

Run the clock back 35 years, and you are in the third year of the great depression. The rattle-trap old cars, loaded with all a family's possessions plus the entire family are going west toward a mirage called California. Every freight train that pulled out of the terminal was loaded with jobless men, some 50 to 100, on the road looking for any kind of a job at any kind of a wage. Those going East sat around the freight yards and exchanged bits of information with those bound West about places where there was work to be had, always somewhere over the distant land.

If you were one of those who had a job, you tried to hold on to it with all your might. The sight of those old cars chugging west, the hundreds riding gratis on the freight trains, the hundreds hitchhiking on every road, was a stern reminder that you were lucky to be among those fortunate enough to be employed.

In a few months, as the depression grew, were to come the Public Works Administration, the Civilian Conservation Corps, and other made-work projects to help the economy along. The Federal government was trying to prime the pump, as the saying went, to get the country back on its feet.

The economy was sick. Just the economy. The people weren't. Most of the millions of unemployed, the low-salaried people, those on relief, all were pretty sure that things were going to be better on the morrow. They had faith. They had confidence in the country, and the country gradually repaid that confidence with an improving economy. Things were vastly improved by 1939 when Hitler started World War II and defense spending that left the depression years a fading memory.

In today's managed economy, we have to worry about inflation, high prices, high interest, and myriad other annoyances. We have the poor and underprivileged to worry about, although the poor and underprivileged are living better than most people did in the great depression.

So the country is in a fairly healthy condition today, economically. But there are a few festering sores that could prove to be disastrous. There is an unhealthy mental imbalance across the land that is growing into a mania.

Students on many college campuses are learning some things that their hardworking parents, scrimping in many cases to give them a college education, didn't know was on the extra-curriculum. They are being taught unpatriotism, atheism, that moral decadence is the vogue, sit-ins and riots are self-expression.

But college campuses are only one festering spot. The civil rights movement has bred anarchy, the Federal government is practicing despotism in its dealings with the states, crime is on the rise with the courts coddling the criminals with no regard for the rights of the general public. A large segment of the population has been economic parasites for two or three generations, living off the earnings of others.

These are just a few of the sores. There are others. You would think that the Great American spirit of justice, self-dependence, self-reliance, prudence, patriotism and freedom would cause the rest of the population to rise up and demand that these sore spots be treated with something more than indifference.

But these not afflicted are apathetic. They don't want to be bothered with problems of the country—leaves that to the politicians. The politicians have only one cure—pour money on the sore spots, which only aggravates the ills.

We've got to get out our mops and brooms and do a little cleaning before it gets worse. And apply a little antiseptic of American spirit to the sore spots.

America as it did during the depression, can pull itself out of the hole by its own bootstraps. But we must get hold of them before they are hopelessly mired in the mud of decadence.

## Four Have Narrow Escape In Car-Truck Accident

Four persons narrowly escaped death Monday afternoon when the car in which they were riding was completely demolished in a car-truck accident about two miles south of Warren on Highway 69.

Taken to Tyler's East Hospital by Edwards ambulance were Robert Eugene Robinson, 22, his wife, Barbara Loden Robinson, 19, their son, Robert David, 2, and daughter, Barbara Jean, 1.

The children were treated and released Monday afternoon. Both Mr. and Mrs. Robinson suffered severe cuts and bruises and were still in the hospital Tuesday. The truck driver, Calvin Brauner, apparently escaped unhurt.

The accident occurred on the rain-slick highway when Mrs. Robinson, driver of the car, attempted to pass a large tandem gravel truck driver by Brauner. As the car passed the truck, spray from the wheels of the truck hit the car's windshield, obscuring her vision.

The car's left wheels apparently went onto the left shoulder, and when she pulled back on the light was the car went out of control.

Brauner told Highway Patrolman Joe Williams that when he saw the car going out of control, he applied his brakes and pulled toward the right shoulder. The truck struck the spinning car and the car spun into two large pine trees, completely shearing the front of the car from the driver's seat forward from the rest of the body.

Mr. and Mrs. Robinson were thrown into the back seat, which apparently saved them from more serious injuries. The truck slid into another pine tree, shearing it off at axle height, and the pine tree came to rest over the length of the truck. The driving wheels were torn from the truck and came to rest near the truck.

The two Robinson children were riding in the back seat and luckily were not thrown out by the impact. After striking the pine trees, the car traveled another 10 feet. When wreckers attempted to pick up the car, the front end, including the steering wheel, dash and front part of the drive shaft was found to be completely torn from the rest of the car. Wrecker drivers said the car was actually in three pieces.

Heavy equipment from Weaver-Chesher in Village Mills was called to pull the heavy truck from the shoulder. Other than a dent on the front and the loss of the driving wheels at the rear of the tractor part, the truck showed no damage. It was heavily loaded with gravel at the time of the accident.

Wrecker drivers and officers investigating the accident said that the Robinson car was the most completely demolished of any they had seen in an accident. The fact that the first impact apparently threw both the front seat passengers into the rear seat probably saved them from serious injury or death, they said.

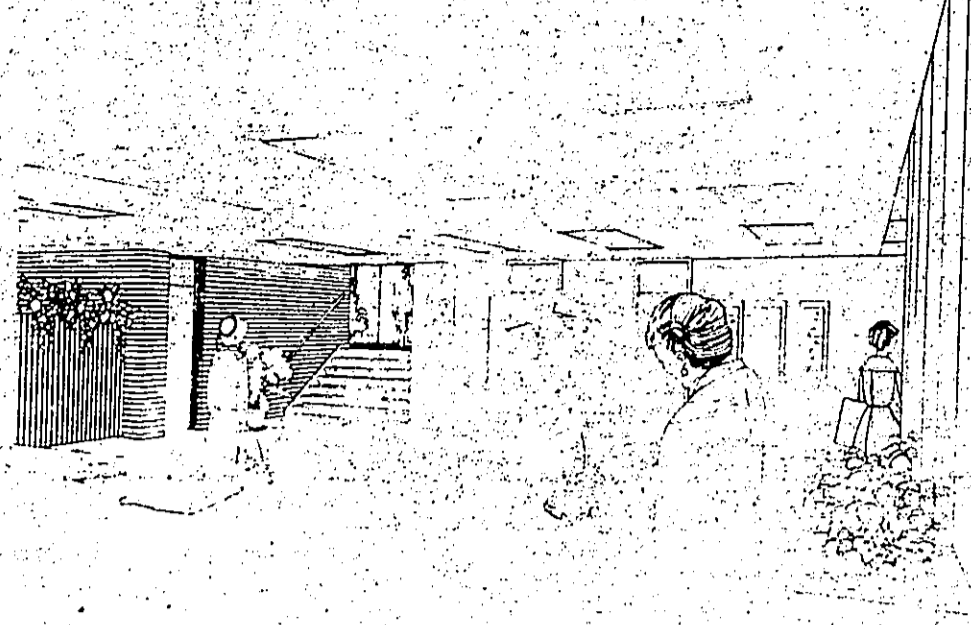
