

### You Can't Vote Without Poll Tax

This is an election year, and many candidates are making known their intentions. On the state level, Governor Connally will run again but Sen. Ralph Yarborough isn't happy with him. However, he isn't unhappy enough to risk giving up his senate seat to make the race against Connally, so the liberal bloc will have to find another candidate.

Target of the Democrats will be the senate seat held by Senator John Tower, who formerly lived in Tyler County (as a boy), and so far Waggoner Carr is the only announced candidate for the Democratic nomination.

State Representative J. E. Miller, Jr. will be opposed by Jesse Knighton of Silsbee, a retired state employee. And in the newly redistricted second congressional district, Sen. Senator Martin Dies, Jr. is expected to announce that he will be a candidate. The redistricting bill took Jefferson County out of the second district and combined a total of 18 counties from the old second and old seventh districts. This makes Rep. John Dowdy of Athens the second district incumbent.

### Funds To Print 100,000 Brochures, Maps Assured

Sufficient money had been received by Tuesday of this week to insure the printing and distribution of 100,000 full color brochures advertising Tyler County's recreation and historical attractions and 75,000 visitor's guide maps of the county. Clyde E. Gray, chairman of the Tourist Development Commission of the Tyler County Program Building Committee, announced.

The brochures will be distributed through travel agencies, tourist information centers over the state, and at all state highway information stations. The guide maps will be distributed throughout the county for in-county visitors.

### Tyler County To Have Beautification Project On Hwy. 69

Texas highway beautification plans submitted for approval by the Texas Highway Department to the U.S. Bureau of Roads includes one project in Tyler County. Under the proposal, an overlook would be constructed on the high hill three miles south of the Neches River bridge north of Colmesneil where drivers could pull off the main highway and enjoy the view. Estimated cost is \$3,000 for right-of-way and \$40,000 for construction according to D. C. Greer, state highway engineer.

### Philip Boyd Critically Injured in Car Wreck

A two car collision Friday about 6 p.m. on Highway 69 north of Woodville resulted in serious injuries to one driver and put two others in Tyler County hospital, one with a broken leg.

Philip Leon Boyd, driving a 1966 Mustang, was the most seriously injured and is in a Beaumont hospital with a concussion, punctured lung and crushed leg. Thelma Lee Gray, Woodville Negro woman, driver of the second car, suffered multiple cuts and bruises. Her brother, John Gray, 15, was hospitalized with a broken leg.

According to Highway Patrolman Joe Wilmon, the Gray woman was driving south in a 1962 Ford sedan and Boyd north toward Doucette when the cars collided in the northbound lane. Skid marks indicate that the Gray woman's car went out of control when one wheel locked and skidded about 100 feet into the path of the car driven by Boyd. Skid marks by Boyd's car indicated that he just had time to apply his brakes before the collision.

The injured were taken to Tyler County Hospital by Edwards ambulances, and Boyd later was transferred to Beaumont. Patrolman Wilmon said that his investigation was incomplete as he could not talk to Boyd because of his critical injuries.

A. L. (Pete) Thornton said Tuesday that only 387 poll taxes and eight exemption certificates have been issued so far, and that January 31 is the final date for purchasing a poll tax. He urged county voters to get their poll tax now and prevent a last-minute rush. This is an election year and over 2000 other poll taxes are expected to be sold in the county.

The Tyler County commissioners court in its first meeting of the year Monday set county officials' salaries, paid the county bills, attended to other routine business, and recessed for another session next Monday. The commissioners voted to raise the salaries of elected officials who were cut \$25 a month last year back to \$6750 annually. The salaries of the district clerk, cut to \$5000 last year, and the county treasurer, cut last year to \$5600, were raised to \$6,000 a year, still \$750 less than other elected officials.

The salary of the justice of the peace in precinct one was set at \$5000 with \$50 monthly expenses. All commissioners voted for the new salary schedule except H.H. Powell of precinct two. In other business, the county tax assessor was given authority to hire one more clerk, to continue maintenance contracts with Lufkin Typewriter Company and Monroe Calculator Company on office machines, authorized the county judge to be in charge of maintenance at the court house, and for the county to observe the same holidays as set by the Woodville Chamber of Commerce.

### Contract Let For New Post Office At Colmesneil

A contract with Mr. and Mrs. Ray Benny of Colmesneil has been completed by the U.S. Post Office Department for construction of a building for a post office on the south side of FM Road 126 in Colmesneil. The contract calls for a lease of \$1400 annually for 10 years with four five-year options to renew the lease.

Otha Miles said Monday that he has decided to run for county clerk, and will file and make a formal announcement soon. Miles, a farmer and stockman who lives on the town bluff road, served briefly as office deputy in the sheriff's office as dispatcher on the county radio.
