Some Confusion On Bond Purpose

Tyler County will vote on a bond issue March 12 which we understood was to provide money for right-of-way for the estimated 10 million dollars the state highway department plans to spend in the county in the next few years. However, at the chamber of commerce meeting Monday night someone pointed out that the petition for the election reads "for the purpose of construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or if aid thereof, and that this does not limit the money or even designate any part of it for right-of-way. Well, we aren't too familiar with legalities, and will have to let the county judge or county commissioners answer this question. Another thing we have heard that does need correcting is the rumor that part of this money will be used on the recreational center west of town. This, we know, is untrue and the recreational center will be financed only and strictly through the Farmers Home Administration loan and membership dues.

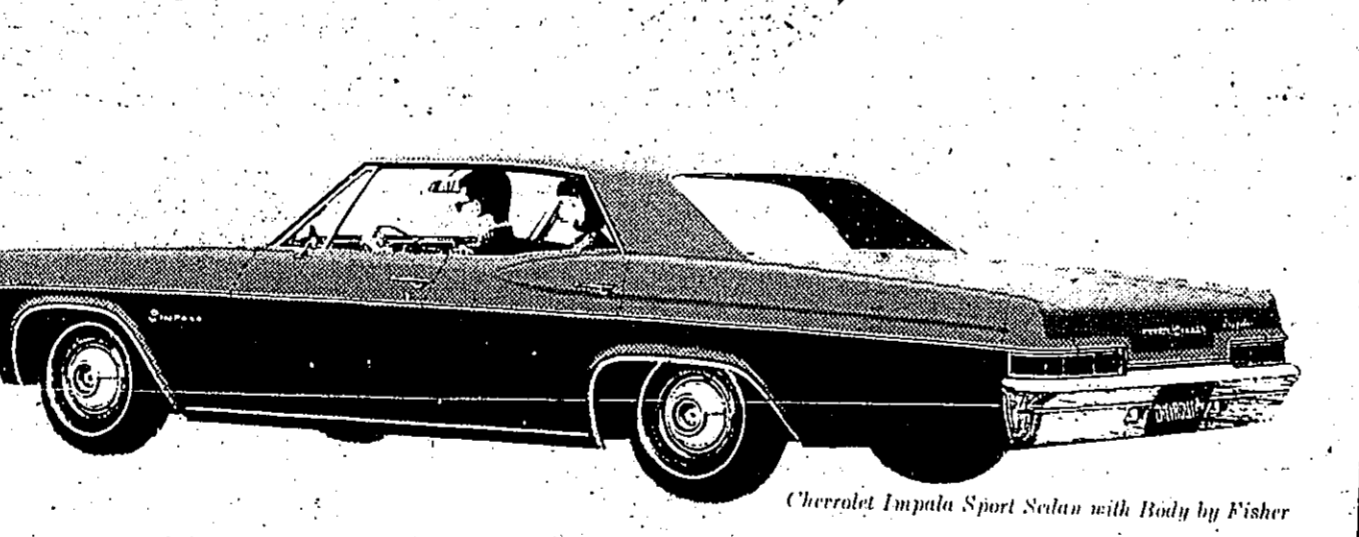
