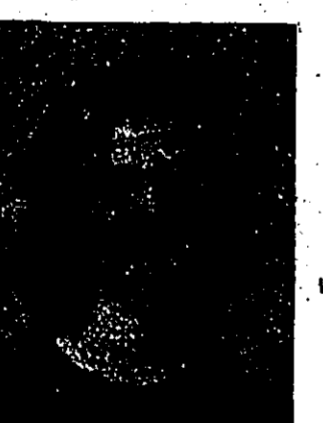

Absentee voting has been about normal for a primary election in spite of the lack of local contests on the ballot, figures from Tom Sawyer, county clerk, indicated Tuesday.

Up until Tuesday noon, a total of 42 applications for absentee ballots had been received in the county clerk's office.

This indicates fairly strong interest in the primary in which the only local contests are for commissioner in precincts two and four. No other county official up for re-election this year has an opponent. Local races are usually the ones in which voters take the most interest.

However, a lively contest in the two commissioner races has accounted for part of the absentee voting. In precinct two, Herman H. Powell, incumbent, is opposed by L. T. Thornton and Oscar Ferguson while in precinct four, F. C. Hicks, the incumbent, drew four opponents. They are Loy A. Whitley, J. R. (Bob) Moore, James R. (Bo) Jordan and S. J. (Stan) Head.

Some hot races have developed in district and state campaigns. Two of the warmest are in the second congressional district where John Dowdy, the incumbent, is being challenged by Martin Dies, Jr., and in the State Senate campaign in which Bob Murphey and Charles Wilson are vying for Dies' old office.

Absentee voting will run through next Tuesday, and as the May 7 primary date approaches the pace of absentee balloting will likely reach a normal level for a primary in spite of the lack of county-wide races.

X-Ray Unit To Be Here May 10

The mobile x-ray unit of the Beaumont Tuberculosis Association, Tuesday, May 10, in front of the administration building at the school to make chest x-rays of pupils and their families as a follow-up to the recent skin tests made in the county's school system.

All pupils who had a positive reaction to the skin tests, together with their families, will be asked to have a chest x-ray that day.

However, school health authorities of both Woodville and the other county schools urge everyone in the county over 12 years old to take this opportunity to have a chest x-ray made that day. The cost is only \$1.50.

Under a new state law, all school personnel must have a chest x-ray made before the next term of school begins, and this is an excellent opportunity for them to have this done. Ruth Thomas, R.N., points out, Mrs. Thomas is school nurse for Colmesnell, Chester and Spurger.

Mrs. Thomas said that if a child reacted positively to the tuberculin skin test given recently, there is no reason for alarm. Such a positive test does not mean that a child has developed tuberculosis, nor does it mean that the child is infectious or can pass the germ on to others. It simply means that the child has been around someone with active tuberculosis and has picked up the germ.

However, x-ray of the lungs should be made to be sure the child does not have any active disease and it should be done each year thereafter, Mrs. Thomas said. When TB does develop, it is often many years after infection is received.

Mrs. Thomas emphasized that every adult in the family of children with positive skin tests should have an x-ray and every child a skin test. The x-rays will be read by a physician and the report sent to the family of the person involved.

The eight-page booklet shows how the two parts of Medicare will work and reminds people of the past 95 in signing for the doctor bill insurance by May 31. Those who have not done so by then will have to pay for the doctor bill insurance.
