Tyler County commissioners court, who in a special meeting June 27 had voted to let the tax valuation remain the same for the coming year, resumed the special meeting Thursday of last week and rescinded the order.

Tyler County did not have an accident of any consequence during the three-day July holiday which ended Monday at midnight.

The Fourth of July traffic death toll seems to have set a record, and in Texas there were at least 10 more highway fatalities than had been predicted.

However, in Tyler County motorists for the most part took it easier and no accidents were reported in the holiday period which began Friday at 6 p.m. and ended at midnight Monday.

Of course, there were exceptions among the drivers on county highways. A few drinking drivers were pulled off the road by law enforcement officers. But on a weekend when there were several thousand more autos on highways here than ordinarily, drivers seemed to be, for the greater part, driving safely and cautiously. A lot of the credit goes to the strict enforcement of speed laws by highway patrolmen and other officers, but most drivers also appear to be commended.

If you happened to drive by the Dam B area during the weekend, you saw the crowded camping and parking areas all around the reservoir. While Dam B reservoir was down a little, there still was enough water to provide swimming and boating. Many family groups brought tents and camping equipment while others took advantage of the shelters and facilities in the park. Speaking of the water level of Dam B, Corps of Engineers planned to start generating electricity through one of the turbines at Sam Rayburn, which will put some fresh water in Dam B. Fishermen think a little fresh water from the new lake will improve fishing in Dam B.

And if you want to tour the power generators at Sam Rayburn, guided tours are starting Monday. They will be given daily through Fridays to interested persons. Hours for the tours will be in a news story in this issue.

Hearings Being Held On Water Plan For Neches Basin

Development of the Neches River Basin and the Neches-Trinity Coastal Basin are being discussed at public hearings held by the Texas Water Development Board in Nacogdoches and Beaumont.

The hearing in Nacogdoches was held Wednesday at the Redona Hotel and the Beaumont hearing will be held Friday at the Ridgewood Motor Hotel at 9 a.m.

A hearing team from the Texas Water Development Board discussed the part of the Neches River Basin will have in the proposed \$3.2 billion Texas Water Plan and at Beaumont will include the Neches-Trinity Coastal Basin in the river basin hearing.

In addition to the hearing on the Texas Water Plan and the proposed development of the Neches and the Neches-Trinity Coastal Basin, officials from the Texas Water Pollution Control Board will conduct a hearing on water quality in the basins. Water quality testimony may be given at the same time as other aspects of the Texas Water Plan are discussed.

The Texas Water Plan, described by Governor John Connally as "bold and imaginative" and considered by internationally-known water authorities "the most comprehensive and far-reaching in the world," proposes the construction of two reservoirs in the basin and the enlargement of an existing reservoir at an estimated cost of \$148,000,000 as part of the plan to "develop and conserve the State's water resources through the year 2020 when there will be an estimated 30,500,000 persons living in Texas.

Reservoirs proposed include Rockland and Ponta near Rusk in Cherokee County. Enlargement of Lake Palestine (Blackburn Crossing) is proposed. In addition, the plan calls for the construction of a salt-water barrier near the coast. However, the specific site has not been designated. It would be desirable, the plan points out, to locate the barrier on Pine Island Bayou and the Neches River.

Estimated cost of the proposed projects at Rockland Reservoir at \$44,500,000 and Ponta at \$61,800,000. The Lake Palestine enlargement to be shared by the Texas Water Development Board and the Upper Neches Municipal Water Authority, is estimated at \$12,300,000.

Both Rockland and Ponta would provide for conservation and flood-control storage capacity.

The Texas Water Plan calls for the development of Rockland Reservoir between 1980 and 1990; Ponta Reservoir between 1990 and 2020, and the salt-water barrier between 1987 and 1979. The enlargement of Lake Palestine is considered already scheduled for construction.

The proposed plan of development includes a continuing study of the relationship of fresh-water inflows to marine life habitat of coastal waters, and proposes to meet all estimated water needs in the basin.

The camp also provides opportunities for the girls to learn new skills and to acquire new interests. The establishing of democratic attitudes, the promotion of an understanding of and respect for others of different backgrounds, and helping the girls gain a sense of worth, of achievement, and of belonging are all a part of the entire scope and purpose of Camp Niwana.

100,000 Visit Rayburn Lake

During June

An estimated 100,000 persons visited San Rayburn Reservoir during June, the Corps of Engineers reported at its dam site reports.

This large number visited the reservoir in spite of the fact that only three of the 50 planned recreational areas have been completed. Total for the year is estimated at 600,000 persons.

Both the Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Forest Service are constructing recreational areas about the reservoir.

The project is being completed in 1967. The Corps of Engineers will complete the 50 planned areas and the Forest Service will complete the 100,000-acre area.

The reservoir is located about 70 miles from Dallas and is one of the largest in the state. It is a popular spot for fishing, boating, and other recreational activities.
