baby. The gifts should be picked up at the various stores following the doctor's certifying the first arrival.

The rules in the contest are simple. The baby must be born in the local hospital and the parents must be residents of Tyler County or the Indian reservation, part of which is in the county.

In case of a tie, a committee will be named to pick the winning baby. However, likeligood of a tie is remote.

Besides the gifts from local merchants, the baby will be photographed by the Booster before it leaves the hospital and at three-month intervals. Prints of the photographs will be presented to the parents and will also be printed in the Boo-

Tyler Countians are reminded by A.L. Thornton, tax assessor and collector, that January 31 is the deadline for paying poll taxes. This is an election year, and as far as can be seen now a suit in Federal court to eliminate the poll tax will not be decided by that time.

Mr. Thornton also reminds taxpayers that property taxes should be paid by January 31 to avoid penalty charges.

Poll taxes may be paid at stations in the county or at the tax office at the court house.
