JUSTICE COURT FINES TOTAL \$11,900 SO FAR

Total of \$11,900 in fines assessed before 1966 in the Peace and Justice Court in the first six months of this year. The fines were collected and put in the county's general fund.

When the new Texas Code of Criminal Procedure went into effect January 1, no court costs are levied against persons charged with offenses and the total amount of the fund goes into the general fund. Formerly the major part of the payments by persons charged in court was "court costs" and the funds collected went into other funds, including the bridge and road fund of the county.

Only the actual fine, not the "court costs," went into the general fund. Misdemeanor and felony cases are filed in precinct courts of the peace court by the sheriff's department, the highway patrol, the game warden, and occasionally a constable.

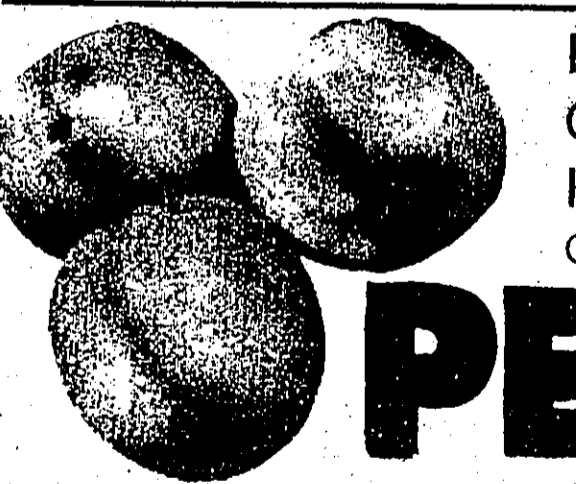
