Jack Risinger Files For Mayor

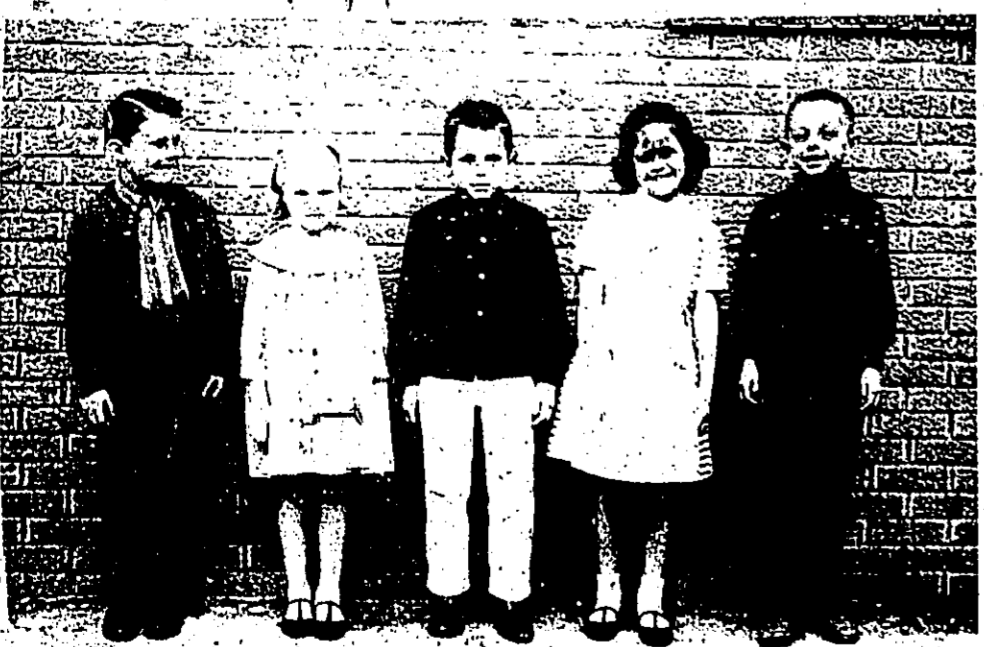
Jack Risinger, a teacher in the Woodville school system, filed for the office of mayor of Woodville in the city election to be held April 6.

Odom Tells Parks Development In Talk Here Friday

Will E. Odom, chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, said Friday night that preservation of the historical sites in Texas should be the major emphasis of its citizens in developing parks in the future.

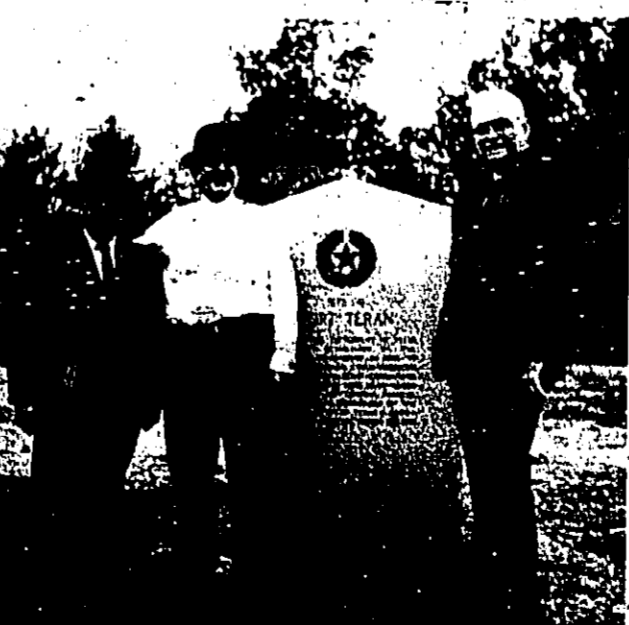
Mr. Odom was the principal speaker at a dinner at Community Inn sponsored by the Tyler County Historical Society. He was introduced by Clyde E. Smith, Sr., associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court and a resident of Woodville.

Mr. Odom told of the progress of the Texas parks system and of plans for the future to provide more parks for Texans and out-of-state visitors.

As an example of their value, he estimated that more than one million persons will visit the Darr-Breaux Woods this fiscal year.

In speaking of historical site preservation, Mr. Odom paid tribute to Judge James E. Wheat of Woodville, first state chairman of the historical society. Judge Smith also recalled the work of Mr. Wheat in getting the state historical group off in the right direction as its first chairman.

Tourist Seminar Set April 4-5

"Tourist Hospitality" may be the key to the prosperity of Texas in the next decade and every Texan needs to know how to make tourists feel welcome and how to stay longer and spend more money.

This is the word of the governor John Connally, the Texas Tourist Development Agency and the distribution department of the extension division of the University of Texas.

Pointing out that 14 million tourists last year spent over \$680 million in Texas, Governor Connally has set 20 tourist seminars in Texas in order that Texans may get a larger share of the \$30 billion spent on pleasure and travel by the American people—a figure that grows each year as leisure time increases.

One of the 20 seminars on tourist hospitality will be held at the Woodville Community Inn on April 4 and 5. It will serve the Southeast Texas counties of Angelina, Polk, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Hardeman, and Tyler. Conducting the seminar will be the Tyler County Historical Society.

will be Frank A. Driskill of the distribution department of the University of Texas.

The sessions will be held daily, one from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. and the other from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Only a registration fee of \$2 will be charged for the seminar. Each person should attend a pre-arranged evening session and will receive a certificate for doing so.

A film produced by the Texas Tourist Development Agency, "Texas, Land of Contrast," will open each seminar. Another film made in Nebraska that shows successful community programs to attract tourists is also scheduled.

The seminars will explain who the visitors are, what they mean to a community, the value of hospitality in inducing the tourist to remain longer in the area and state, and other points of tourist hospitality.

The importance of this seminar is shown by the fact that if every tourist who came to Texas were persuaded to stay one more day, it would mean an extra \$12 million per day in dollars spent. That is why every business man, employee and high school senior who will be employed or businessmen in the future are urged to attend the seminars. Hospitality to travelers is everybody's business and the money they spend trickles into every business in the community, the TTDA points out, and it is everybody's business to learn all they can about tourist hospitality. That is why just about everybody should make it a point to attend the seminars.

At 10:30 a.m. on Friday, Governor Connally will dedicate the 1966 Indian Tourist Development Project. The program will include colorful Indian dances and an address by the Governor. Will Broemer, states "Chief Cooper Sylvestine, born in 1897 and the oldest living member of the Alabama Coushatta Indian Tribes, will bestow an honorary membership in the tribes upon Governor Connally. Mr. Broemer also said "After the dedication, the museum, arts & crafts shop and dining room will be open to the public until 7:00 P.M. on that day."

The Tribes "Witte Chief" and former Governor of Texas, Price Daniel, will also welcome Governor Connally to the Reservation. Mr. Daniel of Liberty signed the bill that started the Reservation on its tourist development and is now the legal advisor for the Tribal Council for an attorneys' fee of \$100 per year, as Price Daniel, will also welcome Governor Connally to the Reservation.

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Indian Commission Chairman, Dempsey Henley, said "The Tribes, officials, the governor would like to invite all our many friends to be present at the dedication."

Matthew Billock, chairman of the Tourist Development Committee, states, "The Tribes also invites the public to come to the Reservation on Saturdays 9 to 5 and Sundays 10 to 5 through March, April, and May when we will have the Indian museum, arts and crafts shop and dining room open plus continuous performances of our tribal dances, tours through the Big Thicket and Indian Camp areas, nature trail through Virginia Timber, and archery."

During June, July and August the program will be open 7 days a week but closed Sunday morning for church.

The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation is located 14 miles west of Livingston on U.S. 190.

The Tyler County Brass Banders and others will leave Spurter at 1 p.m. Friday, March 25, and spend the night at the James Chapman Ranch. Chapman is trail boss for this group.

This year's two-mile long parade will be the largest in the 26 years of the festival, according to party co-chairman John Suttley. Persons wishing to enter floats must do so before Monday.

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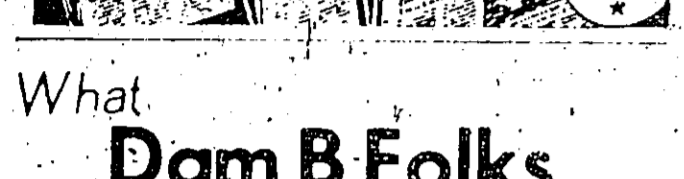

Jerry Sindle Participated In Vietnam Landing. Bottom Third Class Jerry L. Sindle, USA, son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil F. Sindle of Doucette, participated in Operation 'Double Eagle,' the largest amphibious landing ever made in Vietnam, while serving with this command. The assault landing of a large U.S. Marine force near Thach Tra, 30 miles south of Chu Lai, began when a 13-ship Naval Task Force steamed into the objective area in the predawn hours of January 28. Eight waves of assault troops were landed on the beaches, while warships patrolled offshore to provide naval gunfire support. The Marines were virtually unopposed, and received only light small arms fire. Late in the afternoon of January 29, more Marines were landed by helicopter four miles inland from the beachhead. These forces, also unopposed, reported seeing about 200 enemy fleeing the area on foot, changing from green regular force uniforms to the black camouflage garb of the Viet Cong.

He said that Mr. Stone had invited him to come down and hunt with him on this particular morning. Upon reaching the hunting area, Mr. Stone put him on, what he termed, as being one of the most desirable stands in the area, telling him that he would be in a stand on the next ridge. After hearing Mr. Stone shoot and calling to him, he went over and helped him carry the buck to the car. Mr. Tisdale told me that he was certainly glad that Mr. Stone killed the deer because he had been chanking it away from his stand all morning. The buck had one antler with four points on it. ADOPTING ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Adopting and Enacting a New Code of Ordinances of the City of Woodville, Texas, Establishing the Same; Providing for the Repeal of Certain Ordinances Not Included Therein, Except as Herein Expressly Provided; Providing for the Effective Date of Such Code and a Penalty for the Violation Thereof; Providing for the Manner of Amending Such Code; and Providing When This Ordinance Shall Become Effective.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Woodville, Texas:

Section 1. That the Code of Ordinances, consisting of Chapters 1 to 18, each inclusive, and Appendix A, is hereby adopted and enacted as the Code of Ordinances, City of Woodville, Texas, and shall be treated and considered the new and original comprehensive ordinance which shall supersede all other general and permanent ordinances passed by the City Council on or before September 13, 1965...

Section 2. That all provisions of such Code shall be in full force and effect from and after the 1st day of April, 1966, and all ordinances of a general and permanent nature of the City of Woodville, enacted on final passage on or before September 13, 1965, and not included in such Code or recognized and continued in force by reference therein are hereby repealed from and after the 1st day of April, 1966, except as herein after provided...

Section 3. That the repeal provided for in Section 2 hereof shall not affect any of the following: (1) Any offense or act committed or done or any penalty or forfeiture incurred or any contract or right established or accruing before the effective date of such Code; (2) Any ordinance promising or guaranteeing the payment of money for the City or authorizing the issuance of bonds...

Section 4. That whenever in such Code an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or whenever in such Code the status of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, and no specific penalty is provided in such Code for the violation of any such provision of such Code, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00), as provided in Section 1.6 of such Code.

Section 5. That any and all additions and amendments to such Code, when passed in such form so to indicate the intention of the City Council to make the same a part thereof, shall be deemed to be incorporated in such Code so that reference to the Code of Ordinances, City of Woodville, Texas, shall be understood and intended to include such additions and amendments.

Section 6. That, in case of the amendment of any section of such Code for which a penalty is not provided, and Section 1.6 of such Code is applicable to the section as amended, or in case such amendment contains provisions for which a penalty, other than the aforementioned general penalty, is provided in another section in the same chapter, the penalty so provided in such other section shall be held to relate to the section as amended, unless such penalty is specifically repealed thereby.

Section 7. That a copy of such Code shall be kept on file in the office of the City Secretary preserved in loose-leaf form or in such other form as the City Secretary may consider most expedient. It shall be the express duty of the City Secretary, or someone authorized by him, to insert in the loose-leaf places all amendments or ordinances which indicate the intention of the City Council to make the same a part of such Code when the same have been printed or reprinted in loose form, and to extract from such Code all provisions which may be from time to time repealed by the City Council. This copy of such Code shall be available for all persons desiring to examine the same.

any bonds of such City or any evidence of the City's indebtedness; (3) Any contract or obligation assumed by the City; (4) Any right or franchise granted by the City; (5) Any ordinance dedicating, naming, establishing, locating, relocating, opening, paving, widening, vacating, etc., any street or public way in the City; (6) Any ordinance relating to municipal street maintenance agreements with the State of Texas; (7) Any ordinance establishing or prescribing grades for streets in the City; (8) Any appropriation ordinance or ordinance providing for the levy of taxes or for an annual budget; (9) Any ordinance relating to local improvements and assessments therefor; (10) Any ordinance annexing territory to the City or discontinuing territory as a part of the City; (11) Any ordinance dedicating or accepting any plat or subdivision in the City; (12) Ordinances or resolutions prescribing traffic regulations for specific streets, such as ordinances or resolutions designating one-way streets, no-parking areas, stop intersections, intersections where traffic is to be controlled by signals, etc.; (13) Any ordinance establishing or approving rates to be charged by telephone companies or other utility companies or relating to rental charges to be paid by such companies for the use of city streets or other public property; (14) Any ordinance relating to specific railroad companies or to specific railroad grade crossings; (15) Any civil defense plan adopted or approved by the council; (16) Any ordinance enacted after September 13, 1965.

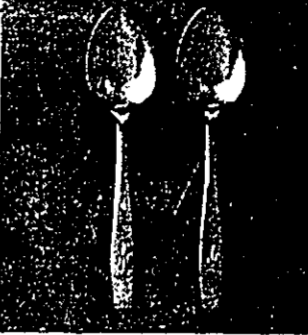
