**Outside of precincts Two and four, there are no political contests on the local level in Tyler County. But district and state races are beginning to warm up as the May 7 primary nears.**

In the second congressional district, Rep. John Dowdy and Martin Dies, Jr. have made pilgrimages to Tyler County. And in the state race for attorney general, Franklin Spears and Galloway Calhoun have both been here. Crawford Martin is due soon.

In other state races, there is no real contest. John Connally is expected to have no trouble defeating his two opponents, Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham and Stanley C. Woods of Houston.

Preston Smith has only token opposition in Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline for lieutenant governor.

In the U.S. Senate race, Waggoner Carr is regarded as a shoe-in over his opponent, John R. Willoughby, in the Democratic primary.

Byron Turnell has two opponents for railroad commissioner, but P.S. Ervin and Paul Harting are both expected to be eliminated in the first primary. Jerry Sadler has an opponent, Fred Williams, but should easily win the nomination for land commissioner. John F. Onlon is highly favored over his opponent, W.T. McDonald, for the court of criminal appeals.

So much for the state races. Now we do have two fairly warm legislative races in our local districts.

For state senator, Bob Murphy of Nacogdoches and Charles Wilson of Lufkin are working hard as the May 7 primary draws close. Here in Tyler County, voters will likely favor Murphy as he is better known and his mother, Mrs. Sam Reid, lives here.

In the race for state representative, Jesse Knighton of Siblee is making a determined bid to unseat J.E. Miller of Newton County. The district was enlarged in reapportionment to include Hardin County, and much will depend on the strength of Knighton in that county.

Miller's father once taught school at Chester, and he is strong in that area. Knighton and his wife have relatives in the southern part of Tyler County and she lived there as a girl. Now Tyler County will go in this race is hard to predict.

Anyway, voters may as well get ready to hear a lot of politics during the next couple of weeks.

Candidates for district and state offices became more active the past week as the May 7 primary election drew nearer.

Absentee voting for the first primary will begin Monday. Applications for ballots may be made at the office of county clerk James W. Coker, 100 West Main Street, during the absentee voting period which will end May 3.

In precinct one, the contests are in congressional districts three and four. All other county officials up for election this year failed to draw opposition.

In precinct two, Bill Powell, incumbent county commissioner, is opposed by J. Thornton and John H. Blevins.

In precinct four, county commissioner F. P. Hinkle drew two opponents. They are James R. (Bo) Jordan, J. B. (Bo) Moore, Lee A. Whiteley and S. J. (Stan) Head.

## Bass Fishing Tournery Heralded As One Of Best

McCroskey of Jasper weighed in a bass at five pounds and this looked good enough in one at five pounds and one ounce, and then a few minutes later Frederick weighed in his five pound two ounce catch. Only one ounce separated the top three catches, something of a record in itself.

Second place team was E.D. Brady of Beaumont and Frank James of Kountze. They caught a string weighing in at 17 pounds five ounces.

Third place team was Sam Malda of Beaumont and Ralph Shivers of Vidor with a string weighing 15 pounds, three ounces. Malda was also third in the individual classification with a catch of 11 pounds, 13 ounces, just behind Holt's 18 pounds, two ounces.

Mr. and Mrs. R.C. McCroskey of Jasper won the Husband and Wife trophy for the second year, and the only other man and woman team in the contest. Mr. and Mrs. C.T. Bradley of Port Arthur, were second.

A total of 146 fishermen registered for the qualifying days, Thursday through Saturday, and 60 qualified for the finals Sunday.

Sunday's finalists were hampered by slightly high winds, crowds of Easter weekend boaters and fishermen, and some of the finalists made a dry haul Sunday.

## Survey Is Started On Reservation Tourism Plan

A study to see if it is economically feasible to develop the Alabama-Coahuila Indian Reservation in Polk County as a Tourist and Recreation Center is now underway. Brown and Root, Inc., has been awarded a contract for \$27,000 to do the survey. Development Administration to conduct the study.

This project is designed to develop a master plan, including a zoning model, and will provide cost estimates and financial feasibility studies on economic possibilities of tourism development.

The project will entail surveys, mapping, soil investigations and architectural engineering studies for a 900-acre tract with boat dock, campsite, picnic and other facilities and an auditorium for a part of the Tribal Historic Site in the Indian Village. Some of the Tribal Historic Site, Native Game Railroad and many other attractions.

With assistance, Superintendent of the Reservation, said that the tourism complex, if approved, should provide employment for over 100 men and women and women and their families among the members of the Tribe. 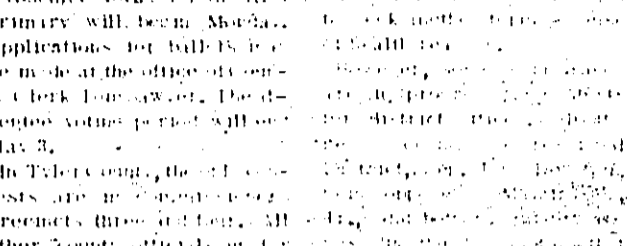

## CANCER CONTROL MONTH, 1966

### A PROCLAMATION

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Every two minutes cancer strikes a child in this country. It ranks second to the causes of all deaths. This represents untold human suffering, as well as a staggering loss to our economy. Scientists, physicians, and officials are making remarkable progress in combating cancer and other such major diseases. These programs will enable us to develop new knowledge of cancer and to make available to patients the latest advances in diagnosis and treatment.

Any program for the prevention and control of cancer requires the support and cooperation of all our people. For this reason, the Congress, by a joint resolution of March 29, 1958 (52 Stat. 148), requested by President to issue annually a proclamation setting apart the month of April as Cancer Control Month.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LYNDON B. JOHNSON, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim the month of April 1966 as Cancer Control Month and I invite the Governors of the States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and other areas subject to the jurisdiction of the United States to issue similar proclamations.

I also ask the medical and allied health professions, the communications industries, and all other interested persons and groups to unite during the appointed month in public reaffirmation of this Nation's efforts to control cancer. IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed. DONE at the City of Washington this fourteenth day of February in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty-six, and of the Independence of the United States of America one hundred and ninetieth.

american cancer society Smoking Habit Shortens Life, Tells Are Told

merican Cancer Society answered the question by emphasizing that the longer people put off starting to smoke the better their chances of a long life. He cited vital facts and expressed the hope that teenagers, or even those younger, would put an end to the problem of cigarette smoking and health. He explained that in 1960 the American Cancer Society began what is now a national teenage smoking program. It was a well coordinated program of working with schools, teachers, other health agencies, youth groups, counselors, etc. The Society started this program because a pioneer ACS study in 1958 revealed that the rate with which youngsters took up cigarette smoking could probably be cut in half by an effective education program. It learned that youngsters whose parents, mentors, idols, peers smoke are more likely to acquire the smoking habit than those whose parents, mentors, idols, peers do not smoke. Studies of the death rates of the ideal complaints among smokers and non-smokers demonstrate that the longer one stays away from cigarettes, the more these life-threatening ailments health appreciate it if those who have never smoked cigarettes, in their 40-50 years of age, a recent study showed that for those who started smoking in their late teens or early 20s, the average life expectancy was 17.4 years less than those who started smoking after age 25.
