Amanda Haraldson, Colmesneil High School senior, was crowned queen of the 1966 Tyler County Dogwood Festival in Woodville Saturday night. The Hon. Louie Welch, mayor of Houston, placed the crown on her head to climax a colorful coronation ceremony.

Miss Haraldson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Haraldson Jr. of Colmesneil. Reigning with her as king was James Poland, student at East Texas Baptist College, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Poland, also of Colmesneil. Runner-up in the queen's contest was Barbara Evans, who was Princess of Tyler County. Her escort was Douglas Bennett, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Bennett of Woodville. Miss Gayla Jordan, princess of Spurger, was escorted by Frank Roberts, Princess of Warren, Miss Beverly Wagner, was escorted by Bert Wayne Calloway.

The 1966 Dogwood Queen is active in 4-H club work and was chosen as Tyler County's Gold Star Girl. In high school, she is a four-year basketball letter winner, a member of the National Beta Club, was chosen the Most Likely to Succeed and Most Beautiful, was editor of the school yearbook, and was holder of the Miss CHS title. She was selected by the Daughters of the American Revolution to receive the Good Citizenship Award this year.

Miss Donna Heidecker of Groves was chosen from the out-of-county duchesses as lady-in-waiting to the queen. Her

escort was R. N. Phillips. The coronation began with the customary greeting from Judge James E. Wheat, president and founder of the festival. Josiah Wheat, executive director, was master of ceremonies and introduced the 35 visiting duchesses and their escorts. He introduced Mayor Louie Welch, who introduced the princesses of Spurger and Warren, the ringbearers, and who crowned the king and queen. Mayor Welch also had served as parade marshal in the afternoon parade.

The stage was colorfully decorated in the Mexican motif for the coronation and pageant. Bright colored flowers and dogwood gave the setting a Mexican and East Texas touch.

Stage settings included an open market, a Mexican mission, a replica of Fort Teran, and a typical East Texas log cabin. The throne area had a 14-foot tall silver comb as a backdrop, and the duchesses wore tall Mexican combs in their hair. The throne area was decorated with blue and yellow satin, and the same colors were used to cover the seating area for the royal court.

The coronation program began with a farewell address by Miss Teri Daniels, queen of the 1965 festival. Miss Daniels is a 1966 graduate of Warren High School and is now attending college.

Following the coronation, the queen presented the specially designed dogwood ring by Judge Wheat.

Music for the coronation was by the Bob Smith Orchestra of Houston, the Denny Eaves 40-voice choir of Houston, and

Al Sacker on the organ. Russell Sparenberg, also of Houston, presented a vocal solo, "Beautiful Lady," following the coronation.

The queen's trainbearers were Tena Allen of Colmesneil, Betty Dixon of Warren, Linda Hicks of Spurger and Dorothy Nettles of Woodville. Crown bearer to the king was David Davis of Woodville. The bearer of the ring was James Pittman of Colmesneil, and the crownbearer to the queen was Eric Pike of Woodville. Flower girls were Jackie Ratcliff of Spurger and Lorraine Evans of Warren.
