Poll Tax Payments Lag In County

This is an important election year. Besides a number of district and county offices, Texas will elect a governor, attorney general and other state officers.

Pete Thornton took time Tuesday afternoon to count the number of poll taxes sold up to that time, and came up with only 914.

Now that means that at least 1500 people in Tyler county are going to have to get in line and buy poll taxes or miss out on voting for county and state offices.

One reason for the lag in buying taxes may be the suit in federal court to do away with the poll tax in Texas. But the federal judges before which this suit comes have warned Texans that this suit will not be tried in time for this year's elections—so better get in line for your poll tax now.

Welcome To Our Visitors

All roads are leading to Woodville here of late.

Sunday, the district mid-winter conference of Lions clubs brought around 300 visitors to the city. A total of 200 Lions registered for the conference, and many were accompanied by their wives.

All were impressed with Woodville's hospitality (in fact, this was a repeat performance, being the second such conference held here by Lions District 25-1).

Wednesday night a number of state figures were here for the historical meeting at the Community Inn. This meeting is in preparation to accept the bid of Woodville for the State Historical Foundation meeting next fall, which will bring around 1500 visitors here.

We are happy to welcome these visitors to Woodville and Tyler county. May their numbers increase.

And their numbers will increase. The recreation and tourist commission of the Tyler County Program Building Committee has completed its visitors guide. A total of 75,000 of these visitors guides were printed and will be distributed to visitors by local service stations and places of business. This guide will also be mailed to those inquiring about the county.

The visitors guide shows pictures of a number of places of historical, recreational and scenic interest in Tyler county. In fact, it lists 32 such points of interest—more than most people know existed.

The recreation and tourist commission, which is headed by Clyde Gray, also has a four-color brochure in the works. This will be ready for delivery in about two weeks, and will be distributed through travel agencies, tourist bureaus, highway department information centers, and other methods including by mail to those inquiring about the county. First printing of the brochure is 100,000 copies.

This brochure is designed to get visitors here, and the visitors guide will show them where to go after they get here.

With the growth of tourism as an industry, and the larger number of people coming to Texas, more of them will be interested in the East Texas area. And the brochure will attract more of them to Tyler county.

Three Injured In Collision Saturday

Three persons were hospitalized in a two-car wreck Saturday about 7:40 p.m. on Highway 190 about one mile west of Woodville.

Donald F. Vestal, 18, of Cleveland, a serviceman stationed at Fort Polk, driver of a 1965 Chevrolet traveling west, was brought to Tyler County Hospital by an Edwards ambulance where he was treated for back injuries. He was released Sunday.

Driver of the other vehicle, a 1965 International Harvester pickup truck, was hospitalized with severe cuts and bruises. He is Charles Elson Kirkland, 16. His brother, Woody Dale Kirkland, a passenger in the pickup, was also hospitalized.

Two other servicemen riding with Vestal escaped injury in the accident.

According to investigating officers, the pickup was crossing the highway from a private drive when the car driven by Vestal struck its front fender. The car was a total loss, according to Highway Patrolman Joe Willmon.

Vocational Survey To Be Made Here

In an effort to evaluate the need for a broader program of vocational education in this area, the Woodville school district will conduct a vocational survey among the business, professions, and other employers within the limits of the local school district.
Several business and professional men are giving their time to conduct the survey, and within the next week they will try to call on every employer in the school district in order to estimate the potential employment opportunities over the next three years, according to Sgt. B. H. McGuire.

This survey is being made in accordance with the Vocational Education Act of 1963 which provides for state aid to the local school districts of Texas in establishing and operating programs of vocational training.
Presently only agriculture and home-making programs are provided in vocational education. For the first time, school districts with relatively small enrollments have an opportunity to expand vocational training to prepare students more effectively for the business and industry.
McGuire said, Woodville's prospects for such a program depend on the outcome of this survey. Should an employer within the Woodville school district be overlooked in this survey, he is requested to notify one of the committee chairmen in order that his business may be included in the survey.

Poll Tax Is Highest In County Elections

State Democratic Party officials are most concerned that Texas voters are under a false impression that they no longer have to pay their poll tax in order to be able to vote in the 1966 elections according to W. D. Davis, C.
Payment of poll taxes for federal elections is no longer required, but poll tax payments for state and local elections are still necessary.
All statewide officials, the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the Attorney General, the Justices of the Supreme Court, one of the three judges of the State Court of Criminal Appeals, the State Comptroller, the State Treasurer, the Agriculture Commissioner, the Land Commissioner and one of the three members of the Railroad Commission are to be elected in 1966.
In addition to these statewide and district offices, many other district and county offices must be filled this year.

Failure to pay the poll tax before the January 31 deadline will disqualify any voter from participating in the election of state, district, and county officials.
Partial qualification as a voter is possible through the obtaining of a "Poll Tax Not Paid" certificate, with which the holder may vote only for the offices of U. S. Senator and U. S. Representative in the elections of 1966.

A substantial tax increase will be needed next year to provide for fast-growing state colleges and universities.

Frank Erwin, chairman of the Committee for the Governing Board of Texas Colleges and Universities, estimates that higher-education expenditures will go to \$100,000,000 for the coming biennium—above the present \$432,000,000 budget. That's a 23 per cent increase.

Some authorities feel that increased expenditures for education will run closer to \$170,000,000.

Erwin predicted that college-enrollment increases will be double by the early 1970's and admitted that the task of providing facilities for all applicants will be a major problem.

Erwin said, "It is an enthusiastic in support of new taxes for education as they were backing increased appropriations last year.

Other sources said the higher education budget looking next year may reach \$100,000,000 in that event about \$500,000 may have to come from direct taxation.

Should an increase as large as now foreseen become necessary, pressure almost certainly would be brought to bear on the Legislature to raise the \$50 a semester tuition fee required at state institutions.

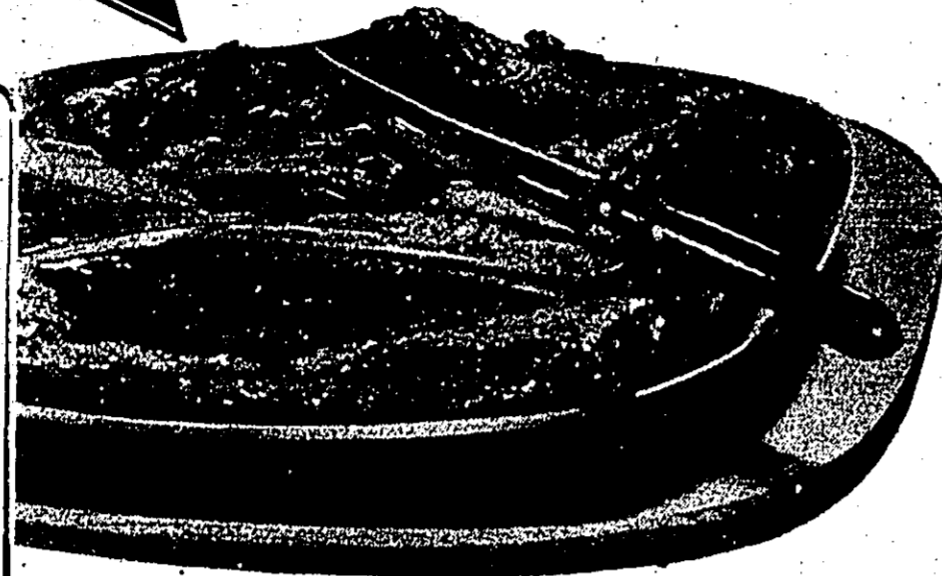

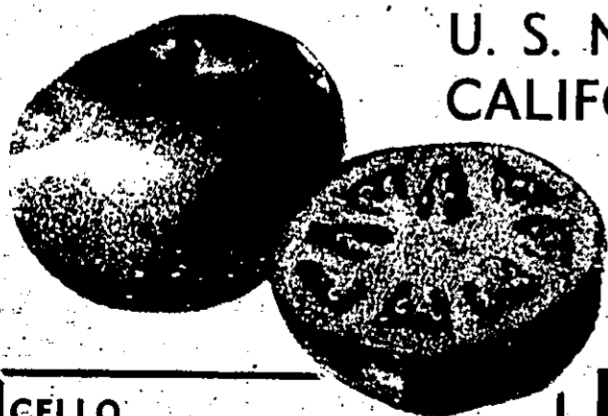
