Indian Tourism Plan Set

A two million dollar budget for the development of a vast tourist project at the Indian reservation was presented to the Texas Commission on Indian Affairs at a meeting at the reservation Monday afternoon.

The \$2,767,170 budget would go toward developing a tourist complex on the 4,200 acre reservation which will employ 152 persons when completed. Included in the budget are a 450 acre lake costing \$511,000; a camping area with 20 cottages and camping shelters costing \$227,600; a shopping center; a living Indian Village, an amphitheatre, a swimming pool and an arts and crafts factory.

Plans for the budget were made through a feasibility study made under a grant to Brown and Root. The Tribal Council presented the study to members of the Indian Commission at the meeting Monday.

Dempsie Henry, chairman of the Indian Commission, said the commission will study the budget in detail before presenting it to the State Budget Board in Austin and to the Economic Development Administration. The state legislature will be asked to provide one-half of the budget.

Absentee Voting For Run-off Ends Tuesday Night

Absentee voting for the second Democratic primary began Wednesday and will end Tuesday night, according to the county clerk's office.

Persons who are ill or who will be out of the county on June 4 may vote by applying for an absentee ballot.

There is one state-wide race and two precinct contests for Tyler County voters.

In the state-wide run-off, Crawford Martin and Franklin Spears are seeking the nomination for attorney general of Texas.

In precinct two the incumbent commissioner, Herman H. Powell, is in a run-off with T.F. Thornton. Precinct four commissioner French C. Hicks will face James R. (Bo) Jordan in the run-off.

The only race in which voters in precincts one and three can cast a ballot will be in the attorney general's race. However, every voter is urged to cast a ballot in this run-off for the important office of attorney general.
