A Good Town To Live In

The following item appeared in the October 1965 Tennessee Industrial Development News, published by the Staff Division for Industrial Development, State of Tennessee.

The ability of a city or town to attract industry--even to keep and develop what it has--involves many diverse and intangible factors. These include the general appearance of the community, its cleanliness, its recreational

facilities, its municipal and business services, its educational system, its hospitals, its churches, the attitudes of the people toward business and industry, as well as toward each other, and its civic spirit and business and political leadership.

The plant location investigator, like anyone else who is interested in establishing a new home, is very conscious of the environmental, cultural and civic background of the community considered. In a vast majority of the cases, the general appearance of the city is most important. Indeed, in many instances, this first impression can eliminate a location from further consideration. The usual attitude of the plant executive attaches great significance to newly painted, well tended, at-

nically landscaped houses, even if they be only modest in size. This stress on the pride people take in their homes is certainly the attitude of the great majority. Industry is generally more pleased with pleasant surroundings for its working people than at the end of the day, the plant employee must return to an unattractive, unkempt dwelling in which he has no pride. Lack of pride in the place of residence generally means lack of pride in the neighborhood, in the community, in the plant and in the job. On a recent trip of inspection, the vice president of a large manufacturing company, with a limited amount of time, could not see everything in the several cities being considered. No matter what else might be missed, this official insisted on seeing the homes in which his labor force would be living. To him, this was of utmost importance.

Too commonly, many communities believe that the mere possession of sites, power, water, labor, and other of the basic locational assets is sufficient to assure establishment of new industry. So few cities or towns realize the true values of the phrase "A good town in which to live and work."

County Judges To Meet At A&M Feb. 16-18

County Judge and commissioners from every section of Texas will be on the campus of Texas A&M University, February 16-18, for their eighth annual conference. It is sponsored by the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas and the Agricultural Extension Service.

In announcing the conference Extension Director John E. Hutchison said the program would feature speakers and panels on subjects of primary importance to the conferees. Considerable time will be devoted to discussions of legislation passed by the 59th Legislature that affects county officials.

County Judges attending will hear discussions on the new code of criminal procedure while commissioners will devote time to precinct operations. Other program items include discussions on organizing for emergencies and programs available to the counties from state and federal sources.

The director added that other program features would be released as they are confirmed. He added that county agricultural agents have been supplied with information dealing with the conference and it is available from their offices.

Plans are also being made for special events for the wives of participants and other special guests, the director said.

400 Telephones Added In Area During Past Year

More than 400 new telephones were installed in Woodville and the surrounding area during 1965, C.M. Conant, Jr., manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said today.

During the past 12-month period, the average daily number of local calls handled by the firm's office here increased from 8,496 to 9,541.

At the same time, long distance calls jumped from a daily average of 733 to 891, Conant said.

He disclosed that Southwestern Bell's 1965 construction program for the firm's South Texas Area, which includes Woodville, cost the company \$94.8 million.

To keep pace with growing communications needs of its customers in 1966, Southwestern Bell will spend \$26.8 million on new buildings, additions, equipment and service improvements in its South Texas exchanges.

Conant said the company will add the following new facilities and services here during 1966: The introduction of a new four party suburban service. More and improved switching equipment to handle local calls and new toll circuits to handle the increasing amount of long distance calls.

Major 1966 projects in Woodville included: increased amount of buried cable to give customers uninterrupted service during bad weather or storms. More new equipment to handle the ever increasing number of both toll and local calls. A faster and more complete repair service.

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Kyle Is Speaker At Study Club Here Tuesday

Jack D. Kyle, assistant director for business of the Texas Department of Corrections, Huntsville, was the speaker at the meeting of the Woman's Study Club at its meeting Tuesday afternoon at the Community Inn. He was introduced by Mrs. Forrest Archer, club president.

Mr. Kyle, a former school teacher and coach, went to work for the department of corrections in 1958. He was formerly warden of the Ferguson unit, and two years ago was selected as the "warden of the year." He was named to his present position last September. He is a member of the board of the Methodist Church and a Shriner.

Mr. Kyle, while warden of the unit for 17 to 25 year old prisoners, had the lowest return rate in the system. "When you say you don't want your child to have to do all the things you had to, ask yourself these questions," Kyle said: "How many of you were left with a baby sitter? How many got by at home without having a job to do? Did it hurt you? If it hurt you, why aren't you in prison?"

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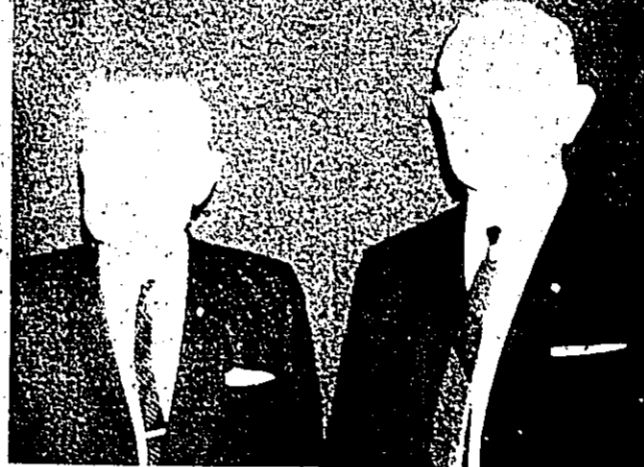

Commissioners Set Bond Election For March 12

Combs Speaks Before Lions



Joe F. Combs, at left, was the speaker at the meeting of the Woodville Lions Club last week. He was introduced by Bill Edwards of Beaumont, a past district governor of Lions International. Mr. Combs, a columnist with the Beaumont Enterprise, is also the author of two books, the latest being "Legends of the Pineys," a collection of legends and factual tales gathered from the piney woods area of East Texas.

The Tyler County Commissioners Court has ordered the right-of-way bond election for March 12.

This election is to provide money for the county to meet its part of right-of-way obligations in a \$10 million state highway building program in the county. The commissioners, after conferring with highway department officials, estimated that the county's right-of-way costs will be around \$750,000. However, bonds will only be issued and sold as the need for right-of-way arises under the state program.

In other business in their first meeting, which was recessed from January 10 to January 17, the commissioners re-appointed the election judges for the voting boxes in the county, voted to purchase a historical marker for the courthouse yard, and set a minimum depth of 30 inches under roads for water pipes to be laid by the Chester Water District.

The court voted to pay constables and justices of peace (except the justice of the peace in precinct 10) a salary of \$1 annually. The court set the salary of the justice in precinct one at \$100 per year in their session January 16.

The commissioners voted to have all county officials on a salary basis. They also voted to put the county clerk's secretary back on a full-time basis at \$225 monthly.

The commissioners also voted to borrow enough money from each precinct account to repay money to the Citizens State Bank which the county had previously borrowed from the bank, with \$6,000 being assessed against each precinct for this purpose.

Once again let me thank each and every one of you good people of Tyler County for the faith and patience you have shown me. May God be with you.

State Senator Martin Dies, Jr. of Lufkin has announced his candidacy for U.S. Congress from the 2nd Congressional District.

Mr. Dies said, "While, of course, all problems cannot be solved in Washington, nevertheless a determined and effective congressman can make a great contribution to the economic development of East Texas and the security, peace and prosperity of our country. East Texas has great potential if we wisely conserve our water resources and utilize the Sabine, Neches, Angelina and Trinity Rivers for barge navigation. This will provide East Texas with water-freight rates which will result in a tremendous industrialization and growth."

Dies has represented the 3rd Senatorial District since 1959. The new Second Congressional District contains eight of these nine counties. While serving in the State Senate, Dies was twice a member of the powerful Finance Conference Committee.

In the regular session of 1963, the Senate unanimously elected him President Pro-tem, the third ranking official in the state, and when the Governor and Lt. Governor were out of the state on May 1, 1963, he became Governor for a day.

The 59th Senate unanimously recommended that the Dan B. State Park be renamed the Martin Dies, Jr. State Park and Parks and Wildlife Commission followed the recommendation.

Mr. Dies says he intends to make a vigorous campaign and visit all counties of the district.

Thomas Tyson Heads Houston Public Service

Thomas B. Tyson, the new director of public service in Houston, is a native of San Jacinto County and the husband of the former Helen Sheffield of Woodville.

Tyson was named public service director in Houston in December. His duties include regulating bus service and other public utilities.

Mrs. Tyson was queen of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival while a senior in high school in Woodville. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Sheffield. The Tysons have one son, Todd, 10, and a daughter, Melissa, 8.

Charles Wilson Announces For State Representative

State Representative Charles Wilson of Lufkin announced today his candidacy for the East Texas State seat vacated by Martin Dies, Jr.

Wilson, 32 and married, is a native of Trinity County. He graduated from Trinity High School and attended Lon Morris Junior College in Jacksonville and Sam Houston State College in Huntsville before his appointment to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, where he graduated in 1956.

He was elected to represent Angelina and Trinity counties while still on active duty with the Navy in 1960. He stresses that his campaign will be based on his six-year record of legislative accomplishment, during which he has authored major legislation in the fields of water development, education, tax reform, mental retardation and old-age assistance.

His statement follows: "The years between 1966 and 1975 will provide the most exciting challenge and opportunity for progress that our part of Texas has known in this century. Our forest and mineral industries are finding new markets and new products. Our small cities are attracting new interest and new industries, and our population is expanding steadily for the first time since the end of the second world war."

"These circumstances together with our vast new reservoirs and coming canals provide us with magnificent raw material. We ourselves must shape and develop the opportunity. We must mold it into the prosperity that East Texas has always promised but never realized. Positive, vigorous, and imaginative representation in our state senate is an absolute necessity for this realization."

"During the coming four months I hope to convince the people of East Texas that I can best provide that representation."

Allen Address Report Due January 31

Joe F. Staley, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, included aliens in the area today that MONDAY, JANUARY 31, 1966 is the deadline for filing address reports on required under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act.

The Immigration official urged aliens who have not yet filed their address reports to do so no later than January 31 to avoid possible penalties.

Mr. Staley said the law requires that every alien except those having diplomatic status, and representatives of certain international organizations, file a report during January of each year at the nearest Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service office.

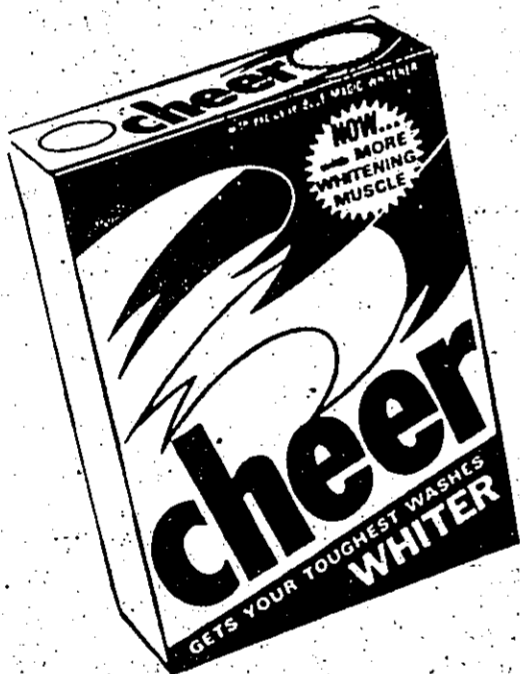
