-Kle-Wax Paper or Plastic Wrap. The new plastic sandwich bags with the self-sealing flaps are ideally suited to hold a number of the bar cookies. Put a layer of chocolate paper in the box and lay the packages directly together on the paper. Alternate layers of cookie packages and shredded paper, insulating and finish with enough shredded paper filling over the top of the cookies to act as padding. The box should be so full that you have to press

Here's Delicious Holiday Relish

CRANBERRY CANNED ORANGES

Cranberry canned oranges make an unusual and delicious relish to go with holiday meat or poultry.

Place 8 small oranges in a saucepan and cover them with water. Cover pan and bring to a boil. Cook about 5 minutes, or until orange peels are pierced easily with toothpick. Drain oranges and arrange orange pieces in shallow heat-proof casserole.

Top with 2 cups of fresh cranberries and syrup made by heating 1 1/2 cups of sugar with 1 cup of water. 4 whole cloves and 6 whole allspice. Cover and bake 50 to 60 minutes in preheated 350-degree oven. Makes about 1 quart.

UNIQUE FOODS FOR YULETIDE

Many nations have unique Christmas food traditions. In Armenia, boiled spinach is eaten because it is believed that Mary did so the night before her son was born. In Holland, small gifts are hidden in pudding. In Scandinavia, a large rice pudding containing a single almond is prepared in the belief that the person receiving the portion with the almond will be married before the following Christmas. In Poland, waters are exchanged between friends instead of gifts, and they is spread under the Christmas dinner tablecloth. In Chile, Monkey's Tail, a cold beverage composed of alcohol, coffee, milk and egg, is served. In French Canada, the cat is always fed well at Christmastime because it is considered bad luck if there is a mew on Christmas Eve.

Santa Was Referee

The first Christmas play was performed in 1715 Century England. Tom Jones' "Masque of Christmas" dramatized the triumph of good over evil, which were represented by a knight on a wooden hobby horse and a dragon. Father Christmas, symbolizing truth, acted as referee.

Gift Shopping For Children?
