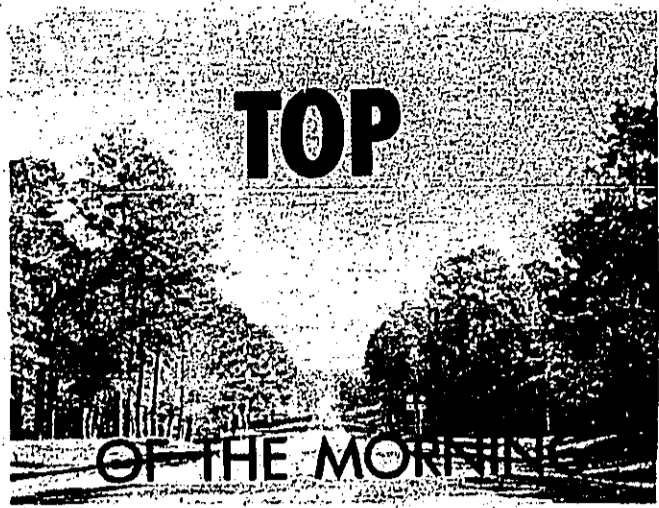

**Tourist Brochures Being Completed**

The brochure to advertise Tyler County recreation and historical attractions is now in the final stages of preparation with a printing of 100,000 copies assured, according to Clyde E. Gray, chairman of the Tourist Development Commission of the Tyler County Program Building Committee.

The brochure will be printed by four-color process with full color photographs of area attractions. The four-color plates and initial copies were made possible by Citizens State Bank with other county firms and individuals donating extra copies of the brochure and map.

The map will be 11x7 1/2 inches and will be made available for distribution to tourists in the county. It will direct visitors to parks, lakes, historical sites and museums in the county. It will carry a large amount of printed information and pictures and will be available at motels, cafes, service stations and stores. A first printing of 75,000 copies of the maps is planned.

The brochure will be distributed through travel agencies, tourist information centers and state highway information stations in and around Texas and will also be mailed to persons seeking information about the area. Stores concerning preparation of the brochure have been picked up by other newspapers and queries for the brochure are already being received.

Besides the Citizens State Bank, firms and individuals making additional copies of the brochure and map available.

**Building Permits Total Over \$500,000**

Heavier rainfall in November and December brought the level of the lake up to 82.79 feet on December 29, which is just at the normal level of 83 feet at which the Corps of Engineers hold the reservoir. Incidentally, San Rayburn Lake on the same date had reached 133.49 feet. Its normal level will be 164 feet, and it should continue to fill with winter rains to a level high enough that Dam B reservoir can be kept at a more constant level next summer.

With these three lakes, this area of East Texas will become a mecca for tourism and sportsmen will have an area unparalleled anywhere for fishing and boating. Plans to connect Rayburn and Toledo Bend with a canal will make all three lakes accessible by boat.

The potential of Dam B has never been reached because of the lack of water during the dry summer months. Rayburn Lake's present high water level and hopes for a wet winter makes it possible for everyone concerned to hope that 1966 will see the beginning of the years when Dam B will be kept filled and its tourist and recreational facilities in use throughout the year.

With Dam B, Rayburn and Toledo Bend to attract tourists and visitors, tourism will increasingly become another industry of great importance in the area. With more and more tourists coming to Texas, the three lakes with proper promotion by area cities can attract more and more of these visitors through the area.

The impact of the area's growth on Tyler County will be an important factor in the county's future progress. Tyler County has made a great deal of progress in the past two decades, and especially in the last ten years, but its population has remained almost the same since 1890, when it first passed the 10,000 mark. In fact, in 1890 the census of that year counted 10,666. In the intervening census years the county's population rose to over 11,000 in 1900, dropped to 10,000 again in 1910, and then was over 11,000 again for the next three decades. It reached its highest figure in the 1940 census when 11,948 persons were recorded as living in the county.

Like other areas, the towns have grown some because of people moving to centers of population. Woodville has grown from about 1500 in 1950 to 1800 in 1960, and now has an estimated population of 3,594. Some of this increase is because of the addition of several surrounding areas to the town by annexation last year.

Tyler County's population has undoubtedly increased since 1960 census figures were made, and by the 1970 census the county's rate of growth should finally give it a much higher population figure than it has seen since the first one in 1850. Incidentally, that year there were 1,894 people in the county--or that's all the census takers could find.

Continued good business and more opportunities for young people in the county are expected to develop in the next few years. Observers feel that Tyler County will have a rapid growth period for the rest of the sixties.

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The Story Of "Bear-John" Risinger

The news of the tragedy soon spread, and the heart-warming sequel of this late illustrates the kindly and helpful relationship of the Alabama Indians and the white settlers.

When the Alabama Herb doctor, or medicine woman, Co-Che-lah-Kas-Kah, learned of her neighbor's plight, she promptly took her dose-side bag of dried herbs and for some miles traveled the foot-path through the densest section of the Big Thicket to give aid and comfort to a friend.

At this time she was a quite young woman, but already looked upon as an authority in healing.

Such a story comes to light from some scribbled old notes which very intimately connected with Woodville citizens G.B. and W.H. Risinger.

When interviewed and asked to corroborate certain details, both men declared that they knew only the bare (bear) facts of what happened to an ancestor, John Risinger, of the Votaw area, before the turn of the century.

John was the brother of George G.B. Risinger, who was killed in the Civil War and great-uncle of the writer. But 40 years ago the story was very fresh in the memories of the old inhabitants.

It seems that on a bright, cool day in early fall, John Risinger was alarmed by the piercing screams of one of his petting geese, quite a ways from the home cabin. Not wanting to get his gun, realizing that part of his winter food of a creature that had fattened up in the woods, he rushed to the rescue.

Nursery Notes

How to make a success of your Amaryllis.

Type of pot.

Use a pot which is about an inch larger in circumference than the bulbs. Use a deep earthen flowerpot (not a glazed pot). Put a small pebbler in the hole in the bottom of the pot.

Type of soil.

Since the roots of the Amaryllis will only grow out when some air can penetrate the soil, it is important to take airy soil consisting of leaf-mould or soil mixed with a little peatmoss.

Planting.

Hold the bulb with one hand in the top part of the pot in such a way that the roots are hanging down into the pot and put soil between and around the roots. The roots must be well covered with soil. Only one inch of the bulb should be covered with soil. However do not press on the bulb. When the bulb throws leaves and the bud appears, then press the bulb somewhat down and add some more soil in the top part of the pot.

Watering.

Never give water on the saucer, but on the soil. The soil should never be wet, just keep it moist. During the first two weeks after planting hardly any water should be given. When watering afterwards the water should be lukewarm. The pot should never stand in water.

Position of the pot.

The pot should be placed at the warmest possible spot where the heat rises from below, such as the mantelpiece or on the radiator of the central heating system.

PLEASE NOTE: AMARYLLIS needs "WARM FEET".

Summary:

1. airy soil

2. earthen flowerpot

3. keep just moist

4. keep as warm as possible underneath

5. keep warm and warm again, especially in the beginning.

6. Failures arise from keeping the bulb too wet before the roots start growing out and also when the bulbs lack sufficient warmth. Temperature approximately 70-75 degrees F. If the temperature is sufficient the flowering takes place approximately 8 weeks after potting.

After Treatment:

After the flowering of the first spike keep the plant growing. Add from time to time a little manure or artificial plant manure which is obtainable from every garden store. By the end of May put the pot outside in full sun and take it back inside the frost can hurt it. When taking the pot indoors cut off the leaves, but leave the bulb still in the pot for about 2 or 3 months. Preferably in a normal house temperature.

If you cannot put the pot in a garden, allow the plant to grow on indoors until October giving it from time to time some manure or special artificial plant manure. From October onwards do not give the plant any water and put the bulb with the remaining foliage on, still in the pot, in a cupboard for 2 or 3 months. Repot the bulb after this rest-period in fresh soil.
