## WRECK IN WHICH FOUR WERE KILLED



This is the scene of the wreck last Thursday in which four Hillister residents were killed, occupants of the demolished car at the right. The car was traveling north toward Woodville and the truck was pulling onto the highway from the right. The car struck the rear dual wheels of the trailer.

## 4 Killed In Wreck

An automobile collided with the rear dual wheels of a truck pulling onto the highway six miles south of Woodville Thursday, killing all four occupants of the car.

The accident, which occurred in an early morning fog, claimed the lives of four Hillister residents who were on their way to work in the Woodville area. They were Alvis Moys, 23; Clarine Mowe, 20; Jonnye Lee Andrews, 30; and Woodrow Glover, 20. All were pronounced dead at the scene.

The trailer-truck, loaded with sheet-length cut-offs from poles, was pulling onto the highway from the H. E. Allison Pole Mill from a road on a slight rise which has a clear view in each direction from the highway. However, it is thought to have obscured the view of the highway and the car, traveling at a high rate of speed, crashed into the rear of the trailer. A beam chain was snapped and the heavy poles tumbled off onto the car.

Highway Patrolman Bill Stewart, who investigated the wreck, said that there were no marks on the highway to indicate that the driver of the car saw the truck in time to either swerve or throw on the brakes.

The impact knocked the dual wheels out of line and left the hood of the car hanging over the top of the wheel.

Driver of the truck, James Merle Amsit, 40, of Hillister, was not injured.

Inquest was held at the scene by J. B. Loggins, precinct justice of the Peace, Coleman Funeral Home ambulances picked up the victims, and arrangements were handled by Coleman.

## Parking Ordinance Amended By Council

The city ordinance limiting the parking of vehicles over 17 feet in length on Magnolia and Bluff streets to 30 minutes was amended at the council meeting Monday night to allow two-hour parking.

Decision of the ordinance had been postponed from the May meeting to allow interested parties to appear before the council to give their opinion regarding the parking time.

The ordinance, which in effect applied to three trucks, limited their parking to 30 minutes. Some opposing to the short time provided, it was thought that the trucks were needed to park in the area.

At the meeting Monday night only two persons showed up to voice an opinion on the ordinance. They were R. E. Grammer, president of the Hill Pole Cafe, and J. L. Mosley, furniture store owner.

Whereas, the week of July 4th will bring many vacationers to our area and many people will be arriving or passing through our town by Saturday, July 2nd, and, whereas, Woodville is widely known as a center of cultural and tourist attractions and Tyler County is graced with many beautiful and commodious homes of retired Senior Citizens, and, whereas, an annual set time for a Youth Week observance will create a growing youth image and interest in our area, and, whereas, Youth Week last year was met with such cooperation and success with the combined efforts of churches, clubs, private and business people, and, whereas, the July 4th holiday will be the time most young people will be looking for vacation attractions and many will be camping out in our area with parents or visiting in local homes, I, Mayor F. W.
