

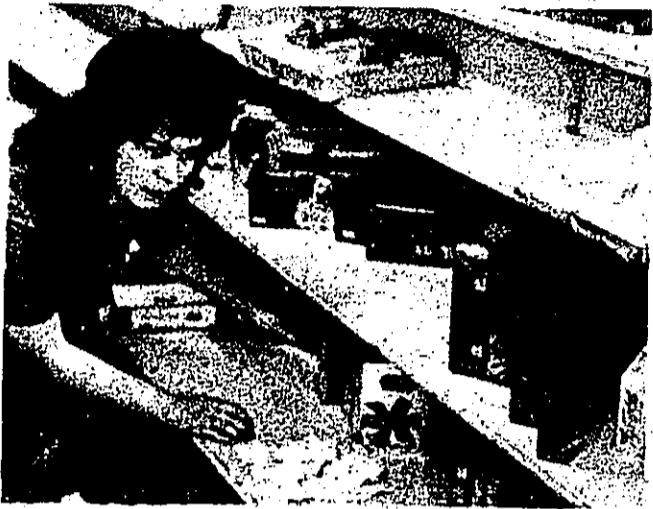

First 1966 Baby To Receive Gifts

Tyler County's first newborn citizen in 1966 will receive a number of gifts from local merchants and a series of photos from the Tyler County Booster.

The first baby born in Tyler County Hospital after midnight Friday will be the "winner" and its parents will be presented the gifts for the



baby. The gifts should be picked up at the various stores following the doctor's certifying the first arrival.

The rules in the contest are simple. The baby must be born in the local hospital and the parents must be residents of Tyler County or the Indian reservation, part of which is in the county.

In case of a tie, a committee will be named to pick the winning baby. However, likelihood of a tie is remote.

Besides the gifts from local merchants, the baby will be photographed by the Booster before it leaves the hospital and at three-month intervals. Prints of the photographs will be presented to the parents and will also be printed in the Booster.

The winning baby will be announced in the first issue of the Booster following its birth. A list of prizes donated will also be printed.

Tax Deadline Is January 31

Tyler Countians are reminded by A.L. Thornton, tax assessor and collector, that January 31 is the deadline for paying poll taxes. This is an election year, and as far as can be seen now a suit in Federal court to eliminate the poll tax will not be decided by that time.

Mr. Thornton also reminds taxpayers that property taxes should be paid by January 31 to avoid penalty charges.

Poll taxes may be paid at stations in the county or at the tax office at the court house. Places in the county with poll tax books are the school tax office in Warren, Fred Grocery in Fred, Spurger Mercantile Company, Dan B Beauty Salon, J.P. Dean Store in Colmesneil, Carl May Store in Rockland and Ray Tremble's in Chester.

Browns Receives Gifts For Christmas

Mrs. C.W. (Farmer) Brown of near Colmesneil surveyed the large assortment of canned goods, groceries, fruit and other gifts and said she didn't know just how to express her feelings of gratitude for the thoughtfulness and kindness the gifts represented.

Mrs. Brown in her 91 years has been on the giving end—she was free with both time and goods for her community and for those less fortunate.

Always active in club and other community projects, Mrs. Brown was a dynamo of action in Eastern Star, garden club, and community improvements. No less active was her husband, known to most Tyler Countians as "Farmer" Brown. They were in the produce business, furnishing county stores with fruits and vegetables, up until recent years.

Misfortune in the form of sickness struck her first, and after she was able to be up her husband became ill and later bedridden. He has been in bed for the past three years.

Mrs. Brown spent months in the hospital about four years ago. The produce business had gone down due to circumstances beyond their control, and Mr. Brown had taken a mail route between Woodville and Jasper. While on this route, he had an accident. His health improved some, but later he became bedridden.

The gifts shown in the picture began coming in before Christmas. The Woodville chapter of the Order of Eastern Star, through the ef-

forts of Mrs. Harry Adams, contributed some of the canned goods, and fruit and a Christmas tree was presented to the Colmesneil Order of Eastern Star.

The Woodville Garden Club presented most of the fruit, a large part of the canned goods and staple groceries. These gifts were personally thought, wrapped and presented by Mrs. Ethel Osborn Hill, who wrote and attached a piece of poetry to each gift.

The Browns also received many other gifts not shown. Among these were checks in amounts from \$10 to \$100 from individuals. And an anonymous friend had their Christmas dinner prepared and sent to them by Woodville Community Inn.

No serious traffic accidents had occurred in Tyler County up until late Tuesday, and local officers were keeping their fingers crossed for the coming New Year's weekend.

The long holiday period which began midnight last Friday may set a record in traffic deaths in the United States. In Texas, the Department of Public Safety had predicted that 110 persons would die in traffic accidents from midnight Saturday until midnight Sunday, when thousands of motorists took to the highways for the eight-day holiday season.

Many persons had a three or four day holiday for Christmas and the highways through the county were crowded the past weekend. Other thousands are expected to hit the highways again this weekend.

The Texas Department of Public Safety has all available personnel working the highways during the holiday period in an effort to cut down on the number of predicted deaths by vigilant patrolling.

However, the number of persons killed in Texas steadily rose and it was feared that the prediction of 110 deaths might be too low.

Motorists are cautioned to drive carefully, and to practice "defensive" driving—that is, watch for mistakes in handling by competing motorists and be "out" to show to avoid accidents.

Traffic through the county is expected to be heavy again Friday night, Saturday and Sunday.

Door decorations winners were the home of S.D. O'Brien, first; Mrs. Edna Collier, second; and James Grimes, third.

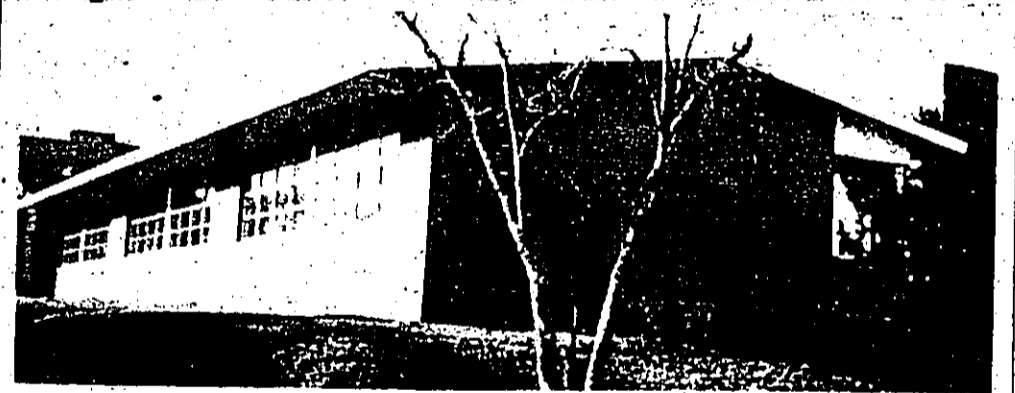
Lawn decorations winners were the Wyatt Bell home, first; the Harry Adams home, second; and the A.W. Cook home, third.

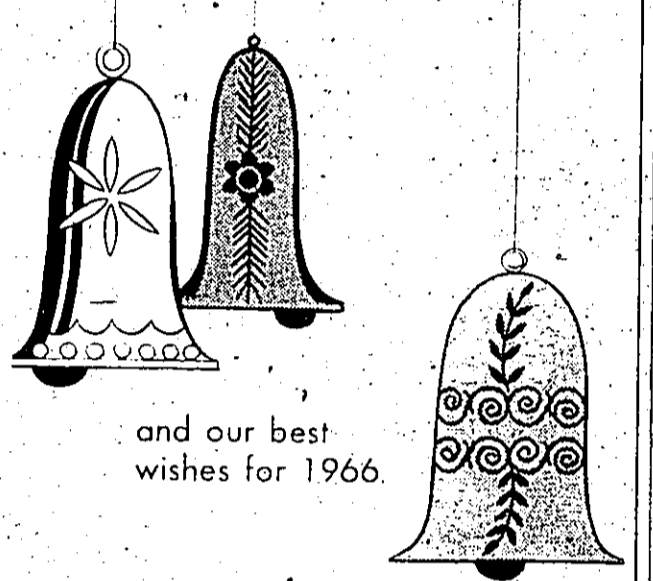

Peace Corps To Test On Jan. 8

Tyler County residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps placement test at 9 a.m. on Saturday, January 8, at 323 Federal Bldg., Beaumont, Texas.

The Peace Corps uses the placement test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicated a High/Low language-aptitude ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitive -- an applicant can retake the test if he fails.

The application form, not the placement test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the

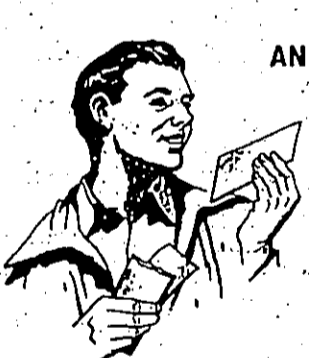
