

Rayburn Power Plant

A large immer of area people have taken advantage of the guiden tours through the Sam Rayburn Dam power plant during the past three. weeks. The tours are conducted Mondays through Fridays at 9:30 and 10:30 a.m. and at 1:00 and 2:15 p.m. Generation of power started about three weeks ago on a rcs or schedule on one of the nuge turbines. Corps of Engineers guides say that both generators can turn out anhuldly enough electricity to light 1,184,000,000 light bulbs or 100-watt size for one hour. Or if you are interested in voltages, the generators can send 38,800 volts into twotransformers located on the draft tube deck and in turn 138,000 volts comes from the

transformers. Two power intakes, with two 26,000 kilowatts at normal rating.

. The power generated from the plant is distributed by Sam Rayburn Dam Electric Cooperative , Inc. over Gulf States lines.

The powerhouse is about 16 stories high. The lowest floor contains the oil storage room and access to the draft tube, about 100 feet below the normal surface of the reservoir. Thirty-six feet above the draff tube access is the turbine room floor, then the generator. room floor which also houses the maintenance shop.
